

In your letter you expressed some concern about my possibly jeopardizing myself by sending specimens to you and I thank you for that. On the other hand, there isn't too much to worry about, As a matter of fact, one of the Kantons Archeologists, with whom I've long been acquainted, has even volunteered to assist me in getting together certain specimens which I feel you should have. For that matter, even Dr. Ruoff in Zurich has been told (by myself) and he voiced no objection as such. You see Don, the only thing which I've really kept to myself was that hafted knife as that might have caused some discussion. What these people here are primarily concerned about is pottery, hafted tools and tools of organic substances.
