I don't know the status of the lithics lab yet—no word from the NSF. However, I will be involved with the liftic technology of SE Arkansas starting in May. I will be excavating several sites to obtain lithic material from stratified sites inorder to put some chronology with my experimental analysis of the technology down there. I will be in the field for about 4 months, then bach to Fayetteville for 6 to 8 months of experimental lithics. I have briefly mentioned the fact that I would like to have you come for to a short visit and add your knowledge to the project, but I will have to see how much money is left in the project budget.
