The 47th annual Tower Trick or Treat brought families to the Moscow campus as students handed out candy and dazzled the children. Each floor of the building was decked out in the Night at the Library theme, featuring stories like "Eragon" and "Goosebumps."

U of I sophomore James Sullivan dressed as Willy Wonka and helped decorate the Theophilus basement like the magical chocolate factory.
