H. W. HULBERT EXPLAINS NEW FEDERAL PEA GRADES

Proposed changes in federal grades for peas were explained Friday in mist with the University of Idaho. He afford plenty competition. was accompanied to Genesee by L. V. Benjamin, county agricultural agent.

Mr. Hulbert said it was impossible to obtain a federal grade on thresherrun peas, but admonished growers of this locality to give more attention to threshing equipment to avoid dockage at warehouses and cleaning plants where peas are brought up to federal grades. As an example of differences in threshed peas delivered he compared the Genesee section with the have been able to deliver their product with a minimum of dockage, due to small peas, splits, foreign material, weevil, damage, other clasess and esee section, while producing good quality peas, suffers greatly by the loss from dockage, the percentage locally being 15.6 per cent compared to 7.0 per cent for the Fairfield section or 12.8 per cent, the average for the Inland Empire pea growing territory.

A further loss sustained by growers of peas is that due to crackage during seeding operations, and to eliminate this loss in force feed drills Mr. Hulbert advised the use of graphite, which may be applied to seed peas by the same equipment used to treat seed wheat with copper carbonate. This inert product was uniformily distributed in a thin layer over the entire seedcoat of the peas in experiments conducted by the University of Idaho experiment station. Graphited peas were slick and did not clog or bridge-up in the drill, thus drill injury was almost entirely eliminated. Moreover, graphite had no apparent effect upon germination. This fact is shown definitely by the comparative germination tests, and soil tests made in sand and actual field trials made later confirmed this fact. Graphited peas fed through the drill at a more uniform rate. In addition, the drill delivered nearly 30 per cent more graphited-treated than untreated seed at the same drill set. The use of this material, therefore, would necessitate the recalibration of the drill if the peas were to be seeded at the normal they drew pictures of them. rate for the variety. Trials are now in progress to develop a fungicide graphite base that would be practical for general usage.

Discussing briefly the pea contracts for 1935 Mr. Hulbert said that it was impossible to obtain a U.S. No. 1 or U. S. No. 2 grade, and urged a grade for thresher run peas.

A processor, to obtain the grade of U. S. No. 1 Extra must produce peas of good color with not more than 0.2 per cent of bleached and other classes; shriveled peas cannot show more than 1.0 per cent and cracked skins the same. The total damage accounted for in splits, weevil and foreign material and may be divided as follows, weevil 0.5 per cent, splits 0.2 per cent and a trace of foreign. Such peas would be the grade desirable for seed.

U. S. No. 1 grade requires peas of good color, not more than 1.0 per cent cent shriveled, 3.0 per cent cracked uary 7th, will enter upon his second bleached and other classes; 2.0 per skins, with a total other dockage of 2.0 per cent, divided 0.5 per cent weevil, 0.5 per cent splits and a trace of foreign material.

U. S. No. 2 peas may be slightly off color; 4.0 per cent shriveled; 5.0 per cent cracked skins, with a total other dockage of 3.0 per cent, divided 1.0 per cent weevil, 1.0 per cent splits and 0.2 foreign.

U. S. No. 3 peas are those of poor color, 6.0 per cent shriveled, 8.0 per Los Angeles, Calif., where they will cent cracked skins, 1.0 per cent weevil, 1.5 per cent splits and 0.5 per cent foreign material.

U. S. Sample grade are those peas not meeting requirements of above grades or which have no commercially objectionable odor or contain over 16 per cent moisture or are infected with live weevil or other insects or dead insects or other putrid matter or otherwise distinctive low quality.

ANALYSIS OF TOWNSEND OLD AGE PENSION PLAN

Insurance statistics show that only B per cent of all people born, upon reaching the age of 60, have achieved financial success to such a degree that they may live comfortably thereafter without depending upon further earnings. Eighty-five per cent of the reremaining 92 per cent are still employed or are endeavoring in some manner to carn all or a part of their livelihood and the remainder are dependent upon public or private charity for their keep. Those of the 85 per cent who are still earning are capable of producing only enough to partially pay for their living. A very small per centage actually earn sufexisiting under the name of National ficient for their total needs and but very few earn any surplus for their declining years.

The spending of \$200 per month is for a constructive purpose. 

To Our Customers:

Doubtless you have recently read in the newspapers the statement that the average residential use of electric energy throughout the United States is 611 kilowatt-hours per year and that an effort should be made to increase such use through reduction of rates. Without discussing the merits of the argument, we think you should be advised that such propoganda is without application in the states of Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

According to the 1932 U.S. Census such residential average in the New England States was 552 kilowatt-hours and in the Middle Atlantic States 542 ing the Pacific Northwest. In our section such annual residential average, according to the said census, was:

The national residential average use is 611 kilowatt-hours per year and the national average cost for such residential use is 5.5c per kilowatt-hour. It is a matter of common knowledge that such average cost in the Pacific Northwest is very much less than the national average. The companies and merchants in this territory for many years have been actively engaged in selling ranges, water heaters, and other load building appliances, and the companies have established rate schedules which will permit the liberal use of such appliances. For example: as a result of low rates and liberal use of electric appliances The Washington Water Power Company now receives an average sum of 2.3c per kilowatt-hour for all residential services.

The inference to be drawn from these figures is certainly most favorable to the privately owned and tax-paying electric light systems in this section of the country.

GOOD EGGS PAY PRODUCER.

Owners of egg producing poultry present prices to begin showing some profit on their investment and feed requirements. At 15 cents per dozen well-culled and well-managed flocks justify their keep if the owner is optimistic and he does not require extra help to tend the poultry. Careful feeding, using the proper feeds and good housing are also necessities if chickens are to be kept for profit, according to Wm. Schlueter, who makes a practice of keeping books on his flock of over 300 laying hens. The first requisite, however in producing eggs for market is to obtain the best stock and to cull carefully. Poultry raising, like every other industry allied to agriculture demands manageuseless birds may be disposed of.

"Mr. Blank, at Northampton, has a friend who received a government check for \$1,000 this year for not raising hogs. So Blank now proposes to get a farm and go into the business of not raising hogs; says in fact, not raising hogs appeals to him very strongly.

REPRESENTATIVE FRED HOVE LEAVING FOR BOISE SUNDAY

Official notification had not been received by State Representative Fred Hove Wednesday noon, but after consulting with other representatives and the state senator from Latah county, it is planned that Mr. Hove will leave Sunday for Boise. Members of the house and senate are asked to be at the state house Monday noon for a special session of the legislature. The governor has issued the call for the extraordinary session to enact laws that will permit use of federal funds in cities of 2,500 population and over.

The five-point program for the session ,outlined by the governor includes defining of state highways, legislation enlarging and defining the powers and jurisdiction of the department of public works, repeal of portions of section 39-2109 of Idaho codes relating to proportion of funds that a county, highway or good roads district shall contribute in improvement and construction projects, validating of all completed construction and improvement contracts, and legislation to enable the state to participate fully in funds allocated by congressional action. The governor also asks legislation defining and regulating caravaning of motor vehicles.

At the time the Idaho law was 2500 population, it was intended that the larger cities could not take more than its just share and thus leave the outlying smaller towns and country highways without it share of money for road improvements and construction.

A new condition has arisen, due to allocation of immense sums of money by the federal government for highlarge cities will rob other towns and cities, also country roads of their share of benefits. Idaho stands to gain by the allocation of federal money, and large cities will be enabled to make improvements with federal and state aid which is not available

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

About 3,000,000 acres are infected in eastern Lapwai, Sweetwater, Culdesac, Reu-Saskatchewan and about 1,500,000 acres in Manitoba. In addition to rust them started at the earliest possible damage, extremely high temperatures and hot winds with continued drouth in southern Alberta and western Saskatchewan have caused further losses. The Canadian crop is ten days to two weeks later than normal while rust infestation is two weeks earlier than is usual. These conditions have favored the development of rust and damage in Manitoba is the most severe since 1916. Because of the lateness of the crop in Saskatchewan, more serious infection is feared in that province before crops mature. Areas affected by drouth have been enlarged and now include southern have failed to sell any large amount | and east central Alberta, southwestern, west central and parts of northern Saskatchewan. In some districts losses as high as 50 per cent are shown from drouth, according to the Free Press.

Some deterioration has occurred in Europe in the countries of the Lower Danube and in the United Kingdom, Belgium, Spain and France, where extreme heat has forced maturity and caused some shriveling of grain. Conditions have been about maintained in Germany, Poland and Italy and harvests are expected to be above those of 1934. Large outturns are still in prospect in Russia. > We have several biennials, but none are so serious. Included in these are curled dock, with its brown triangular seed and burdock, so well known because the burs mat in the fleeces and tails of our farm livestock.

The problem of control of either annuals or biennials lies first in not sowing crop seeds containing weed seed. Idaho farmers annually have many cars of weed seed to market. If any attachment, garnishment, or other legal process is started against adjustment payments, the payments are to be held up until the producer s free to receive them.

Violations If a producer violates the contract the contract may be terminated and the producer held responsible for the repayment of his adjustment pay ments for the previous year.







"It was when we boarded the little train to go from the French port of Djibouti to Addis Ababa, the capital of Ethiopia, 500 miles away, that we really felt the desert for the first that two engines are required. Ims journey vividly shows what a natural fortress Ethiopia is. Most of it consists of a great lofty plateau, surrounded by high mountains and sitring behind a girdle of sands.
