I did so appreciate the card from Santiago.

Something of great interest has happened recently, and that is my acquisition of four Grand-Pressigny cores and a collection of proximal ends of blades from the same area. They have been provided by a friend of mine by the name of Peter Kelberborn from Zurich.

It will be exciting to compare technologies of these blades as related to the macro blades of Belize. I only hope that this year you will have a collection of cores with accompanying blade scars that comparison could be done to see if there are parallel or similar techniques present on the Belize cores and blades. One thing that still is a mystery to me is how the Belize blades were detached with such straightness and distal termination.

I am attempting to do some replication in obsidian: however, the response in obsidian as compared with flint is very different as the flint is much stiffer, which will naturally make a straighter blade.

I will certainly lack forward to receiving any information regarding this particular core and blade technology.
