One-Fifth Farm Land For Grassse, Legumes

(J. M.Rabdau, S. C. S.)

In the Genesee area at least 10,000 acres should be seeded to legumes and grasses in the spring of 1949. This acreage would mean that each farmer plants about one-fifth of his ground to soil-building crops.

For all but the steep land a fiveyear sweet clover and grass rotation will greatly assist in the control of erosion and will increase crop yields. The common five-year rotation has been: First year, sweet clover and grass and peas; second year, sweet clover and grass; third year, winter wheat; fourth year, peas, and fifth year, winter wheat.

More production can be made and the acreage of peas reduced by adopting the four-year rotation: First year, sweet clover and grass and barley; second year, sweet clover and grass; third year, winter wheat, and fourth year, peas.

Making a study of yield trends for following three-year rotation will produce as much crop, if not more, than any of the others. It also will clude peas. It is also a convenient rotation to follow. This rotation is: sweet clover and grass and peas (or barley); second year, sweet clover and grass; third year, winter wheat. From an erosion-control standpoint, the barley makes a better companion crop for sweet clover than peas.

On 5 cent devices, \$500.00 per annum on each device.

On 10 cent devices, \$600.00 per annum on each device.
On 25 cent devices, \$750.00 per

annum on each device.

No license shall be issued for any device of any other denomination. SECTION 5. PAYMENT OF A PORTION OF LICENSE FEES TO THE COUNTY AND STATE:—Of the license fees imposed and collected by this ordinance, the amounts due the State of Idaho and Latah County shall be collected and remitted as pro-

vided by Section 5 of the Local Li-

cense Act.
SECTION 6. APPLICATION FOR ISSUANCE OF LICENSES:—Any person desiring a license to operate such coin operated device shall pre-sent to the City Clerk an application for license, upon a form prepared by the City Clerk with the approval of the Mayor. The questions contained in such form shall be so framed as to elicit all the information required by the Idaho Local License Act. Upon issuing the license, an appropriate stamp provided by the Clerk, with appropriate memorandum thereon. shall be issued by the Clerk, and such stamp by the licensee shall be firmly affixed to the device. The stamp shall then be cancelled by cutting it criss-cross with a sharp instrument.

Joe Hasfurther, who makes no predictions on weather mentioned one method of forecasting. In the early days when the Genesee area of the Padays when the Genesee area of the Palouse country had numbers of small white owls, a severe winter could be foretold by their foresight in laying in ample food supplies. The owls, if a cold winter was in prospect, would catch field mice by the thousands and hang them on thorn bushes or on the top wire of a barbed wire fence. Might be well now to check barbed wire fences and thornbushes and if the mice are gone, it's an early

#### Few Wheat Fields Affected **Bv Stubble Or Dwarf Smut**

Prevalence of stubble or dwarf smut has been noticed in some wheat fields, according to Wm. C. Moore who was advised of the infestation by agronomy specialists of the University of Idaho. Examining wheat stands on his ranch north of Genesee, Mr. Moore noticed an unusual number of wheat plants which had headed out short in comparison with other plants. The heads, somewhat stunted, attracted attention by their non-conformnity with heads on plants which attained normal growth. The "stunted" plants suggested possibility of a mixed variety of wheat, but closer examination of the kernels of the affected heads revealed a smut condition.

Agronomists have advised that stubble or dwarf smut is wind-borne, and may be carried great distances. Infestations in the Spangle area have been reported, and in a less degree stubble or dwarf smut has been found in the Prairie region.

Wheat plants affected have a tendency to stool excessively and attains fly to center, but there had to be a an average growth of about 8 inches. It is said the smut spores remain in the soil for several years and cannot be eradicated by any treatment of the seed as with ordinary smut. Varieties of wheat withstanding infestation to date are Rex and Hymar. Spring varieties have not reached the stage where stubble or dwarf smut is no-

## Killing Frost Hits Area Crops May Be Damaged Damage to growing crops in the Genesee area could not be determined

Thursday after the heavy frost of Wednesday night and Thursday morning. Temperatures varying from 29 to 26 degrees above zero were reported here. First to show effects of the freezing temperature was gardens, where potatoes, corn, beans and vine plants were hard hit. The frost extended over a wide area and touched higher spots as well as the lower lands. A thin coating of ice was reported as forming in metal containers.

There are unconfirmed reports of frost damage to field peas, but an estimate of damage could not be ascertained Thursday. Well-developed pods taken from pea vines in gardens defintely showed effects of frost.

some damage to peas. Frank Densow, who was at Nezperce Wednesday said frost damage to field peas was noticeable in that area. Wm. C .Moore who lives north of Genesee said ice formed in a pail of water at his place

Clouded skies, which promised rain
Wednesday, cleared that night, and
by 12 midnight there was not a cloud to be seen. Cold weather prevailed over the entire Pacific Northwest and snow fell in some of the higher areas Wednesday night.

#### Dry Weather Continues

Cooler weather of the past ten days has brought relief to growing crops but there has not been sufficient rain to relieve the dry condition which exists. Field peas where not entering maturity stage have benefited by the cooler weather which permits blooms to continue setting on in many of the fields. Peas south and southeast of Genesee where the crop is fair to good, are beyond help from rain, but spring wheat and barley could be greatly benefited. Fall grain also needs moisture.

#### Invasion Of Hoppers

Grasshoppers are reported to have invaded a pea field on the J. P. Herman ranch east of Genesee, and are causing considerable damage. Efforts were being made to obtain poison to halt the hopper invasion. Peas and some garden vegetables are about the only things which hoppers might attack unless lack of green crops such as alfalfa causes the pests to attack spring grain.

## RAID ON RECLAMATION FUNDS REVEALED

#### \$993,307,000 FOR 17 STATES

Library of Congress tabulation shows that total government appropriations for building reclamation projects in the 17 western-reclamation states amounted to \$993,307,000 during the entire 11 year period from 1939 through 1949.

\$738,000,000 FOR <u>ONE</u> STATE

Arizona is making Congressional bid for one irrigation project costing a minimum of \$738,000,000 for initial development only. Additional tunnels and dams would raise total project cost to an estimated \$1,500,000,000.



Backers of western reclamation development have expressed grave concern over possible fate of numerous state programs if Arizona's request for a huge irrigation project should be granted. They point out that this proposal gives Arizona the lion's share of all available funds. To meet such a threat, a fight is being waged behind the scenes in Congress over Senate Bill 75 and House Resolution 934. These are the controversial bills calling for the largest reclamation appropriation ever made to a single state. The reclamation states involved Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New

It seems inconceivable to us that a coercive strike should occur on one of the nation's major transportation systems, with all of the losses and hardships that would follow, in view of the fact that the Railway Labor Act provides an orderly, efficient and complete remedy for the fair and just settlement of the matters in dispute. Grievances of the character here under discussion are so numerous and of such frequent occurrence on all railroads that the general adoption of the policy pursued by the organizations in this case would soon result in the complete nullification of the Railway Labor

Perhaps the most disturbing consideration, as one watches the increasing conflict between capitalism and socialism in the world, is the fact that where socialism wins the action cannot be recalled.

For instance, in a democratic country such as the United States, private ownership is always on the uneasy seat. Election after election can be ordered on the same issue say, on government ownership of power. Private ownership may win overwhelmingly today, yet tomorrow it faces the effort all over again. But public ownership if it wins just once is for practical purposes secure, not because it necessarily is more efficient but because it buries its mistakes under government funds and meanwhile the capital, enterprise and know-how for private investment

and operation have been dissipated Suppose, for example, that the private power companies of the Pacific Northwest were all taken over by he government's power pool, who could or would reourchase them on a private enterprise basis under any cir-


