Dear Dick:

Thank you for your letter of January 24th and am delighted that you have approval for the exhibit. The timing change is perfect for me, as I have a very full schedule this year and next year is much better. As far as I know I will be available when you need me from February to April 1970.

Don't worry about the fee for the services. It would certainly be nominal for it will be an honor and a privilege to work with the fine people at the Museum. Have a two bedroom trailer guest house which I think you fellows will enjoy. Tell Junius it is not as swank as the guest house he had in Santa Fe, but is quiet and restful.
