Her mother met her father in Elma, Washington, they were married there. Had their first baby there but he died. Moved to Lenore to homestead in 1918.

158 When six her father went to Bolville to work in the lumber camp. Occurred in 1918 during WWI. Later moved to Moscow where her dad became a policeman. Mother did farm work and had eight children. Her sister died when she was 14 years old, was a heart problem. Mother worked to pay sisters medical expenses.

170 Went to stay with Mrs. Moore when she was in the fifth grade until she started junior high. Moved to different places because parents couldn't afford to take care of her. Stayed with Mrs. Moore because she was sick. Her husband was a lawyer and didn't like to leave her alone. In junior high spent one year with the Halls family. Next year went to stay with the Harry Drisco family. Her senior year she went to the University of Idaho. She went for two years, then returned to Mrs Drisco's sisters home. 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245 Husband's name was Rudolf Jacob Berry. Born on January 5, 1903. His

occupation, was a farmer, lumber mill worker, worked in restraurants. He was born in Palouse, Washington. They were married in Asotin, Washington in 1934. They had two daughters. Thelma Bernd was born in Palouse, Washington on July 17, 1935. She became a teacher and had her masters. Her husband in a Colonel in the Army at Fort Lewis. Her other daughter is Judy Rivers. She lives in Lewsiton and was born in Lewiston on June 18, 1945. She works for a doctor as a receptionist.

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263 Eunice's Education. Went two years and three summers at University of Idaho. Went one semester at Lewiston Normal School. After daughters done with high school she went back and did substitute cooking for the school district. She also cooked for the church camp, YWCA camp cooks, and started private catering service for 12 years, then cooked at Lions Club every tuesday evening for six years and had other cooking jobs.

345 Fears for grandchildren's future. Doesn't want them to suffer through the hardships she experienced. Feels parents disciplined children. Watched them go through experimenting with cars, booze, drugs. Feels a church orientated family is stronger and can suffer through and deal with the problems the children have to face when growing up. Didn't like it when her daughter went to work. But sees good in it because her daughter wasn't happy as a homemaker. Also sees her daughter spending and devoting more of her free time with her children. Feels the discipline from her daughter working has rubbed off on the children. They are more disciplined, do chores on time, and sees her daughter doing a better job at housekeeping. Goes for both daughters.

360 Judy's husband is an alcoholic. Has tried legal help and has gone to the minister. He won't admit his problem. Judy works very hard to keep things together. She has taken charge of the family affairs. The children fear their dad.
