Too, additional illustrations of your technique and also your method of applying force to the object and also how various sizes of cores would be handled would be helpful. And, would it be possible to produce a 12" blade with a cross section of 1;" as some of those from Guatemala?

I am glad your meetings in Saltillo were exciting. I have recently received a book from Tom Hester on Mesoamerican studies (obsidian) which is a really great volume. He certainly brings a lot of information up to date and it is well covered on the papers compiled in this one single volume. I do hope you have a copy of this book.
