Feels sorry for youth of today because of their dependence on 'wheels'; was more dependent on own resources for entertainment: too much free time today: sooner you learn to work. better off you are; felt she didn't have enough time to play. Childhood recreational activities: hiking, sunrise breakfasts, fishing picnics with community families, had old victrola for dancing parties; jam sessions, active church groups; high school students helped in primary grades; many school activities for all. courted 7-8 months, known casually for several years; didn't go too much on dates since it was during the Depression would go out with groups of young people husband had a Chevrolet coupe; reason for marriage - 'the thing to do'. \$80 a month first year; \$85 a month second year; quit teaching when she married because she 'didn't have to work', man's place to support family; enjoyed teaching but happy to just keep a home; forced back to teaching during WW II. not many qualified teachers in area.

smooth transition to marriage, set up housekeeping in Boville ; give and take necessary in life. In Elk River, Potlatch Lumber Company took 'care of its own', hospital factilities for company employees. Now services not available. Raised when communications with world were limited; now the whole world is at their (youth of today) doorstep. 378 - 430

travel, fish, mushrooming, likes woods: cards: rather old-fashioned likes things to entertain rather than cause to worry, watches the news, likes to read.

worked teaching during the war because of war needs, not personal needs; no children of her own, had brother's children, neighborhood children to enjoy, not to worry about; Very few in Boville travel, probably due to lack of interest; she travels because of her upbringing; concept of saving toward travelling because of like and interest.

during Depression, all were in the same category - little money to spend; during the War, had the money but couldn't travel due to gas rationing; During Depression, small towns 'took care of their own', the Company gave food and money to those in need; gave transients whatever she had, never afraid of those men.

In Arizona, sure to lock doors and not go out at night; usually locks doors at home at night and when gone. averages at least one trip weekly. still involved in church activities, spends 4 months a year in Arizona. 4 H Activities 4 H cooking, made cookies once a week for father; on way to elocution contest, brakes failed on Model A, supterintendent had to 'turn it over'; trained to eat what was put in front of them! more training then than now.

Entertaining in the 20's even casual entertainment. used best linens. etc.: high school girls did sewing, made favors for bridge parties to earn pin money; dipped flowers in paraffin to put in desserts; no paper plates used, fancy china, fancy tablecloths, etc.; House shined from top to bottom; Bridge club usually 4 - 6 tables; evenings with men 10 - 12 tables. started University in 1929. not home much then. Entertainment probably wasn't as elaborate during the Depression, but it still occurred. Aware that there was a lot less money but they still got together because there wasn' t anything else to do. Everyone brought what they had. Today, people get out and go more, started changing after WW II. Always something to do if you wanted to go find it. Advent of cars changed trend from social functions. talked things over; lived in Boville due to husband's work: still there due to established home. carrying it too far: everyone deserves freedom, should be a matter of choice; men should have as much time to themselves as women do. we all must take on responsibility; if you don't learn self-discipline through work, it is difficult to function as adult. influence of the Depression - feeling of importance of savings; credit pushed onto newer generations; doesn't believe in too much credit; Raised to save some of what you got. especially in days before Social Security. pensions. had to save for retirement; People today depend on the government.
