By William J. Shayer, Jnr. (1811-c. 1885)

Shayer was the son and pupil of William Shayer (1788–1872), a self-taught artist who lived in Southampton. Both artists painted animals and landscapes and as they worked together and both signed their paintings, W. Shayer, it is often difficult to distinguish between their works. William Shayer Jnr. is probably best known for his fine coaching scenes which were very popular. He exhibited at the Royal Academy, Suffolk Street and the British Institution.

This farmyard scene, which captures the atmosphere of a crisp, cold winter's day, may well have been painted in Hampshire, where Shayer and his father often worked.
