In some fields examined Thursday the prevalence of foot-rot was most noticeable, and with the excessive moisture, the fungus is certain to spread.

Skies opened up Thursday at 2:05 o'clock and turned loose a deluge of hail and rain which nearly reached cloudburst proportions. Clouds cleared away in every direction for a few seconds then again turned loose heavy showers which are adding worries to grain and pea growers of the Palouse country. It was reported here at 2:30 that hail fell in the Moscow area and in the Uniontown-Colton territory heavy rain and hail fell before it did at Genesee.

Locally there was no wind accompanying the hail, and while the stones were small, damage is expected to the pea crop, as it is in every stage of growth, from full blossom to seed which has been in the ground but a few days.


Receive Word of Brother's Death







The OPM Priorities Division announced establishment of regional offices throughout the country to advise businessmen on priority problems.

The rationing of rubber was announced to cut down the amount going into civilian consumption in the form of auto tires, inner tubes, boots, garden hose, shoes, and 30,000 other consumer items. The OPM said there is a sufficient supply of rubber on hand but it wished to build a large

OPACS Administrator Henderson announced he intends to hold bread prices "to the absolute minimum reflecting cost increases" and asked bakers to consult with his office beiore raising prices. Mr. Henders also stated rumors of ceiling prices for scrap iron and steel have caused some hoarding and unless this practice stops the OPACS will take "vigorous action." The department of justice announced a federal grand jury in Chicago indicted 69 companies and individuals on charges of fixing prices in the pea canning industry. The department said the indictments were the first in a nation-wide investigation of food marketing and pricing.

The president, in a memorandum to OPM Directors Knudsen and Hillman stated that "industry must take the initiative in opening the doors of employment to all loyal and qualified workers regardless of race, national origin, religion or color Our government cannot countenance continued discrimination in defense produc-

The OPM labor division announced a two-year agreement by the Gulf shipbuilding industry to provide wage increases, a standard base rate of \$1.07 an hour for skilled mechanics; time and a half for overtime; double time on holidays; adjustment of wages at specified periods according to living costs; and no strikes and no lockouts. The OPM had also submitted a similar agreement to 55 Atlantic shipyards. Living Costs

Labor Secretary Perkins reported average hourly earnings in manufacturing industry at a record of 70.8 cents, 7 per cent more than a year ago. The secretary also reported cost of living in large cities rose 0.7 per cent between mid-April and mid-May, making an increase in living costs of moderate-income families of 2.4 per cent since June, 1940, and 4.4 per cent since August, 1939, with food costs more than 5 per cent higher than a year ago and 9 per cent higher than two years ago. 

THE labor unions have made their demands upon the railways of the United States—and through the railways upon the PUBLIC. These demands are vastly larger in proportion than any they have ever made. The economical and efficient operation of the railways is vital to the nation's defense effort. Therefore, the Western Railways present to the public the following facts:

The labor unions representing engineers, firemen, conductors, brakemen and switchmen are demanding a 30 per cent increase in wages, amounting to 190 million dollars a yearalthough their present rates of pay are the highest in history.

Other unions representing a greater number of railway employees are demanding wage increases ranging as high as 95 per centaveraging 47 per cent — and amounting to 580 million dollars a year—although their present rates of pay also are the highest in history.

Thus the wage increases being demanded by the labor unions amount to 770 million dollars a year, an average increase in excess of 41 per cent.

In addition, certain of these labor unions have demanded advances in their pay not included in the above figures, and more rules for the creation of unnecessary jobs.

The situation, then, is this: The total cost of complying with all the demands made would be approximately 900 million dollars a year!

The average weekly earnings of railway employees

are now 15 per cent higher than in the peak year 1929, while the cost of living is 12 per cent less. The demands of the railway labor unions are being

to make a supreme effort for National Defense. The railways cannot meet these demands without a great increase in the cost of transportation. They

"Day after day, just before sunset, with simple dignity befitting the gallentry with which they died for their country, America's finest have been buried at Honolulu. They have been laid to rest on green hills overlooking the sea—there to remain until a peaceful time when the bodies might be returned to their native soil," says a news dispatch from Honolulu.

Among those who have given their lives for the security of their homes, their families and their country, is Howard Arthur Rosenau, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Rosenau of Genesee, first young man of the U. S. armed forces from central Idaho to die for a cause he knew and believed is just. Ninety-one officers and 2,638 enlisted men of the navy and 168 of the army were lost in action during the treacherous Japanese bombings of December 7. During the year ended November 30th, 1940, the Ford Payroll throughout the United States averaged 113,628 hourly wage earners, not including office employes, students, or executives. They were paid \$185,105,639.12. On this basis, the average annual wage was \$1,629.05.

According to the latest available government figures, the annual average wage of all workers in employment covered by old age insurance law was \$841.00.

If the 45,000,000 workers of this country received the same average wage as Ford employes, they would have had additional wages of more than \$35,000,000,000, thus increasing the national income about 50%. Think what such an increase would mean to the workers of this country and to the American farmer, whose prices are based on the national income.

Wage scales in the Ford Rouge plants are divided into three classifications:

Minimum hiring wage . 75c per hour Semi-skilled . . .

Minimum hiring wage . 80c per hour

Minimum hiring wage . 90c per hour Higher wages are in consideration of ability and years of service.

Minimum wage scales for unskilled labor at the Rouge plant are the highest in the industry. Top wages for skilled labor compare favorably with, or are higher than, wages in other automobile plants.

Now some facts on Ford labor conditions:

Not only are sanitation and other health conditions the best in the industry, but Ford also leads in safety devices for the protection of employes. Proof of this is found in the following comparison of compensation insurance costs:

The national average rate in automotive manufacturing plants as computed by the National Association of Underwriters is in excess of \$1.50 premium on each \$100 payroll. The Ford cost of workmen's compensation is less than 50c.

This indicates that the chance of injury in a Ford plant is much less than in the average automobile plant.

The Ford Motor Company has no age limit for labor, and in fact deliberately attempts to keep older workers working. The average age of Ford workers at the Rouge and nearby plants is 38.7.

A recent check-up shows that nearly onehalf the workers at these Ford plants were 40 or over, falling into these age groups:

> 25,819 between 40 and 50 14,731 between 50 and 60

3,377 between 60 and 70

417 between 70 and 80

12 between 80 and 90

In addition to the so-called regular employes, the Ford Motor Company has hired, and now has on the payroll, at the same regular hourly wage, thousands of workers who are blind, crippled or otherwise incapacitated for normal productive work. They are not selected for their ability to build cars or to maintain the plant. They are on the payroll because of Henry Ford's belief that the responsibility of a large company to labor goes beyond the point at which the unfortunate worker can no longer produce profitably.

The above are facts. They are open to anyone who really wants to deal in facts. Anyone who wants to get a job . . . buy a car , , , or place a national defense contract on the basis of fair labor treatment must place Ford at the top


