Thank you, again, for the two copies of Tebiwa. The theories on such treatments of chert are surely of great interest to me and to Douglas Anderson.

I am writing to ask you a question. Did you ever receive the book The Archeology of Cape Denbigh or not? I am embarrassed to say that I can't remember for sure if I asked the bookstore to send it along or not and I am similarly unclear about whether I cashed a check for it. My assistant, who handles such things often, cannot remember either. If we did take care of the matter I'd like to know. If the book has not yet arrived there, I most certainly want to know so that we can get one off to you right away. I am sorry to have to bother you about this.

In the spring of this year another book written by Louis, just before his death, is coming out. It's a general, more popular type of book about 20 years of working out theories in the western arctic. It contains lots of illustrations and material on otherwise unpublished finds so will be of interest to archeologists, although Louis wrote it for "fun" and included lots of general information and reminisces etc. in it since he didn't intend it as a text at all. I'll not have any free copies to give out, unfortunately, but I could get it for you at 40 percent off whatever its price is going to be, if you write me about it before summer.

I hope to spend next summer at Onion Portage again. There is so much up there to be done.

Please let us know if you got the Denbigh book or not. Good luck on your article on polyhedral cores--we look forward to it!
