Dear Sir:

Just a few lines to tell you of the deep felt gratitude for the course in Psyciana you are sending me. As you know I am a lifer here in the Missouri State Penitentiary, and at the time I wrote you I had little or no hopes of anything but a long stretch of bleak, dreary years in penal servitude. I wrote you in regard to your course more out of curiosity and a desire to pass time more than anything else. After receiving your first dynamic lesson and letter my interest quickened and I found myself reading the lesson over and over again. I looked forward to the coming of the second lesson and devoured it as eagerly as I did the first. Following lessons were received as avidly and I found myself doing your little exercises with zest. They awakened a peculiar feeling in me. I felt as though I had known and believed those things all the time, deep down in my inner self, but that they had lain dormant and that it only took your coaching to bring them out. I found myself getting ahead of you in lessons, I mean by that, using a present lesson as a basis, I would go into contemplation and build up on the thoughts that lesson inspired, and when the next lesson came I would find that I had anticipated some of the thoughts brought out in it. I put the mighty power of the living God to a test as you suggested and found it never failing.

I have received thirteen lessons to date but the great God Law has already proved its willingness to me, to help any one who will attune himself to it. This is what has happened to me. I had accepted this life sentence, "under the bludgeonings of chance"; and my head was bloody and bowed. I had given up all hope and I was broke in spirit as well as materiel means. After I had applied your principals for a few weeks, I began to have a new outlook, a little of that "hope" began to revive. Then out of a clear sky came an offer from my attorney to file an appeal with the Supreme Court for a discharge of my case. He offered his services free if only the expense of his trip were paid. The great God Law was working. Last week my case came up for a hearing. It has been taken under advisment, and it will be several weeks before a decision is handed down. I am confident of the outcome, but I am young and inexperienced in applying this mighty power. Will you Dr. Robinson <sup>use your</sup> mighty experience toward a favorable decision for me? I cannot adequately thank you here on paper, but it must suffice until I can personally clasp your hand and tell you of the wonderful change you have made in my life and the things you have made it possible for me to do.
