POSTAL BANK NEXT MONDAY. The postmaster-general, recogniz ing the importance of Genesee has de ided to establish a postal savings bank in this city, which will be open or business on April 8. The follow ing information relative to the object and workings of the postal savings bank system will be of interest to ou

eaders: Accounts may be opened and deposits made by any person of the age f ten years or over in his or her own name and free from any iterference or control by her husband. No person an have more than one account at any one time.

All acounts must be opened in person by the depositor or his authorized representative. After opening an acount a depositor may forward subsequent deposits to the post office by

Deposits will be accepted only from individuals, and no account will be opened in the name of any corporation. association, society, firm or partnership, or in the names of two or more

persons jointly. The service of the postal savings system is free, and no charge or fee s collected or required in connection amount desired. withdrawal of money deposited.

No person connected with the post ed at the post office. ffice department or the postal service is permitted to disclose the name of any depositor or give any information

be required to sign and which the postmaster will retain in his records.

No account may be opened for less Perce and Latah County, Idaho. Physician and Surgeon than \$1, nor will fractions of a dollar be accepted for deposit. No person is permitted to deposit more than \$100 in any one calendar month nor to oue time of more than \$500 exclusive of accumulated interest. Savings certificates cannot be transferred or negotiated and will be payaple only to the person to whom issued. On opening an account a depositor is sup plied with an envelope in which he Office : In Burr Block, West of Larrabee's may keep his savings certificates. On this envelope is printed information for his guidance, and also a bleak ledger record on which to keep account of his deposits and withdrawals. In case a savings certificate is lost or destroyed the depositor should notify the postmaster. If deemed Office in Exchange block GENESPE, IDA. proper, a new certificate will be issued upon compliance by the deposi tor with the necessary requirements. Postmasters are not permitted to reeive savings certificates for safe keeping.

Amounts less than \$1 may be saved for deposit by the purchase of 10-cent postal savings cards and adhesive 10cent postal saving stamps. Each postal-savings card contains blank spaces to which stamps may be affixed from time to time as purchased, and a postal savings card with nine 10cent savings stamps thus affixed will be accepted as a deposit of \$1 either in opening or adding to an existing account. Savings cards and stamps are redeemed only by the issue of sa vings certificates and are not valid for postage. They will not be received in exchange for postage stamps nor will postage stamps be accepted in exchange for postal savings cards or

stamps. Interest will be allowed on all de posits at the rate of two per cent per annum, computed on each savings certificate separately and payable annually. No interest will be paid on money which remains on deposit for fraction of a year only. Deposits will bear interest from the first day of the month following that in which leposited. Interest will continue to accrue on a savings certificate as long is it remains outstanding, certificates valid until paid, without limitation as to time.

A depositor may at any time withdraw the whole or any part of his deosits to his credit with any interest payable by surrendering savings certificates, properly indorsed for the

Feed of all kinds is reported unusually scarce throughout the west and the 1912 season milling companies are unable to satisfy the demand at \$40 a ton or \$2 per hundred. Similar conditions are reported from the middle west states and this condition is said to be directly responsible for the high price of hogs and the probable further advance in hogs and cattle.

Statement is made that the supply of barley and oates is practically exted and the demand for feed has sulted in large quantities of high rade wheat being manufactured into feed products. This turn in affairs as advanced the price of wheat by ounds during the past few weeks, tatement being make by buyers that the present offerings are far in ad vance of the quotations for exporting or milling purposes.

Stockmen report a scarcity of hogs and cattle throughout the northwest and grain buyers predict that fewer cattle and hogs will be fattened until the new crop is on the market and the present feed condition is relieved. 
The fat test should be made at least once a month, the testing to be don at regular intervals. Samples from both morning and evening milking should be used. For the small herd a four bottle Babcock tester is of sufficient size and may be secured at small cost from any creamery supply company and includes full direction for conducting the test. The manioulation of the fat test is very simple but the directions should be carefully llowed Guesswork is expensive to the

dairyman. No person is able to go into a good sized herd and pick out all the best cows by examination. The highest degree of success cannot be attained unless the dairyman knows accurately the record of each cow. Success in dairying will depend upon the farmer's ability to lower the cost of producing a pound of butterfat,



It was shown during the trial in he lower court that the price of barley materially advanced after the contract between Houser and Hobart Bros. was made and the defendents refused to deliver the crop to the plaintiff.

The contracts used by the grain companies are very dissimilar and in most cases the same have been signed by the agents of the company engaged in the contracting. High Grade Dairy Stock for Lewiston

Dean W. L. Carlyle and Professor Ellington of the University of Idaho started east last week to purchase carload lots of improved dairy stock which will be shipped to Idaho and offered at public sale. The first sale will be held at Moscow on June 14th. About three months ago the Lewiston Commercial Club took up the matter of getting improved dairy stock ship. ped in from the east and a committee has been making investigations for committee found that there was a great demand in this region for good dairy cows, and by advertising in a Wisconsin dairy journal they learned where the stock could be obtained at reasonable prices. Recently the Idaho-Washington Development Leagne has taken hold of the matter and now-both the Commer cial Club and the Development League are cooperating with Dean Carlyle in the work of introducing good dairy stock in Idaho, which, it is believed, is as important as any line of development work that can be undertaken. At the present time \$7,000,000 worth of dairy products are shipped into the Inland Empire annually. This condition should not exist for the Inand Empire is a region just as capable of producing milk and butter as the eastern sections from which these products are now secured.

C.W. Brockman, a prominent farm er of Camas Prairie has just pu chased a carload of choice dairy cat tle in the Willamette Valley. In discussing his investment Mr. Brockman explained that the dairy herd will be maintained entirely from the products of his summer fallow land and the care and milking of the cattle will not exceed a cost of \$30 per month He regards the prairie country particularly adapted to the dairy in dustry and predicts that within a few years the Camas and Nez Perce prair es will be one of the greatest dairy producing sections of the northwest. t is stated when this condition of de elopment is attained, the populatio will be many times what it is at the present time and the land values will approach the \$130 per acre mark.

Juevenile Disorderly Conduct Defined Section 161 - Every child within the provisions of this chapter who does not attend school, as provided in the preceeding section, or who is in ttendance at any public, private or arochial school, and is vicious, inorrigible or immoral in conduct, o who is an habitual truant from school, or who habitually wanders about the streets and public places during school hours without lawful occupation or employment, or who habitually wanders about the streets in the night time, having no employment or law ful occupation, shall be deemed a juvenile disorderly person, and be sub ject to the provisions of this chapter.

Encouraging Delinquency A Misdemea Section 159-In all cases where any child shall be a delinquent child a juvenile delinquent person, or a juvenile disorderly person, as defined by this act, the parent or parents, legal guardian, or person having custody of such child, or any other person responsible for, or by any act encouraging, causing or contributing to the delinquency of such child shall be guilty of misdemeanor, and upon trial and conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300), or imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not exceeding six months, or shall suffer both fine and imprisonment. From cellar to attic the building is thoroughly constructed, and the work done by Contractors Lohrenz and Offiler, under the supervision of a most efficient foreman, Paul Voell, has been satisfactory alike to the school trustees and those who have watched its progress. It contains two floors, besides a commodious basement, has the best and most approved lighting and ventilating facilities, a complete steam heating plant known as the Modern Vacuum System which is the very latest wrinkle in modern heating, by which the radiators may be kept at any desired temperature through an improved valve system. It also contains thoroughly modern toilets, connected up with septic tanks. The halls and stairways are fireproof and constructed of re-inforced concrete, with iron railings and newell posts. Sanitary drinking fountains are placed in the center of each hall. All the rooms, with the exception of the manual training and domestic science are lighted with electricity, and every room in the building is equipped with a series of dampers in connection with the steam radiators by which fresh air constantly enters the room and is warmed, and the impure air is crowded out near the floor. The entire build ing is provided with hot and cold running water, special provisions being made for this in the toilets, chemistry

and physics labaratory, and domestic science rooms. The basement is divided into four rooms, with a large hall The boiler room is located in the northwest corner, where storage room is also provided for 40 tons of coal. This room is done entirely in concrete, with concrete floors, concrete coating on furnace and concrete covered smoke flue. Hot water tanks, ash pits, etc., are among the provisions of the room.

The actual average for the whole field of over 82 acres was

47.57 bushels per acre. The other cause was that readers; also, all the issues of The farmers did not save the seed that as it might and ought to have been dried before the cold weather came. While much of the crop was immature, enough of it was amply mature to have furnished a sufficient supply of good seed for the crop of 1912, had it been properly saved.

Three things call for attention when aving seed corn. The first is to select the good ears of the first ripe orn, the second is to dry the corn roughly in an airy place, and the third is to leave it thoroughly dry before cold, freezing weather comes.

By selecting the first ripe, good ears, the maturing of the corn is hastened up to a certain limit. . Corn thus saved will always mature earlier than corn of the same variety that has grown further southward and that has had a longer time in which to mature. Such seed will also be more rugged than seed grown further south. Saving seed thus has an important bear ing on the success of growing corn in be future.

Seed corn must be dried where the air can circulate freely around it. A good way is to hang in the attic so that the ears do not touch. It is better if they are suspended so they will not touch any object. Various ways of doing this will suggest themselves as by the aid of racks or by contrivances for suspension under the ceiling. The air circulating around the cob carries away the moisture. The corn thus may or ought to become thoroughly dried before the winter ets in. Should it not be auite di when cold weather comes, artificia heat should be provided.

It is not easy in all instances to tell when the corn is sufficiently dried. and therefore, the sim should be to keep it in a place through the winter not subject to extremely cold weather. This is important, and should never be overlooked. An ample supply should be saved as it may be neces sary to discard some ears when the testing is done in the spring

These re arks are intended to aid the individual farmer who is saving his own seed. The saving of seed for the market is a more elaborate process. It involves the use of a drying house and artificial heat, when a large quantity is to be saved. Nothing, how ever, should hinder the farmer from saving his own seed corn He is then independent of the market. When it is considered that only a small amount relatively is wanted for each farm, the time should not be begrudged that is spent in saving the seed

Corn may be plucked for seed after it has become thoroughly glazed. The outer covering of the ear, that is, the husks, will be assuming a yellow tint. Should frost strike the crop before it is mature, then the aim should be to get it from some neighbor's field if this plan is feasible. On no account should the farmer neglect to give attention to this work. The action taken this fall in saving seed will largely determine what the corn crop shall be next year THOMAS SHAW.

"When, in inspection of wheat, it is found to be soft, bleached, frosted, or to contain sprouted or damaged kerrels, but in the judgment of the inspector is fit for milling purposes, said wheat shall be graded No. 2 or No. 3, according to test weights (No. 2 testing not less than 6 pounds and No. 3 not less than 54 pounds to the measured bushel); and in case said wheat is sold on an exic tory contract which provides that the price and the amount to be paid therefore shall de pend on terminal weight or grade, there shall be deducted on the amount of pounds per bushel not to exceed four pounds on either grade to cover above conditions, the amount of said reduction in weight to be discretion ary with the inspector within the above named limit "

'The College of Agricultue is constantly receiving inquiries about soil onditions in different localities that cannot now be answered except upon personal knowledge, which, of course, cannot extend to every bit of ground n the state. A movement to estabish a state bureau of soils was started a few years ago but abandoned be cause of a lack of geological knowledge of the state. Soil is formed by the decomposition of rock, different rocks giving different soils, and so soil surveys can be made only when the geology of a district is understood. "I discussed the matter with many of the most prominent mining engineers of the country at the recent meeting of the American Mining Congress and they were unanimously f the opinion that a survey would stimulate the mining industry of Idaho. Few prospectors have sufficient knowledge of mineralogy and geology o get the best results from their efforts. The most experienced are constantiy finding rocks and minerals which they cannot identify. They should be able to send these to an expert for free identification and for an opinion as to their possible value. Valuable veins are usually found in ertain formations and a survey could point out the favorable regions.

"After an ore deposit is located the able mining of it depends up the understanding of the geology of the district. All large companies find that it pays to employ an expert  $g \in o_{-}$ logist. A state survey would help the small operator.

"Another great service would be i riving outside investors an idea of laho's wonderful mineral wealth. We have rich resources but need more publicity to attract capital for their development. A properly adminis tered geological survey has the confidence of mining men and its opinion are accepted at face value Engineers sent to examine properties can do their work more quickly and report more confidently when they have the findings of a reputable scientific or anization as a basis.

"Mining men in the southern and outheastern parts of the state have oticed numerous indications of valuable coal, clay and cement deposits. The geological formation seems to be the same as in the nearby Wyoming coal districts. Some coal has already been discovered but I am sure that a survey would reveal other valuable deposits. There are undoubtedly within the borders of Idaho good co ment materials, excellent building and ornamental stone, 'clay for making brick, drain tile, sewer pipe and terr cotta, and slates for roofing purposes The discovery and use of these would serve the double purpose of providing cheaper materials for construction and of establishing new industries in the

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### ISHMAELS OF CEYLON.

The Redigas, a Curious Tribe of Sosial Outensts.

There is a curious tribe of people in Ceylon called the Rodigas, who live the life of social Ishmaels, despised and cast out by their fellows. Until quite recently they lived apart from the abodes of other men, in holes and eaves. In no case may they ile down to rest with other men. They may not enter a temple or a court of justice and on all occasions are compelled to "stand afar off." So low down in the scale of humanity are they placed that they may not even speak with strangers except through the intermediary of a man of the lowest casts above their own. Of late years their status has been improved, and they are less servile in consequence, but even now they fall on their knees with uplifted hands to address people of the lowest recognized caste, and upon the approach of a traveler they shout to warn him to stop until they can get off the road and he can pass without risk of defilement from the proximity of their persons. It is curious and yet so characteristic of society in all coun-tries and all levels that even among these people, who seem to have reached the very lowest rung of the human lad-der, there are classes and social distinctions. Thus the ambetteyos, or barbers, and the hanomoreyos, or betal box makers, are looked upon with contempt by the despised, ostracized Rodigas, who go to the length of shutting up their dogs lest they should stray into the houses of the lowborn or gnaw a bone that they may throw at them.-Dundee Advertiser.

### THE COCKET WRITERS.

What Happened When England Abelished Their Offices.

In the long room of the London cus tom house years ago were twelve offcers styled "cocket writers." They wrote certificates that goods had been duly entered and the duties paid. They were also known as patent officers because appointed for life by letters patent from the crown. Their salaries were nominal, £60 a year, but they were permitted to remunerate themselves by extorting fees from the merchants-fees which in some cases amounted to a thousand pounds a year. In 1851 the treasury determined to abolish patent offices and called upon the twelve cocket writers to furnish a statement of their emoluments. The officers, ignorant of the treasury's purpose, imagined that the government intended to impose an income tax. Ten of the writers, therefore, returned a statement which understated their fees by several hundred pounds. The other two furnished an honest statement. In a few days ten clerks were surprised and disgusted and two clerks were astonished, but pleased. The treasury notified the cocket writers that their offices would be abolished and that they would be compensated by pensions rated according to the returns they had themselves furnished. There were gnashing of teeth and broad smiles in the long room. One of the two honest cocket writers enjoyed his pension for fifty-two years, during which time the treasury paid him £52,000.

Where Dollars Originated. Joachimstahl, near Carlsbad, is historie as the birthplace of the original dollar. This was the silver guidengroschen, coined in 1519 by order of Count Schlick from the metal of a recently opened mine, and it became known as the joachimsthaler, or "thaler" alone for short. Before 1600 the nimble English language had al-ready made "dollar" of this. Therefore this name was loosely used of all manner of coins, varying in value from 75 cents to \$1.25 and belonging to all manner of countries, from Swe-den to Japan. It was from the prev-alence of the Spanish "dollar" in the British-American colonies at the time their revolt that the modern "almighty dollar" was derived, while in modern English very recent slang has given the name to the crown piece.






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What it Was.
