Ski Instructor Apprehended In Boise By Sheriff Headrick

County Sportsmen's Wednesday evening follows hall in Cascade for the two deer situation resolution to disallow deer hunt on the lands carried by a large

Resolution had been passed by Supervisor of the Payette Forest, conducted an investigation on "What is the Middle Fork game respect to the over-hunt question."

It seems that the Sportsmen's Association would rather see the deer be utilized by hunters. The fact still remains that there are many sheep on the over-hunt range.

McCALL, IDAHO — December 11—Sepp Benedikter, engaged last week by the Payette Lakes Ski Club as skiing instructor, was arrested in Boise Tuesday by Sheriff Don Headrick and is being detained for the United States immigration service, according to information received from Boise yesterday.

No reason was made public at the time and the Federal officers at Boise as well as immigration headquarters at Salt Lake refused to make any comment.

When apprehended at Boise, Benedikter was making arrangements to purchase a new car.

Benedikter is one of five Austrian skiers who came to this country as a ski instructor for Sun Valley shortly after that resort was established. He was considered an excellent instructor and ranked high among the "down-hill" skiers of the world, having won the diamond skis at Sun Valley, which are awarded only to skiers making the Baldy mountain run in 3 minutes and 10 seconds or less.

It is said that Benedikter had been paid a month's salary of \$300 in advance for the month of December by the local ski club and he was in Boise and other valley towns doing publicity work for the ski club when he was picked up.
