



Severe visual tasks of home, office, school and factory are done under a few foot-candles. (A foot-candle is the maximum illumination about one foot from an ordinary candle.) At the window sill in the daytime, there may be 100 foot-candles or more. Outdoors in the shade, the illumination may be 1,000 foot-candles on the lawn and in the sun it may be 5,000 or 10,000

Still human beings have been content with a few foot-candles indoors, because a science of seeing was needed to reveal the effects of various types and amounts of light upon the human being. Scienlists through research are developing a true science of seeing.

Researches prove that reading ecomes easier as the illumination is increased to about 500 foot-can-dles. The best available level of illumination for sewing with dark thread on dark goods is full sun-light. Old eyes and defective eyes in the home need much more light if they are to accomplish visual tasks with comfort.

What can you do about the light-ing in your home? In all places where the children do critical seeing use portable 100-200-300 Watt lamps which emit some light to the ceiling and provide diffused light directly upon the task. The children should be taught to read and do other critical seeing at these places and cautioned on proper position and on having their eyes too close to their work. Nancy, a peristent reader, should be encourged to interrupt reading with play relax her eyes. YEARS OF DROUGHT COMING TO GREAT BASIN IS WARNING

"Years of drought, like the seven lean years of Joseph's Egypt, are due to grip the Great Basin area of the West," Dr. Ernest Antevs of the Carnegie Institution of Washington pro-American Geographical Society, according to a Science News Letter of February 12, 1938.

Dr. Antevs has made a special study of climatic cycles that swing over long periods of time. He finds that the downcurve in far western rainfall has already begun, and states that it is due to reach its climax in a terrific drought about ten years

The region for which Dr. Antevs makes his forecast lies between the Wasatch mountains and the Sierras, comprising a total of about 175,000 square miles in the states of California. and had not applied gypsum or practiced approved weed control, the penalty or deduction would be computed by multiplying the excess soil-depleting acres (10) by the average vield (30), multiplied again by 8, then by 12 cents per bushel. This penalty would amount to \$288.00 irrespective of the deficient soil-building units, or 20 in number. There is also a penalty for deficient units or 20 multiplied by \$1.50, which equals \$30.00.

Quotas May Be Designated Should the secretary of agriculture decide to apply a quota on wheat marketings, this quota will be based on the allotted acres for the respective year multiplied by the normal yield established for a farm. Such quota may not be applied unless the estimated wheat production between May 1 and July 1 exceeds 910 to 915 millions bushels, together with the million bushels, including the estimat-

For instance, if a farmer produces 3,300 bushels of wheat, and a quota s established that permits him to dispose of but 3,000 bushels, he will be permitted to turn over the 300 bushels as payment for crop insurance, or he may use it on which to obtain loans, provided the price of wheat drops to 52 per cent of parity, when loans automatically become available. Those who cooperate in the 1938 program will be privileged to borrow 50 to 75 per cent on all wheat produced, while the non-cooperator may borrow 60 per cent but only on wheat in excess of his determined allotted production.



A hot, sultry day! A hot, sweaty, dusty, tired team of horses pulling an old-fashioned rod "slicker"! A hot, sweaty boy plodding in the dust behind the crude "slicker" which clogged, filled with weeds and trash, forcing the team to stop!

The boy was not large and he was very tired. Before cleaning the simple weeder he looked away from the hill on which he was working to see in the distance numerous other tired and sweaty teams and men operating their home-made tillage machines. He reflected on his work somewhat bitterly. Later they sold the 80 acres, and with a decided influx of settlers land was becoming scarce, so they purchased a larger place six miles southeast of Genesee where Mr. and Mrs. Lew Jain now live and ranch. In the year 1910 the family decided to move to Genesee, and for 28 years Mr. and Mrs. Walter Jain have lived in their present home. #### Work Sheet Explained

Prelimanary work sheets were givsix years was given as 38, 40, 35, 20, 35 and 38 bushels, or a total of 206 bushels total for the base period. The average yield for the base period, 1930-1935 was 34.8 bushels, and for example 75 per cent of the average yield was 25.7 bushels. The adjustment factor, 5.3 bushels per acre, and which is to be deducted from the average yield, met with objection. The adjusment factor, which may be plus or minus, but in the case of Latah county is minus, is arrived at by the difference between the estimate of the Bureau of Crop Estimates, and the actual average county yield.

In the example explained, there was but one year when the yield per seeded acre was less than the average for the base period, 1930-1935. The premium in Latah county is .3 bushels of wheat per acre for 50 per cent coverage, and .5 bushels of wheat per acre for 75 per cent coverage. With the premiums set at .3 and .5 bushels per acre, such may be paid in wheat or its equivalent in cash, and should a loss be reported, payment will be made in a like grade and quantity of wheat, or its equivalent in cash, based on the amount of loss. The amount of cash which might be received would be determined by the price of wheat on the day of settlement.

a recently developed small-size high-speed "all-crop" combine to determine its adaptability to the direct combining of peas under Idaho conditions. The machine has a 5-foot cutter-bar and cylinder of the same width, making it narrow enough to handle easily in small fields, and is capable under favorable conditions of traveling at field speeds of from 4 to 5 miles per hour. In tests made by the Department of Agricultural Engineering, 66 acres of wheat and 33 acres of field peas were combined with satisfactory operation on slopes up to 15 per cent. and with only slight loss of grain on slopes up to 30 per cent. Peas yielding 23.3 bushels per acre were harvested at the rate of one acre per hour. In wheat yielding 31.2 bushels per acre, 1.3 acres per hour were combined. Owing to the narrow 5-foot width of cut, peas were picked up cleaner than is possible with the wider cutterbars on the larger machines. The tests revealed that with the new machine threshing injury bears a direct relation to the cylinder speed. At 475 r.p.m. the crackage in peas was 1.09 per cent, at 575 r.p.m. it was 1.56 per cent, and at 650 r.p.m. at was 3.6 per cent. Operation costs, including combine and tractor, fuel, lubricants, labor, and repairs, gave a total of \$1.36 per acre for peas, and \$1.09 per acre for wheat, as compared to \$1.61 per acre for wheat and \$2.33 per acre for peas for the larger combine operating under similar conditions. The possible saving in operating cost for the small machine over the conventional 12-foot size is \$0.52 per acre in wheat and \$0.97 per acre in peas. With this new development it is possible for the operator of the smaller grain farm to lower harvesting costs to the level of the costs of the

large scale farming operations.

During the 1935 harvest season a field trial was made of recently developed small-size high-speed "all-crop" combine

to determine its adaptability to the direct combining of peas under Idaho conditions. The machine has a 5-foot cutter-bar

and cylinder of the same width, making it narrow enough to

handle easily in small fields, and is capable under favorable

conditions of traveling at field speeds of from 4 to 5 miles per hour. In tests made by the Department of Agricultural

Engineering, 66 acres of wheat and 33 acres of field peas were

**Unofficial Primary Election Returns - Latah County** 

The name "Clark" found a prominent place in election news of Idaho's primary Tuesday. D. Worth Clark. congressman from the second Laho district won the nomination from Senator James P. Pope, in the race for the democratic nomination for United States senator, and Barzilla Clark, in cumbent governor of the state, lost the nomination of C. Ben Ross, three times governor of Idaho. The race between Clark and Pope and the race between Ross and Clark, were the outstanding contests on the state ticket, although the race between J. W. Taylor, Ralph Litton and Leo Bresnahan, for the nomination as democratic candidate as attorney general was close-

Returns for all Idaho precincts were incomplete Thursday but there is an insufficient number of votes remaining to change the standings. Clark polled 41,590 votes to 38,122 for Pope, a difference of 3.368 votes. Ross' margin of victory was 26,671 to 25,339 for Barzilla Clark. Gessett received 19, 212 votes for third place in the gubernatorial race and W. P. Whitaker, was fourth with 11,192. G. P. Mix will be Ross' running mate as lieutenant governor. He received 34,610 votes in the incomplete returns, or as many as his two opponents, Cosho and Coe.

While not as spirited, the republicans nominated Donald Callahan for United States senator, and C. A. Bottolfson, candidate for governor, with Donald Whitehead winner over Chris Hagan for lieutenant governor. Local Vote Light

Genesee precinct polled but 208 primary votes Tuesday, from a registration list of over 650. Voting in Latah county was heavier than two years ago by a thousand.

Handling the election at Genesee were: Wm. Smolt, Robert Emmett, Mrs. Helen Bershaw, Joe Hasfurther, E. E. Stout and John Eikum as the judges; George Grieser, Miss Maggie Bottjer, Mrs. T. H. Herman and Mrs. Dick Vandenburg, clerks, and Ed Vanouck, constable.

Of the 208 ballots used eight were rejected by the judges in tabulation. Voters in each instance failed to remain within the designated party column. The local election board completed tabulation within 35 minutes after closing of the polls and at 8:45 Genesee precinct was reported in Moscow, the first to be received from the 24 Latah county precincts. The tabulation of votes for all La-

tah county precincts is shown on the first page. They are final but unofficial and are reprinted from the Moscow News-Review.

## SCHOOL CONTRACTS FOR ALL WORK GO TO MOSCOW FIRMS

John Thomas, Moscow, was the successful bidder on the school building were married Saturday at the Luthproject which was started Wednesday. The bid of Mr. Thomas for general construction was \$54,275. This amount however, is in excess of the money which may be expended for general construction, and like the other five contractors, he was permitted to make deductions on three alternate plans for the new building, which in the total amount to \$8805, or \$45,470. There is available for complete building replumbing and electrical work, the sum of approximately \$52,500.

Add to the sum of the alternate bid or \$45,470, the bids on heating, \$3,680; \$1012 for plumbing, and \$1070 for electrical wiring, the total is \$51,232. This amount will be sufficient to complete a proposed building minus the west wing which was to house a domestic science hall, girls' and boys' showers and dressing rooms on the ground floor, and a library and extra room for assembly on the upper floor.

The other bids on general construction were as follows with deductions on the alternate plans: Joe Berry, Clarkston, \$61,446, less \$150, \$600 and \$11,872; Colonial Building Co., \$58,-079, less \$580, \$200 and \$8,000; Hazen & Clark, Spokane, \$63,995, less \$300, \$250 and \$7,100; Gus Larkin, Lewiston, \$61,421, less \$400, \$500 and \$10,575; J. J. Lohrenz, Spokane, \$62,-742, plus \$865, and less \$565 and \$6,930.

H. D. Powell, Moscow was low on the heating contract with \$5,675 less \$1,995, exercising the alternate bids when it was necessary to accept the alternate bids on general. Other bidders were: Lewiston Plumbing and Heating Co., \$6,010, less \$1,880; S. T. Miller, \$6,500, less \$1,657; Ogden Plumbing and Heating Co., \$6,122, less \$1,560; Twin City Plumbing and Heating Co., \$5,532, less \$1,601.30; Zahnisee & Warren, \$6,818, less

Domestic grain markets continued seasonally dull during the week, although light offerings and prospect of a relatively small crop of winter wheat next season tended make the wheat market firm.

BONNEVILLE TOWERS BRAVE STORMS OF COLUMBIA GORGE

er than any other structure along the Columbia River, soon will stand as majestic sentinels at Bonneville Dam. To meet the challenge of raging waters and winds, two river-crossing towers 321 feet high will be erected to support the cables that will carry electricity from the Bonneville power plant westward to Oregon and Washington communities.

Secretary of Interior Ickes has been informed by Administrator J. D. Ross that practically all of the electricity generated at the Bonneville plant within the next few years will pass over these wires. Revenues from the sale of electricity will repay to the federal government within 40 years the entire cost of the power facilities, together with 31/2 per cent interest. A network of transmission lines to market Columbia river power now is being built with an allotment from the Public Works Administration.

The two lofty towers each will bear the weight of transmission cables and ice totaling more than 100,000 pounds. Rigid tests will be required, for the steel-latticed structures must withstand the 60-mile-an-hour gales that race down the canyon. Sleet storms may swell the inchthick cable to the diameter of a man's arm, as the Columbia Gorge is known to electrical engineers as one of the heaviest "ice-

loading" zones in America.

Although dwarfed by the sheer Pullman cliffs of the Cascades that loom above Moscow. the dam, the Bonneville transmission towers will be the highest man-made structure in the area. They will be more than half the height of historic Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Gildersleeve more than half the height of historic Beacon Rock, a few miles downstream, of Washtucha, Wash., spent the day which is the largest monolith in with the latter's parents, Mr. and Mrs. America.
