This site belongs to The Late Palaeolithic in Japan about 13.000 years ago. From this site many Shirataki cores and micro-blades were excavated. are made of obsidians. I had this excavation with Pro. Shoichi Yoshizaki whom you know. He is now in Hokkaido University.

On Oct. 26, 1972. I fisished my paper for next year's International Anthropological & Ethnological Congress at Chicago. I sent it to Dr. Earl H. Swanson, Jr. in London, by express air mail. I do hope I can take part in that congress. I am also writing my master thesis on lithic technology: direct percussion using a hard hammerstone and a soft hammerstone, block on block technique and anvil technique. Sometimes I hear from Guy Muto and Payson Sheets.

I always remember Twin Falls and good times in there. (on Flintworking school) I send a report which I wrote for Japanese Archaeological Journal, on November 12, 1972. Jounal.

I always continue many experiments of lithic technology and teach their techniques to many Archaeologists in Japan. Again I am very sorry that I did not write to you for a long time.
