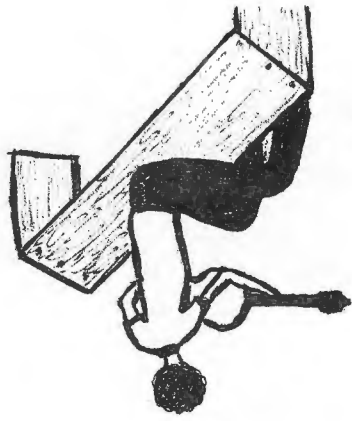

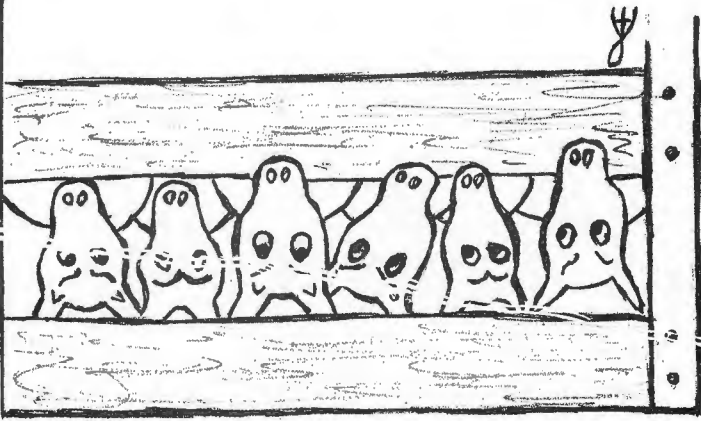
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I did a few "concerts" for old folks at a morning home, & children at an Army Hospital, and - the circus in the Krazy pasture!
