The 1938 value of 12 field crops. be \$49,181,000, compared with \$59,-464,000 in 1937; fruit crops are valued at \$3,590,000 compared with \$2,crops are valued at \$1,054,000 compared with \$1,327,000 in 1937.

The wheat crop, estimated at 29,-848,000 bushels was the largest since 1938 and the third largest on record. Oats production was about the same as in other recent years but the barley crop was the fourth largest on record. The hay crop was the seventh largest produced in the state, but much of it was of poor quality because of rain and weevil damage to first cutting of alfalfa.

The potato crop was the second largest on record, being exceeded only by the 1937 crop. Yields averaged as high as in any other year, due to an sistance measures. Production of alfalfa and clover seeds was below average, particularly of alfalfa seed. The bean crop was considerably smaller than last year, but was the fifth largest produced. The dry pea crop was the smallest recorded since estimates were first made in 1928. The sugar beet crop was the largest ever produced in the state and was the first crop to exceed 1.000.000 tons.

Apple production was about a fifth smaller than in 1937, with higher prices prevailing. In contrast, the quantity of other fruits was greater than in 1937 with growers receiving lower prices than last year. In general, truck crop production was not much different from last year, with onion and green pea prices lower and lettuce prices higher than a year ago.

Unsatisfactory in Canada, and considered unworkable in the United States is the proposal for "Thirty Dollars Every Thursday" for all persons over 50 years of age, living in Idaho, and eligible under provisions of the plan is the proposal suggested for Idaho residents. A copy of the proposal distributed here follows in full:

Section 1. This act shall be known as the "Idaho Life Annuity Compensation Act."

Section 2. There is hereby created the office of Idaho Life Annuity Compensation Act Administrator.

Section 3. The treasurer of the state of Idaho shall be ex-officio such Idaho Life Annuity Compensation Act Administrator.

Section 4. The administrator is hereby charged with full power to supervise and administer this act and all the provisions thereof, and the administrator is further authorized to appoint such deputies and assistants as may be necessary for the administration of this act.

Section 5. The administrator shall cause to be engraved and printed certain numbered warrants of the state of Idaho, which shall be known as "Idaho Life Annuity Compensation Warrants of the State of Idaho;" and he shall cause to be engraved and printed and issued certain revenue stamps which shall be non-interest bearing, self-liquidating, negotiable and transferable without endorsement. Said warrants shall be in the denomination of One Dollar (\$1.00) each, and the total number of warrants issued shall at all times be limited to the requirements of this act. Said warrant redemption stamps shall be in the denomination of two cents each and they shall be issued in quantities ample and sufficient to provide for the warrant redemption requirements of this act as hereinafter provided. Said warrants shall be eight inches in length, and three inches in width. The warrants shall be spaced on the back to indicate serially the proper places for affixing warrant redemption stamps to the end that on the following Thursday after said warrants have been paid out for life annuity compensation, as contemplated by this act, the first stamp shall be due to be fixed and that thereafter one stamp shall be due to be affixed each Thursday until a total of fifty-two stamps shall have been so affixed and said warrants, in the spaces designated for affixing stamps shall set forth the day of the month and the year when each such warrant affixed. The face of each Idaho Life Annuity Compensation Warrant shall be numbered serially and should be set forth in substantially the following language:

"This one dollar Idaho Life Annuity Compensation Warrant will be accepted by the State of Idaho for the payment of any licenses, taxes, fees, royalties, and any and all other classes of debts or obligations of every kind and character due to the state or to any county or city in the state or to any board, district, commission or other political subdivision of the state or of any subdivision of any county or city of the state, provided that at the time this warrant is so offered in payment there shall be afon the back hereof which are prior to such date of tender. Within four weeks after fifty-two, two-cent warrant redemption stamps shall have become due and affixed this warrant will be redeemed by the Idaho Life Annuity Compensation Act Administrator for one dollar lawful money of the United States."

Section 6. Beginning with Thursday following the expiration of 120 days after the adoption of this act, there shall be paid out by the Administrator to each person entitled to said warrants under the provision of this act, Idaho Life Annuity Compensation Warrants in the amount of thirtyone-dollar warrants.

Section 7. The Administrator may n the manner directed for engraving and printing of one-dollar warrants, cause to be engraved and printed and issued Idaho Life Annuity Compensation Warrants necessary to the payment provisions of this act in denominations of five and ten dollars each, and he shall cause to be engraved and printed and issued ample and suffic cient quantities of warrant redeniption stamps of corresponding denominations to wit: Ten-cent stamps for five-dollar warrants and twenty-cent stamps for ten-dollar warrants and said stamps shall be sold and used to redeem all such larger denomination warrants. COST OF PRODUCTION BILL MAJOR ISSUE IN CONGRESS

Secretary of Agriculture Wallace invited to appear before the House Committee on Agriculture recently requested to be heard in executive session, but the request was refused by the Committee, and Wallace appeared in open meeting. His testimony was significant. On the crop control law he said in effect that it would be impossible for the farmer to get parity prices under the present law. The reasons he gave were, (1) because of widespread opposition to processing taxes in the country, in congress, by the president and the secretary of the treasury, and that processing taxes were out. (2) That a large appronriation from the treasury could not be expected without new taxes, and new taxes, in his opinion, were out

for this session..

Under questioning the Secretary said that he saw no other way to secure equality for the farmer other than government fixing of minimum prices, the two-price system and the surplus selling in world markets at world prices. He volunteered the suggestion that if this Committee and the Congress were planning on the sweeping changes in the farm program which are being considered by the Committee (The Cost of Production Bill) the legislation should be made effective in 1940 but enacted in this session of Congress. There was considerable change in the Secretary's attitude since he testified before the Senate Committee a few weeks earlier. Nuggets from her stream beds paid for Idaho's birthright as a state. and her history really dates from that the West and the South the hardy hordes of miners came, seaching for that new El Dorado.

The "rush" is long over. The boom only ghost cities whose crumbling walls we like to think of as still be ing inhabited by the lusty spirits of men who once made those walls ring with the very boisterousness of their living. Weeds are growing over old placer grounds that yielded astonishing riches. Old sluice boxes have tumbled in decay. Knwon free gold bonanzas have been worked out, and we are prone to think of Idaho's gold in the past tense. We tell ourselves that the gold is "all gone."

But is it?

A few years ago John W. Finch. then dean of the Idaho school of mines and now director of the U. S. Bureau of Mines. made the statement that central Idaho contained great potentialities for gold production. In view of the extensive searching and mining that had been carried on in that region for decades, the statement was

eye-opening, to say the least.

However, subsequent activities are bearing out Mr. Finch's contention. If we but pause to look about us we find of comparable production to any time in her history and of much greater

Prior to 1900 few records could be made, but it is estimated that in that period Idaho prospects yielded some 113 millions in gold, or an average of a little over three million annually.

Woman of the Gold Discovery

It has been said, and with probable truth, that women have played a part in every historical event of importance. A Nez Perce squaw is credited with being a principal factor in the discovery of gold in Idaho. Courageous Jane Silcott likely forwarded the development of Idaho by a decade or

Possibly it was Jane Silcott, the daughter of a red chieftain, borne and raised in the Idaho wilderness, who turned the tide of victory in the Civil War since gold from the Clearwater country provided the "sinews" for the Union treasury.

In August, 1860, Captain Ed Pierce, professional gold hunter and adventurer, was trying to make his way into the Clearwater country with a party of six to prospect for the precious yellow metal.

For several years rumors of gold had been coming from the Clearwater, and Pierce was determined to see for himself just what basis there was for these reorts. But his party, after journeying only a few miles into the country, was stopped by a group of armed Nez Perce warriors.

It was their country, so these Indians told Pierce, and white men would not be permitted in it. They ordered him to go back. Pierce made a pretense of obeying, but tried again the following day. Again he was stopped by the Indians. A third attempt a few days later likewise failed, and Pierce was told that if he did not leave the country immediately he would never leave it.

Reluctantly Pierce turned his back and began to retrace his steps down the river. Apparently he was convinced that it would be foolhardy to

carry the attempt farther. How much longer the nuggets of Canal Creek would have lain undiscovered if the prospectors had not halted for the night at Chief Timo-



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

It was in the Nevada Bakery, at the corner of Main and Carbonate in poor condition. streets, that the conflagration got its march along Main street. At the Merchant's Hotel corner the fighters made a desperate attempt to stop it; but leaping tongues of flames, stinging sparks and blinding smoke drove them back. The intense heat blasted thru the night, withering all resistance.

Hurdling the street, the fire roared

its fiery spark-belching way thru the next block . . . and the next. In less than two hours after the first alarm the business district lay in smoking ruins. Of four business blocks only Friedman's store was saved. All that remained of the business firms were two printing offices, a lumber yard. the Alturas Hotel, a couple of livery stables, two stores and a saloon, Losses ran close to half a million dollars, of which about \$150,000 was insured. Hailey is noted today for its Fourth of July fireworks displays, but the 1889 fire holds the record for being the most elaborate and expensive.

Rebuilding, as was true in the case of most burned mining camps, started immediately. Governor Shoup headmiles up the river, experienced a plague of badly singed tramps.

It is noteworthy that within a period of a few weeks Hailey, Seattle, Ellensburg, Wash.; and Bakersfield, Calif., were all destroyed by fire.

The Cayuse had been a member of the band which staged the Whitman

massacre. The priest and his helper had only that day succeeded in getting Dr. Whitman and his assistants

The priest and the half-breed were not fighting men, and they had recently experienced a sickening sight of blood and gore. Doubtless they would have much preferred to be free of the presence of the third member of the party. Doubtless too, he had not asked their permission to travel with them and cared but little for their preferences.

The Cayuse was accompanying the priest and the half-breed for the express purpose of killing another man.

When they were preparing to leave the Mission, Elisa Spalding, ten-year-old daughter of Henry Spalding, and then a prisoner, had asked the half-breed, in whom she thought she could place some trust, to tell her father not to come to the Mission "for the Indians would surely kill him."

Overhearing this, the Cayuse had brutally announced his intention of killing Spalding. He said that he would accompany the priest and the half-breed until they met the missionary, who was expected to return that day from Umatilla. He exhibited to the girl the flint-lock pistal with which he proposed to murder her father.
