# Idaho Prison Camp Under Construction In Valley County

Idaho prisoners will be rehabilitat-  
ed in future years at a new prison  
camp now under construction at  
Smith's Ferry, according to Franklin  
Girard, state forester.

Girard announced this week that  
final touches are being put on dor-  
mitories which will be used by the  
prisoners at this Valley county prison  
labor camp.

The camp was built up by the  
Southwestern Idaho Timber Protec-  
tive Association and was donated to  
the state by S. G. Moon, general  
manager of the Boise Payette Lum-  
ber Company.

A few months ago, Girard took the  
idea to the Idaho prison board that  
the camp at Smith's Ferry would be  
the ideal place for the rehabilitation  
of prisoners.

He asked the prison board to use  
the camp as a place for first offend-  
ers or for prisoners who are not  
hardened to criminal tendencies.

The board took up the suggestion,  
inspected the camp, stamped its ap-  
proval on the project, and gave Ward-  
en Gilbert Talley of the Idaho Pris-  
on the authority to transfer a crew  
of men to the camp.

Three dormitories are available to  
the men. They also will have access  
to a recreation room, a shower and  
wash room and mess hall.

The camp will hold a maximum of  
100 men. About 15 will be sent dur-  
ing the next few months, however, to  
start the camp. The men will work  
on a nursery raising young pines to  
replant Idaho forest lands.
