SOME CHICAGO STATISTICS. As Compiled by a British Consul for His

Government, It is of interest sometimes to get a glimpse of ourselves as others see us. Herewith is reproduced from The British Architect a condensation of the annual trade report of Colonel Hayes Sadler, British consul at Chicago. His financial stat stics are presented in pounds sterling as he wrote them. "In 1830," says the consul, "the population of Chicago consisted of 70 persons, in 1883 it had increased to 200, and in 1833 to 850. In 1837 it was incorporated as a city; it comprised but a very small part of its present site, and a census then

taken showed 4,170 inhabitants. In 1850 the population was 29,963, ten years later 112,172; in 1870, 208,977; in 1880, 503,185; and in 1890, 1,208,669, an increase of 705,484 in ten years. "The city is still increasing, and now con

tains about 1,800,000 inhabitants. Chicago now extends along the line of Halsted street a distance of \$13 miles, and from east to west at the broadest point 10% miles. It covers an area of M5,828 acres, or 180.9 square miles, and is almost entirely

surrounded by magnificent boulevards stretching for about 85 miles and expanding here and there into extensive parks, In 1800 there were 127,871 dwellings and 220,830 families, or an average of 1.73 fam-ilies to each dwelling. Last year 11,605 buildings were constructed, covering a frontage of 5314 miles, at a cost of £11,184, 600, to which may be added probably 20 per cent. for completion beyond the estimates. The river frontage extends 41 miles, and the lake frontage 21 miles. There are 2,333 miles of streets, and count ing the boulevards 8,164 miles; 775 miles of streets are paved, of which 481 miles are paved with wood, and 281.8 miles with

stone. "The park and boulevard system cover

2,597 acres. Nearly 100 miles of fresh sewers were laid last year, with pipes vary-ing from 9 inches to 9 feet in diameter. Education has kept pace with the general advance; there are 218 schools, seating 125,-000 pumils and acrime 0.1190 000 for 000 pupils, and costing £1,180,000, 86 per cent. of which is raised by taxation and the balance derived from school property. Three years ago the appropriation did not amount to half that sum. The total trade in 1891 is estimated at £300,825,000 against £284,500,000 in the preceding year, or a little less than one-third of the total bank clearings. In 1850 the total trade was, in round numbers, £4,000,000; in 1860, £20,000, 000; in 1870, £77,000,000; in 1880, £180,000, 000; in 1885, £198,000,000; in 1890, £284,000, 000, and in 1891, £300,000,000,"

As the days go by Biela's comet is whirling on nearer and nearer to the earth, and t the same time the various projects of the World's fair are also whirling along. The comet will soon be a conspicuous object in the skies, and about the same time the exhibition buildings will also be on view. Indeed, if the flery monster of the akies cares to come this way, it might find a resting place in Jackson park and pose as one of the attractions.

The structures now in progress of crea-tion involve all sorts and styles of architecture, but perhaps the most interesting is that which will stand on the Midway plaisance, and which will represent a typ-ical German village. It is intended chiefly for the pleasure and comfort of Germans and German-Americans, although any vis-itor to the grounds will be welcome, and its erection has the sanction of Emperor William, who has also granted its promoters the privilege of selecting two crack military bands from the imperial army to

furnish the music. The project includes the display of an eld time fair, two restaurants, a German concert garden, a water tower and an encert garden, a water tower and an ethnological museum. This reproduction of German life will be the Mecca of Teutonic citizens. The language of the fatherland will be the exclusive means of intercourse, and the atmosphere will be filled with the strains of "Whicht am Rhein." The original plan was the reproduction of a complete German city of the Middle

Ages, but through lack of time it was con-eluded to build a German village, repre-menting a period at which rural life at-tained its highest exemplification in the year 1600. In the center of a plat 775 feet long there

ill rise a castle, built in the style of the Sixteenth century, surrounded by a moat aixteen feet wide, behind which, for further protection, palisades will be con-atracted. Over a drawbridge the road

A heavy ground swell at Port Los Angeles (Santa Monica) tore the Corona loose from her moorings, breaking the lines and a hawser. The work of dis-charging consumed seven hours over schedule time, with a loss of about \$300 worth of hawser.

The British ship Old Kensington, which has just arrived at Port Town-send from San Francisco, narrowly escaped destruction in Barclay Sound, off Vancouver Island, where she drifted in thick weather and remained seven days drifting around among the rocks and breakers. Her escape was miracu-

The Lamarietta vineyard at Fresno last season brought two carloads of boys last season brought two carloads of boys from San Francisco, and set them to picking grapes. The boys' ages ranged from 14 to 18 years. Some of them ran off, and some landed in jail, but the general result was satisfactory. They picked more grapes than an equal num-ber of Chinese and for less money. It is probable that the experiment of last season will lead to a more extensive one this summer.

At a meeting of Mayor Ellert and a number of citizens the other night it was decided definitely to hold a midwinter fair in San Francisco, and it was further decided to place the matter in charge of a committee of eleven to he appointed hereafter. The committee will meet Manager Cornely upon his srrival from Chicago, and with him begin actual preparation for the enter-prise. Much enthusiasm was mani-fested at this meeting, and a spirit of confidence was shown that money can be raised, sufficient interest enlisted and all things necessary be done, even in the short time between the present and the close of the Columbian Exposition to make the fair a success.

A gentleman of Olympia, Wash., has conceived the idea of utilizing the water conceived the idea of utilizing the water power of Tumwater, a suburb, in gener-ating electricity for the work of dredg-ing Olympia harbor and redeeming the tide lands. At low water the falls at Tumwater produce 9,000-horse power, and a proposition for the utilizing of this power has been made to the com-prove controlling it. The official of the pany controlling it. The officials of the dredger company have asked the light and power company for a formal prop-osition to furnish 300-horse power by electricity with which to finish their government contract in the harbor. The plans for the harbor improvement Line Commission and approved by the War Department. The area of redeemed land will extend to the end of the long wharf, a distance of about a mile from the city front, covering an area of about six blocks at the south end and tapering to about 1,000 feet at the end of the long wharf. Surround-ing this will be a reserved strip of 300

feet for piers. To the west of this will be the harbor proper. Extending down the west side of this redeemed land will run the Northern Pacific track and an avenue 150 feet wide. On the cast side a water-way is proposed, with a 300-foot reserve for wharves and mill and manufacturing sites. The Tumwater water-way will afford deep water a mile be-yond Capitol Point, where the new Statehouse is to be built.



John Gould describes his process as follows: "Taking slightly acid cream, put it in a revolving churn, and churn it until it begins to show signs of breaking, when a little weak brine should be added to the cream to assist in the separation. When the but-ter grains are the size of small shot and before taking out any buttermilk add two-thirds as much cold water as there is butter, etc., in the churn. Agitate a little wooden fork. Let the butter re-main undisturbed for a half hour, when the cover is put on and the churn slowly werely for the cov the cover is put on and the churn slowly revolved for five or more minutes. Then take this fork and break up the butter balls that have formed in the churn, and liberate the buttermilk inside of them. The Navy Department.

The report of the secretary of the navy contains a history of the operations of his department during the past year and exhibits a most gratifying condition of the personnel of our navy. He presents a satisfactory account of the progress which has been made in the construction of vessels and makes a number of recommendations, to which attention is especially invited. During the past six months the demands for cruising vessels have been many and urgent. There have been revolutions calling for vessels to protect American interests in Nicaragua, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Honduras, Argentina and Brazil, while the condition of affairs in Honolulu has required the constant presence of one or more ships. With all these calls upon our navy it be came necessary, in order to make up a sufficient fleet to patrol the Behring sea under the modus vivendi agreed upon with Great Britain, to detail to that service one vessel from the fish commission and three from the revenue marine.

Progress in the construction of new vessels has not been as rapid as was an-ticipated. There have been delays in the completion of unarmored vessels, but for the most part they have been such as are constantly occuring even in as are constantly occurring even in countries having the largest experience in naval shipbuilding. The most serious delays, however, have been in the work upon armored ships. The trouble has been the failure of contractors to deliver the armor as agreed. The difficulties seem now, however, to have been all overcome, and armor is being delivered with satisfactory promptness. As a result of the experience acquired

by shipbuilders and designers and ma-terial men, it is believed that the dates when vessels will be completed can now he estimated with reasonable accuracy Great guns, rapid-firing guns, torpedoe and powder are being promptly supplied.

Agricultural Exports.

The exports of agricultural products from the United States for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1892, attained the enor-mous figure of \$800,000,000 in round numbers, being 78.7 per cent of our total exports. In the last fiscal year this ag-gregate was greatly reduced, but nevertheless reached \$650,000,000, being 75.1 per cent of all American commodities exported. A review of our agricultural exports, with special reference to their destination, will show that in almost every line the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland absorbs by far the largest proportion. The total cattle exports aggregated in value for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1893, \$26,000,000, of which Great Britain took considerably over \$25,000,000. Of beef products of all kinds our total exports were \$28,000,-000, of which Great Britain took \$24,-000,000. Of pork products, the total ex-ports were \$34,000,000, of which Great Britain took \$33,000,000. In breadstuffs, cotton and minor products, a like proportion sent to the same destination is shown.

Not less closely related to our people's prosperity and well-being is the re-moval of restrictions upon the importation of raw material necessary to our manufacturers. The world should be open to our national ingenuity and en-terprise. This cannot be while federal legislation through the imposition of high tariff forbids to American manufacturers as cheap materials as those used by their competitors. It is quite obvious that the enhancement of [•] the price of our manufactured products resulting from this policy not only confines the market for these products within our own borders, to the direct disadvantage of our manufacturers, but also increases their cost to our citizens.

THE INTERESTS OF LABOR.

The intresets of labor are certainly though indirectly involved in this fea-ture of our tariff system. The sharp competition and active struggle among our manufacturers to supply the united demand for their goods soon fills the narrow market to which they are confined. Then follows a suspension of the working of mills and factories, a dis-charge of employes and distress in the homes of our workingmen. Even if the often disproved assertion could be made good that a lower rate of wages would result from free raw material and low tariff duties, the intelligence of our workingmen leads them quickly to discover that their steady employment, if per-mitted by free materials, is the most important factor in their relation to tariff egislation.

Nothing Definite Submitted on the Hawaiian Question-Upholds the New Tariff Bill.

President Grover Cleveland's first mes sage to the 55d congress assembled in regular session was presented to the two houses and read in both. The full text of the message is: The constitutional duty which requires

consideration such matters as he shall judge necessary is fittingly entered upon by commending to congress a careful recommendation of the detailed statements and well-supported recommenda-tions contained in the reports of the de-partments who are chiefly charged with the executive work of the government. In an effort to abridge this communica-tion, as much as is consistent with its purpose, I shall supplement a brief ref-erence with the contents of the departmental reports by the mention of such executive business and incidents as are not embraced therein and by such recommendations as appear to be at this particular time appropriate.

Our Foreign Relations.

While our foreign relations have not at all times during the past year been entirely free from preplexing, yet no em-barrassing situations remain that will not yield to the spirit of fairness and love of justice, which, joined with consistent firmness, characterize a truly American policy. ABGENTINE-BRAZIL BOUNDARY DISPUTE

My predecessor having accepted the office of arbitrator of the long-standing boundary dispute tendered to the presi-dent by the Argentine Republic and Brazil, it has been my agreeable duty to receive the special envoys commissioned by these states to lay before me the evince and arguments in behalf of their

respective governments. THE BRAZILIAN REVOLUTION. The outbreak of domestic hostilities in the republic of Brazil found the United States slert to watch the in-terests of our citizens in that country, with which we carry on important com merce. Several vessels of our new navy are now, and for some time have been stationed at Rio de Janeiro. The strug gle being between the established gov ernment, which controls the machinery of administration, and with which we maintain friendly relations, and certain officers of the navy employing the ves-sels of their command in an attack upon the national capital and chief seaport, and lacking, as it does, the elements of divided administration, I have failed to see that the insurgents can reasonably claim recognition as belligerents. Thus the position of our government has been that of an attentive, but impartial observer of the unfortunate conflict. Em-phasizing our fixed policy of impartial neutrality in such a condition of affairs as now exists. I deemed it necessary to disavow, in a manner not to be mis-understood, the unauthorized action of the late naval commander in those waters in saluting the revolted Brazilian admiral, being indisposed to counte-nance an act calculated to give gratuitous sanction to the local insurrection.

Upon urgent representation to the Haytian government, a suitable indemnity was paid to the sufferer. By a law of Hayti a sailing vessel hav-

ing discharged her cargo is refused clearance until the duties on such cargo have been paid. The hardship of this measure upon American ship-owners, who conduct the bulk of the carrying trade of that country, has been insisted on with a view of preventing a recur-rence of this cause of complaint.

OUR NEAREST SOUTHERN NEIGHBORS. Our relations with Mexico continue to be of that close and friendly nature which should always characterize the in-The work of relocating the monuments, marking the boundary between the countries from Paso Del Norte to the Pacific, is now clearly completed. The Hawailan Affair.

It is scarcely necessary for me to state that the questions arising from our rela-tions with Hawaii have caused serious vestigation of the circumstances attend-ing the change of government and of all conditions bearing upon the subject of the treaty. After a thorough and ex-haustive examination, Mr. Blount submitted to me his report, showing beyond all question that the constitutional gov ernment of Hawaii had been subverted with the active aid of our representative to that government and through the in-timidation caused by the presence of an armed naval force of the United States. which was landed for that purpose at the instance of our minister.

INSTRUCTIONS TO WILLIS.

Upon the facts developed it seemed to me that the only honorable course for our government to pursue was to undo the wrong that had been done by those representing us, and to restore, as far as practicable, the status existing at the the time of our forcible intervention. With a view of accomplishing this result, within the constitutional limits of our executive power, and recognizing all our obligations and responsibilities growing out of any changes in the con-ditions brought about by our unjustifiable interference, our present minister at Honolulu has received appropriate instructions to that end. Thus far no information of the accomplishment of any definite results has been received from him. Additional advices are soon expected. When received, they will be promptly sent to congress, together with all other information at hand, accompanied by a special executive message detailing the acts necessary to a com-plete understanding of the case, and presenting a history of all the material events leading up to the present situation.

RECEIPTS FOR THE YEAR.

The postoffice receipts for the last fiscal year amounted to \$75,896,933 15, and its expenditures to \$81,074,106 90. MONEY-ORDER OFFICES.

There were 6101 additions to the domestic money-order offices during the last fiscal year, being the largest increase in any year since the inangura-tion of the system. The total number of these offices at the close of the year was 18,434. There were 12,309,735 money orders issued from these offices, honey orders issued from these orders, being an increase over the preceding year of 1,240,290, and the value of these orders amounted to \$127,576,433 65, an increase of \$7,502,632 58. There were also issued during the year postal notes amounting to \$12,909,076 73. During the year 195 international money-order offices

were added to those already provided, making a total of 2497 in operation June 30, 1893. The number of international money orders issued during the year was 1,055,299, an increase over the prewas 1,005,259, an increase over the pre-ceding year of 72,525, and their value was \$16,341,837 86, an increase of \$1,222,-506 31. The number of orders paid was 300,917, an increase over the preceding year of 13,503, and their value was \$5,982,375,70 or increase of \$01,004,99 \$5,283,375 70, an increase of \$94,094 83. From the foregoing statement it appears that the total issue of money orders and postal notes for the year amounted to \$156,821,348 24.

The number of letters and packages mailed during the year for special de-livery was 3,375,603, an increase over the preceding year of nearly 32 per cent. The special delivery stamps used upon these letters and packages amounted to \$337,559 70, and the messenger fees paid for their delivery amounted to \$256,592 71, leaving a profit to the government of \$80,976 59.

The vexations question of so-called legation asylum for offenders against the state and its laws was presented anew in Chill by the unauthorized action of the late United States minister in receiving in his official residence two persons who had failed in an attempt at revolution and against whom criminal charges were pending, growing out of a former abor-tive disturbance. The doctrine of asylum as applied to this case is sanctioned by the best precedent, and when allowed tends to encourage sedition and strife. Under no circumstances can the representatives of this government be per-mitted, under the ill-defined fiction of extra territorialty, to interrupt the adminis-tration of criminal justice in the coun-tries to which they are accredited. A temperate demand having been made by the Chilian government for the correction of this conduct, in the instance mentioned, the minister was instructed no longer to harbor the offender.

THE CHINESE QUESTION.

The legislation of last year, known as the Geary law, requiring the registra-tion of all Chinese laborers entitled to residence in the United States and the deportation of all not complying with the provision of the act within the time prescribed, met with much opposition from Chinamen in this country. Acting upon the advice of eminent counsel that the law was unconstitutional, the great mass of Chinese laborers, pending judicial inquiry as to its validity, in good faith declined to apply for the certifi-cates required by its provisions. A test upon a proceeding by habeas corpus was brought before the supreme court, and May 15, 1893, a decision was made by that tribunal sustaining the law. It is believed that under the recent amendment of the act, extending the time for the registration, the Chinese laborers thereto entitled who desire to reside in this country will now avail themselves of the renewed privilege thus afforded by establishing by lawful procedure their right to remain, and that thereby the necessity of enforced deportation may, to a great degree, be avoided. Costa Rica has lately testilied its friendliness by surrendering to the United States, in the absence of a con-

vention of extradition, but upon duly submitted evidence of criminality, a noted fugitive from justice. It is trusted that the negotiation of a treaty with that

DICTATOR, BUT NO REVOLT. Guatemala has also been visited by the political vicissitudes which have afflicted her Central American neigh bors, but the dissolution of its legislature and the proclamation of dictator-ship have been unattended by civil war.

An extradition treaty with Norway has recently been exchanged and pro-claimed.

The extradition treaty with Russia, signed in March, 1887, and amended and confirmed by the senate in February last, was duly proclaimed last June.

AFFAIRS IN SAMOA.

Led by a desire to compose differences and contribute to the restoration of order in Samoa, which for some years previous had been the scene of conflicting foreign pretentions and native strife, the United States, departing from its policy consecrated by a century of obervance, entered four years ago into the treaty of Berlin, thereby becoming jointly bound with England and Germany to establish and maintain Malietoa Laupepa as king of Samoa. The treaty provided for a foreign court of justice and a municipal council for the district

of Apia, with a foreign president thereof authorized to advise the king; a tri-bunal for the settlement of native and foreign land titles, and a revenue system for the kingdom. It entailed upon the three powers that part of the cost of the new government not met by the rev-enue of the islands. Early in the life of this triple protectorate the native dis-sensions it was designed to quell were revived. The rivals defied the authority of the new king, refusing to pay taxes and demanding the election of a ruler by native suffrage. Mataafa, an aspirant to the throne, and a large number of his native adherents were in open rebeilion on one of the islands. Quite lately, at the request of the other nowers and in fulfillment of

the other powers and in fulfillment of its treaty obligations, this government agreed to unite in a joint military govrnment of such dimensions as would probably secure the surrender of the in-surgents without bloodshed. The warship Philadelphia was accordingly put under orders for Samoa, and before she

arrived the threatened conflict was pre-cipitated by Chief Mataafa's attack upon

cipitated by Ohief Mataafa's attack upon the insurgents' caup. Mataafa was de-feated and a number of men killed. The British and German vessels present sub-sequently secured the surrender of Ma-taafa and his adherents. The defeated chief and 10 of his principal supporters Marshal group, where they are held as

A favorable re-sponse has been received from Great Britain in the shape of a resolution adopted by parliament July 13 last, cor-dially sympathizing with the purpose in Britain view and expressing the hope that her majesty's government will lend ready co-operation to the government of the United States upon the basis of the concurrent resolution above quoted. It affords me signal pleasure to lay this preliminary resolution before congress and to express my gratification that the sentiment of two great and kindred na-tions is thus authoritatively manifested in favor of the rational and peaceful settlement of international quarrels by honorable resort to arbitration.

OUR REPRESENTATIVES ABROAD

Since the passage of the act of March 3, 1803, authorizing the president to raise the grade of our envoys to corres-pond with the rank with which foreign countries accredit their agents here. Great Britain, France, Italy and Germany have conferred upon their representatives at this capital the title of embassador, and I have responded by ac-crediting the agents of the United States in those countries with the same title. A like elevation of mission is announced by Russia and when made will be similarly met. This step fitting y comports with the position the United States

holds in the family of nations. THE CONSULAR SERVICE. During my former administration

took occasion to recommend a recast of the laws relating to consular service in order that it might become a more effi-cient agency in the promotion of the interests it was intended to subserve. The duties and powers of consuls have been expanded with the growing require-ments of our foreign trade. Discharging important duties affecting our commerce and American citizens abroad and in certain countries exercising judicial functions, these officers should be men of character, intelligence and ability.

EXTENSION OF THE COPYRIGHT. Upon proof that the legislation of Denmark secures copyright to American citizens on equal footing with its own, the privileges of our copyright laws have been extended by proclamation to the subjects of that country.

In the pursuit of this object we should resolutely turn away from alluring and temporary ex-pedients, determined to be content with nothing less than a lasting and comprehensive financial plan. In these circum stances I am confident that a reasonable delay in dealing with this subject, instead of being injurious, will increase the probability of wise action.

THE BRUSSELS CONFERENCE

The monetary conference, which as sembled at Brussels upon our invitation, was adjourned to November 30, in the present year. The considerations just stated, and the fact that a definite proposit on from the United States eemed to be expected on the reassem-

bling of the conference, led me to express a willingness to have the meeting still further postponed. It seems to me that it would be wise to give general authority to the president to invite other nations to such a conference a any time when there should be a fair prospect of accomplishing an interna-tional agreement on the subject of coinage.

NATIONAL MILITARY PARKS.

MILITARY ACADEMIES.

Under the supervision of Adjutant-Gen eral Robert Williams, lately retired, the bureau of military information has be-come well established and is performing a service that will put in possession of the government in time of war most valuable information, and at all times serve a purpose of great utility in keep-ing the army advised of the world's rogress in all matters pertaining to the art of war.

Postmaster-General.

The report of the postmaster-general contains a detailed statement of the op-erations of the postoffice department during the last fiscal year and much interesting information touching this im-portant branch of the public service. The business of the mails indicates with absolute certainty the condition of the business of the country, and a depres-sion in financial affairs inevitably and quickly reduces the postal revenues, Therefore, a larger discrepancy than usual between the postoffice receipts and expenditures is the expected and unavoidable result of the distressing stringency which has prevailed throughout the country during much of the time covered by the postmaster-general's report.

Department of Justice.

The report of the attorney-general contains the usual summary of the affairs and proceedings of the depart-ment of justice for the past year, to-gether with certain recommendations as to needed legislation on various subjects. I cannot too heartily indorse the proposition that the fee system, as applicable to the compensation of United States attorneys, marshals, clerks of federal courts and United States commissioners, should be abol-ished with as little delay as possible. It is clearly in the interest of the community that the business of the courts, both civil and criminal, be as small and as inexpensively transacted as the ends of justice will allow. The system is therefore thoroughly vicious which makes the compensation of court officials depend upon the volume of such business and thus creates a conflict be-tween the proper execution of the law and private gain, which cannot fail to be dangerous to the rights and freedom of citizens, and irresistible temptation to the unjustifiable expenditure of public funds.

DISPOSITION OF PETTY OFFENSES.

Y

If, in addition to this reform, another was inaugurated which would give to United States commissioners the final disposition of petty offenses within the grade of the misdemeanor, especially those coming under the internal revenue laws, a great advance would be made toward a more decent administration of the criminal law. In my first message to congress, dated December 8, 1885, I strongly recommended these changes and referred somewhat at length to the evils of the present system. Since that time the criminal business of the federal courts and the expense attending it have enormously increased.
