

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Forestry Summer Camp, 1942

The Forestry Summer Camp of the University of Idaho is the culminating point of the underclassman's education. Here he has a chance to put into actual practice those theories which he has studied and those which he has formulated while mulling over his profession. Summer camp also is a place to receive and observe those ideas which are to form the basis of his education as an upperclassman. It is here that the forestry student comes into actual contact with the intricacies of the forests as taught by Prof. Wohletz. The camp is conveniently situated on Big Payette Lake near McCall, Idaho, a resort town in the Idaho National Forest.

Unofficially Summer Camp began June 3rd, when all the boys pulled into camp. Everybody pitched in to sweep out the tent frames and wit's the canvas pulled over them, the camp was soon presentable. After sprucing up a bit, we decided to get our first look at the town of McCall, and we weren't disappointed by what we saw. John Krier and Bob Walkley had been down before, and had more or less paved the way for us by getting acquainted with the local folks. The next day was spent in finishing the work to be done, and "Sheepherder" Koch was able to demonstrate his ability as a mason by laying the bricks around the cistern; the other boys cleaned up around the new lodge which really lived up to the tales the seniors had told about it.

June 5th was an eventful day when Prof. Reidesel began handing out the medicine in double doses; before long we were out in the field finding out the advantages and disadvantages of the level and the transit. We found that both have their advantages, especially with girls who came by in boats. The first five weeks went by comparatively fast with McCall getting our special attention every weekend and Prof. Reidesel our attention the rest of the week. Bob Walkley and Fred Greenfield went on a weekend trip to southern Idaho, and were delayed while Fred joined the Marines. They showed up half a week later with tall tales of Portland which we found hard to believe. Just before the surveying final, Steele Barnett and Ajax Weddle took Forest Service radio training and after

three days returned with a lot of knowledge and some extra cash.

Having had surveying previously, several of the boys arrived near the end of the surveying classes, so as to be on time for Dr. Young's class in Forest Communities. About this time the patriotic urge hit camp and several boys left to join the Army. George Layos went to the Army and Bob Walkley left with Jack Payne to fight for the King. They were replaced by Roy Hoelke and Bill "Waterboy" Lang. Thus we started the last five weeks of camp with ten men. After the surveying final, Prof. Reidesel returned to Moscow with Prof. Wohletz, who at the time was worrying about the addition of a new ration book to the family. The following Monday, Dr. Young had Ajax warming up the truck for those field trips we were to take. The first field trip was around the lake to see various stages of plant succession and to get an introduction into things to come. We climbed up cliffs, over windfalls, and even through swamps to get to a certain plant or to study a xerosere or hydrosere. The next several days were spent in the study of range conditions and the methods of setting up experimental plots. The last and best field trip was to the Circle C Ranch near New Meadows. The owner, Raleigh Campbell, allowed us to practice our horsemanship on some of the horses in the corral, and "Speed" Hodder with "Cow Waddie" Evans proceeded to show us how a cowboy rides. We hope the horses appreciated it more than we did. "Jocko" Joslyn showed us how they did it back in Vermont much to the amusement of the ranch hands who had gathered to watch our antics. This ended Forest Communities and we all settled down to catch Wohletz's material.

The vagueness concerning Forest Mensuration was dispersed on the first day of class, and things seemed to go along smoothly, although study hours did interfere somewhat with swimming and siesta time. Our average day consisted of an hour or two of lecture followed by the actual measuring of every aspect of the tree for the remainder of the day. We became familiar with all the instruments used in obtaining these measurements

At the beginning of the fall semester we had the grand total of 73 students—19 seniors, 16 juniors, 22 sophomores, and 16 freshmen in the School of Forestry. With such a small organization it seemed almost ridiculous to attempt to function as before, with a complete

We could very easily have sat back and allowed our organization to go defunct for the duration, as many other campus organizations have done. Yet, with a balance of \$1.95 in our treasury from the previous year's club, we set forth to demonstrate to future Idaho Foresters that we could function and carry on our activities, regardless of the seemingly unsurmountable odds against us.

With a 100% membership as our goal, we were determined to have all the forestry students and faculty members of our organization. The response was very favorable, with ing our old tradition of challenging the "local miners" to a pigskin riot, the foresters as in the past years proved themselves to be the superior men. Twenty-two hardy foresters attired in their "corked boots", "tin pants", and "wool shirts" waited patiently in a freezing wind and bitter rain to give the "muckers" a chance to display their courage. Well, they displayed something, but it wasn't courage. So once again, as in past years, the Foresters demonstrated that they have the stuff that makes real men.

For the most part this year, our meetings have featured excellent movies and local speakers, and at every meeting we have had refreshments. The seniors started the ball rolling as usual at the second meeting, by presenting a hilarious melodrama satirizing each faculty member. Each member of the class very briefly explained to the group his own summer experience, with the purpose in mind of giving the underclassmen some idea of the wide range of work the forester is apt to encounter. Dr. Chenoweth, head of the Department of Philosophy, and forester at heart,

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was the guest speaker at the third meeting. Very cleverly and uniquely he kept the foresters interested as he discussed the very timely question, "The War and Forestry." Three weeks later, Ranger "Charlie" Powell gave the boys some idea of the life and work of a forest ranger. The last meeting before Christmas vacation was the night for the juniors to howl. Steele Barnett presented a most amusing character sketch of "Joe Private", the average "buck private" in Uncle Sam's army. With songs by Don Hyder and a skit by the entire class, the group was well pleased with the talent displayed by the juniors.

The organization had a real problem to solve regarding its financial affairs. The extremely low enrollment meant one of two things: (1) our annual dance had to pay for itself with no financial support from the treasury, or (2) one of our spring functions would have to be eliminated. However, even with such a black picture before us, we set forth with our fingers crossed and our spirits high. Under the capable leadership of Don Hyder, the decoration committee did one of the finest jobs of decorating done on the campus this year. The center of attraction was a realistic simulation of a typical logging town bar. Steele Barnett, Tom Evans, Tom Laurent, and Chris Koch as bartenders kept the crowd refreshed with punch "over the bar." With numerous trees, and a wild life and game display, the green lighting effect cast a very pleasant atmosphere indeed.

On the night of February 6th the Idaho Foresters did more than have a good dance; they demonstrated to the university that they are one of the more active organizations on the campus, by taking the initial step in the solution of an unfortunate social problem. Fifty-two Navy men, stationed at the Naval Radio Training School on the campus, were invited to our dance with the expressed purpose of improving the social relationship between the college students and the Navy men. Dates with college girls were arranged by the foresters, and the service men were admitted at a reduced rate. Although semi-formal, the dance was lacking in programs in order to cooperate with the conservative trend on the campus during the war, and also to encourage the spontaneous mixing of the college students and Navy men.

Under the leadership of Dick Campana, good advertising and a real sales drive were the essential factors in making the dance a financial success. With so many students leaving school after the end of the first semester and with a general all-university drop in enrollment, the financial success of the dance becomes even more significant. The entire organization is to be thanked for the excellent cooperation in making the Forester's Ball ("Ranger's Dreamland") of 1943 a great success financially and socially. In the face of so many obstacles, the success of this dance surely should be an incentive to future Idaho Foresters to continue to make their annual dance one of the outstanding social events on the campus.

Well into the second semester with the enrollment just below the 40 mark, our spirit and enthusiasm is still high; and we plan definitely to have our spring barbecue, banquet and regular meetings even if only 5 students remain in the school.

DEAN JEFFERS

Throughout the year Dean Jeffers has been grinding away, hammer and tongs, at his work which took him as far as Tennessee to a National Church Board of Education Conference on one occasion. DR. EHRLICH

In connection with his field of forest pathology, Dr. Ehrlich occupied much of his summer in continued work on a University project in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service and the U.S. Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, concerned with blister rust canker development following experimental inoculation of western white pine reproduction in northern Idaho. Two Idaho forestry students, namely Vincent Yoder '42 and Lee Paine '43, assisted in this work. During the summer Dr. Ehrlich and Charles A. Wellner '33 accompanied Dr. Lee M. Hutchins, the new chief of the U.S. Division of Forest Pathology, and western officials of the division on a tour of the white pine type of northern Idaho.

The last year has seen Dr. Ehrlich engaged in performing a number of professional duties. Last fall he represented the University at the Forest Policy and Practice Conference of the Western Forestry and Conservation association at Portland, Oregon; he also attended meetings of the Council of the Northwest Scientific Association in Spokane, Washington. Among other duties, he has been chairman of the Inland Empire Section of the Society of American Foresters, representative of the School of Forestry on the Graduate Council, and faculty representative on the Academic Council.

In addition to his research work and teaching of forest pathology, he is now teaching wood technology jointly with Professor Wohletz.

DR. YOUNG

Ranging is the chief pastime of Dr. Young during the summer months, and last season was no exception, as he was not in one place for any length of time. Two weeks were spent in supervising research work on the effect of sheep grazing in western white pine reproduction, a project jointly undertaken by the Clearwater Timber Protective Association and the School of Forestry. The customary 10 days were spent journeying around on successive field trips at summer camp. Highlight of these trips was the one to the Circle C where the riding of horses and handling of packs were learned. During his stay at summer camp, Dr. Young kept the table full with fresh brook trout, as he really showed the boys how to pull them in. Accompanied by Assistant Regional Forester Favre, of Region 4, and Supervisor Farrell, of the Idaho National Forest, he spent 10 days on a range inspection tour. One week of his time was occupied in helping instruct at the Summer Range School at Mountain City, Nevada. In the latter part of the summer, he worked two weeks in his Michels' grass plots on Paradise Ridge.

His ranging is not all business, however, for more than once he returned from a trip with many fish, and this fall he got a 387pound elk about seven miles from Castle Butte Lookout on the Lolo Trail in the Selway Region. Frequent field trips keep him well informed on current changes in his two fields of game and range.

PROFESSOR WOHLETZ

As faculty administrator and camp director of Forestry Summer Camp, Professor Wohletz really has a herculean task to perform in keeping things rolling smoothly at Payette Lakes. Under his able guidance for two successive summers, summer camp has seen much improvement and several new developments, including the construction of a fine cabin and the installation of a pump as a substitute for the old bucket brigade. Camp routine was interrupted last summer by a few notable events: the minor ones, nothing more than forest fires, and the major one, another woman who came into Mr. Wohletz's life in the way of a cute baby girl. Needless to say, from then on his "handy" gestures in instructing mensuration, biometry, and forest economics have become much more enthusiastic.

During the latter part of the summer he was employed by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration in doing type mapping and surveying in Latah County. In this work he was very interested in learning the method of extensive survey of agricultural lands by means of aerial photography. In fact, after a few weeks' practice he became quite proficient at identifying all types of land and crops from aerial photographs of certain areas.

At the present time he is engaged in the organization and compilation of more recent data to augment the Forest Economics Syllabus.

PROFESSOR PIERSON

Throughout the length and breadth of the State of Idaho, Professor Pierson operates in his extension work. During the past summer he was particularly busy organizing and establishing volunteer community cooperative firefighting units in cooperation with the State Forest Service and various protective agencies. His work is truly extensive, and many of his latest jobs have been concerned directly with the war effort. Tree planting recommendations for the Farragut Naval Base and Japanese Relocation Camp, respectively in Northern and Southern Idaho, are two of his recent responsibilities. Planting stock of Russian Olive, Black Locust, and Norway Spruce for windbreaks at the Japanese Camp, and camouflage material for coast installations of the Army Engineers Corps will be furnished by the School Nursery, which is under his direction. Of special importance to the war effort are the Black Locust tree nails, a supply of which has been furnished through Mr. Pierson.

Last fall he spent eight days hunting elk in the Selway National Forest but never did get his elk; nevertheless he enjoyed the fresh air and all those things one gets in the woods. He is an enthusiastic angler and is looking forward to a season which bodes no good for the fish.

DR. WHITE

Dr. White spent the first part of the summer here in Moscow, completing research work on arabo-galactan. He has now a series of four complete studies on the structure of the arabogalactans which were published in the Journal of the American Chemical Society.

About the 1st of August Dr. and Mrs. White left Moscow for the East. Enroute they visited the University of Minnesota, Dow Chemical Company, and the University of Toronto. They spent a couple of weeks at their homes in Ontario. About the 1st of September they returned to Buffalo to attend a meeting of the American Chemical Society and then back to Moscow. On the return trip, they stopped for a visit with Dr. and Mrs. E. R. Martell, formerly on the forestry staff here and now the head of the Forestry Department at Purdue University.

DR. PROCTOR

Major Proctor, instructor in wood courses here last year was recently commissioned and is now at an officer's school in Florida. After leaving the university last spring, he worked for the Forest Products Laboratory at Madison, where he taught prospective inspectors of wood in qualities, defects, and uses of wood for the war effort. Upon completion of his training course, he will be assigned to Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, where he will be occupied in research in the use of wood in aircraft.

(Continued from page 4) and added some improvisions of our own. Our day usually ended at five and we would get in a short dip before dinner. Grub was served by Mrs. Herman and hashers, with a kitchen crew doing the cleanup. Our evenings were spent in studying or going into McCall if we could get up an iron-clad alibi. Several evenings were spent in cutting firewood and we all became pretty good with the crosscut and the axe. Our mensuration course included a trip to the Brown Tie and Lumber Co. where mill operations and scaling were studied. Considerable time was spent at the log pond; and though we all got pretty wet, we considered ourselves fairly good burlers. Mid-way into the course Prof. Wohletz took pity on us and gave us a day vacation, whereupon five of us lit out for Boise. We had an enjoyable day and night in the Capitol and arrived back in camp late the next evening to find that the fellows who had stayed had been put on standby and were anxiously awaiting fire call. Classes continued the next day but we prayed that they would be interrupted by a fire. However, we had no such luck and spent several days cruising timber and fighting mosquitoes. It was necessary to set up the compass with one hand and fight mosquitoes with the other. This was further facilitated by Wohletz's persistence in starting the compass line from a point in the swamps where the water was only waist deep.

The fire season started with only two weeks to go before the end of summer camp. Our first fire was on French Creek north of Mc-Call. It was our first experience fighting fire as a unit; and all in all we didn't do badly, even though we did have a makeshift cook when Johnny Krier was pressed into service. After several days, the fire was controlled and we returned to camp long enough to take a swim and get in another day of school. Two days later we were called to another fire and spent several days on it. Upon returning from this fire we got in a good night's sleep before being called out once more. This was the Warren Creek Fire and four days were spent on it. During this time Prof. Wohletz had contacted Dean Jeffers and the decision was made to close camp, even though we had one more week to go. We got back to camp on a Friday evening and prepared to disband camp Saturday. By noon the camp was apart and all the boys had departed, some to go to work and some to go home.

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Field Trips

GAME FIELD TRIP-Lawrence Arneson '43

On a chill November 6 morning, the Game Management class left for a trip to the Cascades. There were fifteen fellows from Idaho including Dr. Young; at Pullman ten more, including Dr. Wing, were loaded aboard the big red wagon. From there we went to Coulee Dam, spending some time to enjoy the scenery; and after traveling all day we arrived at our destination, located in the Sinlaheekin valley of the Cascades some twenty miles south of the Canadian border.

The next morning we were divided into three groups for the purpose of cooking meals. After we had finished breakfast and had made lunches, we left camp and journeyed upvalley to study the range, its forage, deer, and game birds, including Hungarian partridge, Chinese pheasant, blue grouse and ruffed grouse. After a day of observing these phenomena, and partaking of much horseplay and numerous snowball fights, we were willing to go back to camp. Some of the fellows were bloodthirsty, so upon arriving at camp, they collected their weapons and left to go hunting. Some had fair luck and all returned to do justice to a fine steak dinner which had been prepared by the boys in camp. FRESHMAN FIELD TRIP-Burt Cleaveland '46

On February 2, 1943, the freshmen foresters went on their first field trip; they journeyed to the school forest in the St. Joe National Forest, and visited the Potlatch mill. The purpose of the trip was to give freshmen who had never been in western timberland an opportunity to see the forests here. They spent the morning and had lunch in the forest; after lunch they journeyed to the sawmill at Potlatch. At the mill they saw the complete route taken by timber from the mill pond to the finished board. Later in the afternoon Dean Jeffers treated the class to another lunch. Everyone agreed that they should take another field trip in the near future, as this first one was very interesting.

PRIEST LAKE TRIP-Gerald O'Connor '43

It was a cool, crisp, typical autumn afternoon in late October when the junior and senior production majors and the profs piled into the two green School of Forestry Chevy pickups, and headed due north, bound for the Priest lake country located in the Kaniksu National Forest. The trip was to be a threeday study of the special pathological and silvicultural problems of the region.

Base camp was made that evening at the B.R.C. headquarters located on the west central side of Priest Lake. After spending the night in sheeted sleeping bags furnished by the Forest Service, the boys were rudely awakened at exactly 5:30 A. M. Pacific war time by the vice president in charge of fire building, commonly known as "Camp Engineer." Following a typical hearty B.R.C. breakfast, the party was introduced to Mr. Billings, who is the chief silviculturist of the Kaniksu National Forest. A tour of the forest was next on the program, and was conducted by Mr. Billings with the able assistance of Professors Wohletz, Deters, and Ehrlich. The morning hours were spent studying the white pine experimental plots where experiments regarding blister rust and its control were being conducted. A plot showing proper silvicultural cutting methods in this region was (Continued on page 16)
