New FSA Official Takes Over Duties In Valley County

before the new farming season. Dur-
ing the time Mr. Keyes has been in
office, 25 new loans have been made,
totaling \$29,830.00. Collection during
the same period were \$16,177. In the
past year, 10 loans, totaling \$9,490
have been paid out completely. An
equal number, Mr. Keyes believes
will pay out the coming year.

A change was made this week in
the county FSA supervisor, stationed
at Cascade, with the resignation of
R. M. Keyes.

The new FSA supervisor is Maurice
V. Sorenson. Mr. Sorenson is a son
of Royal K. Sorenson, purebred Here-
ford breeder of Rexburg, Idaho. He
is a graduate of the University of
Idaho and was a member of the Uni-
versity Livestock Judging team that
won first place at the Pacific Inter-
national Livestock Exposition last
fall.

During his college career, Mr.
Sorenson devoted two years to an ex-
tensive study of the farmers and
consumer's cooperatives of Norway,
Sweden, Denmark and Germany. He
speaks Swedish fluently and was in
Germany during the Austrian crisis
and returned to this country via Italy
and France shortly before the pres-
ent war began.

Mr. Keyes stated that he has ap-
preciated the cooperation given the
FSA program and himself by the
farmers and business men of Valley
and Adams counties. After leaving
the Farm Security Administration,
Mr. Keyes will operate the Ellis Hart-
ley Ranch at Council, Idaho, which
he owns in partnership with his
father, K. L. Keyes.

Mr. Keyes has been in charge of
the Cascade office since August 19,
1939. He reports that business trans-
acted out of the office has been
steadily increasing. The office now
handles 96 loans totaling \$127,760.00.
81¼ per cent of all 1940 maturities
have been met and a good deal of
the remaining balance will be met
