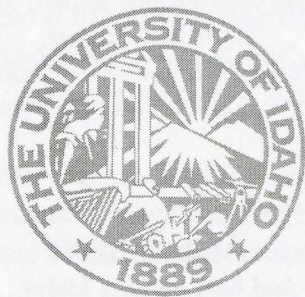

LINDA K. FLEETWOOD KINCER

Linda K. Fleetwood Kincer graduated from UI with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1969 and a master's degree in 1972. Throughout her life, Fleetwood Kincer, of Boise, has made significant contributions to the U.S. Army, Army Reserves and the U.S. Department of State Diplomatic Security Service.

Fleetwood Kincer is a former regional security officer of the American Embassy in Sri Lanka, Ecuador and Chile. She is the first female officer of any military service to be assigned a command overseas in Explosive Ordinance Disposal (EOD). She also was the first female special agent to be selected by Diplomatic Security Service to protect a U.S. Ambassador at a high threat post in El Salvador.

Fleetwood Kincer has received numerous awards during her career acknowledging her hard work and collaboration with colleagues. In 1989, Fleetwood Kincer was selected as an Outstanding Alumni in the UI College of Education.

Fleetwood Kincer is a lifetime member of the International Association of Women Police. She is current member of the Federal Law Enforcement Organization and the Diplomatic Security Association.

JOHN O. (JACK) GRAY

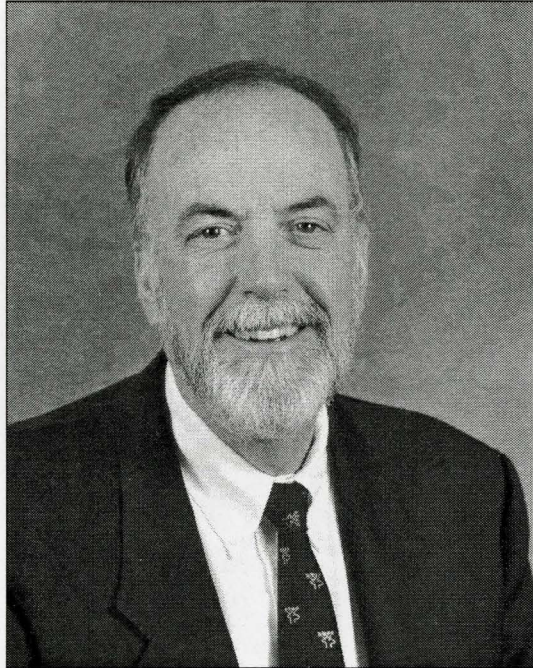
John O. (Jack) Gray is a 1949 graduate from the College of Business and Economics. Gray, of Washington, DC., is a retired brigadier general of the U.S. Air Force. He has spent more than 50 years serving his country, both in the Air Force and the Air Force Association. During World War II, he was a staff executive on General Doolittle's Eighth Air Force Headquarters staff in England. During the Korean and Vietnam Wars, Gray served as a member of the U.S. Air Force Headquarters staff in the Pentagon.

Gray is a former Director of Reserve Affairs in the Air Force Office of Information and was a member of the Air Force Headquarters Command Reserve Forces Policy Council.

Gray has held the position of executive director of the Air Force Association, the Aerospace Education Foundation, and publisher of AIR FORCE magazine, a world-renown aviation publication. He is currently a director emeritus of the association and a trustee emeritus of the foundation. He remains an active trustee of the Air Force Memorial Foundation. He is a current member of the University of Idaho Foundation.

Gray is a recipient of the Air Force's Exceptional Service Award, the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star and many other military and campaign medals. He has received awards from the U.S. House of Representatives in addition to various service organizations, including the Association of the U.S. Army, the Reserve Officers Association, the National Guard Association and the Navy League. Gray retired in 1994.

PAUL R. KRAUSMAN

Paul R. Krausman of Oracle, Arizona, is a 1976 Ph.D. graduate from the College of Forestry, Wildlife and Range Sciences. Krausman has spent 27 years as a wildlife researcher and scientist. During that time, Krausman has completed nine books and monographs, more than 20 book chapters, 122 articles, 45 papers for conference proceedings and nearly 40 research reports.

Krausman has taken on the post of editor-in-chief of *The Journal of Wildlife Management*, the primary publication of The Wildlife Society. He also has served as associate editor of The Wildlife Society Bulletin, *The Journal of Wildlife Management* and The Southwestern Naturalist. The book, "Ecology and Management of Large Mammals in North America (2000)," earned Krausman the Outstanding Edited Work Award from the Wildlife Society.

He is a former president of the Arizona chapter of The Wildlife Society (1987-88). On a global scale, Krausman has been a key contributor to the International Wildlife Management Congress. He previously worked as a visiting professor and wildlife researcher at the Wildlife Institute of India.

Krausman is currently a research scientist and professor of wildlife at the University of Arizona. He also is the associate director of the University of Arizona Agricultural Experiment Station.

Krausman has received many teaching and advising awards, including Outstanding Professor of the Year (1983) and Outstanding Faculty Member ('92,'99) at the University of Arizona.

PEGGY (VAN SICE) PHILLIPS

Peggy (Van Sice) Phillips of Seattle, Wash., is a 1974 and 1976 microbiology graduate of UI. Phillips is the former executive vice president and chief operating officer of Immunex, which was acquired by Amgen in 2002 in the largest biotechnology merger in history.

Phillips helped build Immunex from a small, unprofitable venture into a \$16 billion enterprise. Phillips played the key leadership role at Immunex in the development and marketing of Enbrel, a drug used to reduce symptoms in rheumatoid arthritis patients.

Upon graduating from UI, Phillips worked for 10 years for the allergy division of Miles Labs, the U.S. division of Bayer Pharma. Phillips joined Immunex in 1986 and was elected to the Immunex Board of Directors in 1996.

Originally from Idaho Falls, Phillips is active in her community as a board member and executive committee member for the Alliance for Education where she is leading the advisory committee to establish inquiry-based science in the Seattle School District. Phillips is also serving on a special budgetary task force for King County; by June the committee will make recommendations to help the county better weather its fiscal crisis.

On a broader perspective, she is a board member for the United States Naval Academy foundation. Phillips is currently writing a novel.

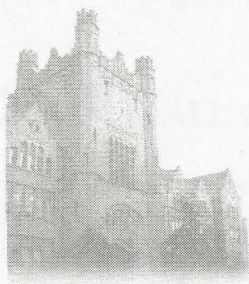
