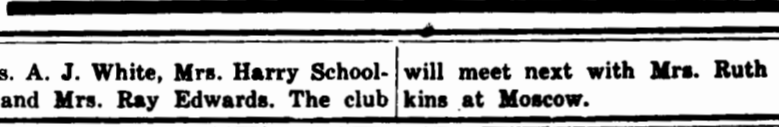

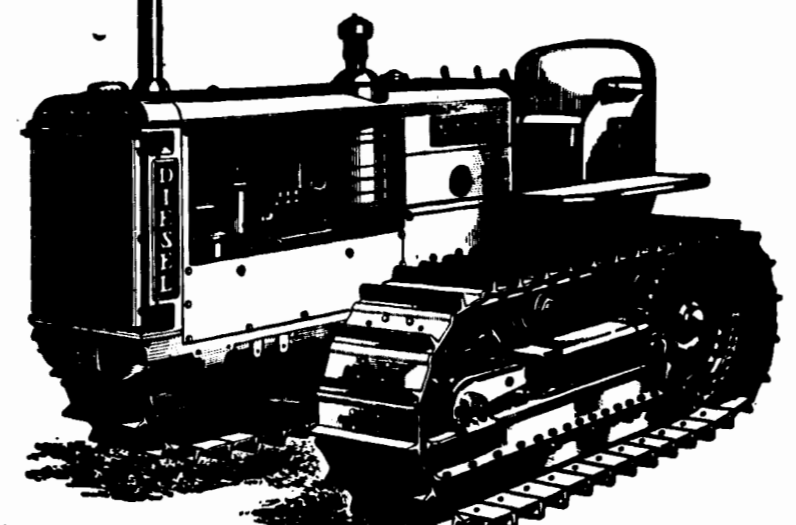

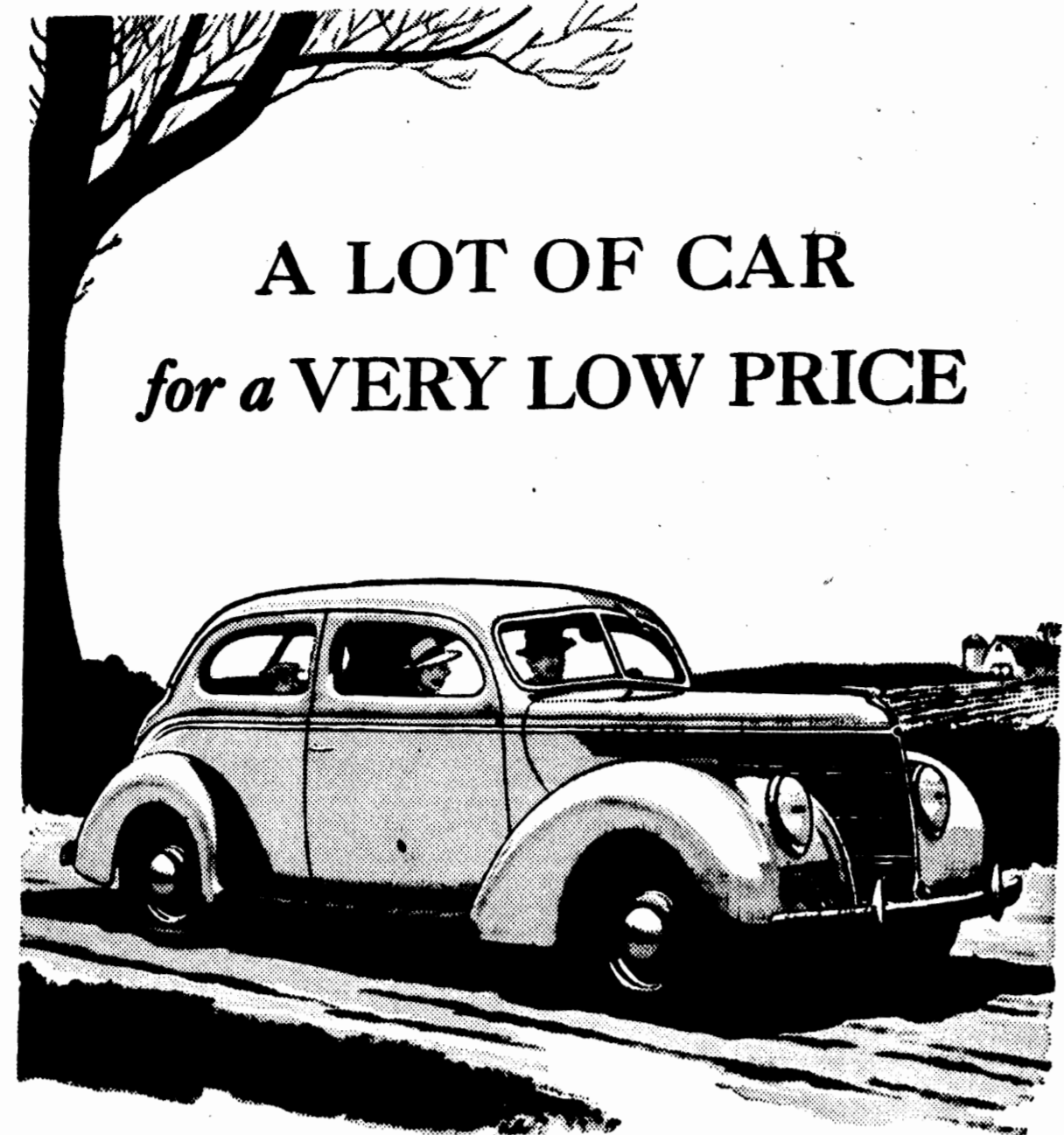

WHEAT ACREAGE ALLOTMENT FEATURE OF 1938 FARM PLAN Two hundred or more farmers of the Rimrock and Geneese communities met at the gymnasium in Geneese Friday of last week to hear G. T. McAlexander and Joe Thometz, county agents of Latah and Nez Perce counties, respectively, present their explanations of the 1938 farm program.

Brought out in the meeting was that each farm will have a total soil-depleting acreage allotment in order to comply fully with the provisions of the program. This allotment will include the usual amount of general crops grown on the farm and a wheat acreage allotment.

Besides acreage allotments, farmers will have soil-building goals for their farms. These goals represent the amount of soil-building practices that each farmer cooperating should put into effect to comply 100 per cent. Acreage allotments and soil-building goals will be made to farmers by county AAA committees.

Payments for Compliance If farmers keep their seedling within their acreage allotments and carry out the amount of soil-building practices established in their goals, they will receive full payment authorized in the program.

CONSERVATION PLAN BASIS OF NEW 1938 FARM PROGRAM The new AAA Farm Act, the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, continues and strengthens provisions of the Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act under which the AAA has been operating since the spring of 1936, according to County Agent G. T. McAlexander.

Under the new program, cooperating farmers may earn payments as they earned them under the 1936 and 1937 Conservation Programs. They will be paid for seeding their soil-depleting cash crops within the acreage allotments for their farms established on the basis of determinations made by county conservation committees, and carrying out a prescribed number of units of soil-building practices, such as seeding of grasses and legumes.

Strengthening and broadening the programs of the last two years, the new Act provides for the establishment of marketing quotas, when necessary, as an additional means of stabilizing market supplies of cotton, tobacco, rice, wheat and corn. Marketing quotas will not be effective if disapproved by more than one-third of the farmers voting in a referendum.

PEACH COBBLER
1 Can halved peaches
1/2 Cup brown sugar
2 Tablespoons butter
Juice of 1 lemon

Rich baking powder biscuit dough with 1 tablespoon of sugar added to the recipe. Place the peaches and juice in a buttered casserole. Add sugar, dots of butter and lemon juice. Cover with dough rolled 1 inch thick and large enough to cover peaches. Bake uncovered.

Place the ham to the back of the lower oven rack of the electric range. The squash either in shallow baking pan or directly on the oven racks and to the front. Place the second rack in glides so that it just clears the food below. Place the potatoes and corn to the back and the pudding in front.

Place all the food in a cold oven. Set temperature to 375 degrees and bake 1 1/2 hours.

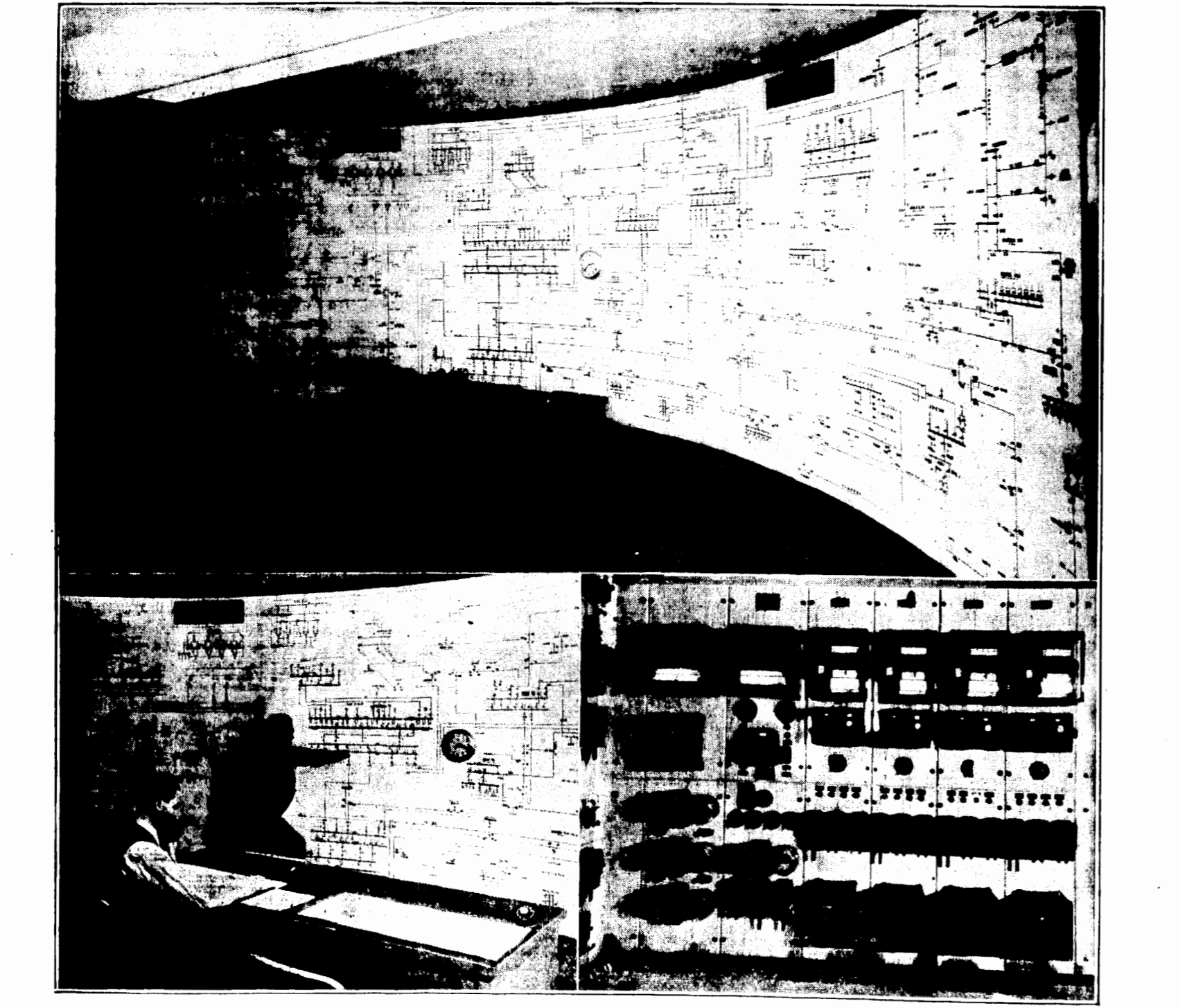

A complete picture of the Washington Water Power company's electric system is provided the system operator at Long Lake. The panel shown at the top. The plan is a miniature, enabling the system operator to provide an immediate service for maintenance of power over the network of lines between the cascades and Rocky mountains. At the lower left Engineer M. L. Blair is to be seen at the power board, while Ray L. Wetherell, system operator, is handling the telephone on an incoming call. In the photograph at the lower right is to be seen the automatic operator at Long Lake. The panel has been designed to increase accuracy in frequency control over the company system, which results in a higher efficiency of operation of synchronous motors and electric clocks. In other words, this panel holds the instruments which maintain the accuracy of electric time pieces throughout the Pacific northwest.

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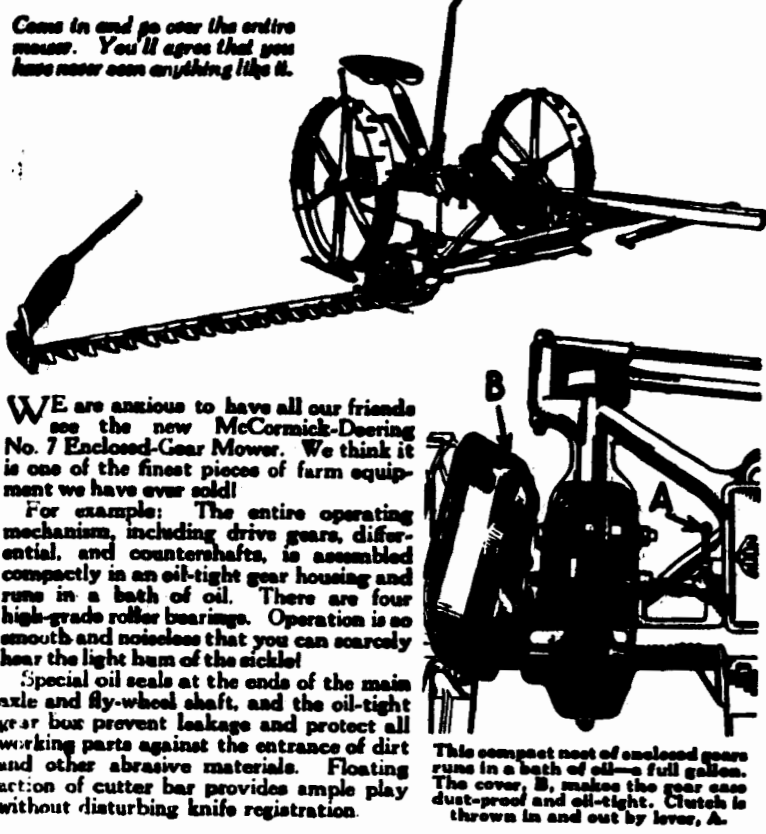

New A-C All-Crop Harvester

Read the following:

During the 1935 harvest season a field trial was made of a recently developed small-size high-speed "all-crop" combine to determine its adaptability to the direct combining of peas under Idaho conditions. The machine has a 5-foot cutter-bar and cylinder of the same width, making it narrow enough to handle easily in small fields, and is capable under favorable conditions of traveling at field speeds of from 4 to 5 miles per hour. In tests made by the Department of Agricultural Engineering, 66 acres of wheat and 33 acres of field peas were combined with satisfactory operation on slopes up to 15 per cent, and with only slight loss of grain on slopes up to 30 per cent. Peas yielding 23.3 bushels per acre were harvested at the rate of one acre per hour. In wheat yielding 31.2 bushels per acre, 5-foot width of cut, peas were picked up cleaner than is possible with the wider cutters on the larger machines. The tests revealed that with the new machine threshing injury bears a direct relation to the cylinder speed. At 475 r.p.m. the crackage in peas was 1.09 per cent, at 575 r.p.m. it was 1.56 per cent, and at 650 r.p.m. at was 3.6 per cent. Operation ceases, including combine and tractor, fuel, lubricants, labor, and repairs, gave a total of \$1.36 per acre for peas, and \$1.09 per acre for wheat, as compared to \$1.61 per acre for wheat and \$2.33 per acre for peas for the larger combine operating under similar conditions. The possible saving in operating cost for the small machine over the conventional 12-foot size is \$0.52 per acre in wheat and \$0.97 per acre in peas. With this new development it is possible for the operator of the smaller grain farm to lower harvesting costs to the level of the costs of the large scale farming operations.

ITALY SHORT ON WHEAT BUT WILL RESORT TO SUBSTITUTES

The gravity of the wheat shortage with which Italy is faced as the result of a poor harvest, takes on increased importance for the nation in the light of Premier Mussolini's speech at Aprilia, Italy, in which he indicated that no purchases of wheat would be made from foreign countries, according to a foreign correspondent of the Christian Science Monitor.

The harvest this year, according to government figures, will be reduced by the dry weather to about 70,000,000 quintals (approximately 35,000,000 bushels.) This is 10,000,000 quintals short of Italy's domestic requirements, which ordinarily are about 80,000,000 quintals annually.

Part of the year's wheat deficiency will be met by using maize and other flours for bread and by other economies; already the ratio of adulteration of flour has been raised from 10 to 20 per cent, and some 700,000 tons of wheat will be saved by this process.

T. DRISCOLL AN EXEMPLARY CITIZEN CALLED TO REWARD

Friday morning, Mr. T. Driscoll was stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage, and in spite of all the best medical and nursing skill, died Tuesday, July 19, at 7:00 a. m. His death deprives Genesee of probably her most patriotic and exemplary citizen, since Mr. Driscoll was unusually attached to his home town, and had the well-being and happiness of its citizens much at heart. Of industrious habit and unusually competent, he was successful in a variety of enterprises before coming to Genesee to enter the hardware business with the late Fred K. Bressler with whom he was associated in the Genesee Exchange Bank.

He conducted a grain warehouse business for many years. After selling out his hardware store to Joe N. Hasfurther, who had been long and closely associated with him, he engaged in farming. He entered, about 25 years ago, into a partnership with Fred B. Hampton, a congenial association which he treasured and enjoyed to his last day.

He spent his winters in Los Angeles for many years but the charm of California never won him from his fondness for his chosen home-town. After the shock of the sudden death of his beloved wife, Caroline, fifteen months ago, his health steadily failed. His interest in the old friends, his love for children, and his animal-pets; flowers; absorption in politics and current news; the efforts of his devoted family, and the assistance which he never failed to receive, did not avail to keep him on earth. He died a peaceful death, surrounded by all the consolations of religion and home. His race was run, and he faced the finish of the course with a gentle acceptance of the will of God which was inspiring to all those around him. His outstanding attributes were generosity, (he often waived his rights when there was need), charity, punctuality, modesty, devotion to Church and family, patriotism. He will be missed by many, and deeply mourned by his daughters, Edna and Dorothy, to whom he was an unusually wise and tender father, and by his sister-in-law, Mrs. Saider Gibson.

The Knights of Columbus of which society he was a charter member, will conduct the Rosary service Thursday evening at the family home.

The funeral will be at 9:00 a. m. Friday, the Rev. Father J. A. Jantges singing the solemn Requiem Mass at St. Mary's Catholic church. Music will be by the choir with special solos by Elvon Hampton.

Those who voted at the last general election will not be required to register for the August 9 election, providing they have not changed their residence from one precinct to another. Those who become of voting age are required to register also.

WHEAT MARKET SUMMARY FOR WEEK ENDING JULY 15

Domestic grain markets were somewhat unsettled during the week ending July 15, according to the Weekly Grain Market Review of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics. Wheat and rye markets tended downward with continued liberal marketing and the prospective seasonal supplies which are above last year and only partially offset by the steady absorption into domestic trade and additional export sales. Foreign markets were somewhat unsettled but were relatively firmer than North American markets, influenced by deterioration of crops in local areas of Europe and in the spring wheat areas of Russia.

Wheat markets were irregular but prices closed with only slight net changes from a week ago. Reports of the extension of rust infection in the North American spring wheat areas and high temperatures in parts of Europe and in Russian spring wheat areas, were strengthening market influences. The larger proportion of rust-resistant varieties of spring wheat in the United States and Canada, however, has reduced rust losses although some local damage has occurred.

World wheat supplies for the 1938-39 season seem likely to be around 435 million bushels larger than a year ago and possibly the largest since 1933-34. The world crop outside of Russia and China is forecast at approximately 4,150,000,000 bushels or about 335 million bushels above last year. The Northern Hemisphere harvest seems likely to show an increase of about 300 million bushels with increases indicated in all important producing areas except North Africa. Favorable seeding conditions and preliminary reports of increased acreage in the southern hemisphere countries may result in a gain of from 25 to 50 million bushels over the 1937 harvest. In addition to the gain in crop outputs, preliminary data of stocks of old wheat July 1 indicate an increase of some 100 million bushels in the world wheat carryover into the new crop.

The United States wheat crop is placed at 967 million bushels and preliminary estimates of carryover stocks of old wheat of around 180 million bushels, gives a total supply of some 464 million bushels over the average domestic appearance of 683 million bushels. Increased outputs are indicated for all principal market classes except white wheat, with hard red winter wheat production placed at 411,875,000 bushels, soft red winter 242,151,000 bushels, hard red spring 176,338,000 bushels, durum 85,031,000 bushels, and white wheat 102,009,000 bushels.

Continued heavy marketings of new winter wheat featured domestic wheat markets. Receipts at the principal southwestern markets were only a trifle below the record movement of 23,208 cars a week ago, and totaled 20,596 cars, compared with 21,105 for the corresponding week last year.

The wheat loan program offering cooperative wheat producers loans at farm rates averaging between 60c and 65c per bushel was officially announced by the secretary of agriculture during the week. The loan is made under provisions of the AAA of 1938 and is approximately 52 per cent of the present farm parity price of \$1.14 per bushel.

Ainslee Twin Saves Man's Life

Pauline Ainslee, well known in Latah county as one of the Ainslee twins, daughter of Emerson Ainslee of near Moscow, was responsible for saving the life of George Gravel, who was taken from the waters of Pelton's pond near Troy last week. Gravel, who may have suffered cramps or shock was brought to the shore unconscious by the 14-year-old girl. After 15 minutes of resuscitation effort, the man regained consciousness.

OWI CREEK MINES REOPEN

"We find that after all, we are going to have a reasonable supply of OwI Creek coal, not only for this year but for several years to come." The foregoing announcement was received here a few days ago by Florent Moser, manager of the Farmers Union Producers company, and relieves him of the anxiety of turning down customers who have been accustomed for years to the use of OwI Creek coal. A previous announcement said the mines had closed down.

Geneese won the north Idaho Junior title, with its only opponent being Craigmont and Grangeville. Parma is the winner of the southwestern Idaho title, and teams from both places meet in a series of three games to decide the western championship.

The first game will be played at Wilder, Idaho, Monday afternoon at 5:30 between Geneese and Parma, the latter team being composed of boys from the Parma, Wilder and Roswell communities.

While the Geneese and Parma clubs are determining supremacy, a team from the southern portion of the state will meet a winner from the south-eastern portion. Winners of the two semi-finals will then meet for the state championship.

Accompanying the boys on the trip will be Supt. Kenneth Dean, coach, who is taking David Kuehl's place, the latter being unable to make the trip. Harold Haymond will accompany the club as a business manager.

If the boys are to be quartered at Parma, they will receive \$100 for expenses and if they are to be housed in Caldwell the club will receive \$150, according to word received here by Mr. Kuehl. The plan is for each boy to take his lunch for the first day of the trip, and each morning the boys will pay for their own meals at the hotel.

Geneese's club has played in two previous semi-finals, going to Parma in 1936 where they took an easy 12-6 victory in the initial game, but lost 9-4 and 10-2 in the second and third games. TENTATIVE WHEAT LOANS WILL BE 48 CENTS, GENESEE

With the wheat loan announced at 67 cents for No. 1 wheat at Portland or Seattle, the grain rate at Genesee is reasonably assured that the local loan rate will be 48 cents per bushel, allowing for the deduction of 15 cents freight and 4 cents for handling charges. There are deductions for lower grades of wheat, two cents for No. 2 grain and five cents on No. 3 wheat. For hard white a premium of one cent a bushel is announced.

Wednesday, Frank Hoorman, manager of the Macklison Warehouse company said application had been made to store grain at the Union facilities, and Clyde Manning, manager for the Macklison Warehouse company said his company operating under the Lawrence Warehouse company had been approved as a government storage warehouse for wheat on which loans may be made. Wheat, it is understood, may also be stored on farms with the loan cost expected to be \$3.00 compared to \$1.50 for warehouse-stored wheat. Wheat in storage in farms will be allowed 2 cents a bushel until May 31 if meeting approval and such wheat will constitute a chattel mortgage for the loan. Loans on warehouse wheat will be secured by warehouse receipts. In either the two storage proposals wheat must in storage 30 days prior to eligibility for a loan.

The interest rate on loans will be 4 per cent and area banks are expected to furnish the money with 2 1/2 per cent of the interest payable to the farmer and the balance to the bank. Intermediate credit banks, it has been explained, Loans are to be made without recourse, and if on May 31 the price of wheat is below the loan value, the wheat will become property of the government. But if at time before that date, wheat goes above the loan value and the farmer desires to sell he may pay the loan principal and interest.

Farmers eligible for wheat loans under the Federal set-up are those who have complied with the 1938 soil conservation program.

HEAT IS BREAKING RECORDS

Beginning Thursday of last week thermometers in Genesee have not failed daily to record 90 degrees or above. While there are no official temperature readings, Thursday of last week was the warmest day, and was followed closely by Wednesday of this week, when readings of 96 and 94, respectively, were reported.

Fall grain crops have matured very fast under the warm sun and spring fields are beginning to turn to moist soils, with some damage on thinner soils feared. There have been no hot winds to sap the moisture and in most places the ground is well covered by growing crops.

Haying is well along with a long dry period, and combines are now operating in a few places on the rimrock.

DAKOTA CROPS DAMAGED

Henry Martinson returned Tuesday from a motor trip to northern South Dakota, visiting relatives near Mobridge for two weeks. Crop conditions are most pitiful, Mr. Martinson said, with no relief from the many years of drought, grasshoppers and heat. This year, the north central portion of South Dakota saw the best prospects in years, with rainfall sufficient, but within the past few weeks there has been a change in the weather, and leaves farmers with no income for another year.

Much of the topsoil has been lost through wind erosion, and the theory that lands of the northern portion of the state should never have been touched by a plow, is somewhat substantiated when it is noticed that lands that were permitted to remain in natural grasses, have also suffered from erosion, with wide stretches of buffalo-grass-covered lands barren under the heat of an unmerciful sun.

Nature has not favored South Dakota. With water standing in ditches along highways Mormon crickets for a time were thought to be frogs as they jumped about the road. A closer examination, however, showed the pests to be large black crickets that measure over two inches in length. Grasshoppers, too are bad, but on the return trip through Montana, Mr. Martinson saw no traces of the insects on wheat fields as mentioned in the press. His route perhaps did not lead him through the heavily infested areas, he assumed.

GRAND COULEE TRESTLE TO BE UNDERTAKEN THIS YEAR

The building of Grand Coulee's highest and largest trestle is underway, it self a construction project of immense proportions, but dwarfed by the great undertaking as a whole—just another step in the new cycle of gigantic undertakings that are going into the raising of the world's greatest dam.

The trestle is being built out from the east and west banks simultaneously, and will be joined over the river about the first of October. It will tower from 170 to 245 feet above the concrete, will have 34 towers, and will stretch out 3600 feet in length. It will contain about 9,000 tons of structural steel, which is about 200 tons more than in the MWAK's high trestle.

The United States Bureau of Reclamation, meanwhile has called for bids for the construction and installation of the three of the world's largest generators. These three will be part of a group of fifteen that will serve the two powerhouses at the dam. The bids will be opened in Denver, the bureau's office there, on August 18.

It is reported that each of the machines will be about 40 feet in diameter and 36 feet high above the floor level. The three could produce one and a third billion kilowatt hours per year. The specifications require that the first of the machines must be completed and installed in 1050 days.

Latah county beer vendors, prohibited from selling the beverage on Sunday by an act of the county commissioners, were favored in an opinion of the state supreme court which reversed the decision of District Judge Johnson of Nez Perce county who decided in favor of the commissioners.

Wheat Market Summary for Week Ending July 29

Domestic bread grain markets continued their downward trend during the week ended July 29. Prices reflected the steady accumulation of wheat stocks and increased hedging sales against the new crop movement. Weakness in world wheat markets may be attributed principally to the prospective large supplies as harvesting of winter wheat neared completion in the northern hemisphere countries and spring wheat harvests advanced northward. The most significant crop developments during the week were reports of the spread of rust infection in the Canadian Prairie Provinces with serious grasshopper damage in local areas, and hot, dry weather causing deterioration in Russian spring wheat. Recent official and trade reports have indicated that rust is present throughout most of Saskatchewan, where a large percentage of the acreage comprises susceptible varieties of spring bread wheats.

Harvest Becoming General in Genesee Wheat Section

Wheat growers are progressing rapidly with harvesting operations in the Genesee area, with yields of fall wheat well up to average or above but it is expected that the spring wheat yield has been cut by the extremely hot weather of the past two weeks when temperatures daily were up to 90 degrees and above each day with the high reaching 98 above. With the decreased yield expected in spring wheat, the acreage in the Genesee area will be about average.

Section 2. That the said Northern Pacific Railway Company is further authorized and privileged to locate, construct, maintain and operate an additional spur track or siding across Beech Street and Birch Street south of said existing spur track, between Lot 7, Block 19, and Lot 12, Block 20, West Addition to Genesee, Idaho, on Birch Street, and parallel to said existing spur track or siding.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall remain in force so long as the aforesaid spurs or siding shall be maintained and operated by the said Northern Pacific Railway Company, its successors or assigns.

Section 4. Ordinance No. 73 is hereby amended to conform to this Ordinance and such parts of Ordinance No. 73 as conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 5. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

GENESEE PRECINCT REMAINS IN THE DEMOCRATIC COLUMN

Voters of Genesee precinct gave democratic candidates their support Tuesday with few exceptions. The exceptions were Arthur Snow for state representative; Moody for sheriff; Peterson for probate judge; Short for coroner; Taylor for assessor, unopposed, and Geo. Anderson, constable, also unopposed.

It is generally accepted that voters somewhat disregarded party lines in the election, with the vote signifying that straight tickets were the exception. Democrats evidently jumped the party line to vote for the candidates in the offices above mentioned, while some who favored the republican column, crossed over to scratch in the circles after the names of White, Mix, Ross, Condie, and for the two local candidates, Hove and Burr. GENESEE SCHOOL RECEIVES MORE MONEY FOR BUILDING

Genesee and community will now be assured of adequate school facilities since the Public Works Administration has notified Supt. Kenneth F. Dean that an additional grant of \$3,263 has been approved. This sum from the government will be matched by a like amount by Independent School District No. 2 and the temporarily consolidated districts, plus an additional \$300 or more. The PWA furnishes 45 per cent of the cost of the much-needed west wing and the local district furnishes 65 per cent of that cost. With the money now available it will be possible to construct an additional 25 feet to the west of the present project, providing additional classrooms on the lower floor, a larger assembly room and space for a school library.

John Thomas, contractor on the original school building started several weeks ago, will also build the west wing. Inclement weather and freezing temperatures during the past week have delayed brick laying, but in the meantime concrete has been poured for the ground level floors and for the stairs leading from the ground floor of the new portion to the present building. About one-tenth of the brick needed for the building is now on the grounds, and all other materials are on hand to rush construction when weather permits.

WEATHEROLOGY

"Because of certain conditions and financial circumstances I cannot write 'official' weatherology between the first day of April and November 10.

"Beginning now, Nov. 10, I'll say, 'Winter has arrived,' an early winter, a bad winter with much moisture, which will be in the form of snow. This winter will compare with the hard winter of two years ago in cold weather and deep snow in the central and eastern states, but we will receive the milder weather. But our winter will be stormy.

"The strange things are that 100 billion meteors strike the earth daily yet no record of any person being killed, although one meteor now in the Hayden Planetarium weighs over 36 tons and is composed of about nine-tenths iron. Another fell in Arizona, gouging out a hole in the earth over 250 rods in diameter and 600 feet deep.

"Saturn and Jupiter are our influential planets now, and they have a coat of ice 6,000 miles deep and forever covered by clouds some 16,000 miles thick. Saturn indicates moisture while Jupiter 1300 times the volume of our earth and sports a jacket of ice over 15,000 miles thick, certainly indicates cold.

"Anyway, all these queer objects are in the heavens and are used in God's weather mill to produce the various climatic conditions, so do not expect me to make a perfect guess in my feeble attempts to produce 'Weatherology.'

"Don't neglect your duty to prepare for winter and be not shocked when I begin to tell you about 'sun-spot' conditions and extremes they will bring in the next few weeks."

BULLDOGS' RECORD CLEAN WIN FROM OROFINO 7 TO 6

Genesee high school Bulldogs, outplayed in the first half of a game with Orofino high school at Orofino last Friday, came back in the second half to score a touchdown and run over the extra point, to win from the Maniacs 7 to 6, in an exciting game, despite the water-soaked field and in a game played during intermittent flurries of snow and a driving rain at periods. In their second win from Orofino Genesee high school players, coached by Einar Husby, finished a season of competition for Class B schools in central Idaho without a loss. Genesee did lose 6 to 7 to the Clarkston high school team, composed of A and B squad players, but this loss was wiped out when Genesee went to Clarkston and won from a stronger team 12-0.

In the game at Orofino, Genesee kicked off with Hasfurther applying the boot and sending the ball to the Orofino 20 yard line. Genesee drew four off-side penalties, but held Orofino a 5 yard gain on three plays before they kicked to Genesee on its 15 yard line.

Hasfurther advanced a yard and Scharnhorst picked up 3 yards with Hasfurther going another yard before kicking to the Orofino 45 yard line.

Orofino went to a first down and a yard to spare on four plays into the Genesee line. Orofino then picked up five yards on an end run from a reverse, with Hasfurther stopping the runner in a pool of water on the sideline, and in stopping the play took the head linesman with him into the muddy water. Orofino then went to a first down on a five-yard surge into the line.

Orofino went 15 yards on two plays, one a reverse and the other into the line and then on a fake reverse Orofino went 10 yards to a touchdown. On the try-for point Orofino was stopped and stopped hard on a play into the center of the line.

Thiessen replaced Berahaw in the backfield, and after Scharnhorst had received on the kickoff, traveled 3 yards. Scharnhorst picked up 2 yards and Thiessen lost 2 yards. Hasfurther then booted to midfield.

Orofino lost 4 yards trying the line, then picked up 8 on an end run. Trying the same play Orofino lost 2 yards and kicked to Scharnhorst on his own 20 and came back up to the 30.

Thiessen plowed into the line for 5 yards and Scharnhorst went up to Genesee 37, with Thiessen and Hasfurther blasting the Orofino line for necessary yards to a first down.

Hasfurther drove up 3 yards, and Thiessen advanced 2 more. Hasfurther found the Orofino forward stubborn after going 3 yards, and Thiessen kicked to the Orofino 25.

Orofino gained 5 yards, sweeping the end, and then was stopped for no gain. Green and Burr were in fast to follow a reverse and threw Orofino for a 5 yard loss. Orofino kicked out to Genesee, a poor kick going only to the 50 yard line, but Genesee was offside. Orofino again kicked with Genesee then drawing a 15-yard penalty, assessed for alleged roughing the kicker.

Orofino gained 5 yards, but two passes were smeared by Genesee and Genesee took possession on the 5-yard line.

Emerson picked up two yards on a reverse, and Thiessen drove up to the 22 yard line, cutting back over right tackle as the half ended.

Thiessen Runs 80 Yards

Genesee received to open the second half with Scharnhorst taking the ball back to the 17 yard line. Thiessen then started toward his right end, cut back and was out in the open with only a safety man and another backfield man in his way as he raced down the field to within three yards of a touchdown, a run that was good for 80 yards, and down a muddy and heavy dirt field before Orofino tacklers brought him down.

With the ball on the Orofino 3 yard line Scharnhorst lost a yard, but on the next play Hasfurther smacked directly over center, with D. Herman, Jones, Pederson, Burr and Green

C. BEN ROSS DEFEATED BY BOTTLFSEN FOR GOVERNOR

C. A. Bottlfsen, Arco, will be the next governor of Idaho, succeeding Barzilla Clark, after defeating C. Ben Ross, democratic candidate for the fourth term as governor of the Gem State. Bottlfsen, better known over the state as "Bott" has been in the newspaper business as owner of the Arco Advertiser, and for a number of years has been managing editor of the Blackfoot Bulletin, successor to The Idaho Republican.

Bottlfsen, former department commander of the Idaho Department, American Legion, has served in the state legislature, both as representative and house clerk, and is outstanding in the state as a parliamentarian. In carrying the state by a vote of over 103,000 to slightly less than 75,000 for Ross, the new governor lost but in only five counties, Latah, Lewiston, Madras, Nez Perce and Shoshone. Ross lost in each county where he has resided in Idaho, namely, Canyon, Bannock and Ada.

With Bottlfsen elected governor, only one other republican candidate, Donald S. Whitehead was chosen on the state ticket, all others being democrats. Whitehead is the next lieutenant governor. He is owner of a drug store at Boise, and has seen much service in the state legislature.

Henry Dworshak, publisher of the Burley Bulletin and interested also in a newspaper at Idaho Falls, was elected congressman from the second district over his democratic opponent, Bert H. Miller, former attorney general for Idaho.

D. Worth Clark is leading Donald A. Callahan, republican, for the U. S. senate by about 20,000 votes, and Compton I. White has about the same lead over Rex T. Hensen, republican, for congressman from the first district.

Latah county gave Ross his best vote in the state, but turned down the democratic candidates for the state senate and house of representatives. Mix was given a good vote in his home county for lieutenant governor, and lost in the state to Whitehead by about 4,000 votes.

It is assumed that republicans are certain of 23 of the 44 senate seats and 31 of the 59 house seats, giving the new governor more support than was expected in early returns from over the state.

In the national congress, republicans will show a gain of 77 or more in the house membership and at least eight senators will replace democrats in the senate. Added to republican victories over the nation 11 governors will replace democrats, while California elected a democratic governor, Olson, over Merriam. The state now showing a gain of strength in the republican ranks are: Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, South Dakota, Kansas, Wyoming, Idaho and Oregon, with a split in Colorado.

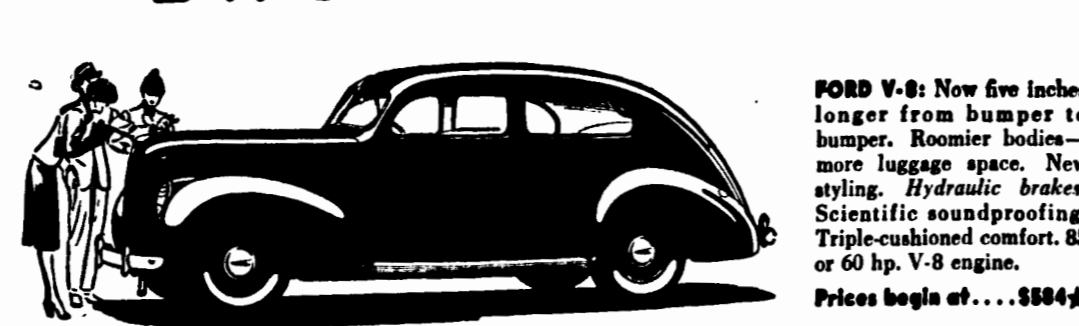

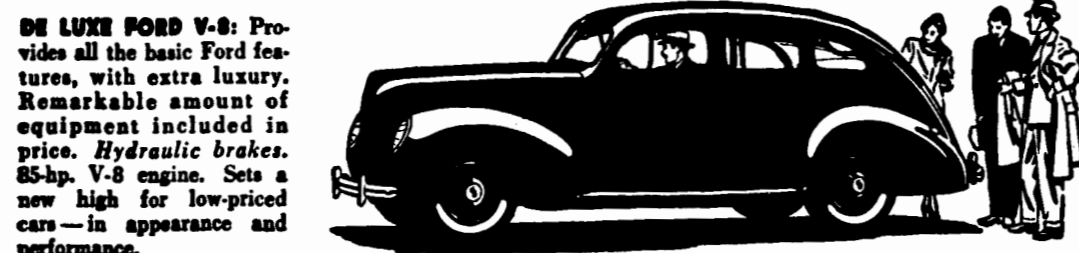

Emerson slashed nicely through the Orofino line for 7 yards and then repeated with another 7 yard gain as the game ended.

Perhaps a trifling over-anxious in the first half, Genesee was penalized severely by the referee for offside, and in the second half, Jones, Green, Burr and Herman were in the Orofino backfield much of the time, and on one play drew the 15-yard penalty for going into the kicker on the end play of a series. Orofino did not lose a yard by penalties. Orofino dominated the play in the first half, but in the second half the Maniacs were pretty much on the defense after its fast backfield found the reverse plays difficult to successfully execute on a wet field.

FIRE DESTROYS WM. MERVYN HOME THURSDAY MORNING

Fire completely destroyed the fine residence at the W. H. Mervyn ranch early Thursday morning. The house, and also consumed all of the personal belongings of members of the family, and much of the furniture and fixtures. The grounds about the house, on which much time and money was expended in the way of plants, shrubs and small trees, suffering the same fate. 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GRAIN MARKET SUMMARY FOR WEEK ENDING NOV. 10

Wheat markets maintained a steady tone during the week ended November 10, while corn turned decidedly firmer. Firmer foreign markets, together with strength in securities and higher corn prices were the principal steadying influences in wheat, reports the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. A sharp reduction in market receipts with growers storing large quantities to avail themselves of federal loans, accounted largely for the advance in corn.

Little change occurred in the general wheat situation. Prices of Canadian and Argentine wheat advanced slightly with reducing marketings in Canada and threatened frost damage in Argentina. The market at Liverpool, however, was slightly firmer as a result of slow European demand and pressure of considerable quantities of wheat unsold on ocean passage. Nearly 500 club members from every state in the Union will be present.

Genesee's high school Bulldogs, finished a successful season of football, but lost the final game to Potlatch at Potlatch on Armistice Day. Handicapped by the loss of Hasfurth, Genesee was unable to pack the punch that saw the Bulldogs through a season with but two defeats. Hasfurth suffered a broken bone in his right leg above the ankle in the second Orofino game. The game at Potlatch was played on snow-covered field, with the temperature below freezing.

Scharnhorst gained 2 yards and Thiessen gained 2 yards on two plays. Bershaw went in for Scharnhorst and Thiessen booted out to the 45.

Potlatch drove upfield for 8 yards and then Potlatch moved forward to the Genesee 25 as the quarter ended.

A Potlatch pass was no good, but a play into the line and one around end netted five yards. On the fourth play, a Potlatch back was swarmed over as he attempted to pass and in rounding the ball drew a 15 yard penalty. Potlatch then booted over the end zone.

Taking the ball on the Genesee 20 yard line, Bershaw failed to gain; Emerson picked up 2 yards on two plays and Thiessen kicked to the 35. Substitutions for Genesee at this time were Lettenmaier for Pederson and Scharnhorst for Thiessen, the latter being injured.

Potlatch gained a half yard around end, then went 5 yards into the line before electing to kick. The kick was over the end zone.

Green took the ball on the Genesee 20 and gained a yard. Potlatch was offside and Genesee took the penalty. Scharnhorst gained 3 yards and Bershaw went into the line for 2 yards and a first down.

COLTON SCHOOL BUILDING IS SOLD TO HIGHEST BIDDER

The doom of the old Colton high and grade school building was sealed last Friday afternoon when it was put on the block and sold to the highest bidder, with the understanding that it be razed.

Four bids were made on the property and the successful bidder was James Kenyon of Lewiston, with a bid of \$600.00. According to the agreement of sale he will start dismantling the building as soon as the plans are transferred to the new building and the work is to be completed within 90 days. This is in compliance with a contract made by the Board of Directors with the PWA, and must be done to receive the final PWA grant on the new school building.

This old school building, a landmark in Colton, has stood for 46 years, having originally been built in 1882. A fire, the most disastrous in the history of Colton, partially destroyed the building on the night of the last day of school in May 1915. The brick walls remained standing following this fire and the present school building was completed in the spring of 1916, and now for 46 years, it is serving people of the district as a place to educate their children, but as the district grows and progresses, it must give way to a bigger and more modern building.—Colton News-Letter.

INTOXICATION, INATTENTION MAJOR CAUSES OF ACCIDENTS

Motor vehicle drivers under the influence of intoxicating liquor or those who are inattentive are responsible for the greatest number of accidents in Idaho, according to the opinion of the state patrolmen who attended the annual police school held in Boise recently. The officers were asked to submit five causes for automobile wrecks in their districts, and after compiling the results, the two conditions most above were intoxication and inattention. Next in the list of causes were speeding and failure to observe traffic signs and signals. These four reasons have resulted in most of the accidents in all parts of the state, as is shown by the accident reports studied by the Safety Education Bureau of the Department of Law Enforcement. Other causes of accidents included recklessness, faulty equipment, lack of courtesy, stock on the highway and center line driving.

During the past four months there has been almost 50 per cent reduction in collision accidents, and there has been a noticeable increase of fatalities in accidents caused by inattentive drivers. This was in those accidents where drivers drove off the road and fatalities resulted by drowning or persons in the car being killed in a fall over some cliff. Inattentive drivers caused 11 crashes in the past four months in which 19 persons were killed during the first ten months of the current year.

One of the state patrolmen said the major causes of accidents in his district were: Persons from rural districts not knowing traffic regulations, improper loading of wood and logging trucks, used cars being sold to careless and incompetent drivers, parking cars upon the highway without clearance for other vehicles, and beer parlors in remote districts with insufficient police supervision.

The five accident causes as reported by officers in their districts are as follows: Intoxication, 30; inattention, 30; speeding, 25; failure to observe traffic signs or signals, 23; faulty equipment, 15; recklessness, 14; lack of courtesy, 9; livestock on highway, 9; center line driving, 5; carelessness, 6; ice, fog or snow, 5; faulty highways, 4; pedestrian fault, 4; and inadequate police force, 2.

In checking over the causes of accidents, drivers are warned of the approach of this season of the year in which the night or early morning will find the highways with a thin coat of frost or ice over them. In those places where there are leaves on the road there will be found a slippery condition and the speeding car may skid at that unexpected moment.

Summarizing the fatalities in a year, it has been found that one-fifth of the people who have been killed in traffic accidents in the entire year were killed during the months of November and December.

INSURANCE DEADLINE NEAR Lowell Isaksen, county crop insurance supervisor, emphasizes that November 30 is the final date for taking applications for crop insurance under the federal program. He pointed out that this applies only to winter wheat seedings, and that spring wheat applications may be written at any time before the spring wheat season.

Applications in the county now number 176, which represents about 20 per cent of the allotted wheat acres for 1938.

Contrary to the impression which some have received that the policy is void after the date designated for final payment on premium notice, this is not the case, the official said. Altho the policy may be put into effect by paying this premium, subject to a re-evaluation of the cash equivalent because of fluctuations in the wheat market, if paid in wheat, it will still remain the same number of bushels specified in the premium.

Officials invited to N. I. Chamber Lewiston.—C. A. Bottolfson, Idaho governor-elect, heads a list of officers and legislators-elect who are invited to attend the annual meeting of the North Idaho chamber of commerce in Moscow, Monday and Tuesday, November 21 and 22.

E. C. Rettig, president of the chamber, said that he was making all successful candidates at the polls to be present when the eleven North Idaho counties comprising the membership of the chamber will send delegates to tell what is needed in the way of state legislation.

In addition to the legislative matters, the meeting, timber and railroad companies will send representatives to the meeting, he said, and will be heard. The University of Idaho, the Lewiston Normal, and other educational and welfare institutions also have a place on the program.

CIVIC ASSOCIATION ELECTS OFFICERS FOR THE YEAR

Thirty men attended the first meeting of the Civic Association for the Fall at Helen's Cafe Friday evening of last week. At a previous meeting it was voted that the name of the Civic Improvement club be changed to Genesee Civic Association, in that its membership endeavors to work for the interests of everyone in the community, and includes members from every pursuit, and is not strictly commercial.

R. E. Nordby was reelected president of the organization as was Supt. Kenneth F. Dean, secretary, and F. G. Densov, treasurer. David Kuehl was elected clerk.

Considerable discussion was heard on the proposed \$5.00 motor vehicle license for Idaho, and resulted in the Civic Association going on record as opposed to the lower fee. Chief among reasons given for opposition to the proposal are: Highway districts created locally and elsewhere in the state issued bonds under the law which provided for all license monies originating within each district to be diverted to highway districts, with the exception of less than 13 per cent, for retirement of bonds. The law specifically provides now that motor vehicle license monies received by the various highway districts shall be used only for bond redemption and interest, and it was according to this law that all highway districts of this locality were able to refund bond issues within the past few years at a lower rate of interest than original issues bore. The second reason for objection to a flat fee of \$5.00 was that all states now charging small fees are able to meet highway expenditures only by levy the ad valorem tax in addition to the fee, and the amount of the tax in addition to the license gives no assurance that operation of motor vehicles as to license and tax would be less than at present for the reason that taxes would necessarily be received first by the counties, then broken down and apportioned to highway districts.

The third main objection was the loss of federal funds should 1 cent of the gas tax be diverted to highway districts. The federal government now matches each dollar in taxes derived from the state gas tax.

R. E. Nordby, president of the Civic Association; Walter Emerson, mayor, and R. E. Emmett, clerk of Genesee Highway District, were named as a committee to represent Genesee at the sessions of the North Idaho chamber of commerce held in Moscow, Monday and Tuesday. The three men attended the two-day meeting, and Monday morning Supt. Kenneth F. Dean attended. Monday morning was assigned to discussion of the school problems of the northern part of the state, and included hearings on the state equalization of school funds by counties. At the chamber sessions there were present: C. A. Bottolfson, governor-elect; Donald Whitehead, lieutenant governor-elect, and most of the senators and representatives elected November 8, who will attend the state legislature, beginning in January.

FEDERAL CROP INSURANCE DEADLINE IS NOVEMBER 30

Farmers in Latah county are reminded today by Lowell Isaksen, county insurance supervisor, that the last date to make application for crop insurance on the 1939 winter wheat crop is November 30.

Insurance for spring wheat can be applied for any time before spring seeding, according to Mr. Isaksen. "Crop insurance in Latah county has received very good support this year," declared the supervisor recently. "Wheat farmers have shown much interest in assuring themselves a crop of either 50 or 75 per cent of their normal yield on next year's winter wheat crop."

Mr. Isaksen pointed out that the insurance policy is not void if the premium has not been paid on or before the final date specified in the notice. However, the cash equivalent of the premium may be changed since the market value of wheat may be higher or lower and this will govern the cash rate of the premium. If the premium is to be paid in wheat, however, the number of bushels will remain the same if paid by negotiable warehouse receipt.

Acreage in the county under the wheat insurance program for next year stands at nearly 11,500 acres he said.

PLAYS AND READINGS WELL RECEIVED FRIDAY EVENING

Undertended by the snub to the New Deal from farm belt voters in the recent elections, Henry A. Wallace, secretary of Agriculture, has announced a 1939 farm program patterned closely on the 1938 plan.

The secretary took the attitude that the 1938 program did not have a fair chance because congress allowed the farmers too little time to get ready for it and because of the unusually large crops that followed the drought of 1936.

"The 1939 program offers farmers the first complete test of the farm program contemplated under the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1933," R. M. Evans, AAA administrator says, as the detailed program was being presented to the nation's farmers.

"In 1938," he explained, "the program was not available until after the first complete test of the farm program contemplated under the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1933," R. M. Evans, AAA administrator says, as the detailed program was being presented to the nation's farmers.

Secretary Wallace said meetings to explain the plan to farmers would be held throughout the country during the next few months "in order that all farmers may have the necessary information well in advance of the 1939 crop planting season."

The new program sets a crop quota for the country as a whole of between 270 and 285 million acres, about five million acres under 1938. It provides for \$500,000,000 in payments for those who cooperate in keeping within the quota by turning over additional acres to soil-building practices.

In addition to the conservation payments, \$212,000,000 in price adjustment payments was authorized by the last congress, to be paid to cotton, wheat, corn, tobacco and rice producers. These payments will be made to farmers who seed within individual farm acreage allotments.

AAA officials said that special attention in the 1939 program will be given to the problem of small farmers and changes made to meet more closely, the requirements of certain areas and producing groups.

Farmers who have corn acreage allotments of less than eight acres may elect to have their farms classified as non-allotment farms. On these farms corn will be treated as a general soil-depleting crop for the purpose of payments and deductions for exceeding the corn acreage allotment would not be made unless the acreages of corn exceed eight acres. Similar provisions apply in most areas for wheat.

Provision is also made for permitting as much as three acres of commercial vegetables to be grown on any non-allotment farm without deductions.

Total acreage goals for various crops under the new program are as follows: Cotton, 94,000,000 to 97,000,000 acres. Cotton, 27,000,000 to 29,000,000 acres. Wheat, 55,000,000 to 60,000,000 acres. Peanuts, 1,500,000 to 1,650,000 acres. Potatoes, 3,100,000 to 3,300,000 acres, and general crops, 145,000,000 to 150,000,000 acres.

Provision also is made for limiting payments within any state to an individual, partnership or estate to \$10,000 and \$10,000 for the United States in the case of any corporation, will become effective for the first time in 1939.

WHEAT LOANS IN GEM STATE
NEAR TWO MILLION DOLLARS

Idaho farmers, totaling 1874, in 26 counties have applied for nearly two million dollars made available on more than four million bushels of wheat since the federal government announced the wheat loan program early this fall, according to a report compiled by H. L. Stafford, state executive officer of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

Applications for loans are made to the Commodity Credit Corporation through the county officers. Due to this procedure the state office does not have available figures on the actual amount of money that has been loaned under the program, Mr. Stafford said.

Applications totaled \$1,959,174 on 3,220,110 bushels of warehouse stored wheat and 85,616 bushels of wheat stored on the farm.

The loan program is designed to provide cash loans on wheat in an effort to hold surplus quantities of wheat at county points that otherwise would have been dumped on the market and contribute to lowering the market price still further. Applications for loans must be made at county offices before January 1, 1939.

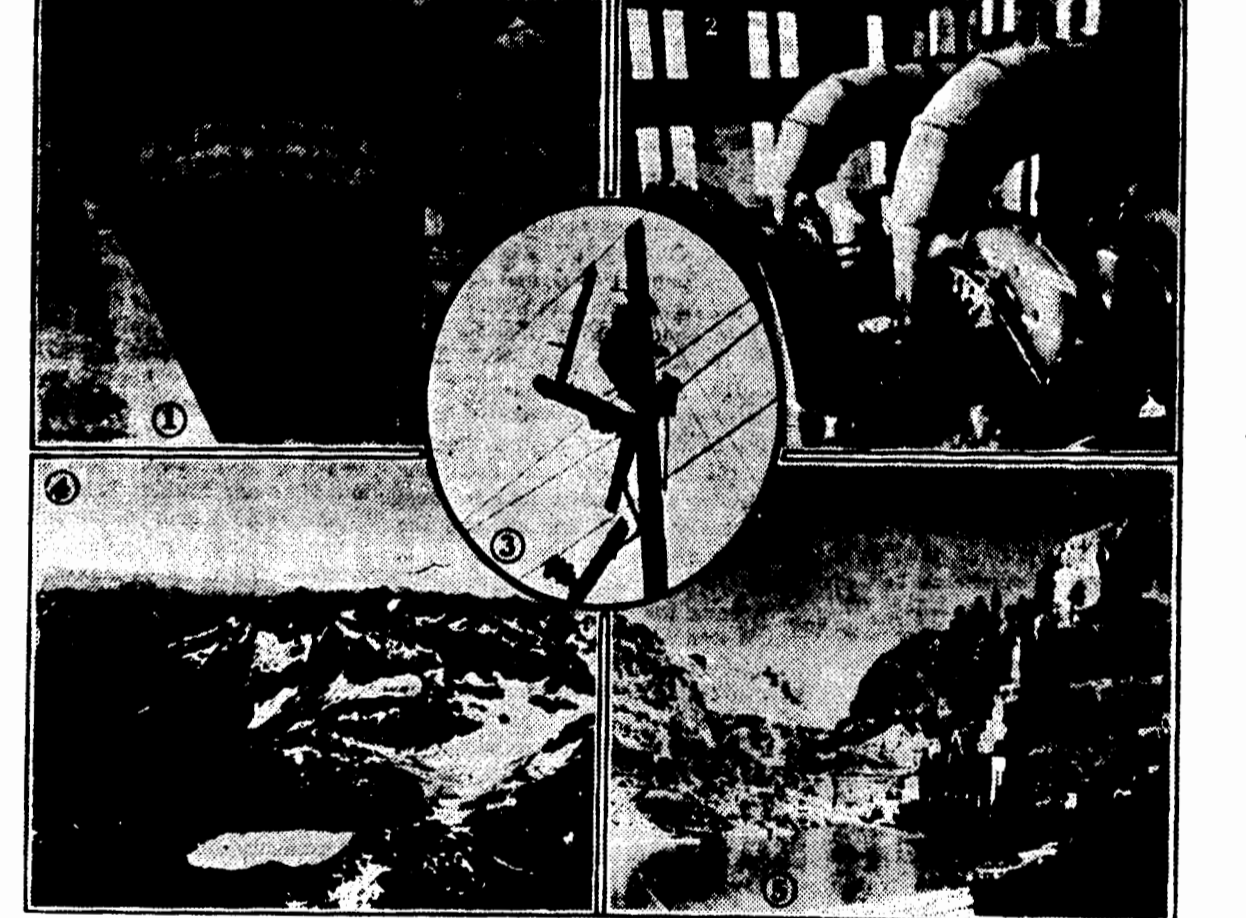

DOMESTIC TWO-PRICE PLAN FOR WHEAT HAS OPPOSITION The motto of Secretary Wallace of the agricultural department at Washington seems to be, "If at first you don't succeed, try, try again." It will be admitted by even the most ardent proponents of the AAA that Mr. Wallace's trials up to this time have not been crowned with an overwhelming amount of success. Blacklisting and plowing under brought a national shortage and a tremendous increase in foreign production and imports. And the prices of wheat and corn now are at distressing levels. Senator Wheeler, returning from Montana, reports that it cost a farmer out there a bushel of wheat to get two loaves of bread—that wheat brought him only 30 cents a bushel and the bread cost him 15 cents a loaf. But Mr. Wallace, being a true visionary, is not discouraged. The latest scheme is the two-price plan. Instead of dumping our grain abroad, we are to export it to foreign nations at a price which will bring us a profit. This is to be done by selling our surplus commodities at home. Those on relief and those unable to buy enough to eat are to get provisions from the surplus crops at reduced prices and the government will make up the difference in cost. It sounds good—but so does the story of the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow. The two price scheme will be beset with many difficulties. It is scarcely necessary to point them out to the thinking man. First comes the problem of manufacturing the raw materials from surplus commodities and passing them on to the consumer at one-third at a fair price. Again comes a more difficult problem—that of setting a price that only those who are entitled to it can buy. This is the problem that Mr. Wallace is going to keep the man who has a few dollars more than the required minimum from helping himself to the surplus commodities if he has the money to buy? Are we going to have a nation-wide index system with an army of income inspectors traveling out of Washington, searching the

Delegates and members represented 36 states, with Oklahoma, sending the largest delegation, 110. A large delegation of representatives from the state of Wisconsin, Mr. Kluss said. North Dakota was the banner state in Union circles for the year just closed owing to advancement of the Union in that state and the decided increase in membership and activities. Representatives leaving for their homes were optimistic regarding the chances of their program being adopted, Madison newspapers report. These reports were further substantiated by a telegram read before the convention from M. W. Thatcher, St. Paul, Minn., manager of the Union's farm terminal association. The telegram followed a conference with President Roosevelt in Washington while the Union convention was being held. In the telegram Thatcher said President Roosevelt had pronounced himself "in accord with" a large number of proposals embodied in the Farmers Union program. MR. AND MRS. KLUSS HOME FROM TRIP TO MADISON, WIS. Mr. and Mrs. John Kluss returned from their trip to Madison, Wis., where the former attended the annual convention of the National Farmers Educational and Cooperative Union of America, held November 15, 16 and 17. They left Spokane November 12 on the North Coast Limited, traveling to St. Paul, and from there completed the trip to Madison over the Chicago & Northwestern line. Following the convention they spent a day in Chicago, before traveling west to Denver, where Mr. Kluss obtained information at the central offices of the Union insurance program. From Madison, Wis., they traveled on the streamliner, City of Denver, leaving Chicago at 6 o'clock in the evening they were in Denver the following day, 16 hours being required to travel over 1,000 miles. From Denver they came north to the junction of the Union Pacific just west of Cheyenne and went to Ontario, where they visited two days in the home of their daughter, Mrs. Francis Dowdy, and husband. Mr. Kluss, as a delegate to the National Union convention, was the representative of Washington and Idaho, which two states comprise the state Union of which he is president, recently elected. There were over 400 delegates and members of the Union at the convention, Mr. Kluss said, and each of the three days were crowded with business. Much time was taken up in discussion of the farm program, and the Union will devote its efforts toward securing parity prices for farmers, and retaining the good parts of the AAA federal program. Mr. Kluss was named as a member of the resolutions and legislative committee and thereby was not permitted to be present at all discussions on the convention floor. At a meeting of the Genesee Local December 3, at the Legion hall, he will give a report of the convention. A summary of proceedings of the convention are related in part in The News this week. The summary is taken from newspapers published at Madison. Thirty-six states were represented at the convention, Mr. Kluss said, and the condition of this group is deplorable. The manner in which the land is operated, leaves the cotton grower with practically nothing under conditions which may seem favorable to the larger grower. He also told of the proposal made by Oklahoma and Kansas farmers to assess a tax on wheat producers who marketed or grew over 3,000 bushels per year. This proposal, met with opposition when it came to attention of wheat growers in areas where yields ran higher than in the states where the idea originated. Mr. Vescey, president of the national Union organization, was highly commended for his handling of the convention. It will be remembered, that he was in Genesee last year, and appeared at a public meeting. All of the national officers were re-elected, Mr. Kluss said, and the Union has been invited to the cities of Kansas City, Mo., Omaha, Neb., and Columbus, Ohio, for its convention next year. The executive board will select the 1939 convention city at a later date. Both Mr. and Mrs. Kluss enjoyed the trip east, but are very content to return to the Palouse country. Here have their problems, Mr. Kluss remarked, but people of other localities seem to have more problems. With many of the wives of delegates and members attending the convention, entertainment was provided for them during the convention. One of the interesting events was a sight-seeing trip about the city of Madison, which was followed by tea at the home of Governor and Mrs. LaFollette, at which Mrs. LaFollette was the hostess. 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NATIONAL FARMERS UNION SEEKS PARTY FOR FARMERS

(Continued from Page One) program, therefore, is designed to amend existing legislation with a view toward obtaining a parity income for the nation's farmers, it was explained. Resolutions adopted in some of the resolutions adopted, the organization went on record as: 1. Opposed to efforts to make "scape-goats" out of minority religious and social groups and favoring a war referendum, such as called for by the Ludlow amendment, before this country engages in any foreign war. 2. Condemning vigilante activities against labor and favoring cooperation with groups supporting the U. S. senate civil liberties committee. 3. Favoring establishment by the Farmers' Union national board of permanent committee to extend and further possibilities of cooperation with organized labor to the mutual advantage of farmer-labor groups. 4. Favoring passage of national health legislation necessary to safeguard health. 5. Demanding protection of this country's dairy industry against the use of imported butterfat substitutes. 6. Favoring the curbing of monopolies and commending recent federal investigations of monopolies resulting

in indictment of large milk corporations and oil companies. Other resolutions adopted included those relating to government insured mortgage loans, refinancing of federal bank loans, bankruptcy laws, moving living conditions through the cooperative movement. The resolutions were presented to the convention group by Glenn Talbot, president of the North Dakota Farmers Union and president of the national organization's resolutions committee, and were adopted with a minimum of discussion. The resolutions relating to minority religious and social groups pointed out that the Farmers' Union is interested in preserving democracy and improving living conditions through the cooperative movement. "Both democracy and cooperatives suffer under war and dictatorship," the resolution stated, "because democracy cannot be maintained by fighting for it since modern war always means military supremacy, is futile, and does not settle any problems." The resolution further expressed beliefs of the Farmers Union members as follows: "We favor a war referendum, such as the Ludlow amendment calls for, before we engage in any foreign war. We urge a strict neutrality program for our government during war in other parts of the world, making sure that the state department does not permit such a situation to be misused so as to make neutrality meaningless. "We favor cooperation with organized labor to the mutual advantage of farmer-labor groups. "We favor passage of national health legislation necessary to safeguard health. "We oppose compulsory military training in colleges and high schools because it creates a militaristic attitude and deadens the desire to settle problems by arbitration and reason rather than by force. "We oppose the so-called 'collective security' program which is actually nothing but favoring one set of imperialistic nations against another. "We oppose efforts to make 'scape-goats' out of minority religious and racial groups rather than facing the fact that our competitive economic system has failed to provide a decent living for millions of our workers on farm and in factory. "We oppose all legislation which proposes to take the profits out of war by the conception of manpower and wealth because we realize that the powerful economic interests of this country through the control of the press, radio, movies and some of our legislators, could easily nullify that part of the legislation conscripting our wealth and thus leave us under a military dictatorship. "We encourage parents to boycott all war toys this Christmas season because such toys are being used extensively to condition the minds of children for war. "We oppose the further increase of armament expenditures because they are neither protection against war, a guarantee of international peace, nor a solution for the problems of unemployment and the business decline. "We urge our membership to increase their emphasis on peace education and understandings of international economic problems, and to study the possibilities of the cooperative movement as an effective way to eliminate the fundamental causes of war. The resolution condemning vigilante activities against labor said that "certain organizations, financed by the big trusts and pretending to speak for farmers, are trying to incite farmers to un-American vigilante action against labor, leading to bloodshed and the violation of basic democratic liberties" and that "the forcible de-

CROSS CROSSINGS CAUTIOUSLY

"Cross crossings cautiously!" This warning has not been heeded by drivers in Idaho during the past eleven months, according to the statistics compiled in the Safety Bureau of the Law Enforcement Department. This was shown in the 14 train-auto accidents in which 23 persons were killed. The heavy death toll in this state, and the greatest school bus grade crossing tragedy in the nation which occurred in Utah December 1, has aroused deep concern with the public. The irony of the latter tragedy is that it snuffed out the lives of a score of young people who were eagerly looking forward to the happy festivities of the Yuletide season.

Motor vehicles which are required to stop at railroad crossings and to observe other traffic signs in Idaho are stages, street and school buses and trucks. It is a mandatory order from their respective employers that the drivers of these motor vehicles stop at all railroad crossings whether on main or branch lines or tracks infrequently used. It is a frequent occurrence, while the buses with their human cargoes are stopped at the crossings where the signals or bells are indicating that a train is within a short distance, to see some speeding car dash across the track while the train is bearing down upon them. Inattentive drivers come to crossings without a shift of gears or reduction of speed or even taking the trouble to "stop, look or listen." These are the reasons that have aroused the discussion of the necessity of adopting safety legislation.

With the ice, sleet, snow, and darkness of December, there is an urgent need of caution on the part of motor vehicle drivers as they approach crossings. It should be "Wait, Driver, Wait." The tragedy at the Utah crossing, according to press reports, occurred during a snow storm with a visibility of about a thousand feet. When these road and weather conditions prevail, a few minutes delay and too much vigilance is better than a lifetime of regret.

Adverse weather conditions, together with the inattention of drivers and the rush and gentility of the Christmas season, swells the December traffic toll, says the National Safety Council. It asks that enforcement be stepped up and wherever it is deemed necessary that officers be at night club spots and other places during the holiday season to dissuade drinking drivers from taking the wheel. The council is asking parents to urge their sons and daughters not to ride with drinking drivers, and it is appealing to motorists and pedestrians to use unusual caution at all times upon the streets and highways.

BANG'S DISEASE PROGRAM REQUIRES STATE FINANCING

Failure of the federal government to continue the Bang's disease eradication program among cattle would result in the probable need for a \$100,000 state appropriation, Dr. T. A. Elliot, state director of animal industry, says.

Dr. Elliot returned to his office this week after attending at Chicago a national convention of the U. S. Livestock Sanitary association, which has studied particularly Bang's control.

At present, Dr. Elliot said, the state contributes approximately \$6,000 annually, with the federal government supplying the remainder of a fund which totals approximately \$100,000.

"If the present federal program is not extended after my 1 expiration date, it may be necessary for the state to appropriate for the biennium \$100,000 to be used in matching federal funds," Dr. Elliot said.

"Bang's disease control still is in the experimental stage, and a great deal of work remains to be done, both in the testing and the use of a vaccine.

"Until more data is obtained, it is imperative that the present program be maintained."

No November China Wheat Exports

The Shanghai office of the department of agriculture reported that there was no demand for foreign wheat at Shanghai during the month ended November 15. If China's domestic wheat prices continue to rise, however, overseas purchases appeared probable since arrivals of domestic grain have been restricted by transportation difficulties and high taxes.

Wheat stocks at Shanghai have declined to about 556,000 bushels and the flour mills have been operating at a reduced rate from that reported a month earlier.

Flour stocks at Shanghai were estimated at 300,000 bags. No imports of wheat were made into China during September and flour imports totaled 136,000 barrels of which the U. S. supplied only 7,000 barrels, Australia 70,000 and Japan 49,000.

FBCC Buys 43,000,000 Bushels Wheat

The Agricultural Adjustment Administration announces that sales through November 15, of wheat and flour for export under the federal plan totaled 19 million bushels. Of this quantity, approximately 76 per cent was wheat and 24 per cent flour.

Purchases of wheat by the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation to November 15, totaled about 28,420,000 bushels. The difference between the price paid to producers and dealers and received from exporters averaged 12 1/2 cents per bushel of wheat.

Flour for export, all agencies, July 1 to November 15, was placed at approximately 43,200,000 bushels, of which 38,400,000 bushels were exported.

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WILMA HERMAN, 4-H CLUB DELEGATE WRITES OF TRIP

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Weather has been sufficiently cold for this season of the year, with temperatures dropping to below zero a few nights during the past week. A light flurry of snow covered the ground Thursday morning which also tends to remind one of Christmas.

Genesee merchants have their stores stocked for Christmas shoppers, and the merchandise seems to emphasize useful and practical gifts, with the usual items in toys to gadden hearts of youngsters. Shoppers will undoubtedly find it advantageous to shop in Genesee, both as to price and quality.

Some strengthening was apparent in the general wheat situation and this was reflected in higher quotations on foreign wheats at Liverpool. Offerings of new wheat from the southern hemisphere were light with sales in Argentina practically all to governmental agencies at the fixed minimum prices which are above present world levels. Argentine shipments for the week totaled less than 900,000 bushels while Australian exports were only 1,644,000 bushels. The Australian law establishing a price equivalent of approximately 96c for wheat for domestic consumption (instead of \$1.20-7.8 as originally reported by the trade) became effective December 5.

Germany and Italy purchased an estimated million bushels of wheat from the Danubian countries, according to trade reports and this was a further strengthening factor. France imposed a tax equivalent to 161-8c in addition to the regular customs duty on durum wheat imported for home consumption. India also imposed an import duty equivalent to about 21 1/2c per bushel on wheat and flour which will tend to restrict further imports of Australian and Canadian wheat purchases of which have totaled nearly 10,000,000 bushels, according to Winter Wheat Prospects.

Domestic cash wheat advanced 1 to 2 cents per bushel, influenced by a firmer situation abroad and also by continued unfavorable conditions for winter wheat. Melting snow and rain together with mild temperatures were favorable for winter wheat in the eastern part of the belt where this crop is in fair to good condition. In western portions of the belt, however, the trade situation occurred, especially in the western half of Kansas and in Oklahoma and Texas. In some southern and western counties of Oklahoma wheat is reported the poorest in many years while in Texas, except in northwestern sections, much of the wheat seeded has not germinated.

Trade estimates of seedings of winter wheat for the 1939 crop range from 46 to 48 million acres compared with last year's seedings of 67,316,000 acres. Marketings of winter wheat increased with a total of about 3,191,000 bushels received at the principal terminals.

Included in stocks on hand at the first of December were 3,069,451 bushels held by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation in premiums. Storage space for about 8 million bushels in 57 bonded warehouses has been contracted for by the Corporation for storing its reserves of winter wheat.

Genesee town team broke even during the week with loss to the Clarkston Seventh Street Grocers Monday evening 44 to 39. In the close scoring throughout, the Clarkston group were in the lead at the Auditorium Hotel and transportation to the Livestock Exposition grounds was by elevated train. We visited the different exhibits of clothing, canning and livestock. At 2:00 o'clock we boarded motor coaches, going to Meadsh Shrine Temple. Here we were guests of Thomas E. Wilson & Company. This was a grand program, marking the twenty-first anniversary of which Mr. Wilson has entertained 4-H Club delegates. On the program Mr. Wilson presented the awards to winners in the National 4-H Meat Animal Livestock project and the National Junior Feeding contest. There were also acrobatics, juggling, impersonations, singers and many other thrills and features. Dinner was furnished by Wilson & Co. Mary Pickford was also present for this day.

At 9:15 in the evening there was a parade of the entire 4-H delegation in the Exposition arena, held by Iowa's 4-H band. Following this we boarded coaches, going directly to our hotels.

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CIVIC ASSOCIATION TALKS OVER LEGISLATIVE MATTERS

Directors of rural school districts, members of highway district and good roads district met with the Genesee Civic Association Wednesday evening at Roy's Inn for dinner, after which a general discussion was heard on matters pertaining to highways and schools that will come before the legislature to convene in January.

The first matter to be discussed was the proposed \$5.00 motor vehicle license fee for Idaho. R. E. Emmett, explained the position of highway districts relative to redemption of outstanding bonds, and their dependence on income from the present motor vehicle licenses.

Seasonal dullness prevailed in domestic grain markets during the week just ended. Wheat moved slightly weaker toward the close of the period, influenced by some improvement in winter wheat prospects and also by weakness at Liverpool where increased offerings of southern hemisphere wheat were a depressing factor.

The general wheat situation turned slightly weaker on offerings of southern hemisphere wheat which increased and outturns above expectations were indicated in Argentina and some sections of Australia. The Argentine Minister of Agriculture estimated the Argentine wheat crop now being harvested at approximately 316 million bushels or 25 to 30 million bushels over recent trade forecasts.

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HEAVY FROST CAUSES LINES POWER COMPANY TO BREAK

Recent heavy frosts have frozen on all electric light and power lines in the Genesee territory, resulting in interference of service when transmission lines gave way under the weight. The first interference was Tuesday evening when one of the three wires of the 6900-volt feeder line near the Berger Bros. ranch broke, and thereby severed by the Washington Water Company. The broken ends at that time were brought back and were turned the fence white hot where there were loose connections in the fence wire. Repairs were made and the circuit opened at Leon Substation.

A second break in service came about midnight when the high line carrying 60,000 volts snapped under the weight of frost. This break was located about a mile south of Leon. Wednesday afternoon service was interrupted for about two and a half hours when the Moscow-Lewiston 60,000-volt highline broke and fell across the Genesee 6900-volt feeder. John Black, Washington Water Power company manager, Keith Freeman, his assistant, and Jess Johnson were out repairing lines from about midnight Tuesday until 7 o'clock Tuesday morning.

WPA WORKERS TO RECEIVE PAY IN TIME FOR HOLIDAYS WPA workers in every county in Idaho will receive Christmas checks totaling \$322,500 in federal funds for payroll earnings during Christmas week and before New Year's Day, L. W. Scott, WPA director of finance, announced.

Eleven thousand seven hundred WPA workers in NYA enrollees will have pay checks totaling \$292,500 or before Christmas week, while 1200 workers will receive payroll earnings totaling \$30,000 before New Year's day, Scott said.

Payment of checks before Christmas was ordered by Harry L. Hopkins, national WPA administrator. Mail carriers and postal employees will give pay checks "first call" during the Christmas rush of mail, upon orders from Washington.

"Employees of the finance division of the Works Progress Administration, treasury accounts office and the disbursing office have been working overtime and Sundays since December 1 to make delivery of Christmas checks to workers possible," Scott said.

"Since nearly every WPA dollar is spent right where it is earned by the workers, this flood of earnings released during the holiday week should have a stimulating effect upon the Christmas trade, particularly in communities where no other payrolls are available during winter months," the administration points out.

MARTIN GRIESER INJURED Martin Grieser was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston Thursday noon for observation and treatment of injuries sustained when he was unloading heavy steel to be used in the new school building.

A steel girder about 35 feet long and weighing about two tons was being unladen from a flat car, and to keep it upright, Mr. Grieser was bracing it with a post. The heavy beam turned partly over, took the post with it and striking Mr. Grieser across the left side of face, toppled him from the car. He landed on his head and shoulders, and it was feared he might have suffered a fractured vertebra. Dr. White administered first aid and immediately summoned an ambulance to remove the injured man to a hospital.

Assisting in moving the heavy steel was Ray Trautman, Wilson Esser and Bernard Grieser. Some of the heavy pieces yet to be moved are the steel beams, 65 feet long which weigh over three and a half tons each.

REBUILDING PHONE LINES

A crew of seven men are rebuilding portions of the Interstate Telephone company lines in Genessee the past two weeks. 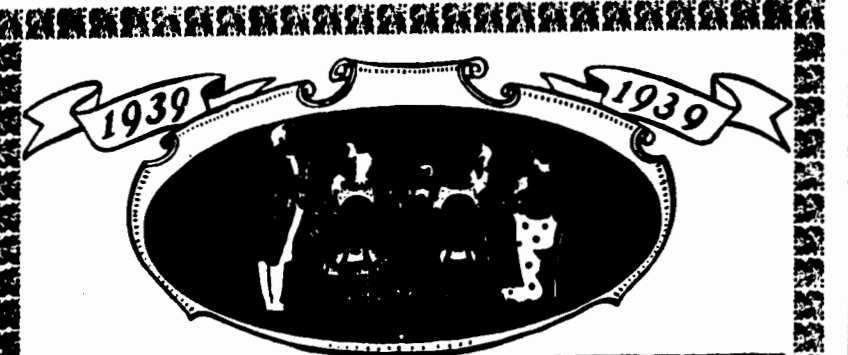

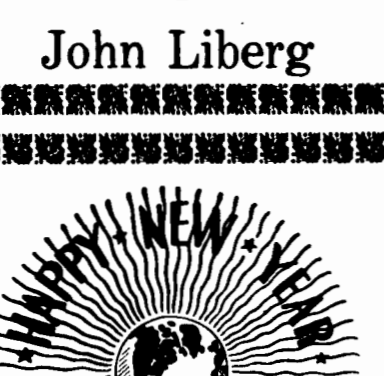

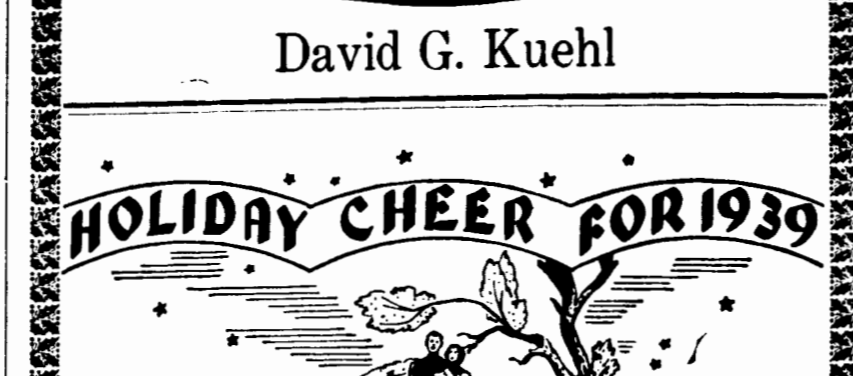

Income Tax Forms Available Jan. 5
The new 1938 federal income tax forms will be available at the Internal Revenue Office in Boise on or about January 5, John R. Viley, collector, announces.

All taxpayers in Idaho who filed federal returns for 1937, will receive the new forms without application. 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United States, insurance companies and mutual investment companies must use Form 1120, regardless of income. No changes have been made in the requirements for individual filers.
