Professional and student papers relating to topics of interest to Wildlife Society members are invited. The theme of this year's conference will be Crises in the Northwest. Papers concerning land management actions affecting wildlife, wildlife ecology and management, or wildlife laws and policies are especially invited. There will be several concurrent sessions dealing with topics not directly related to the conference theme. Sam McNeil (Idaho Dept. of Fish and Game) has accepted a position as Regional Wildlife Habitat Manager with the Department of Fish and Game in Lewiston.

Rich Winstead has resigned from the Idaho Dept. of Fish and Game and moved to Arizona.

Wetlands Conservation

The Wildlife Society and several chapters presented comments concerning the "Federal Manual for Identifying and Delineating Jurisdictional Wetlands" to the Environmental Protection Agency.

The Society supports programs and practices designed to enhance the retention of surface water in its watershed of origin, to conserve natural reservoirs of underground water, to maintain high standards of water quality, and to conserve wildlife habitat. TWS encourages the enactment of legislation and regulations that promote the maintenance and wise management of wetland habitats. The Society opposes programs of alteration or use that cause permanent damage to the physical and biological resources of wetland habitats.

The Wildlife Society commented that the Delineation Manual, as well as the entire Section 404 program, must operate efficiently and in consistent manner, so those seeking permits chave a clear understanding of the program's objectives and how it operates.

A review of the proposed revisions indicates that the administration's proposed changes would add confusion and create an even larger problem for resource managers, developers, and regulators. The revisions indicate a great lack of understanding of wetlands. The Society presented comments on many individual concerns with the proposed revisions including inappropriate criteria for wetland delineation, and the agencies' failure to use professional judgement of qualified wetlands scientists and biologists for making wetland identification and delineation decisions. The Society stressed the need for regulatory agencies to hire and maintain qualified, suitably trained personnel. The Wildlife Society asked that the proposed Manual revisions be withdrawn, and that the original 1989 Manual developed by the EPA, Corps of Engineers, FWS, and SCS be followed.

CRP Proposed Rules

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) published the proposed rules for the Conservation Reserve and Swampbus Programs of the Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990 (Farm Bill). The Wildlife Society submitted comments urging clarification of the eligibility of wetlands in the Conservation Reserve Program. The proposed rules apparently would exclude all wetlands from enrollment in the program. However, according to the 1990 Farm Bill, all wetlands on lands otherwise eligible for the CRP may be enrolled in the program. It must be made clear that wetlands are eligible for enrollment in the CRP in addition to the wetlands easement program or millions of acres of wetlands may go unprotected.

Funding the North American Waterfowl Management Plan

The Wildlife Society urged members of both congressional appropriations committees to support the Administration's request for full funding of \$15 million to support the North American Waterfowl Management Plan in FY 1992. During FY 1991, 47 wetland conservation projects were funded with \$15 million in federal appropriations, and more than \$20 million in matching state and private donations. The President's FY 1992 budget received no appropriations, however the program was

funded with \$12 million through revenues generated by fines, penalties, and forfeitures, particularly from payments resulting from the Exxon Valdez oil spill.

FEDERAL FY 1992 BUDGET

President Bush's FY 1992 proposed budget requested increases over FY 1991 appropriations for the US Fish & Wildlife Service and wildlife and habitat management programs in the Bureau of Land Management. Unfortunately these increases were not sufficient to ensure the needed protection and conservation of fish and wildlife resources. The Administration's budget proposed to decrease funding to the Forest Service's wildlife and research programs.

The Wildlife Society submitted written testimony on the proposed budget to the House Subcommittees on National Parks and Public Lands, Fisheries and Wildlife Conservation and the Environment, and Interior and Related Agencies, and the Senate Committee on Appropriations, The Society commended the Administration for requesting full funding for several critical programs, and urged that adequate funding be appropriated to all wildlife habitat and endangered species management programs. TWS also supported increased funding for the USFWS and USFS Research budgets, the USFWS Maintenance budget, and the BLM Rangeland Management program. Approved budgets for The Fish and Wildlife Service, Forest Service, and BLM wildlife programs all received funding increases for FY 1992.

The Wildlife Society submitted comments
prepared by TWS' Wildlife Damage Management
Committee on the proposed FY 1992 budget for
the Animal Damage Control (ADC) division of the
USDA-Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service
to the Senate and House Appropriations
Committees. The Society recommended
appropriating \$26.6 million for ADC, to finance
the equipment, maintenance, and personnel
needed to meet expanding demands, and current
programs.
