

By early December 1980 The Wildlife Society will have its own belt buckle available for purchase by the members. The Western Heritage Company is casting and marketing them for #12.50 (bronze) and #13.50 (polished pewter) plus #1.00 for postage and handling. The buckle's front design is shown above. The back of the buckle includes a plaque displaying the Society objectives. The buckle backs are serially numbered in sequence as they are purchased.

The Idaho Chapter has nurtured the buckle from conception to birth. Therefore, the chapter will receive a 15 percent royalty from each sale. The chapter will use the royalty for numerous activities, e.g. to help support the TWS Building Fund to provide the extra dollars for establishing the Elmer Norberg Wildlife Scholarship to Sponsor high school youngsters at environmental

workshops and similar projects.

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The buckle has been approved for sale by the TWS Executive Council. It is only available for purchase from Western Heritage (om gany.
