I'm intending to learn some "flint knapping" and have repeatedly come across your name as author of, or mentioned within several periodical articles on the topic.

I wonder if you could recommend sources of information (book, articles, etc.) on the subject which you think especially useful. The items in periodicals which I've so far located are spotty and usually not comprehensive.

Some projectile points found here in Eastern Michigan are made from a grey to black cherty flint which occurs on the Lake Huron shoreline as 6-10 inch inclusions in limestone often perfectly circular. Hence, the points often show a banding similar to tree rings. (Let me know, and I'll ship you some of these nodules...)
