BOISE, Idaho (AP) — Legislation to provide protection of the Hells Canyon area of the Middle Snake River will come out despite opposition within the Idaho congressional delegation, Sen. James A. McClure said Sunday.

Interviewed by newsmen on a Boise television program, McClure said legislation introduced by Idaho and Oregon senators to create a Hells Canyon National Recreation Area is in the national interest.

The Idaho Republican said the opposition of Rep. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, would not necessarily lead to its defeat because of lack of unanimous support.

The senator said he anticipated some changes in the legislation as the result of Senate Interior Committee hearings in La Grande, Ore., and Lewiston last December. One would be a reduction in potential wilderness in the Rapid River areas on the Idaho side of the canyon.

In discussing other issues, McClure said:

—There is a danger of an immediate price movement following the lifting of wage and price controls April 30, but that ultimate good will result because "the wage and price control system is distorting our economy."

—He will disclose his personal finances as did Sen. Frank Church, but did not intend to disclose who contributed to his campaign prior to April 7, 1972, when the new campaign disclosure law became effective.

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
