Miss Rose, a graduating senior from Palo Alto, Calif., received the watch after she was selected by faculty members for her extracurricular activities, citizenship, use of talents and personal initiative.

Announcement of the following fellowships and assistantships was also made at the services:

Mrs. Shirley Nutter Joffs has been offered a teaching assistantship in English at the University of Utah valued at \$2,000.

Charles Keith McCarty has accepted a teaching assistantship in psychology at Montana State University valued at \$1800 plus tuition.

George Malcolm Reynolds has accepted the George Lieb Harrison Scholarship of \$2,000 at the University of Pennsylvania and the Flora Haney Fellowship in Germanic Languages valued at \$1,000 from the same institution.

Wayne U. Smith has been offered a Scottish Rite Fellowship valued at \$2,000, to be used at George Washington University for study in the graduate school of foreign service.


Faculty Activities

Dr. G. Olof Larson, associate professor and head of the Chemistry Department, presented a research paper, "Color Attending the Benzilic Acid Rearrangement," at the Northwest Regional Meeting of the American Chemical Society in Bellingham, Washington, June 17-18. He will attend a conference on plant biochemistry at the Institute of Paper Chemistry, Appleton, Wisconsin, August 19-30. During the remainder of the summer he is doing research at Westminster College.

Dr. Barry G. Quinn, assistant professor of biology, has been awarded a \$5,000 National Institute of Health post-doctoral fellowship. He will use the award over the next two summers plus an additional semester to study ecology and natural history of coral reef animals in the Miami and Florida Keys area.

The fellowship is awarded by the Marine Laboratory of the University of Miami.

Mrs. Melissa Stanley, assistant professor of biology, has begun a year's study in the Zoology and Entomology Departments at the University of Utah under a National Science Foundation Science Faculty Fellowship.

Professor Tom Miller has received a \$1,000 grant to attend a summer institute in numerical and statistical methods of digital computing and analog computation at the Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy, June 10 through August 2.

Westminster College has taken advantage of an offer from General Electric Company which enables the school to purchase \$3,375 worth of equipment for the physics department at a price of \$500.

The offer is a part of a program designed to stretch schools' available funds to more nearly maintain their laboratories at the standards required for high quality instruction and related research.

Assisting him as vice president will be Robert V. Williams, junior political science major and son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Williams, of Salt Lake City.



The Westminster College studentbody came out in record numbers to elect the foursome to office.




