I get letters from everywhere about you and I hope you will be able to come up soon as a party will be in this summer to hunt with you. It means money so I have written them to come. I think my Father and Brother will help me go East this winter and I want to take out the heads you have and I will try to get a big price for them. Mr. Davis is going down to see you in a short time. I think he will be down in less than three weeks.

Mr. Bacon told me of having seen you lately and I was glad to know you were well. I felt worried about you this fall and was glad to know you had company now and then. I just hope you had enough to eat. I have ordered some seed for you and will get them down to you as soon as I can. I think you should have as much garden as you can so you can feed the men with fresh stuff when they come.

It is getting late so I must close. Mr. Garden is getting the mail ready. I sent you some tobacco and hope you need it. I am Deputy Recorder and have the books. In haste
