

## STRANGE HARVEST





MILDRED BURCHAM HART

STRANGE HARVEST is the realistic and convincing picture of a German family in the Middle West in the early years of the twentieth century; of the dominating, parsimonious father who ruled indomitably the lives of his children; of the unfulfilled love of his delicately beautiful daughter, Marta, for black-eyed Danny Murphy, who was too young, too handsome, and, above all, too poor for her father's approval.

"You giff me grandsons. I giff you money," August Spengler tells his children. How they reacted to this overbearing suggestion is the principal theme of the book. Laden heavily with irony, the story leads submissive Paul, frustrated Heinie, and terror-driven Marta to a strange harvest of destinies.

While the people of this novel live upon the land, STRANGE HARVEST is not a "soil novel." Given a man like August Spengler with an overwhelming desire to possess and direct, this story could have happened anywhere and in any group of people.





Around the yard of Mildred Burcham Hart's home in Lincoln, Nebraska, is a wide, dense, closely clipped hedge. If she grasps any part of it and shakes it, the motion travels a length of quivering green, gradually expiring amid a few faintly agitated leaves. The acts of men seem the same to her. They stir most violently those nearest them, but they extend, also, beyond and beyond.

In STRANGE HARVEST, the author has created an unforget-table study in character and the romantic twists that we tie in the threads of our own life patterns. This book is not too somber to bear rich and thoughtful humor; still, it is the very humor of the book that is its most tragic aspect.
