

Socio-economic, archaeological-historic, environmental and other factors are now to be considered in project planning. Yes, this type of planning does take a little longer and cost a little more, but then hopefully this planet and our nation will be around a long time and will still be suitable for human living. In our planning efforts we must be thinking about impacts to our soil, energy and other natural resources from a long range perspective and not from the "what can I get out of the land in one generation" mode. I believe most people today know and understand this need. The concept of the Institute for Resource Management is a vehicle to accomplish this need for wise long range planning.

Naturally the groups that have the most to lose with long range, multiple discipline planning would be the first and loudest to complain. Their short term gain, business-as-usual methods are in jeopardy. Really, long term planning often necessitates compromises in the uses of our natural resources. No one will be truly happy with this compromise situation, but then life itself is really a compromise.
