
Camp Ketchum as seen from Bald Mountain side.





COMPANY HISTORY

At Fort Knox, Kentucky on August 16, 1935 our Company was organized and consisted of members from the Fifth Corps, who were immediately transferred to the Boise District. Ever since arrival we have at all times made our home somewhere within this District.

Camp Black Canyon was our first location to be followed by Camp Bruneau, then Twin Springs and Ponder osa. However this marks the third consecutive summer in which our Company has moved from Winter Quarters tobe again at Camp Ketchum.

Two members of the original Company are Henry Weise, Supply Steward and Wayne E Johnson, Mess Steward These men have seen the Company work upon Bureau of Recclamation Projects at Black Canyon; grazing work at Camp Bruneau and the Forest Service construction work of Twin Springs, Ponderosa and Ketchum Camps.

The majority of the members of our present Company are from Ohio, although West Virginia and Kentucky men also serve with Company 2527 under command of Captain Blanchard H. Smith. At present Lieut. Paul P. Rothert, our subaltern, is on leave of absence and is visiting in Maryland. Mr. Michael Callahan, Camp Educational Adviser was transferred to our Company in October, 1939 This spring our Camp Physician, Dr. Alexander Terowsky arrived to make his home with us.

Camp Ketchum is located upon the Sawtooth National Forest, about five miles from Ketchum, Idaho and only six miles from the world famous Sun Valley Resort, now popular as a vacation spot for the movie stars and fast-idious pleasure seekers.





BASEBALL, AN OUTSTANDING TEAM IN CAMP KETCHUM

The baseball team in this Company carries a banner with the record of 17 wins in 18 games and now lead the Wood River League in the second half of play after winning the first half without a defeat.

The single defeat in the whole season's play came at the hands of the Triumph Mine team, Hailey, Idaho. This team now has been beaten four times during the season now and may not be a problem when next we meet.

The team has scored 249 runs, punched out 252 hits, including 41 doubles, 22 triples and sixteen home runs. Thus the hitting strength of the team provides a collective batting average of .331.

Melvin Meyers leading the team with home runs, 5 in number, with runs scored, numbering 33, is also the leading hitter with a .410 average. In addition, Meyers acts as relief pitcher where he has earned one win and no losses for his credit.

Ralph Shanks and Andrew Chiprany, team battery, have cut down 173 men via the strike out route. Shanks leads the team in hits made, getting 33, of which 6 are triples and he leads in runs batted in, getting 32. Chiprany is the team's leading fielder, with but 3 errors in 239 chances.

Dale Archer leads the team in two base hits with seven and in stolen bases with twenty-six.

During the past five years teams from this camp, have won 48 games and lost 15 to date.





WORK PROJECT

The main project work accomplished in the past two years has been the construction of the Trail Creek Road. This project, with an estimate of five years duration, will be completed early in September after having a total of nine months work expended upon it.

The speed of achievement on this project has been in part due to the excellent work and cooperation by all enrollees and by the use of various pieces of heavy construction equipment.

The following equipment has been used: 4 compressors, I RD-8 bulldozer, 2 35 Diesels, I 66 power grader and, I 3/4 yard gas shovel.

Forty tons of powder have been used in the construction to date. This powder was handled by the enrollees under careful and competent foreman supervision.

The road, when completed, will be a 24 foot turnpike crushed gravel highway. Completed, this will provide a short route to Mackey Recreational area as well as a short cut to Montana and Yellowstone National Park.


Other projects, completed by this Company have been the construction of 82 miles of metallic telephone line, 78 acres of ski run construction on Bald Mountain, where the National Ski Championship is held, the construction of 1346 rods of stock drift fence, the planting of 130,000 fingerling trout, the construction of 32 permanent erosion dams, the laying of 8372 ft. of pipe line for camp ground water systems, the maintaining of 374 miles of road and 275 miles of telephone line maintenance. In addition many picnic grounds have been maintained and numerous forest fires suppressed.




