I am a Masters candidate at the University of Alabama. My thesis toric is an attempt to show a positive relationship between ovoid bifaces and the migration of side-notched projectile points from the continental U.S. to Alaska before 4000 F.C. Due to their size, I first thought these ovoids might have been used to prepare the initial notch on a projectile point. However, it now appears these implements might have been used instead to butcher and skin game animals. I need to know how the corner notches were made on projectile points. Did the artisans use a direct percussion method and retouch with a bone flaker or did they employ only the bone flaker?

In order to adequately answer how the ovoids were used I must make some myself and conduct experiments. Here again I run into difficulties - I am not as adapt at lithic manufacture as yourself. Is there any way I can arrange with vou to manufacture approximately six of these evoids? Cr. can you suggest how I might, with my limited skills, manufacture them?

Any suggestions you might have would be greatly appreciated.
