On a recent trip into the interior of Idaho
I met Mr. David Lewis, who has made proof on a homestead.
I am not sure about the number of his entry, but think it
may be Mo. 039621. Am not certain this is the correct
number, but, at any rate, I feel sure that Mr. Lewis has
complied with the homestead laws in living upon this place.
Owing to the long distance from the county seat or any other
place of settlement, I hope that whatever seeming technicality
there may be in his compliance with this part of the law may
be waived. He has, as far as he could, acted in good faith
in complying with the law to the best of his ability. In my
conversation with Mr. Lewis, I am sure there is no intention
on his part to do anything else than comply with the law and
I hope that any technical requirement of an affidavit will be
waived and that patent may issue in favor of Mr. Lewis.

He is an old Civil War veteran and also engaged in the Sheepeater War in that section of Idaho. From every viewpoint he is entitled to consideration, as I see it. Therefore, I hope that you will do your utmost to see that patent is issued on this homestead entry of Mr. Lewis.
