### BUSINESS MEETING

The Business meeting was held on January 30, 1970. Committee Reports:

Bibliography - Paul Dalke estimated that he will complete this extensive document (over seven hundred references) in several months.

 $\underline{\text{Historian}}$  - Ken Hungerford has most of the needed information, but appealed to the membership for correspondence relating to the events leading up to the Chapter's formation.


