I have just been released from the Penitentiary. A gracious friend forwarded to me, during my incarceration, the full course of "PSYCHIANA" lessons, which prompted me to write the enclosed article which I have dedicated to your work and entitled it the "Fallacy of Fear". I hope you will read it and pass it along to anyone that needs a "builder up".

I am sure, with your responsibilities, you have many lonely periods - sensing defeat for some of your plans and in those silent midnight hours feel that your strength is dependent upon the Supreme Commander.

God will give you strength and courage to master all.

We face grief with dismay - and usually in utter loneliness, and would be apt to lose our bearing, if it were not for the light ahead, and the Unseen Hand ever guiding toward that light.

Please remember these inspired words which is the source of all human courage - "Wait upon the Lord, be of good courage, and He will strengthen thy heart."

During my enforced exile from the outside world, there seemed little chance of my rising to the surface of freedom again.

To me, however, an improbability is a direct incentive to make the improbable not merely probable, but certain. I hope the fates will be propitious and that I can again re-establish myself.

At the present time I am confined in the County Jail - contesting my removal to West Virginia on indictments rendered many years ago - but a priest in that State still insists on having his "pound of flesh".

THE FALLACY OF FEAR

(From the Viewpoint of a Convict)

I am a convict. I have just been released from the Penitentiary.

Convicts in general are free of the Messiah complex, although perfectly willing to dispense the means of salvation if they happen to have it.

I prefer the evil foreboding role of the Greek prophetess to that of a fatuous Pollyanna, dispensing shallow cheer.

An inexperienced narrator probably reveals more than is mannerly.

I have been unproductive and unashamed, devoid of evangelical fervor with no ambition to serve my fellow man, curious only to study him and am enormously amused when I observe lack of intestinal fortitude.

Picture the mental reaction of a lone convict incarcerated in a penitentiary. I lived the life and I wrote it down. I wanted to see for myself and see I did. My viewpoint is not due to old age or approaching senility which often play strange pranks with the mind nor due to disappointments with life. It was gradual and due entirely to the daily experiences encountered during my incarceration. Visualize a

pair of eyes together with a moving hand whose function is that of a needle on a phonograph record to record imperfectly what is so perfect.

I have reached the contemplative age. The contemplative desire is universal, being in the spirit, the prime mover of mankind. I have reached that period. It usually comes somewhere in the fifth decade when a man decides he is going to do anything worth while, he had better get started. During my forced exile from the outside world I was convinced of how little I knew, and how much there was to find out, and now that I could do it, I was going to set forth - bound for the beauty and wonder of happiness and life and a better understanding of that great bugaboo FEAR.

Religion has been called the refuge of those with weak minds. This is not true. The mind coupled with religion becomes a STRONGER mind because it is not readily swayed by the passions and emotions that masquerade as sense and reason.

In my own life and experience, because of my own thinking I was bound by an influence of inferiority, by a weak body - a fear of people and conditions bordering in hopelessness. Then the light of truth began to dawn upon me. My spiritual awakening did not come all at once. Through faith and prayer I gradually cast off, one by one, these destructive thoughts. But even with a view to demonstrating the FALLACY of FEAR I should not presume to offer others ideas worked out purely for myself, unless they were based on EXPERIENCE. Experience is not what happens to a man, it is what a man DOES with what happens to him. No other would be worth while. The mere exposition of a theory would have little or no value. It is a case in which nothing can be helpful to others, which

has not been demonstrated for oneself. These ideas worked out for myself are not original with me. All I have done has been to put ideas through my own mind, co-ordinating them to suit my own situations. The ideas themselves come from many sources. As Emerson says "Thought is the property of him who can adequately place it. A certain awkwardness marks the use of borrowed thoughts, but as soon as we learned what to do with them, they become our own. Thus all originality is relative."

If, therefore one has the feeblest contribution to make to the defeat of fear, it becomes difficult to withhold it. There is at the beginning a dead lift to all personal achievement. We have to pull ourselves up by our boot straps. But once we have made even a small START, plenty of forces rush to our aid. We are reluctant to tackle anything new. We give an excellent imitation of a small boy postponing his inevitable plunge into cold water.

It takes time to warm up, say we in extenuation. Remember that "eventually why not now" is a sound motto. Everybody assumed fear was an inevitable state. You were born subject to fear and that was the end of it, just as you were born subject to death. As daily dreads and fears confronted you, GOD was counted out. He had nothing to do with them, nor could He eradicate them and many thought He brought them upon us. Many are of the present belief that to seek help from Him in this world or to look for rewards from Him NOW is considered a form of ungodliness. Those who believe in danger and live in fear of it, will inevitably experience it. If we THINK fear, all of our actions are fearful. If we ACT fearless and brave, we ARE COURAGEOUS and are able to meet any issue. Those who live in the realization that God is their

protection, find God their refuge. There is no conquest of fear that is not based on God. There may be short detours by which fear can be temporarily OUTWITTED but its EXTERMINATION can be accomplished only in one way.

To exile fear, it is necessary to train the thought to SEE God expressing Himself in all the good, pleasant and enjoyable things that come to us. This requires forming a habit - say to yourself daily and hourly - "THIS IS GOD," "THAT IS GOD," of incidents, persons, occasions, situations and things that we rarely have thought of in that relation.

As a rule we take our good things for granted, complaining that they are not better. The things we lack are more vivid to us than those we have acquired. An important element in convincing yourself of the fallacy of fear is the courage to RELEASE yourself from the shackles of tradition.

The great majority of us prefer a second hand God. We will accept what somebody else has learned, rather than take the responsibility of learning for ourselves. We take our knowledge of God as we take a dose of medicine, from a prescription which one man has written down and another has "put up," and still another administers. By the time it has reached us, it is diluted and weakened by all kinds of outside opinions and personalities. It is, therefore not strange that it does little to effect a cure, and failed to show the way. One will never be liberated from fear, by clinging to the teachings which have inspired fear. We are fearless as we grow independent enough to know for ourselves. Many of us suffer from the inability to forget the traditional. The fact that other people have accepted certain ideas had convinced me

that I should accept them too. To get out of line on my own account and make my own observations would be dangerous. It is often necessary to forget the tradition we have outlined. Many times the things we have outlined will be something dear to us, because there was a time when it served our purpose.

The refusal to follow new light simply because it is new leads to mental paralysis. It is an old adage in all progress that the more we conquer the more easily we conquer. We form a habit of conquering as consistent as any other habit. Victory becomes to some degree, a state of mind. Knowing ourselves victorious and superior and the master of anxieties, troubles, worries and fears which beset us, we are SUPERIOR. To be in harmony with the CONQUEST and VICTORY principal, you are automatically in harmony with power and to be in harmony with power is to be strong. The one who fears is so filled with the thought of fear that he cannot see within himself the presence of God which is the spirit of courage. CEASE to BELIEVE that the state of things in the world about you can stir up things within you. Knowing that fear is entirely mental and that you get rid of it, when you change your mind from fear to courage. The thought of courage is just as easy to hold as is the thought of fear. Your courage comes from God. You cannot fear persons or things when you realize that there is ever within you that spirit of courage which ever inspires you to courageous action. Courage replaces fear in your life when the THOUGHT of GOD replaces the thought of THAT WHICH HAS CALLED UP FEAR.

My battle against fearing God for many years was no help to me or of no help of which I was aware, until I "discovered God" in my own way. It was so simple and easy and so refreshing and invigorating as to give me an entirely new viewpoint of life, a new life. Most people keep God concealed and bring him out for occasional use. God will never be much help in overcoming fear until we RELEASE Him from CONCEALMENT and meet Him in the open as a pal. One must say to God and mean it: "Thou art my hiding place; thou shalt preserve me from trouble, thou shalt compass me about with songs of deliverance." One can know God easily so long as we do not feel it necessary to define Him. Once having grasped the truth, I began to see how easy knowing God became. I ceased trying to VISUALIZE a mental picture created by others. God being a complete summary of all good things (since all good things emanate from Him) therefore if I am to see Him at all, I must see GOOD in all things. "The soul cannot move, wake or open the eyes without seeing God." It is just physical vision with spiritual understanding.

Of all fears, the most haunting are those associated with money. Most of us have many responsibilities and are afraid of not being able to keep pace with their demands. Let's examine money fears. Now God is the most generous of all paymasters. The simplest way to express it is that consciously trying to work with God (not man) as our employer, things happen to us which to the best of our foresight, would not have happened otherwise. Often they seem accidental and possibly we ascribe them to accidents till the coincidence becomes too numerous to explain by coincidence.

God's generosity most frequently occurs in opening doors for us where we saw nothing but blank walls. He MAKES favorable things happen. It may be said that they would have happened anyhow, but when they have happened on our looking to Him, and not have happened when we did not

look to Him, the only fair conclusion to draw is that HE WAS BEHIND THE EVENT. It may also be urged that if there really was a God who delighted in us He would make favorable things happen to us whether we looked to Him or not. So he does. Every life, even among those who never think of Him are full of such occurrences. Every individual obtains some measure of supply for his necessities and in most cases a liberal one.

We have already seen that fear is diminished in proportion as we understand that our trials are not without motive. "Thou therefore endure hardening as a good soldier of Jesus Christ." It is exactly what most of us need. Be a man in accepting it - in other words don't be a cream puff.

Most of us do not understand that in overcoming fear, the hardening of the inner man is a great ally. The object is not so much to ward off fear so that it shouldn't touch us; but to let it strike and rebound because it could make no impact and therefore no injury. It is a strengthening Process and enables us to MEET FEAR with SERENITY. We meet this issue many times in the struggle brought about through living in a world of men such as men are today. Whether justly or unjustly, others attack or hurt or worry or anger us, the knowledge that through the very trial, we are threatened within, strengthens our moral muscle. It is a definite support. Whether catastrophe overwhelms us or not, he who chooses not to fear can be FREE from fear.

There is a refuge for him, a defense, a safeguard which no material attack can break through. "He that dwelleth in the secret place of the most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty." "I will say of the Lord; in Him will I trust." We have the further assurance that "because thou has made the Lord which is my refuge - even the most High - thy

habitation, there shall no evil befall thee, neither shall any plague come nigh thy dwelling, for He shall give His angels charge over thee to keep thee in all thy ways." To the material alone, we are in the habit of ascribing power, though we repeat many times in the course of a year, "For their's is the kingdom, the power and the glory," - yet we do not BELIEVE it. To few of us, is it more than a sonorous phrase. After many sins David was able to write these words "I sought the Lord and He delivered me out of all my fears." It is the royal avenue, and is OPEN TO ANYONE.

Hardship by hardship, task by task, failure by failure, conquest by conquest, we pull ourselves up a little higher in the scale. Some day we shall find all that we have been groping and looking for and will be delivered out of all our fears.

I was always sold with the idea that nothing would be brought to pass unless I worried and fretted over it, whereas it will do well to memorize, "fret not thyself else shalt thou be moved to do evil." Living in such an atmosphere (a cloud about ourselves) we disregard the uncountable ways in which God persists in shining through in spite of our efforts to shut Him out. We are too busily engaged in directing our lives for ourselves - God is responsible for us and we will be convinced as soon as we relinquish responsibility for ourselves. The course of our lives is God's business, remember the advice "commit my way unto Him, He would bring it to pass."

Now that we have placed responsibility where it belongs - let us devote our attention to Trust. Trust is simply the knowledge, that the supreme command rules everything to everybody's advantage. Trust is not a power that we have to force from ourselves against reason, it must be a natural impulse. One actual experience or practical test of trust will convince

you of its merit. Then you will agree that for Him to direct you is the surest way to security and peace. When you cannot trust God you cannot trust anybody or anything. Witness the condition of the world today.

Patience in overcoming fear is important. Do not confuse patience with resignation. Often we think we are being patient when we are merely being resigned. Patience should be thought of in connection with perseverance. It is the attribute that enables one to go forward when the odds appear to be against him, and it requires a vision that can look beyond obstacles to observe the victory over fear that is being manifested. It demands faith in God and in fellow man. We must use patience in every situation in life. Through patience we can turn each circumstance to account and strengthen us in our onward journey. That which seems to be disaster to the human mind, becomes an asset to us when we have the patience and perseverance to observe a blessing from it. Impatience is always a sign of lack of trust in God. When impatient man thinks of working out matters in his own life independent of God he will be sure to fail. You increase in TRUST when you increase in PATIENCE.

Do not be inclined to wonder how conditions or circumstances come to be what they are and NEVER TRY TO REVIEW ADVERSE CAUSES and EFFECTS. In conclusion - fear and discouragements - timidity and thoughts of inferiority complex vanish when you realize YOU are a child of God. Do not let your FEARS CLOUD your world and WEAKEN your natural ability. When problems and complexities arise in your life that baffle or dishearten you, or when conditions in the world cause you anxiety or worry; LOOK to GOD. He will imbue you with a spirit of strength and courage, so that you may fearlessly face any condition or situation. Recognize your fears as HARMLESS phantoms

of your mind, that fear IS a fallacy - a creation of a vivid imagination.
