My what an exciting experience you had in visiting the last of the flintknappers! I only wish that I could have been there. You are most fortunate to have been able to have visited with the last of the Australian aboriginals and the last of the postclassic gunflint makers. Doctor Leakey told me of the Snare family. I believe his name was also Fred so you are most fortunate to have contacted Mr. Avery and to have seen him actually detach the blade. I do hope that he let you try with your own hands. It is so thoughtful and kind of you to consider sending a CARE packages--I will really look forward to this.

Is there anything that you would like to have me send to you for Mr. Fred Avery? I don't believe that by mail I can give him instructions on how to thin a biface... Other than I am using a soft stone percussor and slightly rotating the hammerstone at the moment of impact which causes a follow-through as the flake is detached. Often, for extreme thinness, I create a hinge fracture along the median line and then intersect the hinge fracture from the opposite margin causing the biface to be thinned.

I am glad to hear your book is coming along well and that you are in good company with Doctor Mc Burney. When it is completed I would like the name of the publisher end I wish it every success. I hope you and Betsy are having a ball in England and have a pint of bitters on me.
