It just occurred to me that I promised to send you the names of some publications dealing with the Australian aboriginals. Please pardon the delay. Have been so busy since my return. Had to spend some time at Pocatello and am now rushing to get out the analysis paper before the grant ends. Will list names below.

Have also discovered some mastic which may prove ideal for your experiments in hafting scrapers to use as wood working tools. This mastic is the material that glassworkers use to affix plate glass on building fronts and they also use it to do assorted tile work. It is a tarry material, impregnated with fiber. Any glass dealer should have it. I was trying to remove some from some colored building glass when it occurred to me that this was just what you needed for your experiments. Hope you can find some.

Evelyn and I really enjoyed our visit with you and are sorry that it could not have been longer. Am sorry my examination of your material was so brief and hope to get another look at it one of these days. Had a chance, while in Pocatello, to study some material that Claude Warren had and we found some real exciting things. Claude probably told you of the "things". Also, both Swanson and Vance Haynes are most interested in your quartz crystal and other Clovis points.

The publications are "Stone Implement Making Among the Nakako, NGADADJARA and PITJANDJARA of the Great Western Desert" by Norman B. Tindale, South Australian Museum. From Records of the South Australian Museum, Vol. 15, No. 1 6th October 1965. As I told you, Tindale is in Boulder until June of this year.
