me before. Every morning I have my
quiet "hour" with God and it brings
me peace which I never knew before.

My health is much better than it
was 25 years ago, although I am
now 52 years of age. I have an
electric pump for the water. It is in
a small concrete room down in the
ground. The water would seep in during
the winter and have to be dipped out. I
got so discouraged. But this last
Spring, when I looked in, it was dry.
God did that for me. Several things
like that have been remedied for me
by God.

I shall never forget what you did
for my married daughter in Buffalo
when I sent you the telegram.

I have only one other child - an
unmarried daughter who is a pharmacist.
She is now 23 and her health is not

good but I feel the Siving God will
restore her to abundant health yet.
I asked you, Dr. Robinson, to do
what you could and I know you did.
I suppose some cures come slowly.
Last winter, in my quiet hour with
God, I was thinking of my daughter.
I saw strange men and a trained
nurse. In a couple of days, my
daughter had an attack of acute
appendicitis. Remembering what I
had seen, I advised an operation.
The report from the laboratory was
that in four hours, the appendix would
have burst. She has been better since
the operation. Gas in the abdomen and
lack of appetite now bother her. But I
have faith in God.

I think of you, Dr. Robinson, and
I feel convinced God will see you
through. If it is not asking too
much of you, could you give my
