You can not know how grateful and indebted I am to you for the treasured book you sent. It will be the foremost volume in my lithic technology library. The book was here when we returned from a trip to Victoria. B.C. and a tour of Vancouver Island which explains my tardy reply. Our trip was just a fun trip - the first in three years. All our other trips have pertained to stone working. Vancouver island was, indeed, beautiful and we enjoyed the beaches, fresh fish and picking berries.

I haven't had time to write to Ed Wilmsen about the article on lithics but feel that your experiments and results should be included so will write him today.

I have the article on Litho-Mechanics and Archaeology by Thomsen - it is excellent. I only wish they had continued their experiments using natural abrasives and experimenting with various stages of polish. The mechanics are great but there are still so many unanswered questions regarding the finished archaeological examples.

I also want to thank you for the comments by John Whitthof on Ludwig Pfeiffer's book. The book was published the year of my birth. Had I known of it sooner it would have saved many years of groping in the dark using the hit and miss approach. I only hope that in the near future there will be an English translation. Marie Wormington called last evening and I told her of you and the superb book. She has been such a good friend over the years that I would like to do something special for her like getting a copy of this book.
