"DWORSHAK DAM"

On the North Fork of the Clearwater River near Orofino, Idaho, stands Dworshak Dam. It is the highest straight-axis, concrete gravity dam in the Western Hemisphere and the largest ever constructed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Out of the 118 major dams listed in the world, Dworshak is the 15th highest. Only two other dams in the United States are higher, Hoover and Oroville.

The crest of the dam soars 717 feet above bedrock. Over six million cubic yards of concrete went into construction of the huge structure. The crest of the dam runs 3,300 feet bank-to-bank. At the base, it is 525 feet thick and tapers to 30 feet in width at the crest where a two-lane road runs across the dam.

Dworshak's 40-foot-diversion tunnel, drilled through the mountain on the left abutment, was closed September 27, 1971, and the reservoir began to fill. The pool is not expected to be completely filled until July, 1974. The reservoir will be 630 feet deep near the face of the dam. Storage capacity of the reservoir is 3,450,000 acre-feet. Two million acre-feet will be used for local and regional flood control storage and for on-site and downstream power generation.

In the powerhouse there are three hydroelectric generators capable of producing enough power to light a city the size of Boise, Idaho. There is space in the powerhouse to add three more generators.

Construction of the dam blocked off the anadromous steelhead trout run on the North Fork. To perpetuate the strain, the Corps of Engineers built the Dworshak National Fish Hatchery, just downstream from the dam at the confluence. It is the largest steelhead hatchery in the world. The first juvenile steelhead, smolts, were released from the hatchery in April, 1970. Adult spawners, from the first released, have returned to the hatchery and a complete cycle has taken place. The hatchery releases 3,000,000 steelhead smolts every spring and has reared 2.5 million rainbow and kokanee annually for the resident fishery in the reservoir.

The reservoir is 53 miles long and extends into the wild, rugged timber land. Five thousand acres are presently being managed for elk browse and habitat in the upper reaches of the reservoir and 10,300 acres of land have been set aside for recreational uses. The Nez Perce Indians will operate the Big Eddy recreational area under a 25-year lease agreement with the Corps of Engineers.

The United States Congress authorized construction of the dam in 1962 and preliminary work started in 1964. The main dam contract was awarded to Dworshak Dam Constructors, a joint venture of Dravo Corporation, S. J. Groves & Sons, C. H. Leavell & Company, Fischback & Moore, Inc., and D-K-C Constructors.

Dworshak Dam was originally named Bruces Eddy Dam and Reservoir, but was renamed in honor of the late Henry C. Dworshak, U. S. Senator from Idaho. Senator Dworshak was instrumental in obtaining Congressional authorization and funding for the Bruces Eddy project.



Henry Clarence Dworshak was born in Duluth, Minnesota on August 29, 1894. Early activities included work in the printing trade and service in the First World War as a sergeant in the Fourth Antiaircraft Machine Gun Battalion. He was editor and publisher of the Burley Bulletin in Burley, Idaho between 1924 and 1944. His political career began in 1939 when he was elected to Congress where he served until 1946 when elected to the United States Senate to fill the vacancy caused by the death of John Thomas. In 1949, he was appointed to the U.S. Senate and subsequently elected to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Bert H. Miller. He was reelected in 1954 and again in 1960 and served until his death in Washington, D.C. on July 23, 1962. Senator Dworshak, throughout all his years of service, was known as a champion of the full development of the Nation's water resources.
