Robert G. Ingersoll stated his creed thus:

According to the dictionary "happiness applies to the enjoyment or pleasurable satisfaction attendant on welfare - a state of well-being." A state of well-being for any one individual, therefore. necessarily means both mental and physical well-being. One can be in perfect physical condition but still have certain mental trepidations and inhibitions which retard his search for happiness. In essence, mental development and introspection is indeed necessary to the complete development of the individual. To have no religious faith whatever is detrimental not only to the individual but to society as a whole because he cannot develop that phase of his character which is some-
