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


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
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nternationally acclaimed genius of the jazz world and undisputed King of the Vibraphone for well over half a century, Lionel Hampton began his phenomenal musical career - as a drummer. Born in Birmingham, Alabama, he moved at an early age with his family to Kenosha, Wisconsin, where he spent most of his formative years. He began his musical studies under the strict supervision of the Dominican Sisters at the Holy Rosary Academy.

His idol during these early years was drummer Jimmy Bertrand, and drums became Lionel's first instrument. The records of Louis Armstrong were a major influence in Hamp's young years. He had his first meeting with Armstrong in 1930, when Armstrong hired him to appear in a back-up band during an L.A. night club engagement. Hamp so impressed Louis that he invited the young drummer to join his big band rhythm section for a recording session.

During a session break, Armstrong pointed to a set of vibes at the back of the studio and asked Hamp if he knew how to play them. Taking up the challenge, Lionel, who was well-schooled in his keyboard studies, picked up the mallets and said he'd give it a go. The first tune they cut was "Memories of You," which had recently been written by Eubie Blake. It became a tremendous hit for Louis and young Lionel and has remained a classic throughout the years. Jazz impresario John Hammond heard the record even before it was released and raved to Benny Goodman about Lionel's performance on the vibraphone. But it wasn't until 1936, when Hammond flew out to the Paradise Club in Los Angeles with Benny Goodman in tow, that the famed band leader heard Lionel in person. Mightily impressed, Goodman signed Lionel on the spot. Benny had a trio within his big band which featured Goodman, Teddy Wilson on piano, and Gene Krupa on drums. The trio quickly became a quartet. "Next thing you know," recalls Hamp, "I was on stage jamming with these great musicians. That's one session I'll never forget."

The Benny Goodman Quartet made immediate musical history, not only for the brilliant music they produced, but because they were the first racially integrated group of jazz musicians ever. It was the beginning of the Swing Era and their mixed musical assemblage held great social significance. Among the classics the Quartet recorded, as it fast became the premier jazz group in the world, were "Moonglow," Dinah," and "Vibraphone Blues."

Hampton formed his own big band in the early 1940's. Following the release of a succession of

highly successful records under his own name, "Sunny Side of the Street" (on which he sang as well as played vibes) and "Central Avenue Breakdown" (on which he played piano with two fingers, using them as if they were vibes mallets) among them, he flew to the tope of the charts with his recordings of "Flying Home" in 1942 and "Hamp's Boogie-Woogie" in 1943.

The Lionel Hampton Orchestra had a phenomenal array of sidemen, far too long to list here, who got their start with Hamp. However, among these were Quincy Jones, Wes Montgomery, Clark Terry, Cat Anderson, Ernie Royal, Joe Newman, and Fats Navarro. Also among his protégés were singers Dinah Washington (who was discovered and named by Hamp,) Joe Williams, Betty Carter, and the now legendary Aretha Franklin. Jazz giant Hampton has received innumerable prestigious awards over the years. Among those of which he is most proud are the title Official American Goodwill Ambassador, bestowed by Presidents Eisenhower and Nixon, the Papal Medal from Pope Paul I, seventeen Honorary Doctorates and the Gold Medal of Paris, France's highest cultural award. In 1992 the highly-coveted Kennedy Center Honors Award, shared with Mstislav Rostropovich, Paul Taylor, Joanne Woodward, Paul Newman, and Ginger Rogers. With many honors and awards following through the years, Lionel was truly overwhelmed to receive The National Medal of the Arts at the White House in January 1997 bestowed by President William Jefferson Clinton and First Lady Hillary Rodham-

Reminiscing recently about his lifetime of honors and recognitions, Hampton held that the highlight of his career took place when the Music School at the University of Idaho was named the *Lionel Hampton School of Music* in 1987. It was the first university school of music ever named in honor of a jazz musician. Two years earlier, in February 1985, the yearly festival held at the University of Idaho was named the *Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival*.

This festival, again, is the first jazz festival in the world named after a jazz musician, and Lionel will tell you it's one of his greatest joys. The last week in February is Lionel Hampton's favorite time of year.

Mr. Hampton is also an accomplished composer. His original ballad "Midnight Sun" (written with Johnny Mercer and Sonny Burke) a beloved classic in American jazz and popular music, is among the many well-known jazz and pop compositions written over the years by the gifted musician. His talent in the symphonic field is highly respected as well. His two major symphonic works, "King David Suite" and "Blues Suite" have been performed often by leading philharmonic orchestras throughout the world.

At the age of 88, Hamp has kept to a schedule that has astonished everyone. Traveling from country to country, concert to concert, jazz club to jazz club with almost no break in between, Hamp completely belies his venerable age. On a recent tour of Europe ('96) he broke records at every stop and outlasted younger musicians every night. A tour of China has been in the offing for some time. Lionel is looking forward to the challenge.

Despite the rigors of his hectic schedule, Lionel Hampton continues to amaze fellow musicians and the music business in general with the energies he devotes to public service projects outside the music business. Long a supporter of public housing, he developed the Lionel Hampton Houses in early 70's in uptown New York and

shortly thereafter built the Gladys Hampton Houses, named after his late wife. His "dream" in the near future is to add a university in this area "where young black kids can learn to be doctors, lawyers, IBM technicians and, if they desire, musicians."

Lionel Hampton has raised literally millions of dollars for many, many charities and is dedicated supporter of the Republican Party. He has been active in every Presidential campaign since the early 1950's and has become a close personal friend of all the Republican Presidents, beginning with Dwight Eisenhower. He has been an honored guest at the White House many dozens of times and he has performed there frequently. He has been a guest of the Clintons at the White House several times in '94 and '95. He is also active in state politics and is always ready to share his talents for the benefit of his political and humanitarian beliefs. Among his social commitments, he also finds time to serve as Honorary Chairman of the Jazz Foundation of America's Musician Emergency Fund, a newly-formed volunteer organization dedicated to aiding jazz musicians who have fallen on hard times.

Hampton's stateside and overseas tours often feature his exciting seventeenpiece Lionel Hampton Orchestra, considered by critics to be the best big band of its type in the world. He also frequently appears as leader and soloist with his eight-piece group of renowned jazz musicians, known as the Golden Men of Jazz.. Hampton's own long-time record label, Glad Hamp Records, has released many dozens of recordings. Recent discs are on the Telarc label, Among the highlights of the year 1994 were Lionel's concert tour in Argentina, a three-week concert tour in Europe, a star appearance at the Hollywood Bowl for the Playboy Jazz Festival, where he closed the show bringing the audience of 18,000 to their feet with cheering, waving arms, and dancing in the aisles. It was one of the Bowl's most memorable jazz nights. In July 1994, Lionel performed his "King David Suite" in the Philharmonic Hall in Munich, Germany with The St. Petersburg (Russia) 60-piece Orchestra. It was wildly received by an audience composed of both classical and jazz fans.

In March of 1995, Lionel Hampton suffered a mild stroke and was hospitalized for ten days. Practicing a diligent program of physical therapy, Lionel was never at any time incapacitated. His strenuous overseas tours were postponed, but he was able to make an appearance at the New England Conservatory of Music where he received his 17th Honorary Doctorate. Certainly one of the highlights of 1995 was when the prestigious CBS Sunday Morning television show honored Lionel and his four-day festival at the University of Idaho. In September, an All-Star Tribute was given to Hampton at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. Jazz luminaries Joe Williams, Dr. Billy Taylor, Terence Blanchard, Ernestine Anderson, Milt Hinton, Buddy DeFranco, and vibists Milt Jackson, Roy Ayers and Terry Gibbs, all performed in Lionel's honor. Toward the end of the concert, Hamp insisted on joining the vibists and strode on stage and played. The audience gave him a standing ovation. In October, Lionel Hampton and his Golden Men of Jazz appeared for a week at the famed Blue Note in New York City. Hamp's drawing power has never been

January 1996 brought a two week engagement at the elegant Tavern On The Green in New York City. The entire engagement, of two shows a night, was completely sold-out before the opening. Each show brought standing ovations. February had Hamp at the helm of his four-day annual jazz festival at the University of Idaho. Peter Jenning's highly respected "World News Tonight" on the ABC network covered the entire four-days. On his television show, Peter Jennings saluted Lionel and bestowed his highly-coveted "Person of the Week" honor on Lionel. April had Lionel in a tribute appearance at the famed Apollo Theatre in New York entitled, "Lionel Hampton's Swing Into Spring." A host of jazz legends saluted the great jazz master at this landmark theatre. Also, this

special year brought Lionel to Los Angeles' South Central section where five of that troubled part of the city's high schools gave a unified concert in Lionel's honor. Hamp donated his time and considerable energies to working with the youngsters and providing them with encouraging words and music to continue their promising young careers. In Tampa, Florida in June, Hamp was inducted into the International Jazz Hall of Fame, then rushed back to New York for another popular week at New York's Blue Note. In November, Europe beckoned once again and Lionel put together his big New York band and traveled to his opening concert at the Teatre Sistina in Rome, followed by concerts in Munich, Linz and Vienna, Austria. The tour was a spellbinder and Lionel is invited back again same time next year.



Following the jaunt around Europe's splendid cities, Lionel rushed home to be honored by Jazz at Lincoln Center and was presented with the organization's first Jazz Master's Award at a gala concert in Avery Fisher Hall. Wynton Marsalis' Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra played many of Lionel's well known compositions. Natalie Cole gave a stirring rendition of Lionel's ballad composition, "Midnight Sun," and Ruth Brown sang the tune Lionel wrote with jazz critic Leonard Feather, "Evil Gal Blues," "CBS, distinguished Ed Bradley hosted the glittering evening. The crowded house and the dozen encores spoke eloquently of the deep regard in which Lionel is held.

Despite a vicious fire which engulfed his apartment and destroyed every possession he owned (manuscripts, recordings, photographs, his piano and his vibes) the exuberant octogenarian confides "I'm the luckiest man I know. I love my life. Music, travel, friends, fans, and the wonderful fulfillment of helping young music students further their talents brings me great joy. Tell me, what more could I ever ask?"

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
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Rawls was born in Chicago and raised by his grandmother. His first exposure to music was in a church choir when he was seven years old, but he was most influenced by Chicago's Regal Theater where he went to see the great Black entertainers of the day, including Billy Eckstine, Arthur Prysock and Joe Williams. Rawls joined The Pilgrim Travelers, a touring gospel group, which was the experience that laid the foundation for his style and ability to relate to an audience. His big break came in 1959 when he was performing at Pandora's Box Coffee Shop in Los Angeles. A producer with Capitol Records asked if he wanted

to make a record. The stunned singer did an audition tape and soon signed a contract. With the recording of his first album in 1966, he received national recognition which led to a string of award-winning albums. With each new album or set of concert dates there is a fresh enthusiasm that seems to come directly from his soul. This enthusiasm has led him to record a string of American standards which have garnered one platinum and six gold albums plus a gold single. Although vocalist/performer/philanthropist and four-time Grammy Award-winner Lou Rawls knows the taste of success very well, he is always looking for the next challenge.




Dianne Reeves

Born in Detroit, Dianne grew up in Denver listening to jazz, with her bass-playing uncle, Charles Burrell, as an early influence. In her late teens, still in high school, Dianne was "discovered" by trumpeter Clark Terry at an National Association of Jazz Educators Convention in Chicago. She joined Terry's band, performing at festivals and with the Denver Symphony Orchestra. After studying at the University of Colorado, Dianne moved to Los Angeles, recording with Caldera, cousin George Duke, and Stanley Turrentine. An eighteen-month stint with Sergio Mendes was followed by Dianne's initial recording. In 1983 she worked with Harry Belafonte who introduced her to the


rhythms of West Africa and the West Indies, leading her back to her African American roots. Since that time, Dianne has produced albums covering a range of musical styles. Several R&B hits led to a series of highly acclaimed performances across the country and overseas. She toured Europe extensively throughout 1991 and 1992, winning acclaim from audiences for her exciting and dynamic live performances. In 1994, after a painful period of soul-searching, Dianne worked with longtime friend and collaborator Eddie Del Barrio, producing her most recent album *Art & Survival* - undeniably personal music born of the struggle for self-discovery, identity and truth.

#### GUEST ARTISTS' BIOGRAPHIES-

Joe Lovano has been critically acclaimed as the next modern master of the tenor saxophone - in a lineage that includes Joe Henderson, Wayne Shorter, Coltrane, Dexter Gordon and other giants on the instrument. His "voice" on the instrument is singular and powerful and his musical concepts are fresh and always adventurous. His latest adventure is a collaboration with the Pulitzer Prize-winning composer Gunther Schuller. They met when they first worked together at a music symposium in Idaho two years ago and both became excited about embarking on this latest Blue Note recording Rush Hour which features a program of great standards and trailblazing originals by Schuller and Lovano. Down Beat magazine flatly stated that Lovano is "at the top of the heap of modern jazz saxophonists."

#### Joshua Redman

In the five years since he turned his back on law school and chose a career in music, saxophonist Joshua Redman has been on a path of constant progress, with musical successes matched by popular recognition in a manner rarely seen in the jazz world. After graduating summa cum laude and phi beta kappa from Harvard College, and following a summer of work with his father, the legendary Dewey Redman, Joshua created a sensation by taking first prize in the Thelonius Monk Institute of Jazz saxophone competition in 1991, and hasn't looked back since. His original compositions reflect the open, anti-categorical spirit one would expect from a musician born in 1969 who virtually has kept his ears wide open from birth. He grew up listening to and loving all kinds of music, and that variety and diversity are in his soul. He is eclectic as a person and as a musician. He freely incorporates non-jazz rhythmic elements into his music, which from his perspective only strengthens its authenticity. For Joshua, his latest album represents an extension of the soul and spirit of jazz - improvisation, interaction and spontaneity - into territory that isn't conventionally considered part of the jazz idiom.

# Randy Brecker trumpet

Randy Brecker has been shaping the sound of jazz, R&B and rock for more than two decades. His trumpet and flugelhorn performances have graced hundreds of albums by a wide range of artists, from James Taylor, Bruce Springsteen, Chaka Kahn, George Benson and Parliament Funkadelic, to David Sanborn, Horace Silver, Jaco Pastorius and Frank Zappa. His history is as varied as it is distinguished. Born in Philadelphia to a piano-playing father, Randy spent summers in big band stage camps where he got his earliest experience in ensemble playing. He began playing R&B and funk in local bar bands while in his teens, but at the same time he had an ear for hard bop. After finishing high school, Randy attended Indiana University. In 1966, he moved to New York where he played with Clark Terry's big band, then helped to form the jazz-rock group Blood, Sweat and Tears. Randy played with the Horace Silver Quintet, Art Blakey's Jazz




Messengers and formed the seminal fusion group Dreams. In 1973, Randy was back with Horace Silver, teaming up with his brother Michael as the frontline in Horace's quintet. By now the two horn players had become two of the most in-demand studio musicians of the day. The Brecker Brothers went on to record a total of six albums and garner seven Grammy nominations between 1975 and 1981. After the Brecker Brothers parted in 1982, Randy recorded and toured extensively with Jaco Pastorius. It was soon thereafter that Randy met his wife, jazz pianist Eliane Elias. Eliane and Randy formed their own band, touring the world several times and recording one album together. Through the end of the 80's, Randy toured North America and Europe several times as a leader, as well as touring with Stanley Clarke's Jazz Explosion. In 1989, he performed a sold out week at the Albert Hall in London with Eric Clapton. The 1990s began with a tour with Charles Mingus Dynasty/Epitaph followed by the reunion of the Brecker Brothers with a triple-Grammy nominated recording and tours throughout the U.S. In 1995, Randy toured Japan as a special guest with Stanley Turrnetine and, as a leader, was one of the first Western jazz artists to tour for several weeks throughout Poland. Most significantly, he began recording his first solo album in six years with a band of musicians assembled from different parts of the globe.



#### Sasha Daltonn

vocals

Singer/actress Sasha Daltonn is a prolific entertainer who has enjoyed acclaim on stage as a soloist, as a member of an award-winning production, as a favored songtress on the cabaret circuit, and as a champion of the arts. She is particularly renowned for her absorbing portrayal of Dinah Washington and for her crusading role in keeping alive the memory of the late "Queen of the Blues." She has won a host of honors including recent citywide recognition for her pioneering role in the creation of the Chicago Gospel Festival. She also was nominated for a coveted Joseph Jefferson award for her one-woman performance, "Madam Hortense." Sasha Daltonn has succeeded in leaving her imprint through decades of commitment. Because of this, she remains a constellation on the entertainment galaxy as an entertainer, writer, producer and innovator.







Elvin Jones drums

Elvin Jones comes from a family of musicians, brother Hank is known as one of the finest pianists in jazz and brother Thad has become a highly successful trumpet and flugelhorn player. In inventing and perfecting his unique "polyrhythmic" technique, Elvin Jones changed the direction of jazz drumming, raising the status of rhythm to equal that of melody. He has influenced the way a generation makes and hears music. He has performed with such jazz greats as Charlie Parker, Sonny Stitt, Miles Davis, Tommy Flanagan, Kenny Burrell, Pepper Adams and Lou Hayes. Elvin first came to global prominence through his association with John Coltrane, as part of the legendary 60's quartet which also included McCoy Tyner and Jimmy Garrison. Through 1966, Elvin contributed to some of the most controversial, influential, and ultimately important music in jazz. Since that time, Elvin has been active as a performer, composer, arranger, producer, and educator and has tirelessly brought his message to nearly 40 countries.


Jazz pianist-composer, Hank Jones, was born in Pontiac Michigan in 1918. He played with local bands in Michigan, Ohio and New York only 13 years later. When he was 25, he moved to New York City to play with trumpeter Hot Lips Page's combo, and it was with this group that Jones made the first of what would amount to thousands of recordings, as a soloist, an accompanist, and a group member. Jones's versatility has kept him in constant demand as an accompanist and as an ensemble member throughout his career. He has played with Coleman Hawkins, Andy Kirk, Billy Eckstine, Artie Shaw, Johnny Hodge, and Benny Goodman, among others. As an accompanist Jones had a five-year association with Ella Fitzgerald. As a 15-year member of the CBS Orchestra, the range of his work was even further extended, as Jones performed with the vocalists Patti Page, Julie Andrews, Andy Williams, Barbara Streisand, Harry Belafonte, and many more. Even Broadway has felt the touch of Jones' versatile musicianship. For over three years, he was conductor and pianist for the musical "Ain't Misbehavin".






#### GUEST ARTISTS' BIOGRAPHIES -

Multi-talented Benny Golson is an acclaimed musical artist who is at home in nearly every idiom of modern music. He is a composer, arranger, lyricist, producer and a saxophonist of world note. His influence has had an impact on jazz, motion pictures, television and records. In New York, Benny began to gain fame as a saxophonist with such bands as Dizzy Gillespie, Art Blakey, Lionel Hampton, Benny Goodman and even his own group. He has written music for Diana Ross, Connie Francis, Eartha Kitt, Lou Rawls, Nancy Wilson, Carmen McRae, Ella Fitzgerald, Peggy Lee, Oscar Peterson, Miles Davis, George Shearing, John Coltrane, Dizzy Gillespie, the Bangkok Symphony Orchestra, and the BalletMet to name only a few. He has written scores for M\*A\*S\*H, Mission Impossible, The Partridge Family, Mannix, Mod Squad, major network pilots, feature films in Paris, France and Germany and national radio and television spots for many major advertising agencies. In addition to being a lecturer at major universities, he is an international recording artist who has recorded over thirty albums under his own name and innumerable ones with other major artists. Mr. Golson has been a successful writer of instrumental songs that have long since acquired international status. He has recently begun collaborating with the renowned singer and lyricist, Peggy Lee.

#### Herb Ellis guitar

Guitarist Herb Ellis creates a fully original style, playing melody with sensitivity and phrases with a horn-like conception. Given his first guitar at the age of four, Ellis has since graced the harmonious contributions of Jimmy Dorsey, Ella Fitzgerald, Julie London, Oscar Peterson, and Charlie Byrd. He won a Grammy in 1990 as a member of the Oscar Peterson Trio in the category of Best Jazz Instrumental Performance. Jazz critic Leonard Feather described the guitar duo of Ellis and Joe Pass in the 70's as "unabashed advocates of swinging improvisation, their teamwork has a relaxed living room feeling rather than a concert hall precision." Ellis uses an Aria-Pro guitar of his own design, known as the Herb Ellis Model, which boasts a special neck that makes it technically easier to play. He currently explores his instrument with the "Great Guitars," as a duo with Barney Kessel and as a featured artist in jazz concerts and night clubs.



Within the music world, Pete Candoli is regarded as one of the most precise and eloquent interpreters of jazz. A trumpet player of major importance, Pete has played with over 27 of the

top name bands, including Tommy Dorsey, Glenn Miller, Woody Herman, Charlie Barnet, Stan Kenton, Les Brown, and Count Basie. He has composed and arranged music for Judy Garland, Ella Fitzgerald, and Peggy Lee, and made recordings with over fifty top recording artists, including Henry Mancini, Igor Stravinsky, Nelson Riddle, and Quincy Jones. Pete was named outstanding trumpet player by both Down Beat and Metronome Magazine, the two most prestigious publications in the music business. When Pete is not playing a jazz festival, concert or nightclub, he is active conducting college music seminars.


Now recognized as an international jazz giant of the trumpet, Conte began blowing his horn at the age of sixteen, working his way around the major big bands of the time, Woody Herman, Stan Kenton, Charlie Barnet, Benny Goodman, and Jimmy Dorsey. He has played with many of the smaller best known jazz ensembles such as Super Sax, Charlie Ventura, Shelly Manne, Howard Rumsey's Lighthouse All Stars, and

many others. Renowned as one of the world's top studio musicians, Conte Candoli probably works on more recording sessions than any other living trumpet player. He has recorded with Frank Sinatra, Bing Crosby, John Lennon, Chicago and other contemporary artists as well as on his own. He has been highly visible as part of the brass section of the NBC Tonight Show Band for many years.

#### Brian Bromberg

Growing up in a family of musicians where both his dad and brother played drums, Brian Bromberg began his career at the very young age of thirteen, as a drummer. At fourteen, Brian began his classical training on bass. Only a few years later, he was one of the most respected and talked about musicians in the business. By age nineteen, Brian was touring the world with Stan Getz, performed at Carnegie Hall, and has since played and recorded with many jazz greats including Horace Silver, Monty Alexander, Dave Grusin, Dizzy Gillespie, Richie Cole, Joe Farrell, Lee Ritenour, and Freddie Hubbard. A gifted musician, composer, arranger, producer, and performer, Brian reaches unprecedented melodic and technical heights with a variety of acoustic and electric basses including fretted, fretless, piccolo, upright, and synth. Brian's popularity is rapidly increasing and he is being recognized as one of the finest lead bass players of this generation.



#### Claudio Roditi Group



Roditi began his musical studies when he was just five years old. By the time he was 12, he had already become a serious jazz listener. Eight years later, he was named a finalist in the International Jazz Competition in Vienna. Claudio studied music at the Berklee School of Music in Boston and later joined the faculty of the School of Contemporary Music, all the while continuing to perform at clubs and concerts. In 1976, Claudio moved to New York where he has performed and/or recorded with Charlie Rouse, Herbie Mann, Slide Hampton, and Paquito D'Rivera, among others. Claudio integrates post-bop elements and Brazilian rhythmic concepts with ease and plays with power and lyricism. This versatility keeps him in demand as a leader, a studio musician and a sideman. He is also a composer and arranger and has five critically-acclaimed albums. Currently he leads his own band and frequently travels as a member of Dizzy Gillespie's United Nations Orchestra.


# Helio Alves

Helio Alves started playing piano at the age of six in his native Sao Paulo, Brazil. After training classically as a child, Helio segued into jazz in his teenage years and was soon playing local gigs in Sao Paulo. He continued his study of jazz when he moved to Boston and enrolled at the Berkelee College of Music. Upon graduating from Berklee, Helio came to New York City and started working with the likes of Claudio Roditi, Paquito D'Rivera, Dave Samuels and Gato Barbieri, to name a few. Since 1995 Helio has been a member of Joe Henderson's "Double Rainbow Quartet," highlighting jazz clubs and festivals around the world.

#### Duduka da Fonseca

Born in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, Duduka began playing the drums at the age of twelve. By the age of fifteen he was appearing on television, performing with the top musicians of Brazil. In 1975, Duduka came to New York, establishing numerous Brazilian Jazz groups, among them "The Brazilian Jazz All Stars" featuring artists Bob Mintzer, Elian Elias, and Randy Brecker. Duduka is co-leader of Trio da Paz, nominated as the best new Latin Jazz group of 1993. He has performed and recorded with artists such as Antonio Carlos Jobim, Astrud Gilberto, Herbie Mann, Claudio Roditi, Joe Henderson, Gerry Mulligan, New York Voices, and many others. Since 1984, Duduka has been a member of the faculty at the Drummer's Collective, conducting workshops and private lessons. Duduka has also conducted workshops in Europe and Japan. Duduka is the author of an instructional book and tape or CD, "Brazilian Rhythms for Drumset", published by Manhattan Music/DCI.



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#### **Monty Alexander Trio**

Born and raised in Kingston, Jamaica, Monty began piano lessons at the age of six. As a teenager he was often invited to sit in with the bands of some of the prominent musicians in Jamaica. While still a teenager he had the opportunity to enjoy the performances of Louis Armstrong and Nat "King" Cole at the Carib theatre in Jamaica. His style of playing was deeply affected

by their joyful gospel of jazz. He formed a band called "Monty and the Cyclones" which recorded songs which charted on the Jamaican hit parade from 1958 to 1960. In the summer of 1963 Monty played in Las Vegas with Art Mooney's Orchestra and was observed by Jilly Rizzo and his friend, Frank Sinatra. Jilly hired him to work in his club "Jilly's" in New York City. There he played for and accompanied many of the well known names in show business, including Frank Sinatra, Sammy Davis, Jr., Judy Garland and Milt Jackson, who hired Alexander to work with him. Soon thereafter, he began an association with bassist Ray Brown which lasted for many years. He has also performed with other giants in jazz, including Dizzy Gillespie, Clark Terry, and Sonny Rollins. Since 1964, Monty has recorded with other artists and played on movie sound tracks and albums with Quincy Jones. He worked for producer/director Clint Eastwood on the film, "Bird" and in 1991, he collaborated with Natalie Cole in the tribute to her father Nat "King" Cole. In 1993, he had the honor of performing at Carnegie Hall in a tribute to the beloved jazz pianist, Erroll Garner. Monty performed at the Montreux Jazz Festival in Switzerland with opera singer Barbara Hendricks in a program of Duke Ellington compositions and again with his all-Jamaican reggae group where he recorded his live album "Yard Movement". In 1996, Monty performed Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue" with a seventy-piece orchestra directed by Bobby McFerrin at the Verbier Festival in Switzerland.

# Jeff Hamilton drums

Originality is what versatile drummer Jeff Hamilton brings to the groups he performs with and is one of the reasons why he is constantly in demand, whether he is recording or performing with his trio, Oscar Peterson, Ray Brown, the Clayton Brothers or co-leading the Clayton/Hamilton Jazz Orchestra. Jeff has received rave reviews for his dynamic drumming. Born in Richmond, Indiana, Jeff grew up listening to his parent's big band records and at the age of eight began playing

Jeff grew up listening to his parent's big band records and at the age of eight began playing drums along with Oscar Peterson records. He attended Indiana University and later studied with John von Ohlen. Jeff was influenced by Gene Krupa, Buddy Rich, Mel Lewis, "Philly" Joe Jones and Shelly Manne. In 1974 he got his first big break playing with the New Tommy Dorsey Orchestra. He then joined Lionel Hampton's Band until 1975 when he, along with bassist John Clayton, became members of the Monty Alexander Trio. He attained a childhood

goal in 1977 when he joined Woody Herman and the Thundering Herd, with whom he made several recordings. In 1978, he was offered the position vacated by Shelly Manne in the LA4 with Ray Brown, Bud Shank and Laurindo Almeida. Jeff began his association with the Ray Brown Trio in 1988 and left in March 1995 to concentrate on his own trio. In addition to his many recordings with Ray Brown, Jeff has been on over 150 recordings with artists such as Natalie Cole, Barbara Streisand, Mel Torme, Benny Carter, George Shearing, Dr. John, Milt Jackson, Clark Terry, Gene Harris, Toshiko Akioshi and many others. Jeff has also appeared in Natalie Cole's Great Performances PBS Special, Unforgettable and Oscar Peterson's documentary, Life in the Key of Oscar.

composer Ben Wolfe was born in Baltimore, Maryland, but grew up in Portland, Oregon. By his early twenties he was freelancing regularly in the Portland area and also backing national acts such as Woody Shaw. At age 23 he moved to New York City where he worked with musicians such as Junior Cook, Duke Jordon, Jimmy Cobb, Dakota Staton, and the Mel Lewis Orchestra. In 1988 he begun a fiveyear stint with Harry Connick Jr., which

included over a dozen albums and soundtracks, many television appearances, and multiple world tours. In January of 1994, he joined the Wynton Marsalis septet and remained with the group until it disbanded. He spent most of 1995 working with Wynton Marsalis and the Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra, which included performances with Joe Henderson, Harry "Sweets" Edison, Slide Hampton, Doc Cheatham, Phil Woods, Jimmie Heath, Billy Higgins, Charles McPherson, John Faddis, Al Grey, John Hendricks, and many others.



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
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Wallace was four when he began toying with the trumpet and five when he began theory and piano lessons. By nine, Wallace was studying advanced trumpet with Sigmund Haring of the Philadelphia Orchestra, his hometown band. By thirteen Wallace had his own band and a year later he recorded with poet/activist Haki Madhubuti. In 1979, he won Down Beat Magazine's "Best Young Jazz Musician of the Year" award announcing him to be one of the most important "future people" in jazz. After attending Howard University and the Berklee College of Music, he joined Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers and later was offered the Music Director's chair by Blakey. At the same time, drummer Tony Williams requested Wallace's horn in the front line. He toured with both bands and his reputation grew, winning Down Beat's Critics Poll as Talent Deserving Wider Recognition in 1990. (No less than Dizzy Gillespie listed him as a personal favorite.) In 1991, Miles Davis invited Wallace to perform with him in the Montreux Jazz Festival and in 1992 a special band in tribute to Miles Davis was formed. Featuring Wayne Shorter, Herbie Hancock, Ron Carter, Tony Williams and Wallace Roney as starring trumpeter, the band began a world tour in 1992. When asked about his musical direction, Wallace replied that he strives to "push music as far as it can go. We're dealing with polychords and polyharmonies. The way you can superimpose chords over chords has become very intriguing to me."

#### Bill Evans tenor saxophone

Eclectic, unpredictable and experimental, Evans leaves no doubt that he favors an expansive approach to jazz drawing on rap, hip-hop, funk, soul, reggae, Brazilian music and other idioms. Evans' willingness to take risks was no doubt encouraged by his four years with Miles Davis - jazz's ultimate risktaker. Not long after moving to New York from his native Chicago in 1980, he met Davis and ended up being featured on Davis' "comeback" album in 1981, The Man with the Horn and its successors, Star People and We Want Miles. After leaving Davis' band in 1984, he went on to play with two fusion heroes who'd also played with Davis - first, with guitarist John McLaughlin and his Mahavisnu Orchestra from 1984-87, and with keyboardist/pianist Herbie Hancock in a new edition of Headhunters in 1989 and 1990. As a leader, he's recorded eight albums - nine if you count his leadership role in the self-titled 1992 album by fusion band, Petite Blonde, which united him with guitarist Chick Loeb, keyboardist Mitchell Forman, drummer Dennis Chambers and bassist Victor Bailey. Through it all, he has never lost his sense of adventure. "As much as I enjoy some of the young straight-ahead guys," Evans explains, "playing one type of jazz exclusively is never what I'll be about. Hopefully, I'll always be looking to try something fresh and different.


With the release of Twenty One, her third recording for Blue Note, pianist Geri Allen honors the great jazz tradition to which she has become such a vital contributor in the 1990s. Dating from her early years at the legendary Cass Technical High School in Detroit, where her mentor was trumpeter Marcus Belgrave, Allen's musical world has been characterized by collaboration and study. After graduating with a degree in jazz studies from Howard University in Washington, DC in 1979, she studied with piano great Kenny Barron in New York. She accepted jazz educator Nathan Davis' invitation to attend the University of Pittsburgh where she earned a masters in ethnomusicology, and returned to New York City in 1982. In addition to teaching as an Assistant Professor of Music at Howard and garnering such honors as that university's Distinguished Alumni Award, the SESAE Special Achievement Award, the Eubie Blake Award from Cultural Crossroads, and recognition as the top Talent Deserving Wider Recognition in Down Beat magazine's 1993 and 1994 Critic Polls, Allen has amassed a stunning resume of musical collaborations. Her colleagues have included such early M-BASE musicians as Steve Coleman, Greg Osby and Kevin Eubanks, as well as such modern greats as saxophonists Oliver Lake, Julius Hemphill, Arthur Blythe, and Dewey Redman, trumpeter Lester Bowie, flutist James Newton, bassist Charlie Haden, and drummer Paul Motian. Allen has had the opportunity to work in some very choice musical environments, including a recent tour with Ornette Coleman's new acoustic quartet alongside Denardo Coleman and Charnett Moffett. She's also accompanied vocal diva Betty Carter and played in the quintet of trumpeter Wallace Roney.

#### Al Grey trombone

World class trombonist, composer, arranger and educator, Al "Golden Trombone" Grey, is a consummate musician and an original stylist. A veteran big band player, Al Grey is recognized internationally as a premier trombonist, and the foremost proponent of the plunger and mute. In his early days, Grey performed with the leading big bands, which included those of Benny Carter, Luck Millinder, Jimmy Lunceford, Dizzy Gillespie and Lionel Hampton. Grey embarked upon a amazing career throughout the United States, Canada, Europe, the Middle East, the Far East and even behind the Iron Curtain. Between various band performances, he produced more than 1,000 recordings with famous greats such as Frank Sinatra, Bing Crosby, Count Basie, Tony Bennett, Ella Fitzgerald, Sarah Vaughn and Teresa Brewer. For nearly 20 years, Grey toured with Count Basie and was a featured soloist, expounding the tantalizing vocal sounds of the mute and plunger. His triple-tongued lectures, bellowing growls, lowdown bubbly notes and condensed phrases imitate the gamut of human conversation. No wonder Basie called him "Mr. Fabulous".



A jazz trombonist who is among the best on his instrument, Bill Watrous has played with Quincy Jones, Woody Herman, Count Basie and was a member of the group "Ten Wheel Drive". He has recorded with many top name artists, including Frank Sinatra, Quincy Jones, Ella Fitzgerald, Peggy Lee, and Ray Charles, to name only a few. Bill was a staff musician for CBS and a member of the bands for the Dick Cavett and Merv Griffin Shows. He has been named number one jazz trombonist for seven consecutive years in Down Beat's Reader's Poll and won the magazine's Critics Awards twice. Bill is an active performer and has recorded nine albums - his second was nominated for a Grammy.

Carl Fontana is considered by musicians and educators alike to be among the world's supreme jazz artists. His improvisational virtuosity and contemporary style have been the major influence of virtually every jazz trombonist today. He has travelled with road bands such as Woody Herman, Hal McIntyre, and Stan Kenton and has appeared in Las Vegas showbands with such notables as Paul Anka, Wayne Newton, Frank Sinatra, Sammy Davis, Jr., Merv Griffin, and Benny Goodman. His personal appearances have seen standing-room-only audiences at jazz clubs in Los Angeles and New York. Periodically, Carl has recorded as a special guest artist with Louis Bellson, Supersax, and the World's Greatest Jazz Band.

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Born in Nanaimo, British Columbia, Diana grew up surrounded by music and musicians - her mother and father both played the piano. She studied classical piano but played jazz in the school band with bassist-teacher Bryan Stovell.

Diana's first gig was at age fifteen in a Nanaimo restaurant and she's been playing ever since. Her favorite singers have all played piano: Dinah Washington, Roberta Flack, Shirley Horn, Andy Bey, Aretha Franklin, Sarah Vaughan and especially Carmen McRae and Nat Cole. Her first inspiration was Fats Waller. When she was just a kid, she tried to learn all his tunes and to play and sing at the same time. Diana studied for a while on a Vancouver Jazz Festival scholarship at Berklee College of Music in Boston. She returned to British Columbia where she became friends with Jeff Hamilton and Ray Brown when they performed there. They encouraged her to venture down to Los Angeles, where a Canadian Arts Council grant enabled her to study with pianist Jimmy Rowles, who, being a pianist-singer himself, inspired her to sing more. Hamilton's musical partner, bassist John Clayton, also befriended Diana, and they often performed together as a trio. In 1984, Diana returned to Canada from Los Angeles and settled in Toronto, where she studied with bassist-pianist Don Thompson. She came to New York in 1990, but she performed most often in Boston with a trio that included bassist Whit Browne and drummer Klaus Suonsaari.

# Dee Daniels vocals

Dee Daniels has an amazing four octave range that developed as she sang gospel music in her father's church choir in Oakland, California. Her talent made its mark at a very young age and she continued to develop her love for music as she entered the University of Montana where she founded, directed, wrote arrangements for and accompanied the university's noted Black Ensemble Gospel Choir. In 1972, she joined "Dynamite," an established group in the Seattle area, and introduced her gospel roots to the more commercial areas of rhythm and blues, soul, and rock. By 1974, Dee's reputation had extended to California where she was invited to appear at a popular Hollywood nightclub. She stayed for one year, performing at other clubs, playing concerts, and recording backing vocals for many artists, as well as jingles for national products and companies. Dee returned to Seattle and during the next four years she captivated capacity crowds while fronting trios, quartets, big bands, and performing solo. She enjoyed regular radio and television exposure and was honored with several civic and national awards for her music. By 1979, Dee was beginning to be recognized as a "jazz singer" by the public and critics alike. In 1982, she began a fiveyear stint in Europe where she performed with many of the jazz greats, including Ernestine Anderson and the late Sarah Vaughn. Today, Dee Daniels makes her home in Vancouver, B.C. and her voice and presence continue to make an international statement while she performs around the world where every performance ends with a standing ovation.




#### **Lembit Saarsalu**

saxophone

Born in 1948, Lembit became interested in jazz as a result of the international Tallin Jazz Festival held in 1967. Determined to become a tenor saxophone player, he independently mastered the playing of the instrument. He finished Tallin music school as a clainet player in the class of the veteran Estonian jazzman Alexander Ryabor. His jazz quartet made a successful debut during the Tbilsi jazz festival in 1978 and soon thereafter, the first "giant" was recorded. One side of the recording represented Estonian national

dances and songs. For Saarsalu, the Estonian national and professional musical tradition has always remained an inspirational environment, although his ears are open to the whole world of music. He performed in Hungary, Bulgaria, and Cuba, bringing back with him impressions of musical traditions of different nations. In 1984 he met Leonid and performed on the international jazz festival in Prague. The following year they performed together at the Denets Jazz Festival and shortly thereafter in the Berlin Festival of "Jazz-Stage" with great success. The duo released their first recording which highlights their relationship with the national traditions, with jazz standards and with their own compositions.

Born in 1949 in the town of Kursk, Leonid has played the piano


since the age of seven. As a twenty-year-old student of the piano at the Kazan conservatory, he was able to hear the radio broadcast

> (piano). This performance made a strong and serious impression on him, influencing the conceptions of his own compositions of jazz music. He first turned to the classical style of jazz, then later became interested in studying new, avant-garde jazz. The second strong impression on this style was the folk choir of the Belgrade village Fostchevatovo, in which he heard the harmony of Stravinsky's music. After finishing the conservatory, he taught at Kursk musical school. There, he established a stage jazz section and in 1976, he formed a professional jazz ensemble. Leonid later formed a duo with saxophone player Vladimir Konovalchev, which was highly successful. Then Leonid met

Lembit. Both found in each other mutual interests and feelings. The duo form of musical improvisation exhibits a strong artistic expression, especially when each musician is tuned to the other and, remaining still himself, is absorbed in his partner.

#### **Igor Butman** saxophone

Saxophonist Igor Butman's first jazz teacher was the Voice of America. Each night between 11:15 and midnight, what was often more static than jazz, floated over the Iron Curtain by short-wave radio. Already known in the Soviet Union as the nation's best tenor saxophonist, he emigrated to the United Sates in 1987 to pursue his dream of becoming a worldclass jazz musician. Butman's group was one of only four officially recognized jazz bands in Moscow and repeatedly placed first in the Soviet Critics' Poll. While in Russia, he played with touring American musicians including Grover Washington, Jr., who took him under his wing. Since his emigration, Butman's career has moved straight ahead as a featured soloist with the Billy Taylor Quartet, the Walter Davis Jr. Quartet, the Monty Alexander Quintet, and actor/musician Michael Moriarty's Quintet. He is also featured on Washington's album "Then and Now" (Sony).






# Kitty Margolis vocals

Jazz royalty and the nation's top critics agree that Kitty Margolis is one of the new generation's most brilliant jazz singers. Her exuberant, inventive approach and high wire improvisational mastery have earned her "Talent Deserving

Wider Recognition" honors in the 1994 and 1995 DownBeat International Critic's poll and recognition from the Village Voice, Jazziz, Coda and the SF Examiner, all of whom picked her second album "Evolution" as one of the top jazz releases of 1994. Her eagerly awaited third album "Straight Up With a Twist" features R&B legend Charles Brown and trumpeter Roy Hargrove, and will be out in the Spring of 1997. A San Francisco native, Margolis began her recording career after attending Harvard University and San Francisco State where she studied with jazz great John Handy. Her warm, full-bodied sound, riveting stage presence and extraordinary scatting abilities quickly established her as a strong force on the contemporary jazz vocal scene and her hit records have made her a hot ticket on four continents at many top festivals, clubs and concert halls. To complement her work as a performer, Margolis also works as a jazz educator both privately and in clinics nationwide. As JazzTimes magazine says, "Rarely does a female vocalist emerge who exhibits the assurance, skill, creativity and expressiveness to cast her into the spotlight with singers such as Sarah Vaughn, Ella Fitzgerald, Carmen McRae or Betty Carter. Kitty Margolis, with her rich contralto, perfect pitch, facile phrasing and strong sense of swing, matches these masters." (Visit Kitty's website at www.kittymargolis.com for the latest news in Kitty's world.)

Noted jazz critic Nat Hentoff wrote, "John Stowell can make an electric guitar sound like a singing voice." Experts throughout the world have echoed that praise. The esteem John holds among his peers makes him in demand for recording and performance dates with, among others, Milt Jackson, Art Farmer, Conte Condoli, Herb Ellis, Bill Watrous, Pete Christlieb, Billy Higgins, Billy Hart, Richie Cole, Ralph Towner, and Scott Hamilton. For seven years, John and virtuoso bassist David Friesen toured extensively to critical acclaim everywhere from Australia to New York. With flutist Paul Horn, he and David Friesen were the first American jazzmen invited to perform in Russia in more than forty years. John has played many of the international jazz festivals, including Newport, Monterey, Telluride, Arcosante, Molde (Norway), Berlin, and others and taught as either a faculty member of clinician, at Manhattan School of Music, the Westchester Conservatory, Berklee College of Music, and the National Jazz Educators Convention. He spends much of each year doing clinics, workshops, and performances for colleges throughout the United States and Canada and is on the adjunct faculty of Marylhurst College in Portland.

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
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
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#### **Christian Bausch**

Christian F. Bausch was born in Sweden, before his family moved to Germany. He studied for four years at the Maastricht Conservatory with the principle bass player from the Concertgebouw Symphony Orchestra in the Netherlands. During this time he was performing a wide variety of music in different bands in Germany, the Netherlands, Belgium, Austria and Hungary. Mr. Bausch worked, recorded and performed with such artists as Charlie Mariano, Jaques Pelzer and Garrison Fewell. After receiving a scholarship from the Berklee College of Music, Christian decided to continue his successful career in the USA. Soon after his arrival, Christian (majoring in a Degree of Performance and Filmscoring/Composition) received numerous awards from the College and was nominated for the All-American Scholar Collegiate Award from the United States Achievement Academy. Since his arrival in the USA, touring opportunities led him to Florida, Georgia, Idaho, California, Mexico, Turkey and Japan. Christian has performed with such jazz notables as Gary Burton, George Garzone, John LaPorta, Richard Evans, Joe Hunt, Jane Jarvis, Makoto Ozone, Phil Wilson, Billy Pierce, Phil Grenadiere, Hal Crook, Bobby Hebb and Casey Scheurell.





Seduced by the sounds of great jazz on the Voice of America radio network, pianist Andrei Kitaev made the long journey from Moscow, Russia to pursue the creative freedom of the music he loved. A gifted child, he was admitted to the Gnessen School of Music, Moscow's equivalent of New York's Juilliard, at the age of six. Due in part to the classical training he received in his native country, Kitaev was offered a recording contract by Reference Records almost immediately after settling in the San Francisco Bay Area. His first album "First Takes" debuted in 1978, but it wasn't until 11 years later, after moving to Portland, Oregon, that his second album "Yesterdays" was released. A member of the Oregon Arts Commission's "Oregon on Tour" program, he was featured in an hour long segment of "PDX: Jazz Summit," an eight part television series produced and aired by Oregon Public Broadcasting. In 1990, he was named "Most Outstanding New Artist" by the Portland Music Association, winning one of the first "Crystal Awards" ever presented.



# Jane Jarvis

Born in Vincennes, Indiana, Jane started piano study at age nine. She auditioned to appear on a kiddie's radio program and stayed on as staff-pianist. In high school she appeared in theatricals with Karl Malden and Red Skelton. Jane received scholarships to attend Bush Conservatory, Chicago Conservatory and DePaul University School of Music. Many years later, she graduated from Pace University in New York City. Jane was an organist for the Milwaukee Braves for 10 years and for the New York Mets for 16 years, during a time when her jazz career was also expanding. She appeared with Eddie South, Milt Hinton, Grady Tate, Clark Terry's Big Band, Major Holley and Lionel Hampton. As a composerlyricist, she co-authored with Lionel Hampton, Johnny Hodges, Roy Eldridge, Steve Allen, Clark Terry and Jess Stacy. She has recorded with Tommy Newsom, Grady Tate, Jake Hanna and other jazz luminaries. In November of 1994, Jazz Music Education, Inc., initiated the first annual "Jane Jarvis Jazz Invitational" with proceeds going to the Jane Jarvis Piano Scholarship Fund.

Andy Laverne was born in New York City and enrolled at the Juilliard School of Music at the age of eight as a classical piano student. He continued his musical education at the New York City High School of Music and Art,. Ithaca College, Berklee College of Music, and the New England Conservatory. LaVerne's professional career includes three years with Woody Herman's big band and four years as pianist, composer and arranger with the Stan Getz Quartet. He has also played and recorded with Frank Sinatra, Sonny Stitt, Dizzy Gillespie, Chick Corea, Marian McPartland and numerous other top jazz performers. LaVerne was the recipient of four Jazz Fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts and he has also been awarded several ASCAP composer awards as well as a "Meet the Composer" grant. LaVerne spends much of his time touring North America and Europe playing concerts, clubs and giving clinics. He has also served as an adjunct professor of music at the University of Bridgeport, and the Mannes College of Music.



#### Travelin' Light Jazz Duo

Since 1991, Travelin' Light has performed on tour in North America and Europe. Utilizing the unlikely combination of tuba and acoustic guitar/banjo, the duo has performed extensively on radio, television, and has recorded four compact discs on the Telarc and Concord Jazz labels. The many educational clinics taught by Travelin' Light while on tour have been the inspiration for a basic, user friendly approach to jazz improvisation studies - a play along CD and instructional booklet for jazz beginners.

Best known as a founding member of the internationally renowned Empire Brass Quintet, Samuel Pilafian now

enjoys a rich career both inside and outside the classical music world. He has performed and recorded with such diverse organization as the Boston Symphony, Pink Floyd, the Metropolitan Opera, the New York Philharmonic, the Duke Ellington Orchestra, the Orchestra of St. Luke, and actress/singer Bernadette Peters. He was recently appointed Professor of Music at Arizona State University having previously served on the faculties of Boston University and their summer Tanglewood Institute. He has recorded a series of wind music compact discs for the Angel/EMI label with trumpeter Mark Gould. Recently, Pilafian became a member of Summit Brass. Recital and concerto performances this year will take him to Canada, Sweden Germany, Spain,

Switzerland, and Japan, as well as the United State.

Born in Islip, New York, the son of a banjo player who wrought constant musical exposure on his quick-learning, impressionable son. Frank started playing the guitar when he was five and remembers, "...my father brought me my first records by Django Reinhardt, Joe Pass and Bucky Pizzarelli. By age fourteen Frank had won the Grand National Banjo Championship in Canada and recorded an album. He broadened his improvisational awareness by studying at the Cultural Art center of Long Island. 

Born in Tokyo, Japan, Kuni started taking piano lessons at the age of six. He pursued his music studies primarily as a hobby until, while a high school student, he heard jazz pianist Dave Brubeck's rendition of "Take Five." It was then that he "decided to become a jazz pianist." His uncle, a samisen player with the Grand Kabuki, and other family members who were musicians supported his decision, and his uncle helped to subsidize Kuni's journey to New York. Many of his compositions draw upon his Japanese heritage and combine the best of jazz and Japanese musical perspectives in a very personal style. On her latest release, Boogie to Heaven, Wynters teams with Dr. John, Roger Kellaway, Joe Beck and Jay Leonhart.



# Jim Martinez

Pianist Jim Martinez, from Sacramento, California, began his musical career at the early age of four. Saxophonist/composer and arranger Lance Bryant comes out of Markahm Illinois, a small town near Chicago. He received his music education at Berklee College of Music in Boston, where he studied saxophone and composition. During his tenure at Berklee, Lance fostered musical relationships with fellow classmates saxophonist Branford Marsalis, drummer Marvin "Smitty" Smith, trumpeter Wallace Roney, and other renowned musicians. In 1986, Lance received a National Endowment of the Arts Study Fellowship, which enabled him to study saxophone and arranging privately with Frank Foster, former director of the Count Basie Orchestra. Spare time often finds Lance teaching saxophone and jazz at New York City's Jazz Mobile workshops or as an artist-in-residence for the New Jersey State Council on the Arts. Lance made his musical film debut in Spike Lee's feature film, Malcolm X. Since 1990, Lance has toured extensively throughout the United States, Europe and Japan with Phyllis Hyman, "Bootsy" Collins, Cindy Blackman, Abdullah Ibrahim, Pete LaRocca and the Lionel Hampton Orchestra. He currently serves as the Orchestra's Musical Director and Principle Arranger. Lances work as an arranger is featured on the recent Lionel Hampton release entitled For the Love of Music (MoJazz records).

Amy is looking forward to pursuing a graduate degree in music.



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
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
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#### Victoria Rowell Actress/Dancer

# Chip Deffaa jazz critic

Chip Deffaa is the ASCAP-Deems Taylor Award-winning jazz critic of the New York Post and a regular contributor to Entertainment Weekly. He has written about music for magazines worldwide, including England's Crescendo, Canada's Coda, Japan's Swing Journal, and Americas' Down Beat, Living Blues, and Jazz Times. He also contributed to the landmark New Grove Dictionary of Jazz. At Princeton University, Deffaa was a student of distinguished Ferris Professor of Jounralism, Irving Dilliard. He is a trustee of The Princeton Tiger magazine today. In addition, Deffaa has been a radio host, and, in partnership with his sister, Deborah, a cable television producer. He is the author of such books about jazz (all of which are currently in print) as Voices of the Jazz Age (published in the United States by the University of Illinois Press and in Great Britain by the Bayou Press), which was a finalist for the Excellence in Recorded Sound Reserach Award of the American Association for Recorded Sound Collections; and Swing Legacy, Traditionalists and Revivalists in Jazz, and In the Mainstream, (published in the United States and Great Britain by the Scarecrow Press). His specialty is preserving the oral histories of veteran jazz artists.

A Berkeley native, Mr. Elwood has been a popular music critic and columnist for the San Francisco Examiner for 30 years. Since 1965 he has been a professor of history and music history in the Peralta Colleges, Oakland, CA. He has taught and lectured in the field of popular music, jazz, blues, etc. at Sonoma State University, University of California (Berkeley), San Francisco State University, and Diablo Valley College. Mr. Elwood's radio career in jazz and blues programming began in the late 1940s; he has been a jazz program producer and announcer, a regular participant in radio and television programs in the San Francisco area, an advisor to a number of PBS music specials and is on the NARAS (Grammy) selection panel for the Hall of Fame awards. Elwood's enthusiasm for vernacular American music developed during his secondary school years in Berkeley. His record collection is considered among the most complete in the west totaling about 50,000 discs as well as a few thousand cylinders, piano rolls, etc. He is a frequent contributor to music magazines and journals and has written hundreds of liner-notes for record albums. He travels widely and often in the world of jazz, blues, and popular music and has attended most of the jazz and blues festivals in this country and many abroad. He is a pianist and drummer and a good friend of most of the musicians who have either passed through the Bay Area or who are part of the large

community of performers in the greater Bay Area. Elwood graduated from the University of California in Berkeley, began graduate work there (in U.S. History) then completed his Master's degree at Stanford.

His BYU Big Band, *Synthesis*, has achieved much acclaim both nationally and internationally including First Place at the Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival and performances at the Montreux, North Sea, Pori, Riga, and Kongsberg Jazz Festivals. Smith is also very active in the recording studios and can be heard on many movies, national ads, and TV programs including daily air play on ABC Good Morning America.

Dr. Robert Spittal

Robert Spittal is the Director of Bands at Gonzaga University, where he conducts the wind ensemble and jazz ensembles. He also teaches music theory and jazz history, and performs on flutes and saxophones with the Faculty Jazz Quartet.
