

Television Gets Better High Antennae

Reception is improving in the Genesee area, since dealers and in which sets have been in use are making use of higher antennae. Hills between Genesee and Moscow, such as Moscow Mountain, Steptoe Butte, are said to be a barrier for some locations in part of the Inland Empire, and situate the high antennae, such as those erected by Helbling Bros., the Robinson Cash Hardware, and more recently Jim Helbling, placed an aerial rigging atop the Elmer Vanouck place, located near the public school and at the top of the hill. Television dealers, locally, believe reception will gradually become better as the station now operating in Spokane, KIQ, adds more power and sets the networks. Some talk is also that television should be made to be better when the second station, KXLY, goes into operation.

Constructive Action Needed In Tax Plans

Some constructive and sound thinking should result from the protestations of taxpayers of certain parts of Latah county, but only confusion will prevail while tempers flare, and a few attempt to seize the opportunity of gaining a prominent position politically. The latter phase of the current county argument became noticeable before the general election, which effort could have been wisely devoted to organization and presentation of protest to the Idaho Tax Commission on valuations for assessment. Clearwater county timberland owners have filed their protests with the Tax Commission, and as a result there will be a hearing this month.

Latah county voters who favored the Tax Commission amendment in 1946, provided a mandate for the county commissioners to enter the State Tax Commission program for re-evaluating property for taxation. The survey cost Latah county a large sum. However, the information obtained, provided statistics on which to compute values. Latah county, to date, is one of 21 counties in the state which has adopted the Tax Commission program. The program was expected to be ready for use by the assessor's office two years ago, then it was assumed it would be ready a year ago, and finally, with time limited, it was placed in use for 1952 assessments in Latah county.

Recall of the county assessor, as threatened by some, is not the solution, as pointed out by the county commissioners. It will be remembered that many now indignant, failed to show complaint while the board of equalization was in session. Now is the time to gather information on assessments; protest, for presentation to the Tax Commission, asking for a hearing, and thereby providing constructive criticism.

New Tax Law Faulty
Idaho's new method of establishing values for taxation is not without faults, nor could it be expected to be. In Benewah county taxpayers made their protests heard in time for the assessor there to revert to values of the previous year. In Latah county much time can be wasted if those protesting do not make their protest heard before the State Tax Commission.

In a recent dispatch, coming from Boise, with credit to Tom Aden, and appearing in the Lewiston Tribune, one change proposed by Sen. K. C. Barlow, republican of Cassia county, is: The tax commission "should be shrunk to proper size" and that several tax amendments should be passed.

Some differ with the above paragraph, and contend the Tax Commission should be enabled to offer salaries that would attract men proficient in establishing equitable values.

Peterson, probate judge, on the request of Mrs. Maxine Simmons, Moscow, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Haynes, who died from injuries when the truck and car in which the parents and Mrs. Simmons were riding collided at the intersection west of Genesee on Highway No. 95. Mrs. Simmons declined to testify against Klemm. Her parents resided at Pullman and were traveling from Lewiston to Moscow. The truck was traveling from the Klemm ranch to Genesee and was just beginning to make the turn west at the intersection when the fatal accident occurred.

Second Giant Generator Placed "On Line" Adds More Badly-Needed "Reddy" Kilowatts to Forces Fighting Power Shortage

Important new reinforcements of electric power have just been made available by the Washington Water Power Company, to help overcome the present serious power shortage in this area. Working night and day, Company engineers and crewmen have completed installation of a second 50,000-kilowatt generator at Cabinet Gorge. Together with power from the first generator, which was placed "on the line" in September, this makes over 100,000 kilowatts of additional generating capacity for inland Empire homes, farms, and industries.

Work on the installation of a third generator is under way, and the fourth is scheduled in the near future. Each is rated at 50,000 kilowatts capacity, but it is expected that total power placed at Cabinet Gorge will exceed 200,000 kilowatts when all four are in operation.

"So Far, Yet So Near" Story Putting Genesee On The Map
Coach Harold Hammond and his Genesee high school Bulldogs, have been receiving a lot of attention, especially since Jack Hewins, Associated Press sports writer of Seattle, sent to a number of papers his story about Genesee, Idaho, and Metlakatla, Alaska. While Hewins apparently failed to get Hammond's statement straight, he did Genesee no damage, and besides it's refreshing reading. Hewins helped put Genesee on the basketball map. The story in the Lewiston Tribune the other morning.

The News has received two clippings from Seattle, one from Elmer Huse, and one from Lowell Mason, 1011 S. W. 106th St., Seattle 66, Mason formerly lived in Lewiston and recalls the keen rivalry between Kendrick and Genesee. Einar Husby, who operates the Swissman Cheese Mart, Rt. 2, Box 730, Tacoma, Wash., and two Genesee football coaches, and a good one wrote that he took the clipping about Hammond and his Bulldogs from the Seattle Times. He also wrote "Reading it brought back many pleasant memories. I have often wondered what happened to the students and faculty which I visited there. Where is Gerald now? I have also wondered many times what happened to some of the other students. Lloyd Hufschur, Scharnhorst, Thesen, Burr, Herman and the others. I am interested about Ben Cook and Dan. If you could write to fill me in on the details, I would appreciate hearing from you."

The Hewins Story
Following is Jack Hewins comment on basketball at Genesee:
I can hardly expect a town as small as Metlakatla, Alaska, to have anything in common with the large village of Genesee, Idaho, but winter times they have a common interest.

Metlakatla, which is a high place on Clatsop Strait, fishes all summer and spends the winter playing basketball. Genesee, a not very wide spot on Highway 95, spends the summer on peas so it can get a chance on basketball business.

Two towns aren't unusual in their standing examples of how basketball can take over a community.
Everybody Gets In
Metlakatla, which has no high school, has a schedule of basketball games. The Metlakatla teams play in regular games, but since the boys never seen his shadow so now we have spring.

Genesee centers its interest on the high school club, which hasn't

finished lower than fourth in the state for the past three years and won the Idaho B title in 1951.
Gary Hammond, the Genesee coach, apologizes for his team's recent record. "We're rebuilding," he says. "The team is mostly sophomores and juniors."
"Hammond's rookies had won eight and lost four at last count, the latest being a three-point loss to Rogers of Spokane. They've beaten Central Valley and handled Endicott, one of Big Five in the Washington high school Class B poll, its only defeat of the season."

Small School, Big Squad
Genesee high has 90 pupils and is typical of a small-town school that is being run by the basketball bug. Hammond's squad numbers 35—bigger than the rosters carried by most of the large schools—and he never cuts a boy from the list as long as he keeps trying. "The tallest player is 6 feet 2."
Metlakatla's long way from Genesee to Metlakatla is a long one, but they're neighbors in athletic interest."



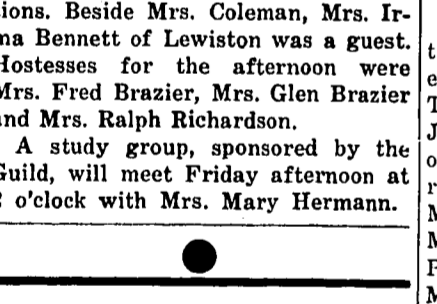

Washington, D. C.—American parents are steering their youngsters right into the juvenile courts with "too much love and kisses, too much love and security," according to an eminent child specialist.

Dr. Joseph Palma, pediatrician with the Straub Clinic of Honolulu, says he's fed up with "all this talk of love and security." It's about time that American mothers and fathers went back to the old-fashioned stick and a bit of reproof and rebuke, he adds.

"America would be a safer, happier, and healthier place if we would stop mollycoddling our children."

Sounding off in the current issue of "Life and Health," a national health journal published here, the doctor charges that parents, led by modern psychologists, are making delinquents of their children with soft-pedaled restraint and discipline.

"A measure of a child's maturity," Dr. Palma says, "is the way he handles the time interval between his demands ('I want') and his satisfactions ('I get')."

Parents must show disapproval of antisocial actions. Reproof and rebuke must be as freely given as love and kisses. There are useful fears and useful inhibitions. And the rights of others must be repeated," Dr. Palma points out.

Dr. Palma puts some of the blame on modern psychologists for today's breakdown of parental discipline. They find it easy to play on "the child wish of parents that their children have a better breed in life than they had," he says.

For some time we have been wondering when a crusade would begin to "start pounding the kids again." We also are speculating if some kids are not wondering when the parents quit "laying the strap on."

Now that we are at the age of grandparents (age that is) we can't see this old world flying apart by the way the youngsters act. Not long ago, a fellow, like the writer, who devoted a bit of his younger days to "counsel in the woodshed," said the children of today seem to be doing alright in spite of their parents, and we looked knowingly at each other. This brief discussion does not apply to mothers, but fathers only.

Young men and women of today have broken practically every record in the books, placed by their parents, and this includes records for almost everything. Take them out to the woodshed if you have to but put the blame on Doc Palma, if you become so possessed, not on us.

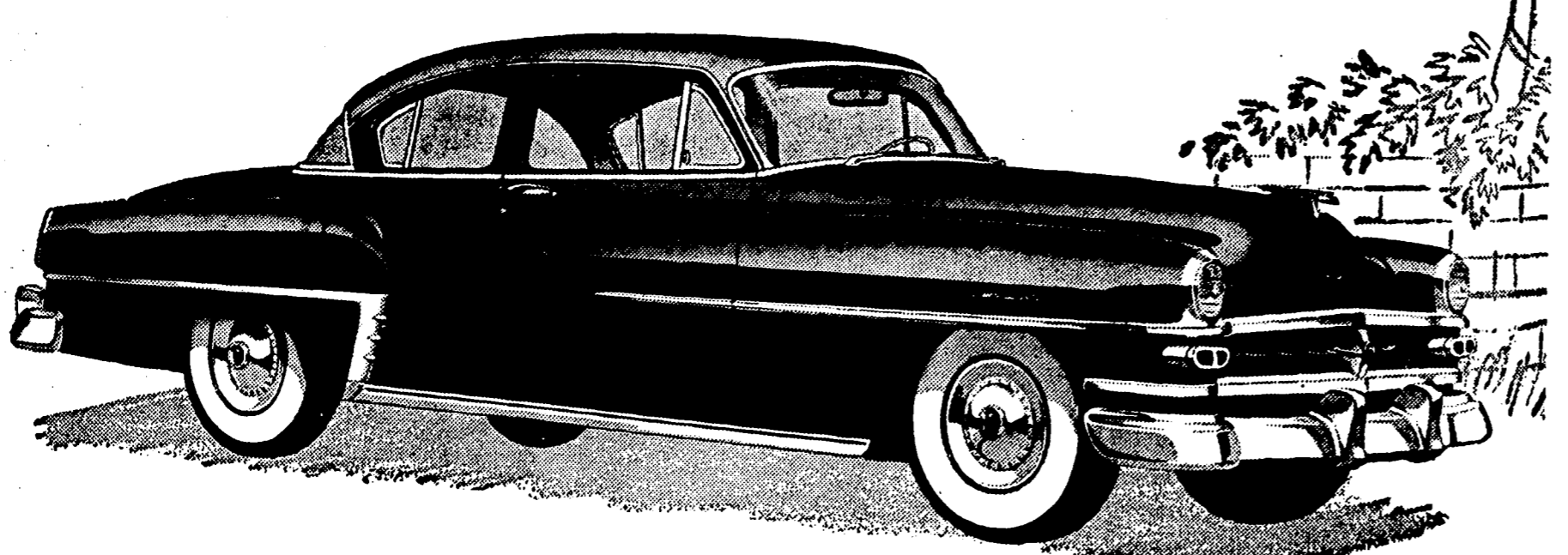

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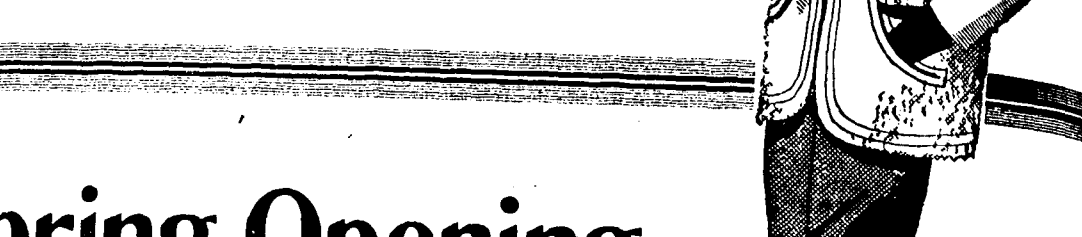

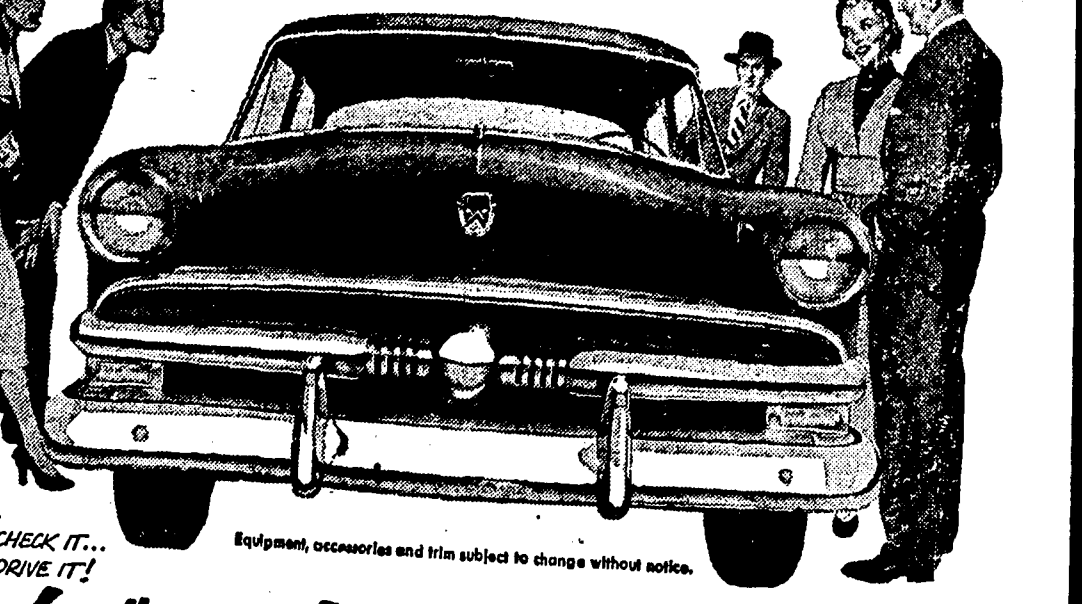

Jacobsen, John Tetlie, August Halverson, Knut Larson, Detlef Smith, Tunnes Muller, Hans Smith, Hans Tvedt and Knud Bergquam. On March 17, 1878, the Rev. Emil Christenson conducted the first service, and on March 18, 1878 the Synod Church constitution was officially adopted and signed by 32 members. The name of the congregation was "Vor Frelsers Menighet, Nez Perce County, Idaho."

In this park area are acres of pines, fir, cedar and other native trees and shrubbery. Here a great variety of wild flowers, including rare orchids, bloom in their season. Wild animals and birds abound. This spot affords recreation for the body and for the spirit. Lovely now, it will be priceless when other Idaho forests have been cut down. As a winter sports resort there are unlimited possibilities. Senator Costley is reported as saying, "This area provides nothing as a tourist attraction."

Senator Gaffney mentions that the park would take land away from Benewah's tax rolls. It will take away not quite \$178 per year in taxes. Can Benewah county stand this? Latah legislators seem to think their county is able to stand a somewhat higher tax loss. California has 90 state parks; Oregon has 149. Idaho has one state park. Here is where we are poor! All Roads Lead to Rome "All roads lead to Rome" but what if we start from Rome? Senator Gaffney reportedly said, he was sure a sign would be erected calling it to the attention of tourists and that after they drove through it they would be in Washington. That sign has been erected already—not one, but many signs. However, there are signs at the Washington end too; so it follows, that tourists entering from the Washington side must end up in Idaho. Good reasoning, Senator Gaffney? Dedicate?—Meditate! Senator Gaffney reportedly said that the state could find an Idaho woman if it wanted to dedicate a park to a pioneer. Why be so narrow, Mr. Gaffney? Virgil McCroskey would dedicate this area to all "pioneer women of the Inland Empire."

A Rose By Any Other Name I must guess that Mr. Gaffney's objection is to the naming of the park, "Mary Minerva McCroskey," in honor of the donor's mother, a Washington woman. Truly, Idaho has many worthy pioneer women, my mother is one of

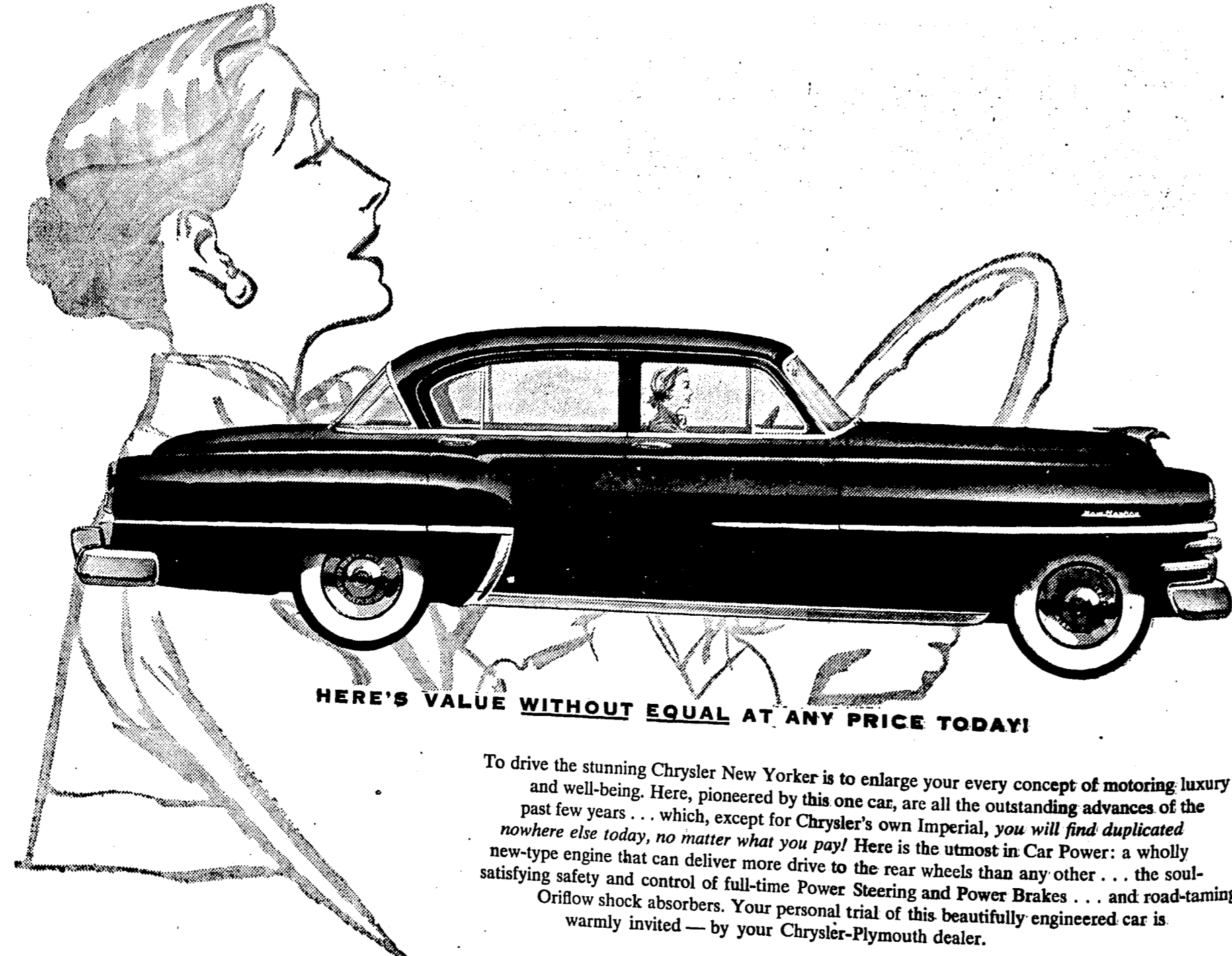

Many years ago an agreement was entered into whereby the church would donate land for the "Synod" church if Detlef Smith would donate land for a school and a parsonage.

In 1884 it was decided to buy 40 acres of land and the building erected by the United Lutheran Church in 1885, was built by John Halie, son-in-law of Knut Larson.

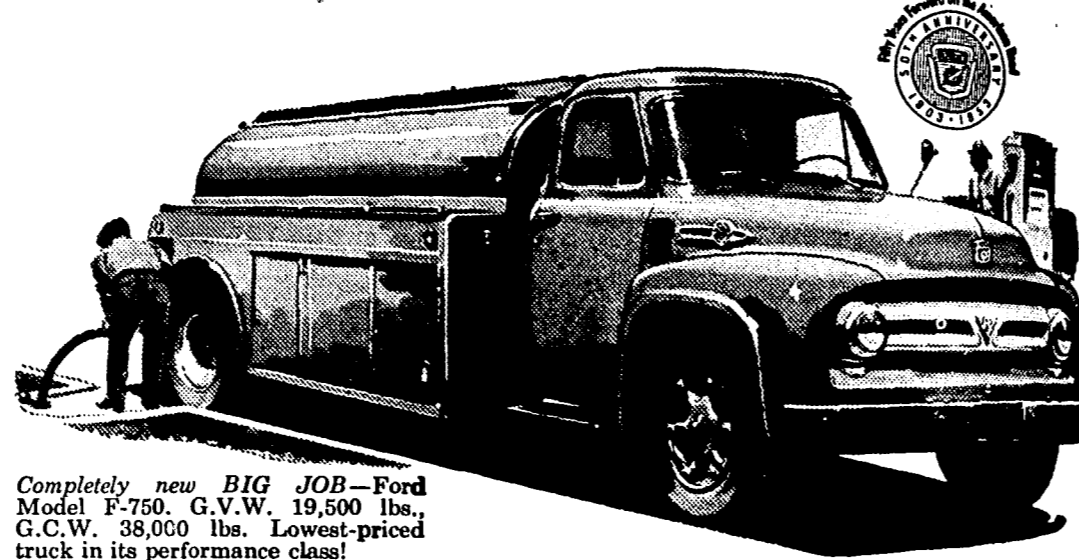
Mr. Larson also donated land for this church, and somewhere along the line about three acres were purchased at a cost of \$20 per acre.

The present church was built in 1911 by Gullack Grave. In 1923 the beautiful stand of evergreens was planted by Ben Sather, deceased.

Many years ago an agreement was entered into whereby the church would donate land for the "Synod" church if Detlef Smith would donate land for a school and a parsonage.

Go on back farther the minutes disclose that land for the first church, built of logs in 1878, was donated by Knut Larson, who owned what is now the Leo Ernst place.

Farmers Getting Eager To Start Spring Work

Eagerness is now evident in the Genesee area for weather to become more settled that spring work may start. During the last half of March a few were able to get on land for spreading fertilizer and harrowing, but intermittent rain and snow showers have left too many wet spots to hold up equipment. March may well go into the book as the most severe month of the winter of 1952-53, and a touch of winter hung on into the first week of April. March brought the heaviest fall of snow, about six inches in one brief fall, but it quickly disappeared. The warmer period of the "Palouse country" always returns after the past winter, undoubtedly the mildest on white men's records, so they can tell their grandfathers that they were not kidding. What promised to be an early spring may still hold east for north-east Idaho and eastern Washington, despite weather which turns cold and warm every 24 hours. Canyon pastures started early to become green, but the heavy rain of the past week has been no appreciable growth of grass, owing to the chilly nights and cool daytime breeze. Dandelions are coming up, but they give lawn grass a chance to compete. Spring work in the Genesee farming area will be more extensive than in former years, due chiefly to the extremely dry fall of 1952, and following a season of exceptionally large crops. Many farmers are planting corn, wheat, and other crops, and are planning to plant alfalfa and other crops. New Cattle Herds Found In Beef Herds Within State

A new cattle herd has been found in Idaho beef herds, according to Dr. A. P. Schneider, state veterinarian. This information has been passed on in a bulletin issued by the Idaho Cattlemen's association. Leptospirosis or "Lepto" is a disease that was first found in the eastern United States about 1948. The disease has been found and confirmed at Emmett, Homedale, Horseshoe Bend, Kamiah, Weiser and Moscow, as of now. The symptoms, and read this carefully, are sudden sickness, lack of appetite, dehydration, general shock, rapid pulse, rapid and labored breathing, depression. Red coloring of the urine and jaundice or yellow coloring of the skin may or may not appear. Course of disease is about ten days. Temperature, 104-107 degrees. Death rate so far, not high. Milk cows show sudden cessation of milk flow. Pregnant cows may abort. The disease is one of the main symptoms in Idaho cases, and blood tests will show whether abortions are due to Lepto or Bangs disease. Assistance for blood testing suspicious animals may be directed to your local veterinarian or to the State Veterinarian, State House, Boise.

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Cost of State Government \$118,509,351 For Two Years

Idaho's state government will be a \$118,509,351 business in the two years beginning July 1. A compilation by the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho shows that \$49,439,726 was appropriated from the general fund for the 1953 legislature. Another \$69,069,625 was made available from other funds, including federal matching money, special taxes whose revenue is earmarked for special purposes, sale of produce and commodities, interest from endowment investments and other local income.

The legislature appropriates for expenditures from the special funds but doesn't transfer the earmarked money from one purpose to another. Nearly \$97,000,000 of the state's expenditures will go for highways, education and public welfare. Another \$3,516,640 will be for public health and \$2,701,170 for fish and game management.

The state highway department will have \$37,715,625 to spend on the highways of the state. None of the money comes from the general fund. It all comes from gasoline taxes, motor vehicle registrations and federal matching funds.

The public assistance load for the next two years will be \$21,616,012, of which \$10,096,832 was appropriated from the general fund and \$11,520,180 will come from the federal government and from Idaho counties. The state hospitals at Orofino and Blackfoot and the Nampa state school will have more than \$4,000,000 available in the next biennium, most of it from the general fund.

The state will put up \$14,751,404 as its share of the public school minimum education program in the next two years—\$12,000,000 from the general fund, \$2,000,000 earnings from the endowment fund, and \$751,404 surplus from the current biennium. The University of Idaho will have \$5,866,945 available, plus an additional \$1,544,548 for agriculture research, \$1,209,249 for agriculture extension, and \$258,250 for other research. Idaho State College will have \$2,620,000 available and \$2,880,026 was appropriated for teachers' retirement.

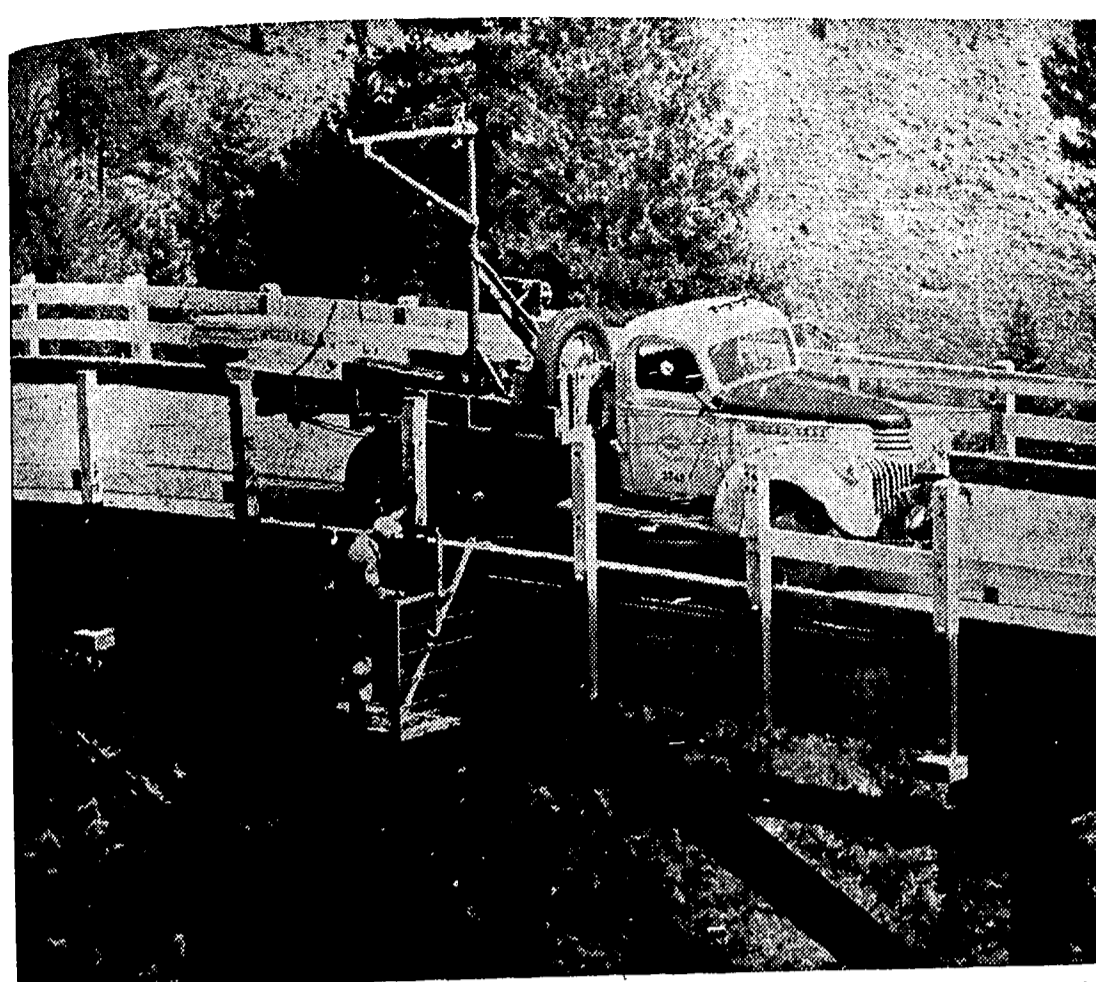

The tale of Mrs. Hauss' \$100 and how it grew is one of the many colorful Ford stories that will be recalled by automobile men during the observance this year of Ford Motor Company's 50th anniversary. Prominent Americans from all walks of life will join with Henry Ford II, president of the company, and his employees in marking the anniversary at the Rouge headquarters in Dearborn, Michigan, and at manufacturing and assembly plants and sales offices all over the world.

Old timers also will remember the day in 1914 when Henry Ford promised to return between \$40 and \$60 to each customer who bought one of his cars during the next 12 months if sales in that period topped 300,000. A total of 308,213 Fords were sold. Fifteen and a half millions of dollars in \$50 checks promptly went into the mail.

It was also in 1914 that Henry Ford rocked the financial world with his Five Dollar Day. The prevailing wage scale for factory workers at the time was \$2.34 for a nine-hour day. When Ford announced that he would pay a minimum of \$5 for an eight-hour day, bankers and businessmen thought he had lost his mind.

Ford contended, however, that higher wages would mean better business for the employer. Time proved that he was right. Cowboys, sailors and lumberjacks showed up in Detroit, looking for work at the Ford plant. When Ford employees went downtown on Saturday nights, they wore their company identification badges proudly on the lapels of their best suits.

Again in 1914 Ford shattered another precedent in labor relations. He gave the C. I. O. automotive workers union its first closed shop and check-off of dues.

In 1908, when Ford Motor Company opened for business in a barn-like building on Mack Avenue in Detroit, the automobile was an expensive plaything of a few wealthy families. Henry Ford decided to make a car that anyone could buy and keep in repair, a car designed for rough roads and hard work as well as for Sunday driving. This was the rugged and simple Model T.

Once Ford was asked by his engineers how much space should be left between the Model T's front and back seats.

"There should be enough room for a farmer's milk cans," he said.



This strange car helped set the automobile industry free. Henry Ford built it in 1907 from early French patents and used it in winning the famous Selden patent suit. Ford alone among early automakers fought Selden's monopolistic grip on the infant industry.

Ford was able to keep down the price of the Model T because of his assembly line, which lowered the time required to put together a car from 14 hours to 93 minutes.

When the assembly line revolutionized the automobile industry, it also changed the face of America and gave the people a new way of life. In 1910, there were 6,771,000 passenger cars in the United States. In 1920, there were no less than 23,121,000 and one-third of them were Fords. In the years between 1917 and 1927 one-half of all the cars manufactured in America were Fords.

On one working day in 1925, Ford turned out 9,109 cars, or one Ford every ten seconds. More than fifteen million Model Ts were produced in the 18 years that the model was manufactured.

Henry Ford predicted early in the century the automobile would give the country good roads, making it easier for the farmer to bring his crops to market and making it possible for the factory worker to live comfortably away from the smoke of the factory.

His prediction came true sooner than anybody expected. By 1927, the roads were so good that the heavy-duty, high-riding Model T became outmoded. Ford then brought out his famous Model A, with a standard gear shift transmission.

the aviation industry. In 1938, after the Model A had been discarded in favor of the Ford V-8, the company entered the medium-priced field with the Mercury. In the old American tradition, Ford Motor Company is still owned and operated by its founder's family. Henry Ford in his lifetime turned down several offers to put his business on the stock market. His son, Edsel, was president of the company from 1919 until his death in 1943. Henry Ford then reassumed the presidency, finally stepping down in favor of his grandson, Henry Ford II, on September 21, 1945.

Henry Ford died on April 7, 1947, at the age of 83. He was active to his last day. A simple and hard working man, who liked square dancing and practical jokes, he was one of the few Americans who became famous and successful without leaving home town. He died at his estate, Dearborn, only a mile from the house where he was born and married. His tremendous manufacturing plant at the Rouge, the largest in the world, was in his home town.

After their grandfather's death, Edsel Ford's two younger sons, Edsel and William Clay Ford, followed their brother into positions of responsibility in the management of the company. Benson is vice president, general manager of the Lincoln-Mercury division and William is manager of special products operations. Observers in the business world not only envy Henry Ford II when he is in the limelight but also respect him. Continued on Page Five

IHC Truck Prices Go Down Average About 6.7 Percent
Jim Hebling of Hebling Bros., local International motor truck dealer, announces a substantial reduction in retail prices of his new R-Line light, medium, and light-heavy duty truck models. The price reductions, according to Hebling, cover the company's model series, ranging from its smallest pickup trucks through those of the 19,000-pound rated capacity. The downward price adjustments range from 3.5 per cent on the R-180 series to 16.6 per cent on the R-120 pickup models. They range from a minimum of \$87 to a maximum of \$152 on former list prices. The overall price reduction in these weight categories amounts to about 6.7 per cent. In a statement accompanying the price reduction announcement, it was said: "Since the end of World War II we have centered an increasing share of our engineering and production efforts on the job of building the kind of high performance, high efficiency vehicles which this market demands. We have been increasing our share of participation in the light through light-heavy duty truck markets in 1953, but we still want more. In appraising our truck manufacturing operations for the remainder of this year, and even farther into the future, our considerations led us to the natural economic advantages for our customers and our truck plant employees to be gained from possible price reductions in those categories of trucks. We decided to take the bold step of planning increased production at our Springfield, Ohio, plant and other Harvester plants, where these lighter trucks and components are built. "This will have the beneficial effect of helping our customers with a better price on a better quality truck and our employees with better employment opportunities."

 Over the leadership of the company after V-J Day. The plant at the Rouge had reconvered to peacetime production in record time and had turned out America's first postwar pleasure car. But the company had many serious problems.

During the depression of the 1930's Ford had lost its position at the head of the industry. The company's operating procedure, with control centered in a few hands, was so outmoded as the Model T Plant facilities were inadequate and working conditions need improvement. The sales staff had disintegrated during the war and needed rebuilding from the bottom up. The young Henry Ford tackled the job of building an automobile company all over again. He brought new blood into executive positions, and completely reorganized every branch under a decentralization policy. Each division and each plant in the big company was given new authority and responsibility that was unknown under the old regime.

He established plant newspaper and management meetings to keep hourly workers and executives alike informed about the company's policies, problems and progress. Among other things, he abolished his grand-father's famed no-smoking rule. The Rouge, with 60,000 workers, was modernized and expanded and new manufacturing and assembly plants were built in other sections of the country. Ford's business boomed in the postwar market and it is now moving steadily back to its old leadership in the industry.

"If I were starting as a young man today," one of the leading American automobile executives said recently, "I'd try to get a job at Ford. That company is a brand new one."

Henry Ford II says his organization has made as much progress in improving manufacturing techniques in the last five years as it did in the early days of the assembly line method of mass production.

"We expect the revolution in Ford products to be as revolutionary in the coming 50 years as they have been in the past," he adds. "And we expect the social and economic progress of America to be as great."

CITY DUMPING GROUND MAY BE CLOSED

It seems to be more than a rumor that the dumping ground, usually known as the "City Dump" may be closed unless the citizens of this community use considerably more care in the selection of the refuse which they dump as well as the manner in which they dump it. It is my understanding that any burnable materials are not to be disposed of in the dump such as magazines, newspapers, paper boxes, brush, etc., which can be disposed of easily in one's own back yard. I have seen rotten potatoes, dead animals, etc., placed there—a definite health menace, and unlawful. With this continuing, what are we going to do with the rat menace which now prevails in sections of this community?

I believe our city dump is not a necessity but a privilege to which we have access. It is private property and has been furnished by the owner providing we do not abuse it. I can see why the owner would like to discontinue the dump when one observes the papers that have blown over nearby fields and the careless manner in which we have dumped our refuse near the road to save a few steps rather than carry a few loads to the proper place for dumping. I, as a citizen of this community think that we should give careful thought regarding upkeep and financial "outgo" to maintain this dump, especially in the way it is now being abused. We are not all to blame perhaps, but it is time we stop to think what we will do with our tin cans if the dump is closed permanently. This dump has been of great service to the community, to be used at any time of the day or week. Perhaps we may lose this "any time of the day disposal" and be required to observe regular dumping time as, say, one-half a day a week under supervision. This would be an inconvenience as well as an expense to the taxpayer.

Suppose we try to observe the regulations set up for the dump and see if it will add a little to the care of it. The appearance of a dump near the highway, at its best, will not be a pleasing sight.

Barberry Eradication Urged

New Rust Races May Develop

Continued from Page One

Such as the Race 15-B described above. We all know that new wheats, new rices, new strawberries, new corns, and nearly any cultivated plant—are produced by hybridization, either naturally, or more usually artificially by man, using known parents. There is abundant field evidence that new races of stem rust have thus been created naturally and, indeed, new races have been identified and produced under controlled conditions by man many times at the federal laboratory at the University of Minnesota; at the Dominion Laboratory of plant pathology at Winnipeg, Manitoba, and elsewhere. Naturally, these scientific demonstrations were produced under controlled conditions so as to avoid all possibility of the escape of these new synthetically produced races of stem rust, which have been identified from the Inland Empire. Eight of these races have never been found elsewhere in the country and are being kept in the laboratory at the University of Idaho. The fact that none of these has so far been as virulent as the Race 15-B is a matter of just plain sheer luck. There is such a thing as a rust which, by its very nature, is destined to be eradicated. It would seem to indicate to us that we should complete with all possible haste this task of eradicating the barberry bushes from the entire Inland Empire region. Stem rust is no respecter of state lines and the nuisance which it causes is a constant threat to wheat production in adjacent areas of another state. Only the necessary wheat importation from the United States is a matter of a few weeks. It is a matter of a few weeks that a devastating epidemic of wheat stem rust is possible.

What evidence do we have that new races of wheat stem rust have been produced in the Inland Empire? During the last six years, hundreds of collections of stem rust of wheat have been sent from the Inland Empire to the federal laboratory at the University of Idaho. The fact that none of these has so far been as virulent as the Race 15-B is a matter of just plain sheer luck. There is such a thing as a rust which, by its very nature, is destined to be eradicated. It would seem to indicate to us that we should complete with all possible haste this task of eradicating the barberry bushes from the entire Inland Empire region. Stem rust is no respecter of state lines and the nuisance which it causes is a constant threat to wheat production in adjacent areas of another state. ideal setup was provided for a stem rust epidemic, except that by 1948 probably most of the barberry bushes had been eradicated in that area.

In that area, however, isolated, severe outbreaks of stem rust were discovered near barberry bushes in adjacent areas of Idaho. By the time the rust had spread into the grain fields of Washington, the weather later in the season was dry enough to hold it in check, with the result that only scattered areas became heavily attacked.

If proper weather conditions had persisted a couple of weeks longer in 1948, the rust would have spread from the fields of Washington, probably into nearby fields with resultant heavy damage. If the barberries over a large area of eastern Washington had not been eradicated, there is no doubt whatever but that the summer of 1948 would have seen tremendous wheat losses, probably considerably more than any ever experienced before in the Inland Empire. As it was, the wheat fields of the Palouse country of Washington barely avoided a heavy stem rust infestation which largely developed in the adjacent areas of Idaho and perhaps also Oregon, not conducting barberry eradication.

This again points up the fact that for maximum protection to wheat farmers of the entire Inland Empire of all three states it is necessary that the barberry bushes be eradicated from the Inland Empire region of all three states.

Tri-state cooperation is the answer. Tri-state cooperation on the matter not only would be of mutual benefits and insurance for Inland Empire grain farmers, but would be of great national value in helping with the tremendously complicated over-all problem of stem rust control. In fact, the stem rust problem is one calling for cooperation not only on the state level, but, in fact, national and even international in scope.

With the present barberry situation in the Inland Empire of the three-state grain area, the accusation is justified that this area is "maintaining a nuisance," that is, a threat to the general welfare of the country. It does not help much, if any, that this accusation is shared by some of the lesser wheat-growing areas in the eastern states where barberries still have not been eradicated. We are not thus excused from cleaning up our own Inland Empire which, at least as a grain-growing area, has no peer.

Unquestionably barberry eradication has paid big dividends in the state of Washington. In wet years like 1937, 1938 and 1943, previous to the barberry eradication project in Washington, fields of wheat in the Palouse region were so badly rusted that they were not even harvested. In fact, in the season of 1943 it was estimated that the losses to wheat farmers in Whitman county alone due to stem rust amounted to more than half a million dollars.

In the Inland Empire the usual growing seasons are fairly dry. Rust epidemics are dependent upon periods of high humidity and relatively high temperatures. It is fortunate, indeed, that such periods are not a normal occurrence during the critical part of the wheat-growing season. That is, the wheat-growing season. A good example of the value of barberry eradication in the Palouse area of Washington did not occur in 1948 when it will be remembered, there were extended periods of summer rainfall and humid, warm weather into July. Montana Takes Action To Eradicate Barberrry

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Windblown spores may be carried by the wind for many miles and start infection centers in grain fields. Each new center continues to reproduce and spread the disease. Live rust spores have been collected from airplanes at elevations of 10,000 feet. With proper wind and weather conditions, dust originating from one barberrry may cause a very destructive epidemic.

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soil keeps seeds in good condition for many years.

Means Of Killing
Best means of killing the barberrry has been found to be cutting off the shrubbery and applying the chemical "ammate" (ammonium sulphamate) to the canes. Common salt is sometimes used on and around the bushes for control also. While the majority of the bushes are found in towns where they have been planted as ornamentals, the eradication crews also tour the rural districts trying to spot bushes in farmstead plantings or in "escape" areas. These escape areas are areas where the seeds have escaped cultivation or been sown by birds or moved by water into isolated ranges or fields and started plantings. They are probably the most dangerous to farmers in the area.

Department of agriculture workers in the eradication program point out that only the "susceptible" barberrry is to be eradicated. This bush is a tall, erect bush with leaves having a sawtoothed edge and with berries hanging in bunches. The Japanese barberrry, which is harmless, is a slow growing bush and has leaves with smooth edges and red berries hanging singly or in pairs.

Another distinguishing mark of the dangerous, common barberrry is the three-pointed spike.

The department of agriculture urges all persons finding bushes suspected of being the rust-spreading barberrry to report the fact to their county agricultural agent, or send samples direct to Montana State college at Bozeman.

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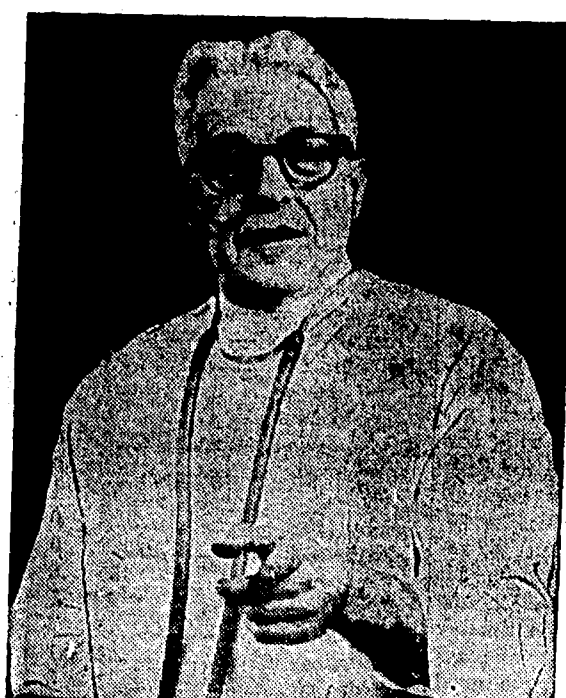

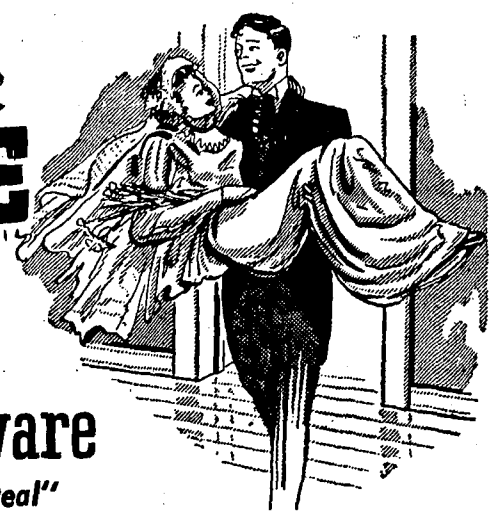

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Eradication Of All Barberry Possible By Use Of Chemicals

Loss of farm income, especially when operational costs have been skyrocketing, and lower grades of bread wheat bring less when sold, there is reason for concern in the possible contamination of grain fields by rust. Much has been printed in The News pertaining to eradication of the common barberry bush, not because the writer dislikes barberry as an ornamental shrub, but because he has witnessed destruction of wheat crops by black rust over wide areas in the northern mid-west states. Back in 1914 a intimate farmer friend, well toward success as a young man "cool school" eighty acres of fine farmland, and planted it to wheat. Cool, spring weather, with ample moisture, was responsible for the crop making excellent growth. Wheat, in fact, was looking the best over a wide area. A few weeks before harvest, when the standing grain began changing color, the young farmer proudly placed his order for his first new 8-foot, reel-supper binder. Conditions seemed favorable until a few days after the Fourth of July, although it was noticed the wheat had a slightly off-color, but the heads looked good. The binder was readied for the field, and on a beautiful day a neighbor, owning two fine spans of mules, hooked on the binder. Binding the good looking field with a new machine and having some recent improvements, it was considered as a demonstration. Several friends of the young farmer were invited to see the mules, and for dinner there was to be fried chicken and roasting ears. Several "pony" kegs of beer had been

lowered into the well the day previous, and after the demonstration there was to be a sort of celebration. The new binder was readied, and the drapers were properly tightened, and the tall, fast-walking mules pulled it up and down a lane a few times. With quite a few watching, the mules were headed into the field. The bundles dropped onto the carrier, and were dumped nicely. Then came the terrible surprise. There were no filled and matured kernels in the heads. After traveling a quarter of a mile, the shiny new binder began turning dusty black, and farmers and others were picking up the bundles, weighing them in their hands, and then examined the wheat heads. That field was completely taken by black rust, one of perhaps 300 in the county. The young farmer was depressed. The fried chicken, first of the summer had no taste, although it was cooked beautifully. Despair was a cloud that settled over everyone. There would be no wheat harvest in the area that summer. Black rust had laid its ugly and destructive hand on exceptionally fine prospects. The young farmer, a favorite in his community, to be sure, had other sources of income, but it meant a heavy loss. He was only one of hundreds, who worked their lands from breaking the soil, into highly productive lands. By the way, the term "backsetting," related to working the land the season following its first year from sod, and it was an operation requiring much work to prepare a seed bed which would be rich and productive, with no weeds at all, and no erosion. 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tempting to let anyone how to manage their affairs, what they grow or permit to grow on their own lands, but we would like to have a small part in complete eradication of the common barberry.

Further, we are not going to point out where barberry bushes are growing. It would be somewhat like telling a fellow he has a mean dog, that his kids are ornery, that he neglects his family, or that his wife talks too long over the telephone.

Losses Not Always Heavy

Expert advice must come from the U. S. Department of Agriculture representatives and others engaged in a study and control of black stem rust. The Genesee area had rust infection last season, some quite noticeable, and perhaps the damage would have been more noticeable except for the large yields, which offset the loss in yield. Weather has been favorable and continues favorable for black rust development. The Genesee area has several factors in its favor, however. Grain matures quickly once warm weather prevails, and the precipitation lessens as the crop matures. Too, the hills act as a barrier to some extent in the spreading of rust spores from the barberry to wheat plants.

Warm "muggy" days and nights, common to the midwest, would certainly wreck a great many farmers' hopes, if such prevailed here. The cool weather during a period of ample moisture, and cooler nights, are working in favor of local wheat growers considering the amount of rust. The USDA Recommendations of Agriculture, cooperating with state and county agencies in stem rust control in grains, recommends the removal of common barberry early in the spring.

The USDA advises use of ammonium phosphates 2,4-dichlorophoxyacetic acid (2,4-D) to kill barberry. The canes are cut off at the crowns and the freshly-cut surfaces treated with small amounts of chemical in concentrated form. One may apply common crushed rock salt around the crown of each barberry. About 200 lbs. of salt is needed to kill a five-foot bush. Where the use of salt may endanger livestock or poultry, treat the crown of a 5-foot barberry with about a gallon of kerosene to kill the bush.

Lenville Improved Area

Sentimentality, that's not it. "When a young man's fatherhood is established, that's absolutely ridiculous. It must be that the Lenville and Aspendale area is simply a pretty place in the spring and early summer. The roads wind over the hills and through the valleys, comfortably smooth a week ago, and for a number of years they have been so maintained. Being a fairly new road, the water in the matter still continues to perplex us, and that is, "where does Aspendale end and Lenville begin. It's something like going from one place to another without marked boundaries. However, the little Potlatch country is a change place. Names on the map have been changed in the past 25 years. The people look younger, and they are. Percy Kinrier is about the only "pioneer" still holding out. There are a number of new homes and others have been changed by remodeling. One evening recently, as the sun had dipped behind a hill, one could see smoke rising in an opening in the pines. But that cook stove can still fuse a piece of home-made dough into a tasty piece of home-made bread or rolls. "Look out brother!" there's three nice fat Hereford calves crossing the road. Missed 'em.

At one same home there was a beautiful plot of tulips a few weeks ago. They're all gone. The hail storm decided they wouldn't go to market. The scars of erosion, caused by two heavier than usual storms, one containing hail, have practically disappeared. The creek is running higher than normal, but the water is rather muddy, but will clear between rains. Seems like crop lands have pushed farther up the hills. Maybe some of us have lost in stature. Anyway, the pines seem greener and larger, but there are more acres taken from them for farming and pasturing.

There hasn't been a Fourth of July celebration at Lenville for years, the last being in 1910, when the promoters received reports on the Jack Johnson and Jim Jeffries fight by telephone attached to a pine tree. The fight was at Reno, Nevada, won by Johnson. Returns of the fight, with Jeffries coming out of retirement at the "white hope," was a most important event all over the United States. Nels Lende, who just dropped in the print shop said July 4, 1910 was a lively day at Lenville, with Bill Kennedy dominating the foot races. The dance hall was on Dawson property, and the store was doing a land-office business. The Armstrongs and Schumackers have disappeared from the picture locally, but they were there in numbers in 1910. Lenville once supported a race track or a place

to race horses, and there were plenty who had horses and a few dollars to say they had the fastest animal.

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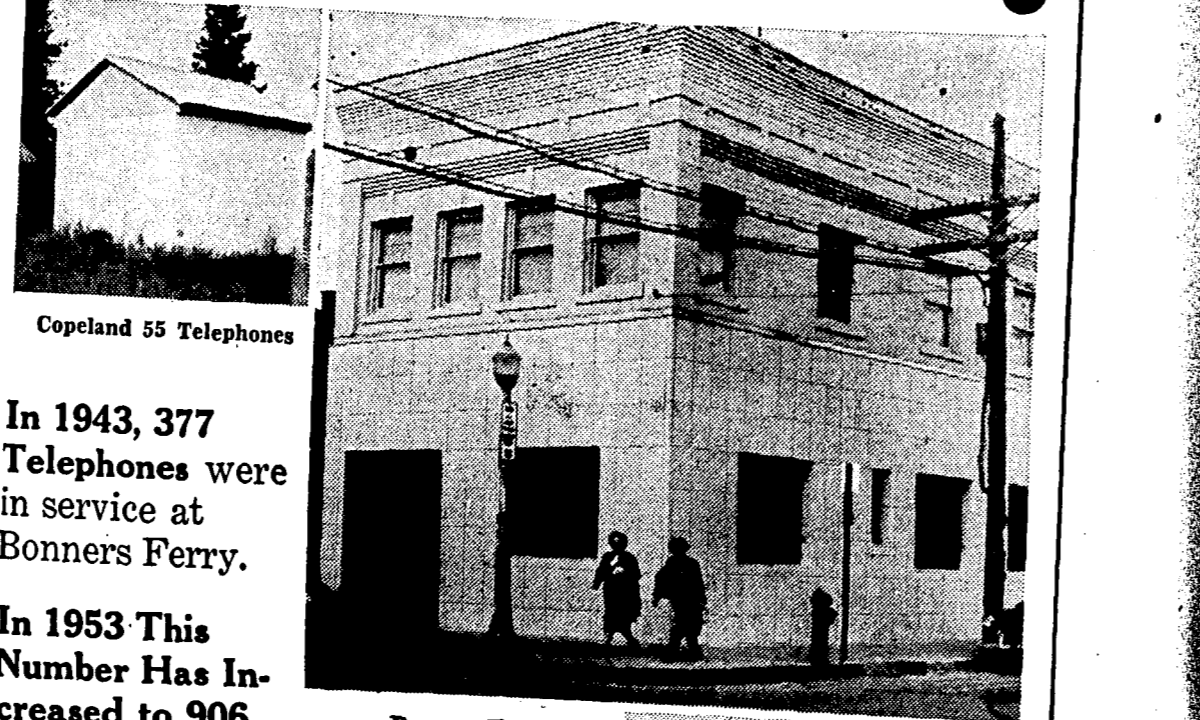



Crops Looking Better Peas Bloom Profusely

Soil conservation, soil building, use of commercial fertilizers and sufficient rain in June has brought the Palouse country into full bloom. The sun has been shining and this week the varied shades of green have taken on the deeper hues, which suggest a healthful condition for all crops. The spring-seeded crops never looked better, and even the latest seedings are promising.

The Genesee area should harvest one of the best average-yield crops of peas on record, and with the larger acreage planted for several seasons, the total yield will be high. Peas are blooming profusely at this time and pods are setting on well. The cool weather, colder than normal, has been responsible for the excellent vine growth, and with adequate moisture the crop is made locally.

Some stands of fall wheat show the effects of the unusually dry planting season when it was dry, causing uneven and delayed germination. The fall crop, in general, however, will continue to improve as warmer weather brings the crop to maturity. In contrast to some fields which are spotted with thin stands, there are fields of fall grain which may approach a new production record, and it would not be surprising if the yield on those fields exceeds any other year. Spring wheat and barley is making excellent progress. Stands are even and have that healthy color.

Haying Gets Under Way
The current week, following the rain of Monday evening, witnessed the start of cutting hay. This crop will be exceptionally good, and judging from hay now on the ground for curing, the yield will be higher than normal and of good quality.

Marketing Quota Invoked
Marketing quotas for the 1945 crop of wheat were invoked by Secretary of Agriculture Benson Wednesday. It was not announced how much the reduction will be requested.

Bank Makes Improvements
Carpenters and painters have remodeled the interior of the Genesee Branch of the First Security Bank. The interior has been finished in celotex wall board with celotex acoustic tile. The floor has been covered with black and white plastic tile, and the woodwork has been changed to a dark brown, with mahogany-colored paint used to change the appearance of the furnishings, which have been modernized by reducing the height and removing some of the decorative woodwork.

The entrance has also been remodeled with a border of glass brick at both sides of the door frame. The finish of the entrance has also been changed to dark brown. C. J. Sisty, manager, said his company is also considering installation of a clock in the archway at the entrance.

Heat Affects Pea Crop Haymaking Nears End

Extremely high temperatures prevailing since July 1, but which took a noticeable drop Monday, July 7, for a light shower Sunday evening, have undoubtedly affected the pea crop in the Genesee area. Continued hot weather caused blooms to close and in many fields blooms began to drop, which means that the pod development cannot be expected to start off to an exceptionally good start, except in late planted fields. Cooler weather with sufficient moisture for maturity finds some fields where little or no damage will result. Fields of wrinkled peas seem to have been affected most by the heat, while the Alaskas have withstood the torrid wave much better.

It is reasonable to believe that the field yield will be reduced in the Genesee area, and in some localities the loss in yield will be greater.

Bill Haxton, field man for the Inland Empire Pea Growers at Oakesdale, who was here Monday to look over the pea crop, reported that through his company, said the pea crop looks good generally. Examination in fields here showed 8 and 10 pods per bush, and vines had 10 to 14 pods. He noticed that soil was cracking under the heat where land was in the heavy rain and had stood in. In these small areas the rain and had packed the soil firmly and by cracking there is a decided loss of moisture capacity. He commented on the healthy color and stand of peas here, which reflects the use of commercial sulphate fertilizer.

Wheat Quota 62 Million Acres

Roy Emerson, who heads the Latah County PMA, expected to be in Coeur d'Alene Wednesday to attend a conference of wheat growers of the Northwest. The conference is being held at the University of Idaho, Pocatello, Idaho.

President Eisenhower has signed legislation permitting wheat growers to plant 62 million acres for the coming season and still receive the high price support. The former law provided for a national acreage of 55 million bushels, and was applied the last time in 1942. Farmers in that year favored the quota by 85 percent. Elections are next in order to determine if wheat growers desire the quota and attending price support of 90 per cent of parity, or have preferred prices drop to \$1.23 a bushel from the present price of \$2.21.

Applicants for the quota are strictly up to the nation's wheat growers who plant 15 acres or more or harvest 200 bushels or more. Only 9.5 percent of the total wheat crop in the United States is to be planted under the quota. The quota, to be enacted, must receive a two-thirds vote to become law.

School To Open Sept. 8 Owing To Late Harvest

The date for reopening of public schools has been set for Tuesday, September 8, according to Supt. Kenneth Primus. Classes will begin at 8 a. m. on the opening day and will be in session the full day ending at 9:40 p. m. The first day of school had been tentatively set for Tuesday, September 1, but owing to a late harvest it was deemed advisable to delay the opening until September 8.

First grade beginners must be six years old or before midnight, September 15. A birth certificate is necessary to complete registration in the first grade. If a birth certificate was presented at the time of registration last spring, it will not need to be presented a second time. This registration for school in the first grade is a legal record and schools are required by law to keep.

High school students will register on September 3 and 4 in Room 3 of the high school building. Grade school students will register with their respective teachers on the opening day of school.

The book rental fee will be \$4.00 this year. This fee is required of all students at the beginning of the school year. This is a decrease of \$1.00 from the amount charged last year. Lunch will be served in the school lunch building on the first day of school. The cost of lunch tickets will be the same as last year, 25 cents each.

Rock Crusher In Operation Dump Ground Disappeared

Crushed rock is fast making a huge storage pile at the former dumping grounds south of Genesee, except that little remains to be seen of the once unsightly grounds, with its accumulation of rusted metal. The contractors have set up a dump truck building, bulldozing the weather beaten metal beneath heavy tractors, and spreading earth over the smashed accumulations of years.

Rock from the crushing plant at the Hickman farm southeast of town is being hauled from the crusher set up there to the hot-mix asphalt concrete plant set up on the old dump grounds. An excellent quality of road surfacing material to be used in the hot mix is coming from the DeAtley crushing plant, which is preparing surfacing material for McEtee & Heath, who have the contract for final surfacing of the approximately 3 1/2 miles of state highway from Thru Creek to the Matt Kasper place, south of Genesee. Preliminary work of tearing up the temporary surfacing of the new section of state highway is about complete, and relaying and applying the initial coats of heavy oil is in progress. At times it is necessary to route traffic over some sections of construction by pilot car, one way, and later, when the hot mix is being applied, only half of the roadway will be open for travel until that area has set.

Road construction, which includes oiling or applying asphaltic concrete, always takes place at harvest time in the Genesee area, and elsewhere, for that matter. It seems that the warm weather which prevails during harvest season is best for oiling operations, and also fits in well for threshing and hauling crops to market.

There appears to be one danger point in traffic, and that is the hazard of trucks coming together where the road leading to the east end elevator. When the sun is well down in the afternoon, grain trucks have difficulty seeing, and unless they know rock trucks are coming onto the highway a collision could occur.

Correction On Wheat Quota Latah County Cut 31 Percent

Quoting Roy Emerson of the Latah County PMA committee last week The News when it stated that the county wheat acreage reduction called for was 41 per cent. This acreage reduction under the quota is 31 per cent generally for Latah county.

Wheat growers have been reading and hearing much recently on the quota referendum set for Friday, August 14, which is estimated to be 16.6 million acres today eligible wheat growers of the nation go to the polls to decide for themselves if they want a quota with supported prices of 90 per cent of parity, or accept the alternative of no quota with its attendant allotted acres but only 50 per cent of parity for cooperators. Non-cooperators, any who exceed their acreage allotments, will not be entitled to price support, even at the 50 per cent level.

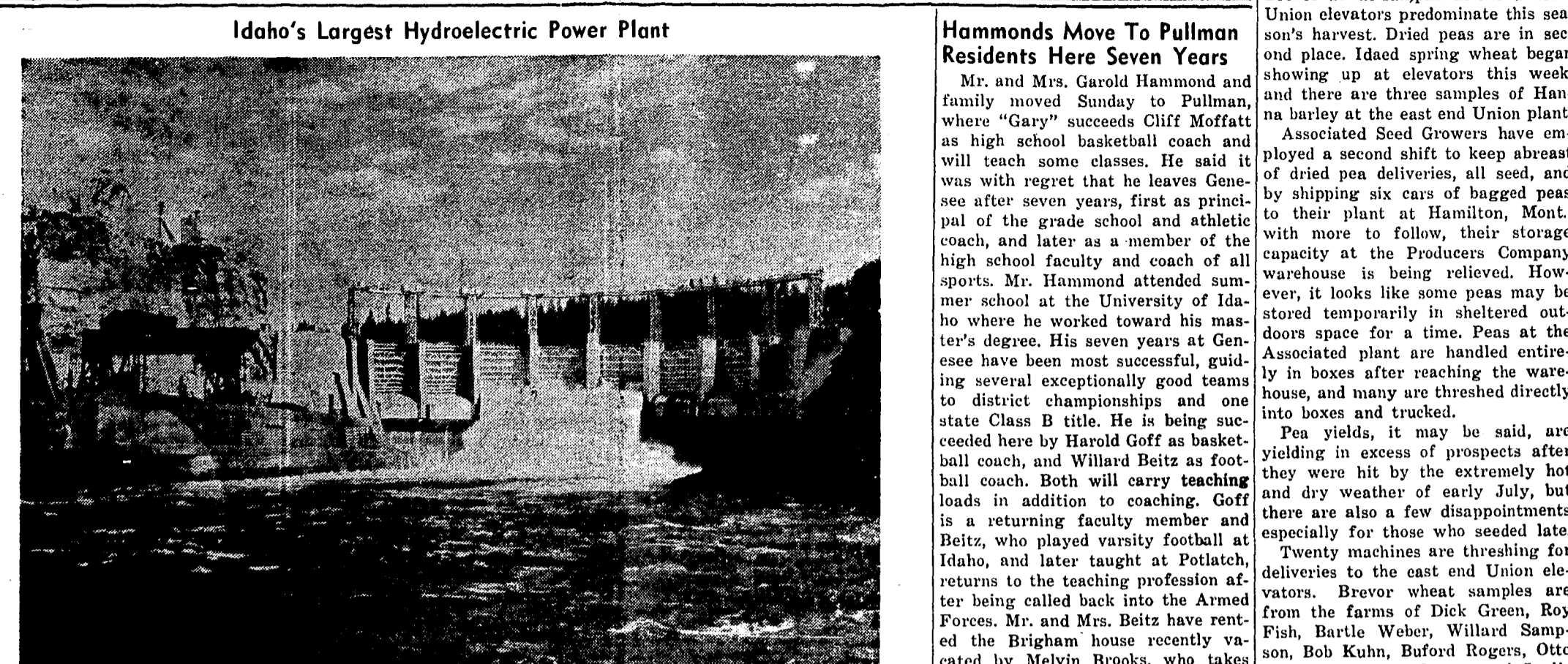
Under these new provisions, the national allotment for 1954 may be less than 62 million acres. Since the indicated 1953-54 wheat supply stands at an all-time high, the minimum acreage, 62 million, is called for.

Under previous legislation the minimum national allotment was 55 million acres, which would have required a reduction of more than 23 million acres, whereas the new legislation reduces the adjustment to 16.6 million acres below the 78.6 million acres planted for the 1953 wheat crop.

On July 1, when the Secretary of Agriculture proclaimed wheat quotas, the total supply of wheat for 1953-54 was indicated at a record of 1,717 million bushels, which exceeded the normal supply of 1,150 million bushels by 48 per cent. Wheat quotas must be proclaimed not later than July 1 when the total supply exceeds the normal supply by more than 20 per cent. Since that time, a later crop report boosts the expected 1953 wheat crop to 1,176 million bushels, and this crop, together with a carry-over of 890 million bushels and estimated imports of 5 million bushels, raises the total indicated supply to 1,760 million bushels.

Three big generators were grinding out 150,000 kilowatts in June for use in the area, and the final 50,000-kilowatt unit was scheduled for service at this time. Thousands of visitors have viewed the public vista point from the cliffside flanking the river. Markers on Highway 10A indicate access roadway to the vista point.

Quotas Up To Wheat Growers Referendum Friday, August 14

Wheat growers of the Genesee area, both in Latah and Nez Perce counties, will take time off today, Friday, August 14, to vote on the wheat quota referendum, declared by the Secretary of Agriculture. All over the United States wheat growers will decide for themselves if there will be a quota of wheat acres for 1954 harvest. Growers have received their allotted acreage for wheat production by the county Production Marketing Administration officials. With the large number of names of growers in each county, there are certain to be errors, according to Roy Emerson of the Latah county PMA committee, and if growers have reason to believe their allotments are incorrect they may appeal.

Vote At Burr Building
Wheat growers of Nez Perce and Latah county of the Genesee territory will vote at the Burr building, the city hall today. Voting booths will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

Only Wheat Growers Vote
Wheat quotas, which operate thru acreage allotments, were proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture on July 1, as directed by law. There was no alternative, because there is no other federal law pertaining to support of wheat prices, and the visible supply of wheat added to the estimated production, makes it mandatory that a quota referendum be applied. Wheat quotas will not become effective, however, unless at least two-thirds of the growers voting approve their use. Growers with more than 15 acres planted to wheat, and with normal production of 200 bushels or more, are subject to the quotas and are, therefore, eligible to vote in the referendum.

A new minimum national allotment figure and authorization to hold the referendum as late as mid-August are provided in amendments to marketing quota legislation which were signed by the President on July 14.

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Hammonds Move To Pullman Residents Here Seven Years

Mr. and Mrs. Harold Hammond and family moved Sunday to Pullman, where "Gary" succeeds Cliff Moffatt as high school basketball coach and will teach some classes. He said it was with regret that he leaves Genesee after seven years, first as principal of the grade school and athletic coach, and later as a member of the high school faculty and coach of all sports. Mr. Hammond attended summer school at the University of Idaho where he worked toward his master's degree. His seven years at Genesee have been most successful, guiding several exceptionally good teams to district championships and one state Class B title. He is being succeeded here by Harold Goff as basketball coach, and Willard Beitz as football coach. Both will carry teaching loads in addition to coaching. Goff is a returning faculty member and Beitz, who played varsity football at Idaho, and later taught at Pullman, returns to the teaching profession after being called back into the Armed Forces. Mr. and Mrs. Beitz have vacated the Brigham home recently vacated by Melvin Brooks, who takes the Reissauer home, rented until mid-August by Gary Hammond.

Gary Hammond, who came to Genesee without previous recognition in athletics in northern Idaho, lost little time in setting up an athletic program for the Genesee public schools which paid off. Seven years ago he instituted a full-school opportunity in basketball especially, and this coming season will see some of the boys as seniors on the basketball squad which started with Hammond. He said he would like very much to remain at Genesee another year, but the Pullman offer is an advancement, and his many friends here hope that the success enjoyed here will follow him. Goff worked with Hammond last year and no change is anticipated in the style of basketball for Buldog teams this season, at least. Hammond said he was not acquainted with the style of ball played at Pullman in recent years, and it will take a season or more to establish his methods, and it goes without saying, that his Genesee teams were tough for some of the best Class A teams in Idaho and eastern Washington.

Hammond and basketball at Genesee drew a lot of attention from all parts of the state and in Washington. He was named as coach of the West team in the all-star state basketball game two years ago, and it was won by the West.

It is not believed that less emphasis will be placed on basketball at Genesee under Goff, and games with out-state teams may be continued to meet commitments of last season. This, however, remains to be seen as no schedules are yet made.

Football, under Beitz, should be all that was to be expected. He has had the experience, and his Potlatch squad turned out very good. Football under Hammond, with the assistance of Goff, last season, gave Genesee a district Class B championship, the first time since the district was organized under its present form. Genesee has had stronger teams, such as the one coached by Guy Wicks and later by Fred Judd.

High school sports fans at Genesee appreciate what Hammond has accomplished here, and the boys who played under him in wishing him further success, Hammond intimated before leaving Genesee that he is interested in entering the administrative phase of school work, and wishes to round out his coaching career in a larger system.

Harvest Is Advancing Heat Damage Showing

Harvest is gaining momentum in the Genesee area, with all crops maturing at practically the same time. Brevor wheat samples at the Genesee elevators predominate this season's harvest. Dead peas are in second place. Ideal spring wheat began showing up at elevators this week, and there are three samples of Hanna barley at the east end Union plant.

Associated Seed Growers have employed a second shift to keep abreast of dried pea deliveries, all seed, and by shipping six cars of bagged peas to their plant at Hamilton, Mont., with more to follow, their storage capacity at the Producers Company warehouse is being relieved. However, it looks like some peas may be stored temporarily in sheltered outdoors space for a time. Peas at the seed plant are handled entirely in boxes after reaching the warehouse, and many are threshed directly into boxes and trucked.

Pea yields, it may be said, are yielding in excess of prospects after they were hit by the extremely hot and dry weather early in the season. There are a few disappointments especially for those who seeded late.

Twenty machines are threshing for deliveries to the east end Union elevators. Brevor wheat samples are from the farms of Dick Green, Roy Fish, Bartle Weber, Willard Sampson, Bob Kuhn, Buford Rogers, Otto Baldu, Clarence Montana, and Leslie Lyons. Ideal wheat is coming in from Zenger Bros, Lew Jain and Stanton Becker machines, and Elmer fall wheat from Pete Peterson's and the Gray place farmed by R. E. Nordby.

Hanna barley samples at the east end are from Otto Baldu, Maet Nye and John Ewert, near Ogle, Condon & Co. As harvest becomes general wheat samples at the west end Union are from the farms of Sanford Evans, Ferd Bruegeman, and Wm. Broemeling farms, Brevor; Wm. Haxton, Ferd Bruegeman, Wm. Broemeling and Bob Herman, Elmer, a dried pea sample from the farms of Condon & Kambitsch, Lloyd Nibler, and Walt Erickson. Mrs. Belle Isakson is delivering dried peas to the east end plant.

Included in the samples at the Associated Seed Growers, are deliveries from the Ridge, Thornecreek and immediate Genesee area. An exceptionally nice sample of peas is that of Thomas Laxton wrinkled peas from the Fix Ridge area.

Test weights of early wheat deliveries are running under those of previous seasons, some grading as low as 58 pounds per bushel. Samples of barley from first cuttings, representative of the first rounds, are below last season in quality demanded by malsters. With the extremely hot and dry weather, there will be little difficulty from excessive moisture this harvest season, although an occasional delivery shows foreign material which may cause heating if not cleaned immediately or converted into livestock feed.

Combustion Destroyed By Fire Origin Of Fire Mysterious
Fire of unknown origin destroyed a Case A-6 combine at the Elmer Esser ranch west of Genesee on the state line Tuesday noon. The small machine, with a 6-foot cut was being used to harvest alfalfa clover seed, but had not been in operation for 24 hours before it mysteriously caught fire. It was standing in a green field of alfalfa about a half mile from the home, but out of sight adjacent to the Leon cut-off road. It was about 50 feet from the road to where the combine was left.

Mel Cox, employed at the Esser ranch was in another field when he noticed smoke on his way to dinner. Mr. Esser was in a Lewiston to deliver a truck load of clover seed, but the fire had left after controlling the fire. The machine tires and the lower parts were undamaged, but the motor and most of the combine, including drapers are a complete loss, estimated at approximately \$1,000 by its owner. It was not insured.

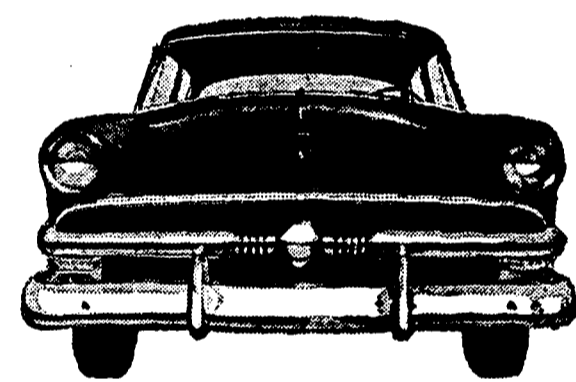

More wheat and less guns would do more to make a peace that would hold water than all the diplomatic talks we have had so far. The eleven miles of new highway is being oiled right in harvest time, as usual, and farmers who have to haul over the rough, dusty section are not too happy over the idea.

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Black Stem Rust Hits Spring Wheat Locally

H. M. Busdicker, federal plant pathologist, Pullman, was in Genesee Monday morning to observe fields which have been affected by black rust, and to make a brief survey of voluntary eradication of common barberry in the area. Idaho has no state law pertaining to barberry control, and it is one of the very few major wheat producing states which does not have a law providing for the complete eradication of the bush which harbors black stem rust and which prevents the U. S. Department of Agriculture for many years, and had much useful experience in the wheat-growing sections of the midwest, said he has never seen such a concentrated infection of black rust as that which prevails in a number of spring wheat fields in the Genesee area this summer. Rust has also affected some stands of fall wheat, and while yield is generally good where rust is not serious, the loss in such fields will be barely noticeable. In the fields where damage is more pronounced the yield of wheat will be seriously cut and the grade will be extremely low.

Mr. Busdicker, who has been with the U. S. Department of Agriculture for many years, and had much useful experience in the wheat-growing sections of the midwest, said he has never seen such a concentrated infection of black rust as that which prevails in a number of spring wheat fields in the Genesee area this summer. Rust has also affected some stands of fall wheat, and while yield is generally good where rust is not serious, the loss in such fields will be barely noticeable. the term for which nominated shall be placed on file with the clerk of the board of trustees at least six days prior to the day of election, by one or more qualified voters of the district, provided, however, that in any school district reorganized pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 117, Session Laws of 1947, as amended, each trustee nomination must be accompanied by nominating petition signed by not less than five nor more than ten qualified resident electors of the school trustee district in which such nominee resides, providing that nothing herein shall prevent any qualified voter at the annual election from writing in the name of any qualified elector of his trustee district for whom he wishes to vote for as trustee.

Provided, that the clerk of the board, shall at least five days prior to the day of election, notify each nominee, who has not personally filed his or her nomination, of the filing of his or her name as nominee. Wheat Quota Voted For 1954 Support Prices To Continue

Idaho wheat growers favored a quota in their plans for 1954 at elections held in 43 counties last Friday. The unofficial vote was 9,674 for and 894 against. Boise county, a small producer voted 11-1, while Owyhee county, also a small producer, favored the quota 80 to 0. Bonneville county, Idaho's largest wheat producer voted 318 for and 55 against. The entire state favored a reduction in wheat acres by 91.6 per cent, compared to 90.1 per cent in 1942, the last year the quota was used to keep production in line to assure growers of support prices.

Latah county went strong for the quota, 1,013 for and 35 against, on an unofficial count, which was 97 per cent plus in favor. Nezperce county favored the quota 729 to 8. Genesee wheat growers voted 146 to 1 for controlled acreage and support prices. The largest vote against the quota was Kennedy Ford with 164 for and 10 against.

The unofficial national quota vote was 301,892 for and 53,252 opposed. The vote was approximately 7 to 1 in favor of the quota.

Whitman county, a leading county in the nation's wheat production, favored a quota for 1954 by 1,581 to 82. Washington had 13,106 wheat farmers voting for controls and 593 as opposed.

In states where wheat is normally grown for livestock and poultry feed and as farmers usually say, "just to have some on hand," the vote for a quota was more evenly divided. Kansas, America's highest producer of wheat, voted strongly in favor of a quota for 1954.

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Harvest In High Gear Before Rain Stoppage
Harvesting of small grains and wheat continues at a rapid pace. The Union Warehouse company hit a new high during the last four days of the week ending August 22. Deliveries to the warehouse were 1,265 trucks for 181,465 bushels. The Union Warehouse company plants, were significant of the continually speeding up of harvest operations in Genesee area. It is difficult to determine the number of combines in operation last week because one or two machines could be running in an area. However, according to the samples, there were approximately 80 machines working.

Stubble Plowing Going On While Combines Are Tied Up

Rains which put a stop to all combine operations in the Inland Empire do not mean a lay-off for tractor-operators this week. Quite a few have been plowing under stubble or working summer-fallow. The cut in wheat acreage for 1954 production is one consideration of farmers today, and will necessitate changes in intentions to plant for the coming production year.

Wind of a week ago Wednesday, considered as not causing serious damage immediately following the storm, shows losses in some fields up to an estimated ten per cent. The loss is mainly in barley fields, where the heads were banged around by wind and being very dry at the time of the storm. Some loss of grain has also been reported.

Most growers feel that the moisture of this week will not cause serious damage to the crop. The loss of grain, although the latter will require extremely careful handling to avoid loss in combining.

The Associated Seed Growers plant, the Producers company warehouse, receipts of peas which are well protected in boxes, stored one on top of another and sealed with wax in prepacked paper to keep out moisture.

Yields of wheat have been surprising, despite the unfavorable conditions which prevailed last fall at seeding time and last spring.

In Joint School District No. 282, Genesee, Idaho.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the annual school election of Joint School District No. 282, Genesee, Idaho, State of Idaho, will be held on Tuesday, the first day of September, 1953, at the Home Economics Building of the Genesee Public Schools in said District, and the polls at said election shall be open between the hours of 1:00 o'clock P. M. to 7:00 o'clock P. M. on said day.

That at said election One Trustee to serve for a term of 3 years will be elected from Trustee District No. 2, and One Trustee to serve for a term of 3 years will be elected from Trustee District No. 4.

There shall be a board composed of five members. Each trustee shall represent one trustee district, and he shall be required to be a resident to be a resident and elector of said trustee district so long as he shall hold office as a trustee. Each Trustee shall be voted for and elected by only the qualified voters of his Trustee District of residence.

Be it Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Idaho: Section 1. That Section 32-610, Idaho Code Annotated, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

32-610. Nomination of Trustees. The name or names of all candidates for election of trustees together with the term for which nominated shall be placed on file with the clerk of the board of trustees at least six days prior to the day of election, by one or more qualified voters of the district, provided, however, that in any school district reorganized pursuant to the provisions of Chapter II, Session Laws of 1947, as amended, each trustee nomination must be accompanied by a nominating petition signed by not less than five nor more than ten qualified resident electors of the school trustee district in which such nominee resides providing that nothing herein shall prevent any qualified voter at the annual election from writing in the name of an elector of his trustee district for whom he wishes to vote for as trustee.

Provided, that the clerk of the board, shall at least five days prior to the day of election, notify each nominee, who has not personally filed his or her nomination, of the filing of his or her name as nominee. Unless such nominee shall file with such clerk, not less than five days prior to said election, a written declination of such nomination, his or her name shall be placed upon the ballot.

That the election will be by secret and separate ballot.

Qualification of Voters:

1. Electors of the State;
2. Residents of the District at the time of election.

In addition thereto said voters must possess one of the two following qualifications: (a) Parents or guardians of a child or children when such child or children are under twenty-one (21) years of age and when such child or children and parents or guardians thereof are residents of the District at the time of election; or (b) A person who pays taxes within the District and the husband and wife of such taxpayer, in case the taxpayer is married. A payer of poll tax is not a taxpayer.

Record Grain Delivery Marks Harvest Season

Grain elevators at Genesee are not bulging, but they are packed brim full of grain. Outside emergency storage bins full of grain are being piled up on the other hand, are bulging plenty. The harvest season is in full swing. The construction firm and Miller house are leveled off to make additional room. The grain is being used for storage. The grain is being used for storage. Record Deliveries Friday
Friday, Sept. 4 established a new record for the Genesee Union Warehouse company. Deliveries on that date amounted to 102,000 bushels. Without checking on past records, and there is no time available for checking statistics, it is estimated that the two Union plants received approximately 2,000 more bushels of grain last Friday than for any other day. Converted into pounds Friday's deliveries of grain reached better than six million pounds. These bushels do not include deliveries of peas to the Associated Seed Growers.

Grain deliveries started slackening off at mid-week when the Union Trucks have lined up at times during the rush when extremely dry weather permitted all machines to operate in fields, but when elevators were jammed by having to receive several varieties of grain, making it necessary to await elevation of grain from dumps.

Outside Bins Filled
Wheat going into the large outside bin at the West End Union plant is estimated at between 400,000 and 500,000 bushels, and the outside bin at the East End, which has been next to running over for several days, has 50,000 bushels of grain. The usable storage capacity of the Union plants is around 1,400,000 bushels, and of this amount approximately 400,000 bushels represent the overflow from last season. Not a single car of new crop wheat has left Genesee since the current harvest got under way. The grain is being stored in the Union elevators, which has relieved the storage by having such a large amount of grain piled up at Oakesdale. Only one car of barley has been shipped so far this season.

Asgrow Harvest Ending
Frank Robinson, manager of the Associated Seed Company and Claude Barker, warehouse manager, who are also at the tail end of a harvest rush said 34 cars of seed wheat have been shipped to their plant at Hamilton, Mont. Six growers are still delivering seed peas to Associated. Approximately 400 cars of peas have been shipped by the company in the Genesee area this season, and while figures are not available as yet, it is estimated that the average yield was around 1100 pounds per acre, cleaned basis. Some fields yielded exceptionally well, one making 2400 pounds per acre. Peas have been shipped and are being stored at the associated plant during the harvest season.

Loans Being Made
With an above normal delivery of grain at Genesee there has been a demand to date for warehouse receipts on which to obtain government loans. Some applications are in, however, and it is expected that by the end of the procedure will gain momentum. The base loan price on wheat at Genesee is \$2.03 per bushel on that delivered after Aug. 10, and the market price Wednesday was given as \$1.92 per bushel. The loan price is subject to some reductions, exclusive of PM and loan charges, such as slightly lower weights per bushel and smut. The latter has been less this season except for a few deliveries. A show here is being reported to be about a pound per bushel lighter than that harvested before the rains.

Barley A Big Crop
Spring wheat has been a disappointment generally, after prospects were so good in late June and early July. The heat wave which affected the dried pea and seed crop to a large extent, caused a decided drop in yield of spring wheat. The heat and dry weather caught spring wheat at a critical time.

Spring barley, on the other hand, stood the warm weather much better than wheat or oats. Some fields did not yield too well, but some growers reported very good yields.

Federal loan prices on feed barley at Genesee is now \$47.91 per ton, and the cash price is approximately \$42.00 per ton. Oats also come under the loan program, with the government support being above the cash price. Oats are a short crop in the Genesee area this season. The acreage was small and the yield was not good. It is necessary to demand a price for oats at current market prices, because storage space has disappeared, and elevator facilities are at a premium. Wheat may not be piled outside, Genesee is more favorably situated, and if deliveries continue there is space for a better than good harvest of wheat in the open. It is perhaps too late to erect bins, such as now in use.

The harvest season of 1953 has been accompanied by many surprises in fields of wheat. One grower said he plowed up about 20 acres of fall wheat that looked poor, and he considered tearing up about twice that amount. At harvest time the grain yielded a mature yield around 45 bushels, and he believed the 20 acres returned under would have yielded as much. 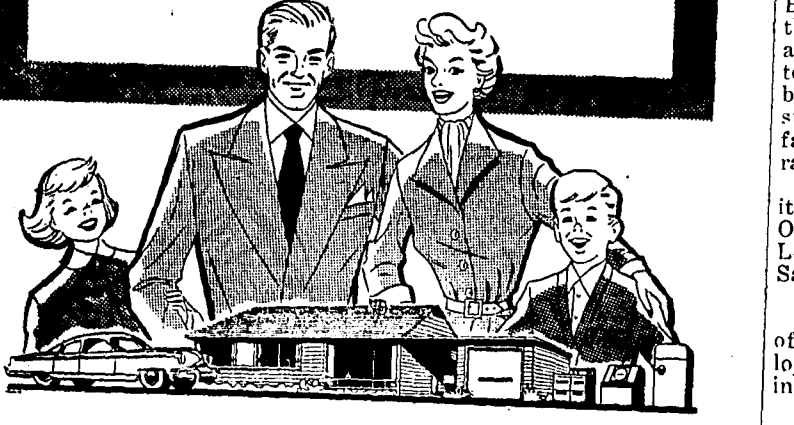

Harvest In Final Stage Wheat Stored Outside

Grain and pea harvest in the Genesee area is nearing the finale for the current season. Only a final dozen combines were delivering grain to the Genesee Union East End plant Thursday morning with one due for about 200 acres of threshing. This means that harvest will wind up here at the week end. Despite the large storage capacity of the Genesee Union Warehouse company facilities, and use of the Martinson warehouse, thousands of bushels of grain have been piled outside. There is a considerable tonnage of grain stored in farm elevators, and with returns of peas grown for seed and for processing stored in other plants, the Genesee country has come across with another unbelievable crop. Prospects for a brighter harvest for peas and spring grains in early July were dimmed considerably by an extreme heat and dry weather, which started before winter and then followed. There were, on the other hand, a number of pea fields which yielded beyond expectations. Spring wheat and oats suffered generally from the heat. Genesee Beats Lapwai By Three Touchdowns

Lapwai failed to generate sufficient power last Friday to score against the Genesee Bulldogs, even when they caught the local wind. Being the Bulldogs, having a 19-0 bulge in the third quarter, they saw Coach Wilhelm Becker sweep the reserves for action, and his bench held the Wildcats beyond the Bulldogs 30 yard line, and even set them back on several occasions before they could start moving.

Several thrills were dished up for spectators, the first when Bennett intercepted a Lapwai pass and scooted over for a touchdown. Krier took a pass from Bennett to break loose and travel to pay field, good for 20 yards. The second pass play, good for 20 yards, was a punt, one by Bennett, was good for about 80 yards, and Krier booted one from mid-field that went out of bounds on Lapwai's 1-yard line. Both were kicking with the wind which was a help for kickers with a strong competitor when faced by the passers and kickers. Krier, however, kicked off once against the wind, when the ball touched ground on the Lapwai eight yard line.

Krier, doing the kicking for Genesee, kicked off to the Lapwai 10 yard line. There was a return to the Lapwai ran smack into Sather and Jacobs on the first play for no gain. A left end sweep netted 25 yards. Lapwai passed and the ball was taken by Bennett for Genesee who ran from the Lapwai 30 yard line to a touchdown. Krier's kick against the wind went wide.

Genesee kicked off to Lapwai short on the 30 yard line and the Wildcats ran on the 40 yard line. A play into the line, right at Howie Bruegeman, made a half yard. Lapwai made 3 yards at left end with McFarland carrying. A pass was not good, giving Genesee the ball on the Lapwai 35 yard line.

Genesee had Bennett into the line for 2 yards. Parks made 4 yards and Dave Hasfurther scampered around left end for 15 yards. Bennett made the same. Stout, going to his right and grabbed by Lapwai hands, pitched out to Bennett who went 9 yards.

Bennett made 6 yards. Stout, Genesee quarterback, was nabbed for a 2 yard loss and on the next play 4 yards were lost. On the following play, Bennett ran 12 yards to the Lapwai 1 yard line.

Parks, Genesee fullback, plunged over for the touchdowns, but the Bulldogs were offside. Bennett trying at end, made it up to the 1 yard line. Genesee kicked, recovered by Stout. Stout, on the next play, was caught for a 6 yard loss. Lapwai's Nos. 12 and 14 were pouring through the Genesee line frequently.

Lapwai, on its own 5 yard line, lost 1/2 yards. Then Green ran out for 9 yards. Maury Baumgartner, who took the place of Jack Jacobs in the line, threw Lapwai for a 2 yard loss in the first quarter ended.

Opening the second quarter, Lapwai kicked to its own 35 yard line with Hasfurther taking the ball and running to the Lapwai 18 yard line. The Wildcats drew a 15 yard penalty for spilling on Hasfurther out of bounds. Bennett hit the line for 2 yards. Hasfurther gained around left end and the Bulldogs' defense was set. Bennett picked up 2 yards. Genesee lost 3 yards for too much time in the huddle. A forward pass failed to connect. Bennett passed to Hasfurther for 8 yards, and Genesee fumbled on fourth down.

Lapwai tried a pass that was intercepted by Bennett on the 15 yard line of the Wildcats and ran to the 2 yard line. Bennett made nothing go into the line and he fumbled Saturday the following play with Lapwai taking over on the recovery.

Lapwai ran 2 yards from its own 2 yard line, being stopped sharply by Sather. Running right end was no good. Nelson reared up to stop Lapwai and a 4 yard gain. A play later, Lapwai ran 2 yards to the Lapwai 45 yard line. He ran back to the Lapwai 28 yard line.

Bennett made 5 yards but Genesee was offside. A fumble lost 12 yards. Hasfurther moved ahead 2 yards, and then Bennett, taking a pitch out from Stout, whipped a forward pass to Krier, who got away from three men and crossed the goal line. Krier made the extra point from 30 yards.

Krier kicked off to Lapwai on its 3 yard line, with the return coming to the Lapwai 25. Lapwai tried the line for a yard, being stopped by Baumgartner. Greene flashed over right tackle for 16 yards.

Lapwai made 6 yards into the line, penetrating Genesee territory for the first time. Hasfurther threw Ellenwood for a 3 yard loss. Bruegeman forced to be pushed around and halted Lapwai for a yard gain. A pass fell incomplete, and Lapwai kicked to Genesee on the 28 with Bennett coming out to the Bulldogs' yard line. Hasfurther traveled 5 yards through the Lapwai line and Bennett ran 15 yards around right end as the half ended.

Second Half
Genesee kicked off to Lapwai with the ball going to the 25 yard line and then out to the Lapwai 43. Lapwai kicked up a first down with Greene going 9 yards and repeating with a gain of 2 yards.
Lapwai fumbled when Bruegeman grabbed the Lapwai T-man and Olson recovered for the Bulldogs.
Hasfurther ran 6 yards for the Bulldogs. A pass by Bennett went incomplete. Bennett moved 3 1/2 yards and then went 3 yards for a first down.
Parks for Genesee drove 8 yards through the line. Stout was nabbed for no gain. The Bulldogs made the gain of 2 yards with Krier falling on the ball.
Bennett rumped 16 yards for another first down.
Stout, who works the split-T for Genesee, fumbled and recovered for a yard gain. Bennett made 2 yards. Interference was ruled against Lapwai on the penalty placing the ball on the Wildcats' 1 yard line. Stout kicked for a first down.

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Harvest Good At Connell Fertilizers Increase Yield

John Loran, who operated the self-propelled harrow in the Connell area of Washington made some observations of interest, chiefly those on the application of commercial fertilizers in a more arid zone than Genesee. On the farm where he was employed the owner has studied commercial fertilizers for several years and with experiments conducted by others, applications of anhydrous ammonia is increasing yields.

The land owner harvested 1820 acres of wheat this season. On 320 acres the yield was 8.9 bushels per acre and on 1500 acres the yield was 22 bushels per acre. Just in passing, the 320 acres were reaped in two and a half days with two 16-foot self-propellers. The same ammonia treatment was given all the land, but on 320 acres the land owner decided to use a smaller amount of fertilizer. The yield was 15.2 bushels per acre. A small strip over which farm equipment was moved to the cultivation field yielded 15.2 bushels per acre. The cost was 12 cents per pound or \$6.00 per acre, or approximately two bushels of wheat per acre plus the added work Twenty-two bushels of wheat per acre in the Connell area is very good, and better still when the type of summer season is taken into consideration.

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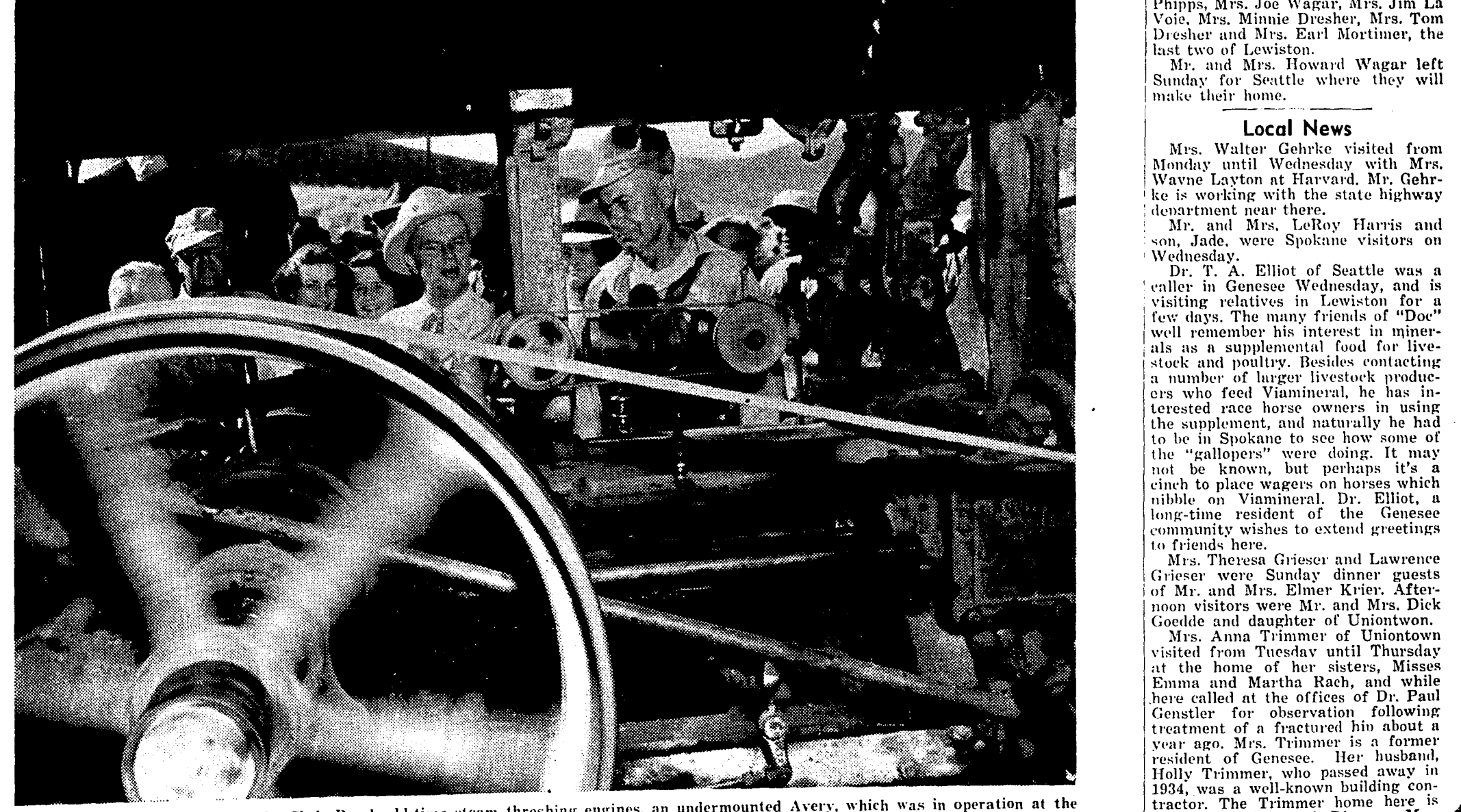

Statistics prove that in 40 minutes after drinking two or three highballs, the efficiency of the four vital factors in driving is reduced as much as 69 per cent. Concentration, coordination, muscular reaction and selective action are necessary when split thinking means often the difference between life and death, and it is the drinking man who causes the accidents. The human race is slow in learning some lessons. Besides the menace of a drinking driver there is the menace that destroys the character of the drinker—broken homes, wrecked lives and increased crime. Public institutions and private sanitariums shield us from the unpleasant sight of those desperately ill from liquor but the fact still remains: Of the 65 million drinkers in the U. S. A.

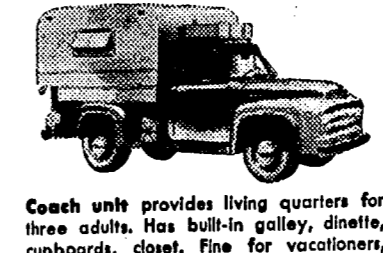

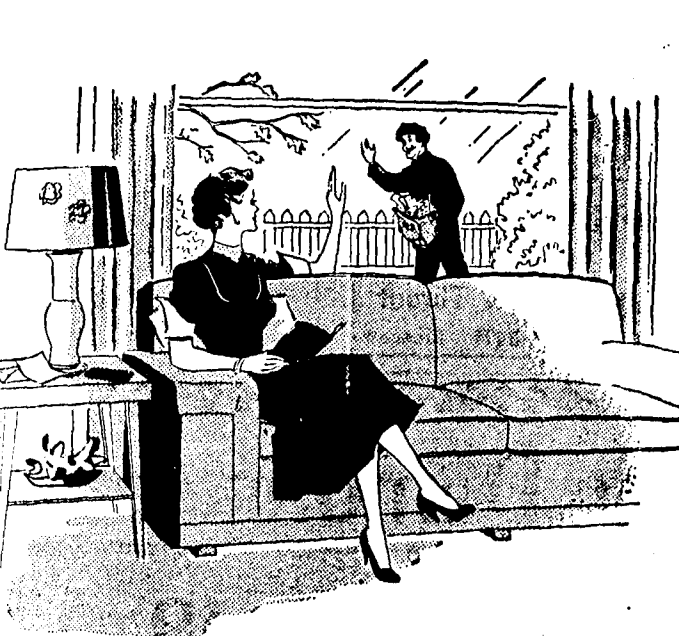

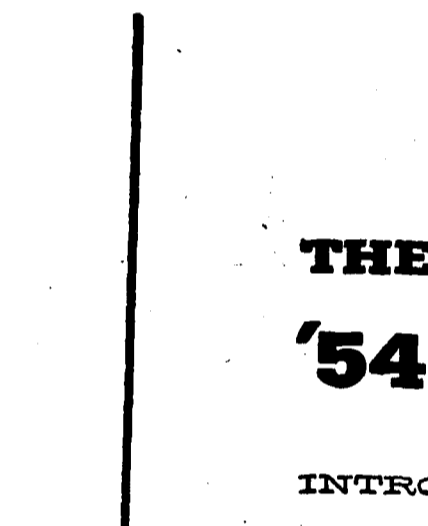

80,000 Bushels Wheat Sold During The Week
Approximately 80,000 bushels of wheat has been made available for sale by growers during the past week, according to a report from the manager of the Genesee Union Warehouse company. The Union also announces that it welcomes additional sales of wheat that orders may be filled immediately when received. The total price of wheat at Genesee Wednesday was \$2.03 per bushel, and the local quotation on wheat the same day was \$2.02 1/2 per bushel. This makes the loan price and sale price for the reason that the cost of processing a bushel is one-half cent per bushel. The board of directors of the Genesee Union Warehouse company, which has been operating since 1918, and is an authority on the damage which results annually from the presence of common barberry, discussed the local rust infection with a number of men who witnessed initial work of removing the shrubs last Wednesday and today the fungus spreads in the spring and how the common barberry becomes an alternate host following the winter season. Genesee in the proximity of spring, and following the dormant winter season, it spores rest in the soil and in the spring, the state of Washington has a law which federal funds are earned for common barberry eradication. At the time Idaho has no such law. The eradication program in Latah county is being done with county funds alone, under the supervision of county agent, Dr. H. M. Busdicker. The board of county commissioners, witnessing the damage to grain during 1953, as declared common barberry a noxious weed, and as such, has made an appropriation. Idaho will undoubtedly join other wheat growing states in enactment of a quarantine and eradication program at the next session of the legislature.

Black stem rust is capable of wintering in Idaho. There are now number of rust classifications, the most recent having caused widespread damage in the northern and central areas.

Torrell Continuing Work
Mr. Torrell, who has become aggressive in eradication of common barberry, was back in Genesee Tuesday and said removal of another common barberry hedge would be undertaken soon. In addition to the infected fifth removal work this week.

Mr. Torrell said he appreciated the cooperation of people in the Genesee district in the intensive work on common barberry eradication, and advised that should any bushes be found that he has not noticed, they should be reported to him. Mr. Torrell said he has disclosed a number of the barberry shrubs on farm lands, anyone finding barberry on his farm should report it to the county agent, who will be glad to come to the ground and apply ammonium sulfamate to the shrubs. The chemical is rather expensive in original quantities, but Mr. Torrell said he would like to personally attend to application of the ammonium sulfamate, and that the small amount required could be obtained from the county supply on hand.

Common barberry is growing in Lewiston and community in Latah county, and fear has been expressed that it has spread farther than expected in some of the drainage areas, such as the Palouse. 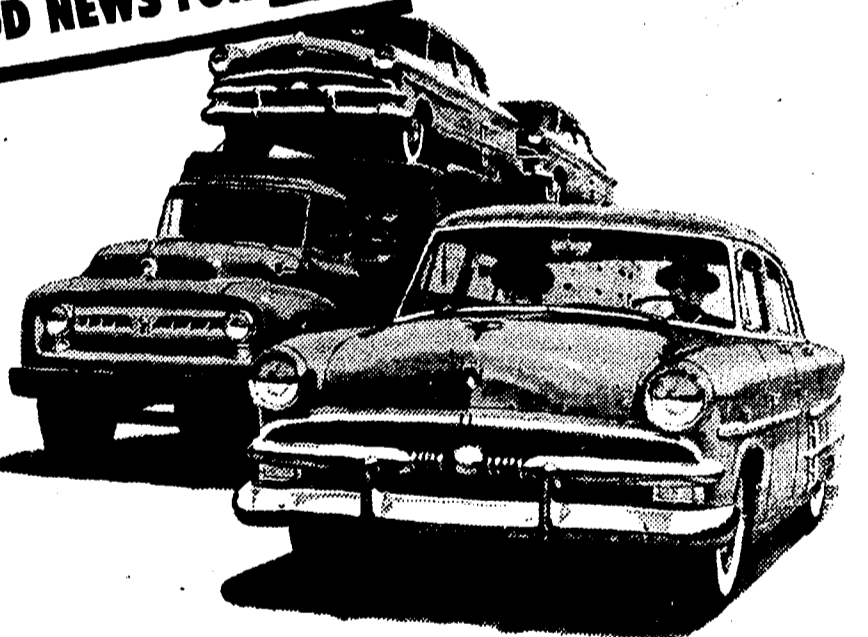


Looks like she figured I still needed some checking-up and slipped that postcard in the last batch of letters.

Cow Creek Dam Is Proposed Water For Use In California

It's dam this and dam that river now they want to dam Cow Creek, according to Herman Isaksen, Genesee Valley farmer and a Clarkston resident during the non-productive season. A former resident of Genesee Valley, Henry Tweed, it is reported, is looking for additional water to divert during the winter. The proposal is to hold back Cow Creek water, turn it loose to go down the Snake and into the Columbia so it may be pumped south into California. By releasing a large quantity at one time Cow Creek water would be less likely to mix with drainage from less desirable portions of Idaho and other states. Water from Genesee Valley, according to Mr. Isaksen, would make California twice as productive, and for drinking purposes would eliminate the tedious work of growing grapes and squeezing them to make wine.

Guard Water Rights

Several who have heard Mr. Isaksen's proposal are urging land owners to file water rights along Cow Creek and its main tributary, Heifer Creek. To date there has been no dam hearing because of the time being consumed over the Hell's Canyon controversy. Sentiment seems to favor a low dam for the time being, with a high dam to be later pumped. Original plans include no provisions for irrigation, power or recreation, just water storage, and the dam is organized, to be made into the "PUD" business.

Earl Parsons, a lower Cow Creek rancher, who heard Herman Isaksen voice his opinion on construction of dam on Cow Creek strongly urged the dam location should be between Genesee and the place he farms, and urged a high dam that water could be used for irrigation, recreation and power, more specifically, however, for recreation.

Isaksen Dam Promoter

The Clarkston resident, who was in Genesee Tuesday afternoon, writing checks admitted being a dam promoter for the Idaho Power company because he believes the dam could be constructed at less cost and without use of government funds. California would supply the money for engineering and construction and any other dam expenditures necessary. Isaksen has no axe to grind, and is accepting no fee for his services. He does not even plan to form a Cow Creek Dam organization. He is not promoting a dam except to assist California get more water. He insists there are no political angles to cause the dam situation as far as he can determine, but intimated that Genesee could be a better town by a damsite.

Dam Controversy Certain To Develop Personalities

Herman Isaksen, Clarkston, "well-fare state dam promoter," is having some mean words spoken about him since he talked The News into announcing a dam on Cow Creek to store water for California. He also has his supporters but their voices don't carry far, in fact they are rather indistinct. One Cow Creeker said he never listened to such an outburst of vapidity, having the belief that the dams on the Snake and Clearwater rivers should all be constructed before Isaksen presses his proposal. Of course, it seems that everyone today wants a dam, and Isaksen having a home in Genesee Valley which would be out of the water if his dam should be built, looks favorably on a lake backing upstream from the damsite. One of his neighbors, Erling Lande, said he would trade his Beechcraft off for a B-39, and bomb every installation to impound water that Isaksen undertakes. Earl Parsons came out real flat-footed, and is now urging construction of a dam for recreational purposes. Roy Evans, who isn't exactly on Cow Creek or any of its tributaries, said he is not opposed to the dam, provided navigation on Cow Creek is not restricted to smaller boats.

There are numerous obstacles to be hurdled by Isaksen. He does not have permission as yet of the Lewiston Tribune, to erect a dam, and he has not even requested a public hearing as of December 23.

Opposition seems to outweigh the support for a dam so far. Those who consider the irrigation angle, insist that the Genesee area is already over-producing.

A rather boring remark was heard Tuesday when one fellow, with an eye perhaps on part of the dam construction, suggested drilling a tunnel all the way to California. Another person, not over 35, said he expected to see Cow Creek flowing gently on to the Pacific when he reached the age of 85. With some one else would take this dam situation from here on. To be absolutely fair in the matter, it should be remembered that Isaksen is only attempting to solve a California problem, a shortage of

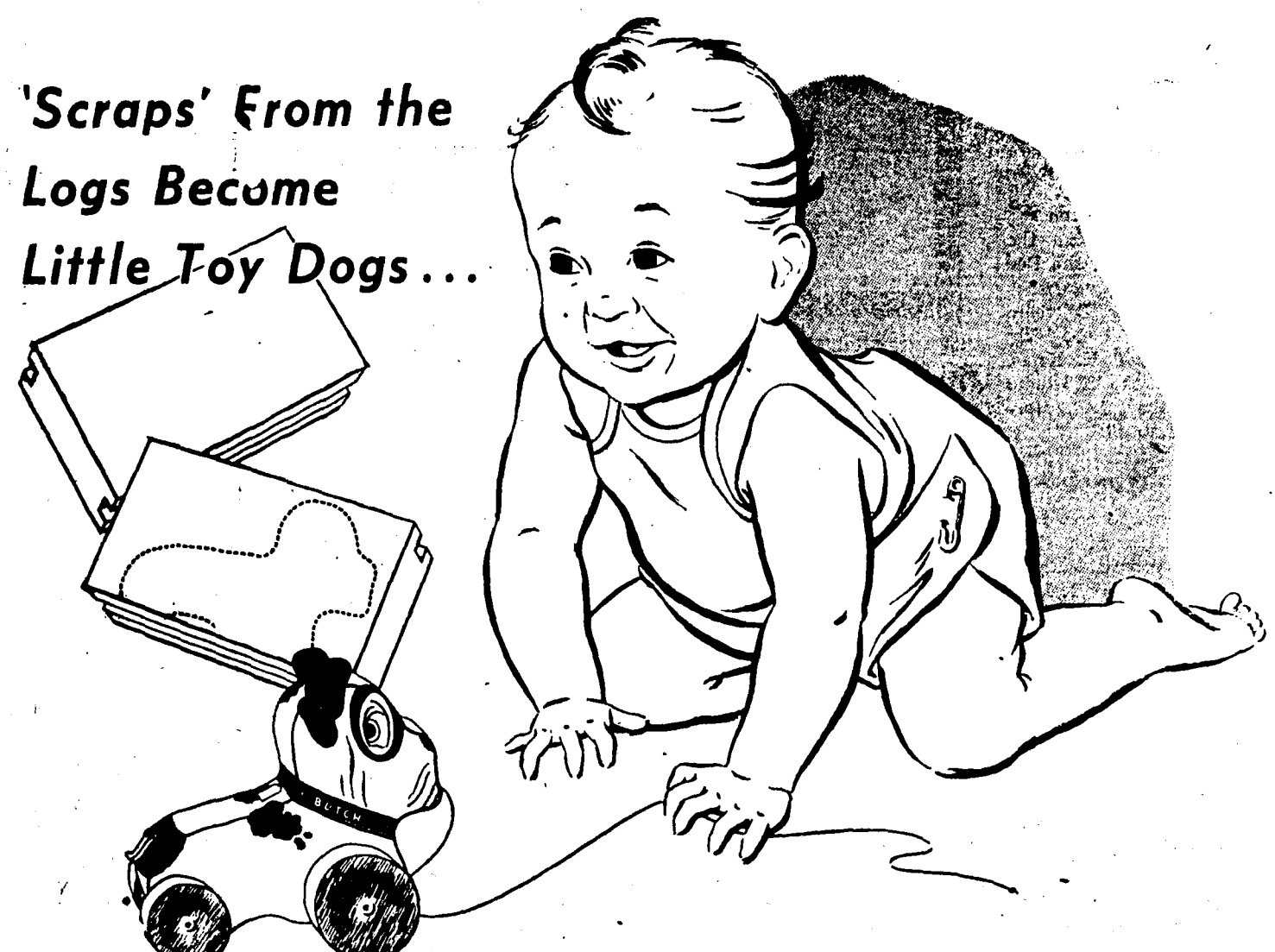
