His literary career began at the age of sixteen, with a revised version of Swiss Family Robinson which did not include the restraining influence of the pious father and mother. His books for boys have been received with enthusiasm because of their clean, sparkling excitement and ingenuity of plot.

At the present time Rutherford lives on an abandoned mining claim high up in the mountains of Idaho, where the winter
snows isolate him for several
months in his cabin. At this
time Rutherford finds plenty of
time to continue his literary
work when he isn't sawing wood
to keep himself from freezing
to death.
