I hope you are well, and that your work is going well too. Here, this summer I excavated, but had not much time to work flint. However, before this summer, I did some experiments with the chalcolithic technic of pre-polishing. It works beautifully, and I wonder if the solution to the egyption retouche is not there. I took a big flake of Grand Pressigny flint, made a preform, then had it polished to a lenticular section at the lab of Geology(too long to use the neolithic technic, and that is not the point). Then I heat treated it, and pressure-worked it. I missed a little the forst side (it was my first try), but the second side came beautifully, with very regular retouch . It is ten times easier this way than when you have to"rub out" flake scars of the percussion retouch. Try it, if you never did before. One thing I did this summer is working on blade flaking with a punch. I specially worked out the technic of the Upper Perigordians, in liaison with the study of Corbiac I want to do this winter. I got very good results, evh if I do not yet completely succeed having blades with a very tiny striking platform, as they did. Sometimes I succeed, sometimes not. Of course, it did happen to them too, but they ware still better than I am. One thing I found out is that when your punch is at exactly the right angle, and the blow V exactly the necessary strength, then the puch shows no mark at al of its use.But when you miss,you blunt the end very fast!You can even use hard wood. I plan to go on this winter, and I will tell you about more completely then. Another thing:most of the jasper we have here can be presure-worked without heat treatment, which not only does not improve it, but rather deterio -rate it. No wonder the Solutreans hunted for jasper! And not only because 0 the nice colors! I dont know when I can come back to the States. Something is A Oliveto & Cie- 18 1995g in L.A., I think.
