## 56 Graduates Hear McCall

Challenged with a plea to become personally involved in society, 56 Westminster graduates received bachelor degrees in commencement services June 8.

Commencement speaker, J. D. McCall, president of Columbia-Geneva Division, U. S. Steel Corporation, told the Class of '63 that "non-involvement—an unwillingness to involve one's self in the problems of our times—has become virtually an accepted way of life.

"Too many people expect poverty and illiteracy to go down, health and living standards to go up, and the

country to go forward without any effort on their part. This will not—this cannot happen," he continued.

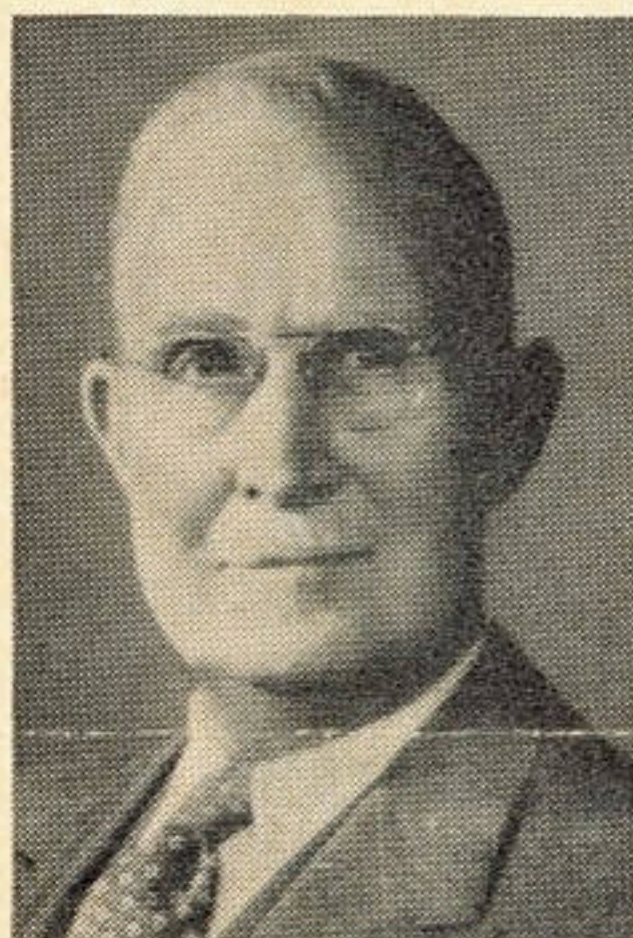
McCall received an A. B. degree in mechanical engineering and a master's degree in business administration from Stanford University. He has held his present position since 1959.

The commencement exercises climaxed a week of activities which included a reception honoring graduates and their families at the Walker Memorial Dining Room and a farewell banquet at Maxfield Lodge. In addition graduating women and their mothers were honored at a luncheon.

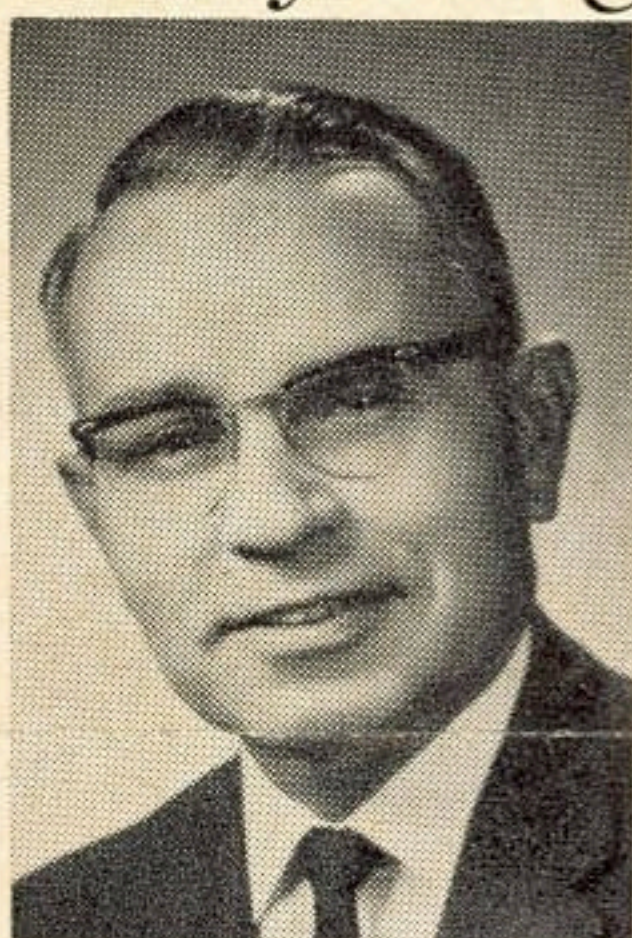


J. D. McCall delivers the commencement address to the Class of '63.

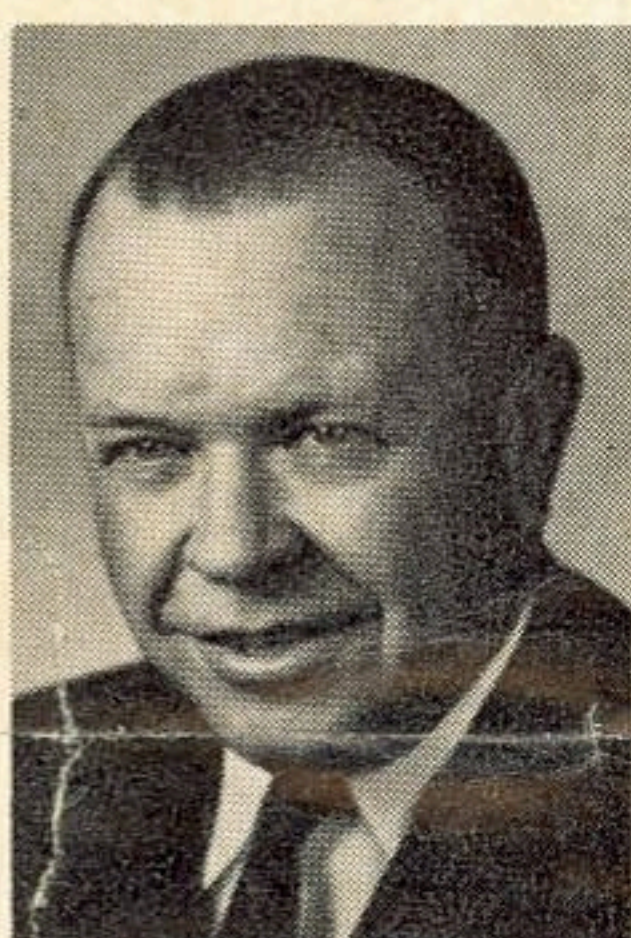
## Honorary Degrees Awarded

Honorary degrees went to two industrialists and two clergymen at the 1963 Commencement Exercises on the Westminster campus June 7.

J. D. McCall, president of Columbia-Geneva Division, United States Steel Corporation and speaker at the commencement exercises, and Alfred C. Berol, chairman of the board of Eagle

Pencil Company, New York, N. Y., each received honorary degrees.

They were joined in the distinction by baccalaureate speaker, the Reverend Miner E. Bruner, pastor of the First United Presbyterian Church of Logan and moderator of the Presbyterian Synod of California, and the Reverend Eugene V. Haynes, Bountiful pastor of the Community Church.

## Bruner: High Walls Faced By Graduates

The Reverend Miner E. Bruner, pastor of the First United Presbyterian Church, Logan, addressed 1963 Westminster graduates at baccalaureate services, June 7.

"Doctor, lawyer, merchant, chief, teacher, housewife—you now face the highest walls ever erected in walls of bigotry and prejudice, destruction and hate," he cautioned the graduates.

The Reverend Bruner received his A. B. degree from Hastings College, Hastings, Neb., and a B. D. degree from San Francisco Theological Seminary at San Anselmo, Calif. He has served the Logan church for 20 years.

He has served as moderator of the former Ogden Presbytery, the Presbytery of Utah and currently is moderator of the Synod of California-Utah-Nevada-Hawaii.
